MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-NINTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION OF ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Meeting with the Beaver Creek Association
with the First Free Will Baptist Church of
Inman, S.C.

November 11, 12, 1971

The meeting was opened by singing, "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart" led by Rev. Guy Owens from Florence, S.C.

Devotions were given by Rev. James A. Hucks, Jr. from the Central Conference. He used Psalms 133:1-3 as his text.

M.S.C. to take yesterday's tabled business off the table.

M.S.C. to delete from the constitution the articles dealing with Blue Cross & Blue Shield Ins.

M.S.C. to amend the constitution article 7 point 1 to read: Members of the Executive Committee shall be reimbursed their travel expense at the rate of ten cents per mile to and from not more than two committee meetings per year.

The above move was amended that it be retroactive to cover this year's travel also.

M.S.C. to receive the Executive Committee's report on evangelizing our State Appendix 18.

M.S.C. for the Executive Committee to determine after the State bills have been paid how much money can be sent to each Conference that has an Evangelism Crusade. (Each Conference is to receive the same as they have a crusade.)

M.S.C. that we have our State Paper jobbed out, so we can have a better paper. The pastors pledged \$5.00 per month to help pay for it. (Pledged for their churches)

M.S.C. to receive the nominating committee's report. Appendix 19.

The placement committee report: The next State Associational Meeting will be held Nov. 16-17, 1972 with the Oak Grove Free Will Baptist Church near Conway, S.C. Rev. James Hucks, Jr. is the Pastor.

M.S.C. that each conference elect their own delegate to the National Association, and assist him with the expenses.

M.S.C. for the moderator to appoint a State delegate to the National Association and that the Executive Committee determine after the State bills have been paid, how much the State can assist with the expenses. M.S.C. to lay on the table until next meeting the motion to amend the constitution, Article 4, to elect officers every year. The State Ministers Fellowship will meet February 8, 9, 1972 with the Horse Branch Church in Turbeville, S.C.

APPENDIX I

"Make Full Proof Of Thy Ministry" 2 Timothy 4:5

Introduction: This command of God to make "Full Proof Of Thy Ministry" was first given to a young preacher by the name of Timothy. It was given also for our instruction, and we are as much responsible to obey this command as Timothy. Let me point out three things about this command.

1. It's a summation of all that is said in the book (2 Timothy), but more particular in the preceeding verses of Chapter 4.
2. It carries with it a sense of urgency. The situation at hand demands immediate action.
3. The importance of the meaning of the words "Full Proof". I took time to look up this in the Greek to get an accurate meaning of the phrase. Here is what I found. *To carry out fully having a burden for, To entirely accomplish in evidence.*

With a burden for our ministry we are to strive to entirely accomplish it, bearing evidence of our labor. **MAKE FULL PROOF OF THY MINISTRY.**

In this short message I would like to point out three basic and necessary things involved in making full proof of our ministry. All three are found in our text verse. They are: *Persuasion - Perseverance - Proclamation.*

1. Persuasion (Watch thou in all things)

The word watch means to be discreet - sober Discerner. We are to soberly (honestly, sincerely) discern (know and understand the prevailing conditions of our time) and be persuaded thereby.

A. We should be persuaded of the times and conditions that are upon us.

- (a) Prevailing tide of Apostacy (2 Thess. 2:3) We learn in this verse that the day of Christ shall not come until there is a falling away. In other words the return of Christ will not take place until there is a wide-spread apostacy. A falling away from the faith. The true doctrines of Christ, Salvation and the Church. Well, brethren, that day is upon us. Even so come Lord Jesus.

(b) The working of antichrist is now evident (2 Thess. 2:3, 7) As a young Christian my concept of antichrist was limited to a man that would one day call himself Christ. To be sure this will happen, but this is not all that is involved. It means any individual, group or organization that teaches error and does not align itself with the doctrines of the Christ of the Bible and His Church. The full age of antichrist is upon us.

(c) The prevailing tide of Sin within the Church (2 Tim. 3:1-5) Sin that was once looked on by the Church as being evil, shameful, destructive and soul damming is now practiced within the Church with a mocking approval.

(d) The prevailing tide of light attitude toward the fundamental doctrines of Christ and His Church. (Rev. 3:15-17) Jesus tells us of the day that would come when the Church would be neither hot nor cold. What does this mean? Simply this. The time would come when the professing Church would not be for Him nor would it be against Him. This age of easy believism when liars, harlots, drunks, Bible deniers, and in some cases the devil himself is promised salvation. Brethren the last days are upon us.

