THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

Since the National Association has changed the board of Superannuation to.
 "Pastor's Retirement and Insurance", We recommend that we change the
 Board of Superannuation to, "Pastor's Retirement and Insurance Board,"
 every where it is listed in the constitution.

ARTICLE VII

2. The Blue Cross and Blue Shield Group leader is to be advanced \$125.00 for an operational fund. From these funds he will pay for office supplies, stamps, and travel. He is to get 7 cents per mile for travel. He will also pay himself \$50.00 per year for services rendered. At the end of each State Association meeting, he will be reimbursed for the amount he has spent. Each year the fund will be brought back up to \$125.00.

3. ARTICLE VIII

- 1. Foreign Missions Field Director. His duties are to make a report of the activities and work carried on in the State during the past year. Give a report of planned activities and promotions for the coming year.
- Home Missions Field Director. His duties are the same as the Foreign Missions Director's above.
- 3. Church Training Service Field Director. His duties are to give a report from the State C.T.S. convention on the activities, and accomplishments of the past

year, and the plans of the coming year's activities.

4. Blue Cross and Blue Shield Group Ins. Leader. His duties are to receive all premiums from the pastors, and make the payments to the company. He is to be a representative of the Group's interest to the company, and report to the group concerning the group's standing, and of any changes that might be made.

OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS:

- We recommend that we continue to have our State Associational meetings in November.
- 2. We recommend that we leave the State Association Treasurey and the Promotional Treasurey separated, because it would put extra work on the promotional Secretary, and make the work load to heavy for a pastor.
- 3. We investigated the possibility of the National Association meeting in Columbia, S.C. in 1973. They are going to build some new Motels in Columbia that are supposed to be ready by 1973, but they were not sure they would be ready. So, in face of this, we recommend that we resubmit an invitation for 1974 or 1975.

APPENDIX X

REPORT OF S.C. FREE WILL BAPTIST YOUTH CAMP

Our annual encampment was held at Camp Forest, Cheraw State Park, Cheraw, S. C. in August. There was the largest number attending this year that has attended in the past several years. The first session we had 144 campers plus staff for a total of 181 people. The second session we had 103 campers plus staff for a total of 131. There were 32 young people who had made reservations put for one reason or another did not attend.

The emcampment was a good one in that several were saved, others rededicated their lives to the Lord, and still others answered the call of God to missionary service. It was also good in that the staff worked effectively together. The men and women who gave of their time to make camp a success this year truly gave themselves. Therefore, I believe that each person present today should let it be known that we appreciate these folks making our encampment possible.

If there are laymen who you think would be interested in working with youth camp please have them contact me about the first of March and I will submit the necessary information for them to apply for a staff position. The

ministers will receive information about this time also. The executive committee selects the staff from the applications that are submitted to the director between March and mid-May each year.

There are several areas in which we will need your help during our encampment next summer. They are: (1) Cooperation of each Pastor in encouraging the young people of our Churches to attend camp. (2) Cooperation of parents in permitting their children to attend. (3) A person with cooking experience for large groups to operate our kitchen. This job is contracted to some individual each year. He hires his help, cooks the meals, wash dishes, cleans the kitchen, etc. He prepares 30 meals for approximately 180 people. (4) A man and woman each having a "Senior Life-Saving" certification to serve as life guard during our swim time. A certification by either Red Cross or the "Y" is acceptable.

Let me encourage you to pray for our youth encampment. We have some of the best young people in the world in our State. They want a good CHRISTIAN youth camp and they need the type of camping situation we have been giving them for the past several years. Not all the young people who attend our encampment are Christians and therefore they don't fully appreciate a camp where Jesus is exalted and glorified in EVERY activity. However, the majority of our young people do appreciate the efforts put forth to have our encampment and look forward to attending.

APPENDIX XII

REPORT OF BLUE CROSS, BLUE SHIELD GROUP LEADER

The office was established by the S. C. State Association of Free Will Baptist on November 14, 1969 to handle the Blue Cross, Blue Shield hospitalization group sponsored by the Association for our ministers during this associational year while a study is conducted by the Executive Committee.

The office was functioning by December 1, 1969 as instructed by the body in establishing the office. This year has been somewhat less than 100% satisfaction. The Florence Office of Blue Cross, Blue Shield has not been as cooperative as they were during my past services as group leader. I have not had any correspondence with them as to changes they have made in their methods until I call to find out why a given service has been handled in a particular way. The secretaries handle all the affairs while the representatives solicit more groups. This possibly accounts for some of the delays in your claims being settled promptly.

