PROCEEDINGS OF THE NINTH ANNUAL SESSION of the South Carolina State Association of the Original Free Will Baptist Held with Lockhart Church, Lockhart, S. C., Nov. 15-16, 1951.

MORNING SESSION

1. The South Carolina State Association of the Original Free Will Baptist met with Lockhart Church, Lockhart, S. C. in its nineth session on Thursday and Friday, Nov. 15, 16, 1951 at 10:00 o'clock. The President, Rev. L. A. Holliday called the meeting to order and the opening song was "Are You Washed" after which Rev. W. L. Jernigan led in prayer.

The Devotional and Welcome address was by the host Pastor, the Reverend A. F. Lawter. His talk was based on Gal. 6:14 where Paul said "God forbid that I should Glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world."

The Response was given by Rev. Edison Kirby of Lake City who is Pastor of the Sumter Church.

Following the Welcome and Response the appointment of committees was then made as follows:

At this time there was a motion made that the State Association adopt the National Treatise of the National Association of the Original Free Will Baptist as our Articles of Faith and Practices. This motion was carried, which involved a change in the Church Covenant to conform with that in the National Treatise, which Covenant may be found toward the back of these minutes.

Following the above the President brought his annual message. The Service was opened by singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" with Rev. Fred Powers as director and Rev. Carlisle Hanna at the piano.

The President's Text was from Matt. 25:13 "Watch Therefore for Ye know neither the Day nor the hour wherein the Son of Man cometh."

Rev. Holliday brought a most timely message, in which he pointed out that, we are not to fear the coming of the Lord, but rather we are to look forward to it with happy expectation, because the greatest incentive to the Christian is the coming of Christ.

He also pointed out that we should not be ashamed that we are small, notwithstanding the fact that there is consolation in great numbers. "Yet," said he, "I believe that God has a special place for Free Will Baptist in world Evangelism in these last days.

Brother Holliday pointed out that "as long as we stay humble, as long as we follow Christ He will continue to Bless us. The Challenge is so great to Free

Will Baptist that we cannot afford to be divided, however Satan's greatest attack is upon the Church, we've seen the effects of His work as Deacon's and Ministers have yielded and been led by the forces of Satan.

He also pointed out the 'Virgins' were waiting and watching and as a Church we should be ready for the task, to do this our greatest need is consecration—or putting the Church First.

The work of the Ministry is a work of Sacrifice, Let us be Obedient, and Let us Go Forward.

We then recessed for five minutes.

We re-assembled for the Associational Message which was brought by Rev. Paul J. Ketteman of Pamplico, S. C. who brought a very timely message on Customs; and was enjoyed by all.

'We then recessed for lunch, which was spread by the Ladies of the Church.



THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

At 1:30 we re-assembled for the evening session, the devotional was conducted by Rev. B. L. Shook who used as his Tx. Matt. 10:32.

FREE WILL BAPTIST LEAGUE REPORT

Recommendation No. 2—That ALL PASTORS of our Churches be required to support, endorse, and encourage the work of the League.

Recommendation No. 3—That any Pastor who refuses or rejects the work of the League without showing just and proper reason should be subject to disciplinary action by his quarterly meeting or conference.

Recommendation No. 4—That all encouragement be given the Local Leaders to cooperate with the Nationwide League Conference and the National League Board.

RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

Article No. 1—Whereas, We, the Free Will Baptist of the State of South Carolina assembled in session at Lockhart, S. C., Nov. 16, 1951 wish to go on record, protesting the appointment of an ambassador to the Vatican in Rome, believing in the fundamentals of the National Constitution, which clearly states that Church and State shall ever be kept separated.

Whereby, we recommend that a copy of this resolution be wired to the President of the United States by the President of this Association.

Article No. 2—Whereas we hereby recommend that paragraph No. 3 on page 35 of the Revised National Treatise of the Faith and Practices of the Original Free Will Baptist be read before this body without any discussion.

Article No. 3—Whereas, we feel the need of proper identification for the Ordained Ministers of our State—Be it therefore resolved that the Clerk of this State Association be Authorized to draw up and have printed a card of Identification to be issued by the Clerk of the Local Conferences to the Ordained Ministers of that Conference or Association.

Be it also resolved that any person who cannot show this card shall not be recognized by the Churches of our State as an Ordained Minister of our State Association.

The Devotions was conducted by Rev. C. E. Lambert of Darlington, who brought a very timely message, which was enjoyed by all.

The first business was taken up. Home Mission report by Seldon Bullard. After the Home Mission Report, it was decided that all Home Mission money be divided between local and national work.

Report on Bible College By Rev. Henry Melvin, Business Manager

Brother Melvin brought a good report on the college, pointing out that the growth had been 650 percent in nine years, also that in 1951 it had made 37 percent growth over 1950.

He also pointed out that the facilities at the School was not adequate for much growth in the future, there is a great need of purchasing or building Dormitories to accommodate several hundred students, as of present we cannot care for all of the present student body in the present buildings, as a result, we have several living outside the Dormitories.

The College is one of the greatest needs in our work, and more and more people are realizing this important fact every day. Rev. Melvin called upon everyone to support the College whole-heartedly.

Orphanage Report

The Orphanage Report was made verbally by the Superintendent, which was very good.

Brother Baggetts Financial Report did not get in, in time to be heard.