(e) The prevailing tide of false teachers. (2 Tim. 4:3) Look anywhere you please in the Word of God and you will find that where Apostacy and heathen worship existed, it was the result of false teachers. In Jer. 5:31 we find the cause of Apostacy of Israel. The prophets prophecy falsely, and the priest bear rule by their means; and my people love to have it so. On every hand there are those who preach falsely and do it in the name of Christ and His Church.

B. We need to be persuaded that even in these last days souls can still be saved.

(a) The Gospel is still the power of God unto salvation.

(b) All those who believe will be saved. Our responsibility is to be sure all hear the Gospel. Faith sets off the fuse that ignites the power of God, which results in the new birth. An explosion that will thrust any lost sinner into the realms of eternal glory.

2. Perseverance (endure affliction)

A. Prevailing conditions make it more difficult to maintain a stand for fundamental Christianity. But brethren we must endure if we are to make full proof of our ministry.

B. It has never been easy to accomplish a ministry for God. There is a blood stained path through the ages, stained with the blood of the prophets, apostles and faithful martyrs. The greatest blood stained path is the one that led to Calvary; stained by the precious blood of Jesus Christ. Oh! Brethren, He made full proof of His ministry. Heb. 12:2 tells us: "Look unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him, He endured the cross, despising the shame."

3. Proclamation (Do the work of an Evangelist)

A. An evangelist is a person. God could have chosen angels for his instruments or He could have created a new army of creatures for this task, but instead He chose redeemed people to be His mouthpiece. Isn't it reasonable that

one who has experienced the joy of redemption, makes a more powerful and effective Voice for God, than one who knows nothing of the glory of being cleansed from sin and made to sit in heavenly places in Christ. Brethren we are the evangelist. Oh! What an honor and privilege it is to represent Heaven.

- B. The Evangelist is a Proclaimer of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Through the ages there have been many proclamations of good news which have been helpful to mankind, but none can be compared to the magnitude of the Gospel news. We have the message that tells how lost mankind can be saved from sin, ruin, and hell, and give them a life in Christ and a home in Heaven. Our entire ministry should be directed toward accomplishing our ultimate purpose; Proclaim the Gospel.

Conclusion: As individuals, local churches, conferences and a State organization, we have the responsibility to make *full proof of our ministry*. I believe that I will have to give an account to God for my responsibility as moderator of this State Association. I believe we will all give an account to God for the evangelization of the State of South Carolina. It can not be done by a few individuals, a few churches, or one conference; but it can be done through a State effort. I believe it's time that we got up from our complacency and dropped off the weights of our petty differences and join forces and get this job done for the Glory of God.

This Church that is hosting this convention (First Free Will Baptist—Inman, S.C.) is a testimony to what can be done. It is about six years old and is the result of a concern by God's men and a joint effort to get the job done. This Church is known in town. On our way into town Brother Guy Owens lost the way and we ended up on the opposite side of town. This turned out to be all right though because we found a small snack shop and enjoyed a refreshing cup of coffee. While talking to the operator of the business we inquired about the First Free Will Baptist Church. The response was quick and enthusiastic. He gave us accurate directions to the church and in the conversation he commended on the progress of the work. These people do not attend this church, but they know it is in town. This accomplishment can be multiplied many times and every city in South Carolina can have a Free Will Baptist work for Christ if we, as a State *Make Full Proof of our Ministry*. May God help us do it.

APPENDIX III

REPORT OF S.C. FREE WILL BAPTIST YOUTH CAMP

The 1971 encampment was one of the most blessed encampments with which I've worked. OUR camp is growing even though the reports from the Cheraw Park Supt. state that most groups using the facilities at Cheraw are getting smaller. During our first week we had a total of 195 people registered in a camp facility prepared for 140. With much regret I had to turn away several who wanted to attend. (The State Park Supt. strongly suggested that we consider the possibility of three weeks with small groups next year. HELP US PRAY

ABOUT THIS MATTER.) Our "teen" week was off in attendance this year. However, we have a total of 120 people registered which is just twenty less than the facility capacity.

There were quite a few who professed salvation, rededication, and consecration at camp this year. We also had one to answer the call to go to the mission field and two to answer the call to preach. Several others surrendered themselves for "full-time" Christian Service even though they were not sure what the Lord wants them to do. As I stood near the altar each night and watched the young people as the Holy Spirit worked I received some of the greatest blessings a man can receive on earth. I find it impossible to express the great thrill that fills my soul upon remembering the services we had. I wish it were possible for every adult Free Will Baptist in South Carolina to attend youth camp for just one session.

Lest everyone get the impression that youth camp is heaven on earth let me share some of the heartaches also. The encampment was not only one of the most blessed but it was also one of the most challenging. The young people were rebellious. They would deliberately disobey the rules and then defy the staff to do anything about their misbehavior. This is just another indication that the devil is opposed to our encampment. For the first time in many years we had to ask some campers to go home because of their rebellious actions. Several others were on the borderline of being "shipped".