I appreciate the cooperation I've received from the ministers in payment of your premium. With the exception to a couple of incidents there was promptness in payment and therefore very little headaches for me in this area. Let me again remind you that the payment must be mailed by the group leader on the tenth of the month. Therefore, if your check is received on the eleventh or thereafter and you were already a month in arrears your coverage had been reported for lapse and the lapse will be effective as the first of the month for which the payment was missed.

We still have 25 members in our group. Some have dropped out during the past year and others joined to replace those who did drop out. Therefore, we have the same number as we had at this time last year.

Below you will find an accounting of the \$100 advancement given to me last year for the operational expense of the office.

Our group policy offers a semi-private room paid in full; \$20 deductible; Miscellaneous Hospital Services paid in full; 70 days allowance; \$325 Medical-Surgical Coverage.

COSTS

The above coverage for family coverage (Husband & wife, or husband & wife plus any number of children below 19 years of age, single, and dependant on parents) is \$34.30 per month. An additional \$10,000 of Dread Disease is available for \$1.45 per month. Therefore, a family coverage plan with Dread Disease costs \$35.75 per month. The Dread Disease Coverage is for each member of the family.

The above coverage for the minister only is \$13.25. An additional \$10,000 for Dread Disease is available for \$.80 per month. Therefore, an individual contract with Dread Disease costs \$14.05 per month.

RESOLUTION COMMITTEE REPORT

Whereas,

There is much confusion among Bible-believing Christians, across our

country today, as a result of unreliable versions or paraphrases of the Bible, And Whereas.

There is being widely circulated across this state and Nation the newest of these versions, called *Good News for Modern* or *Today's English Version* (TEV), published by the American Bible Society,

And Whereas,

.

There are some serious errors in Today's English Version that distort and alter in some places the plain message of the New Testament as taught in the original language,

And whereas,

These distortions are significant in that they deal with and attempt to weaken the major doctrines of the Bible, such as the deity of Christ, His virgin birth, the blood atonement, salvation by grace, and further, by omission, addition, and/or interpretation, ignore, weaken, or destroy such great doctrinal concepts as repentance, propitiation, redemption, reconciliation, justification, righteousness.

And whereas,

These facts reveal an unfaithfulness to and disregard for the plenary, verbal (whole, word for word) inspiration of the Bible to which we as Free Will Baptists ardently adhere.

And whereas,

To keep silent as we see the perversion of God's truth, is to be untrue to our divine call,

And whereas,

Our National Association, in Jacksonville, Florida in 1967, withdrew from the American Bible Society as a result of testimony given by Rev. Lonnie Sparks, missionary translator, of the trend of this organization to tolerate men on their staff who were liberal in theology, which men sought to influence Rev. Sparks to water down or weaken his Scripture translation in the African Kulango language, in order to appease those who do not hold to the fundamentals of the faith as clearly set forth in those translations true to the original language, And whereas.

We, as the Apostle Paul, should be "set for the defense of the gospel" (Phil. 1:17), and as instructed by Jude, should resist the devil stedfast in the faith (I Peter 5:19).

Therefore, be it resolved that:

- 1. We call attention to the subtle danger of substituting for the Word of God any paraphrased version or translation that is not true to the faithful translation of the Word.
- 2. This body specifically and publicly declare itself in opposition to this translation, Good News for Modern Man.
- 3. We encourage our pastors to write their local newspapers expressing their personal opposition to this translation.
- 4. We encourage our pastors to instruct and teach their people regarding the dangers of such translations so-called, so that they may intelligently reject them, realizing that our duty as God's men is not simply to comfort and edify, but also to warn.

5. We encourage our pastors to follow Paul's example in this, and as they warn, also weep with concern and compassion night and day, being sure to maintain the right Christian, spiritual attitude in this matter (Therefore watch, and remember, that for the space of three years I ceased not to warn everyone night and day with tears" (Acts 20:31).

CONSTITUTIONS AND BY-LAWS OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION OF ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS

PREAMBLE

WE, the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists, in order to advance the cause of the Lord Jesus Christ through fellowship and co-operation, do establish and adopt this Constitutions and By-Laws.

Since the National Association has changed the board of Superannuation to, "Pastor's Retirement and Ins." We recommend that we change the Board of Superannuation to, "Pastor's Retirement and Ins. Board," everywhere it is listed in the constitution.