Superannuation Report and Adoption of Constitution and By-Laws

The Report of Superannuation was made by Rev. Paul J. Keteman, Sec.-Trea.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearances of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the Scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship; and by self-denial, faith, and good works endeavor to "grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences; public worship, and the observance of the ordnances of the Gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church. of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able to promote the success of the church and of the Gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprises, the support of the Missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the World. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION OF ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS CONVENTION

Preamble: We, the oficials, ministers and delegates of this the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists, while in session at Una Church, Spartanburg, South Carolina, November 13-14, 1946, do accept and adopt the foregoing constitution and by-laws.

Article One. This body shall be known henceforth as the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists.

Article Two. It shall be the purpose of this organization to cooperate with the National Association in its efforts to elicit combine, and direct the energies of the Free Will Baptist Church, for the promotion of Home and Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Sunday School, Free Will Baptist League and Womans Auxiliary Work, and for the extension of the kingdom of God in general.

Article Three:

Section One. This Association shall consist of delegates duly appointed or elected by the church or organizations to represent, and ordain and licensed Free Will Baptists Ministers, who are of good repute in the Original Free Will Baptist Church, and who reside in South Carolina, or hold membership in, or pastor a church in South Carolina.

Section Two. Each Association or Conference, may represent in this Association on the basis of two delegates for each Association and Conference of one thousand members or less, and one additional delegate for each additional thousand members or fractions thereof.

Section Three. Any local church that desires to may send an additional delegate, provided said church sends a contribution for Association expenses of not less than \$5.00.

Article Four. This Association shall have an Executive committee of five, composed of ordained ministers and lay members in good standing in the Association, one to be appointed by the Moderator each year for a five year term, to act officially in the event any case may arise in this Association, when, and only when it is deemed necessary or expedient for the best interest of the cause of the church in general.

Article Five. The officers of this Association shall be a president, first, second and third vice-president, a corresponding secretary, a recording secretary, and a treasurer and a reading clerk. Said reading clerk to take the place of the recording secretary in his absence.

Section Two. These officers are to be elected by the Association to serve a term of two years.

Article Six. All officers of this Association, all members of its committees and boards, all its secretaries, missionaries, and agents appointed by the Association or by any of its boards, shall be members of regular Free Will Baptist Organizations in South Carolina cooperating with this Association.

Article Seven. All missionaries, teachers and Christian workers approved, appointed, or supported by this Association must be fundamental in their views of the Bible and its teachings, and in harmony with the doctrines of the Original Free Will Baptist church. They must also give evidence of genuine Christian piety, for fervent zeal in the service of Christ, and of ability to do the work for which they are considered.

Article Eight. This Association shall hold its meeting annually on Thursday and Friday of the week between the second and third Sundays in November, beginning at 10:00 a. m., unless, or until, some change of the time of the year shall be thought best.

Article Nine. Articles may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.

★ ★ ★ BY-LAWS OF THE ASSOCIATION

1. A portion of the Scripture shall be read and prayer offered at the beginning of each morning and afternoon session of the Association, and prayer shall be offered at the close of each session.

This is to be done by the President, or someone appointed by him.

2. The President or Vice-President shall call the Association to order at the hour designated by the program committee.

When neither the President or the Vice-President is present, the Recording Secretary shall call the Association to order and a President Pro-Tem shall be elected by the body, who shall preside for that session of the Association.

- 3. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to enroll the delegates of the Association who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their right to seats therein, and those enrolled by the Secretary shall compose the Association.
- 4. Each organization represented in the Association shall send into the Association as large a contribution as they can from time to time. This money to be used to meet the expenses of the Association and to promote the work it undertakes.
- 5. On the first day of the Association meeting the President shall appoint a Resolution Committee to consist of three members, all resolutions not connected with the reports of boards and committees shall be referred to this committee, which shall report on all resolutions referred to it, with or without recommendation.
- 6. The officers of the Association, the departmental Secretaries, the Executive Committee, and all boards shall be elected by the Association. All other committees may be either appointed by the President or elected by the body.

In the election of officers, boards, or committees, the votes may be by ballot if preferred, or by any other method agreed upon by the body.

- 7. In the event of a standing Executive Committee, the members shall be elected for a term of five years except the first four elected, who shall serve a period of one, two, three and four years respectively.
- 8. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows: 1. To act for the Association in matters that demand its consideration between the regular annual sessions of the Association. 2. To have oversight of arrangements for meetings of the Association with the authority to change, if necessary, the time and place of meeting. 3. To fill vacancies in the Association that may be caused by death, resignation, etc., between the regular sessions of the Assn.
- 9. It shall be required of all members of the Association to remain throughout the entire session, unless they are excused by a majority vote of the body.
- 10. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President, and shall wait until he is recognized before speaking further. 1. The President shall not allow discussions that are unchristian in spirit and that tend to creat envy and strife among the brethren, and anyone resenting the ruling of the President in such matters shall be liable to censure of body.
- 12. No one shall be allowed to speak more than 15 minutes or more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 13. It shall be the duty of the President to have his annual message so prepared and arranged that it can be handed to the Secretary for publication in the minutes of each session of the Association.

14. The officers of this Association, except that of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee, shall be for a term of two years.

15. These By-Laws may be altered at any regular session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.