ARTICLE I NAME

This body shall be known henceforth as the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of the organization to cooperate with the National Association of Free Will Baptists in its efforts to elect, combine, and direct the energies of the Free Will Baptist Denomination, for the promotion of home and foreign missions, Christian education, Sunday school, Church Training Service, Pastors's retirement and Ins. Board, and Woman's Auxiliary work and for the extension of the Kingdom of God in general.

ARTICLE III REPRESENTATION TO THE STATE ASSOCIATION SECTION ONE: Delegates

This association shall consist of delegates duly appointed or elected by the church or organizations to represent, and ordained and licensed Free Will Baptist ministers, who are of good repute in the Original Free Will Baptist Church, and who reside in South Carolina, or hold membership in or pastor in this state, and all members of standing boards and committees.

SECTION TWO: Conference Representation

Each annual association and quarterly conference may represent in this association on the basis of two delegates for each association or quarterly conference of one thousand members or less, and one delegate for each additional thousand members or fractions thereof.

SECTION THREE: Church Representation

Any local church that is in good standing with the conference or association to which it belongs may send one delegate.

SECTION FOUR: Finances

Each member association or quarterly conference shall be requested to send a representative fee of two dollars per church. Each local church shall be requested to send a contribution of \$15.00. This money shall be used to meet the expenses of the association and to promote its work.

ARTICLE IV OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer. They shall be elected for a two year term.

SECTION I: Duties

Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established paliamentary usage, and appoint all temporary committees, unless the organization requests they be elected.

Assistant Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Assistant Moderator, to serve in the full capacity of the Moderator when he is absent or he requests the Assistant Moderator to serve in this capacity.

Clerk: It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record all transactions of the association and prepare them for printing and distribution.

Treasurer: It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all monies that come into the association. He shall be a standing member of the Finance Committee. He shall pay all bills of the association through a checking account in a bank of his convenience. He shall present a financial report to the Finance Committee at each session.

SECTION TWO: Membership and Support

All officers of this association, all members of its committees and boards, all its secretaries, missionaries, and agents plus all missionaries, teachers, and

Christian workers approved or supported by this association must be fundamental in their views of the Bible and its teachings, and in harmony with the doctrines and practices of the Original Free Will Baptist Denomination. They must give evidence of genuine Christian piety, possess fervent zeal in the service of Christ and of the ability to do the work for which they are considered.

ARTICLE V COMMITTEES

The committees of this association shall be:

- 1. The Executive Committee, composed of its officers. This committee shall 1) act for the association on matters that demand its consideration between the regular annual sessions of the association; 2) to have oversight of arrangements for meetings of the association with authority to change, if necessary, the time and place of meeting; 3) to fill vacancies in the association that may be caused by death, resignation, etc, between the regular sessions of the association.
- 2. The Committee on Committees, appointed at the beginning of the session by the Moderator. They shall present before the body for vote the necessary committees for transaction of business. The recommended Committees are:
- a. The Finance Committee, composed of four, whose chairman shall be the treasurer, shall be responsible for receiving and handling the monies received into the association. (The committee shall receive all recommendations for expenditures and then recommend to the body for vote the expenditures.) The Committee shall receive and examine the treasurer's report and then present the financial report to the body.
- b. The Resolutions Committee, composed of one delegate from each conference or association, shall be responsible for receiving all resolutions. After careful examination and necessary discussion, possibly with those presenting the resolution, the committee shall present the resolutions before the body.
- c. The Nomination Committee, composed of one delegate from each conference or association, shall prayerfully prepare a state of officers and present them before the body for vote.
- 3. The Public Morals Committee, composed of five with one rotating off each year, shall be responsible for evaluating the moral condition of our country and churches. Through resolutions, papers, and messages, they should warn us of the dangers of low morals and encourage us in keeping our standards Scripturally high.
- 4. The Credentials Committee, composed of three, shall properly register and recommend the seating of all delegates, ministers, and visitors. They shall keep a register of all delegates, ministers, and visitors, and present their report to the body and to the clerk for recording in the minutes.
- 5. The Publicity Committee, composed of one delegate from each conference or association. The members will be responsible for informing the newspapers and other news media of the convening and the events of this association during the session and immediately after.

ARTICLE VI BOARDS

The Pastors's retirement and Ins. Board, the Board of Education, and the

Children's Home Board shall draw up their own Constitution and By-Laws and present them to the State Association for its approval.

- 1. The Board of Trustees shall hold title, if any, to all property or equipment owned by the association. This board shall be composed of one member from each conference or association, plus one member-at-large.
- 2. The Board of Education shall be responsible for examining all applications for loans from the Poston Bagette Memorial Loan Fund. The Christian Education Field Director, elected every two years, shall be under the jurisdiction of this board. This board and director should be alert to help as many worthy students as possible to attend our Christian educational institutions. The Board should encourage our churches to give financially to the Loan Fund. This Board shall be composed of one member from each conference or association, plus one member-at-large.
- 3. The Pastor's retirement and Ins. Board shall supervise and distribute retirement and other assistance, as approved by the board, to the ministry of this association. The Field Director, elected every two years, will be the treasurer of Pastors's retirement funds. Expenses incurred in connection with Pastor's retirement promotion and board meetings shall be paid from Pastor's retirement funds. This Board shall be composed of one member from each conference or association, plus one member-at-large.
- 4. General Board Member shall be one person, elected every two years to be recommended to the National Association of Free Will Baptists to represent South Carolina on the General Board of the National Association.
- 5. The Children's Home Board shall supervise the ministry of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Turbeville. They shall be responsible for establishing the rules of the Home, employing the employees, and overseeing the ministry of the Home. This Board shall consist of two members from each conference or association, except South Carolina, which shall have three.

ARTICLE VII APPROPRIATIONS

- 1) Members of the Executive Committee shall be reinbursed their travel expenses at the rate of seven cents per mile to and from no more than two committee meetings per year.
- 2) The clerk shall receive fifty dollars a year for services rendered. The Moderator and Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars per year. Before bills are incurred, he shall consult the treasurer to find out if money is available to pay said bills.
 - 3) All board shall pay incurred expenses from their own funds.
- 4) The Promotional Secretary shall receive fifty dollars per year for supplies
- 5) The Blue Cross and Blue Shield Group leader is to be advanced \$125.00 for an operational fund. From these funds he will pay for office supplies, stamps, and travel. He is to get 7 cents per mile for travel. He will also pay himself \$50.00 per year for services rendered. At the end of each State Association meeting, he will be reinbursed for the amount he has spent. Each year the fund will be brought back up to \$125.00

ARTICLE VIII FIELD DIRECTORS

Promotional Secretary: The Promotional Secretary's duties are 1) to report South Carolina news to our National Association magazines; 2) to arrange missionary schedules for our state when missionaries are visiting in our churches; 3) to edit an occasional newsletter and mail to all pastors informing our people of Free Will Baptist Church news.

Pastors' retirement and Ins. Board: The Pastors's retirement and Ins. Field Director shall be under the jurisdiction of the Pastors' retirement and Ins. Board.

Christian Education: The Christian Education Field Director shall be under the jurisdiction of the Christian Education Board.

Foreign Mission Field Director: His duties are to make a report of the activities and work carried on in the State during the past year. Give a report of planned activities and promotions for the coming year.

Home Missions Field Director: His duties are the same as the Foreign Missions Director's above.

Church training Service Field Director. His duties are to give a report from the State C.T.S. convention on the activities, and accomplishments of the past year, and the plans of the coming year's activities.

Blue Cross and Blue Shield Group Ins. Leader: His duties are to receive all premiums from the pastors, and make the payments to the company, and report to the group concerning the group's standing, and of any changes that might be made.

ARTICLE IX TIME

This association shall convene annually on Thursday and Friday of the week between the second and third Sundays in November, beginning at 10 A.M.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Articles may be altered or amended at any regular session of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.

BY-LAWS OF THE ASSOCIATION

- 1. A portion of the Scripture shall be read and prayer offered at the beginning of each morning and afternoon session of the association and prayer shall be offered at the close of each session.
- 2. It shall be the duty of all members of the association to remain throughout the entire session unless they are excused by the Moderator.
- 3. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and shall wait until he is recognized before speaking further.
- 4. The Moderator shall not allow discussions that are unchristian in spirit and that tend to create envy and strife among the brethren. Anyone resenting the ruling of the Moderator in such matters shall be liable to censure of the body.
 - 5. No one shall be allowed to speak more than 15 minutes or more than

twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

- 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to have his annual message so prepared and arranged that it can be published in the minutes.
- 7. These by-laws may be altered at any regular session of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.