We need the prayer support of every Christian for our youth camp. We have reached a point in our camping when changes are going to have to be made. I have already mentioned that Mr. Adair suggested that we plan a three week encampment next year rather than two. There are several problems involved if this change is made. Some will be: (1) Finding qualified cooks who can work for 3 weeks. (2) An effective staff who can work (most preachers can't leave their congregation for three weeks therefore we will have to train and use "lay" staff for at least part of the encampment). (3) With this amount of demand for time we would need to consider an honorarium for the staff. (4) The cost of rent for a third week plus additional food and staff expense would probably necessitate a fee increase for campers.

There are two possible alternatives that have been suggested. (1) We use both Camp Forest and Camp Juniper and continue to have only two weeks. (2) We shift the eleven and twelve year olds to the second week therefore making the number attending for two weeks more evenly distributed. **SOME PROBLEMS WITH THESE SUGGESTIONS.** If we use both camps we will have to have two groups of cooks, two crews of lifeguards, sufficient staff to meet the 1 to 5 ratio required by the State, and guarantee \$650 minimum rent plus utilities cost in both camps. We will also have to purchase auxiliary lights to install in Camp Juniper. If we shift the eleven and twelve year olds we will have too wide an age span to possibly reach the young people effectively (ages 11-19), the social development conflict of the young people, and we will still have more than the maximum of 140 persons on campus for the sessions.

This is just ONE of our problems to which we must find the answer before we can begin our plans in January for the August encampment. **PLEASE PRAY FOR US AS WE LABOR TO SERVE THE LORD JESUS IN THIS CAPACITY.**

NATIONAL HOME MISSION BOARD REPORT

I send you greetings from our missionaries and staff to say "thank you" for what you have done for the cause of Christ and Home Missions.

I remind you that there are yet ten states and 28 capital cities that do not have a Free Will Baptist church. There are 17 other states that are not strong enough to support a missionary within their own state. So you see, there is a great need for the National Home Missions Department as a medium through which our stronger states can help to start churches in these 27 weak ones.

I want to express gratitude from our missionaries and staff for the part you have in Home Missions. Last year you gave \$5,413.46. This was \$913.46 over your quota of \$4,500. So far this year you have given, as of October 31, \$4,998.18. This is \$498.18 over your quota of \$4,500.

November is Home Missions Month. Let me urge each church to receive a special Home Missions offering this month, as we need \$50,000 in November to reach our budget. There are two missionaries who really need your support. Mack Owens' account is in the red over \$2,400 and Larry Powell's \$1,900. May God bless each of you is our prayer.

BEAVER CREEK HOME MISSION REPORT:

The new mission at Union, S.C. is progressing nicely under the Beaver Creek Home Mission Board. The Mission is located about one mile from the city on Peach Tree Road. At present, they are averaging about 35 in Sunday School with weekly offerings averaging about \$125.00. The Mission has nine acres of

good land for expansion in the future. The present building will seat 200 and is valued at \$30,000. Inside, it has wall to wall carpet, central heating and air conditioning and certainly every member of the Beaver Creek Association is proud of it. Rev. Jack Elders is the full time pastor.

The Beaver Creek Mission board is planning to move the Mobil Chapel to a new location in the near future.

Please pray for this good conference that they will ever expand for the glory of God.

Last year, the Beaver Creek Association gave to Home Missions \$4,436.01..

CENTRAL CONFERENCE HOME MISSION REPORT:

The new Mission at Myrtle Beach is doing nicely and the Pastor is very enthusiastic about the work. Rev. Seldon Bullard is the Mission pastor. They are averaging 45 in Sunday School with weekly offerings averaging \$130.00 a week. The Mission is having to care for most of the pastors needs. They are meeting in a converted garage. The mission has been paneled throughout and wall to wall carpeting installed. They have 4 class rooms and a nursery with a sanctuary that will seat 140. Recently some one donated an organ to the Mission. This work is a real challenge to the Central Conference. Let's pray for them.

SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE HOME MISSION REPORT:

On October 17, 1971, a new Mission was begun in Sumter, S.C. with Rev. Fred Kirby, as pastor. This Mission has averaged 27 in Sunday School for the first three Sundays with thirty-five on the fourth Sunday. The offerings are averaging \$135.00 weekly. Presently, they are meeting in the Optimist Club Basketball Gymnasium, with weekly prayer meetings being held in the homes of individual members of the mission. They have purchased 70 chairs, typewriter, piano, and a mimeograph machine. Please pray for God to have His way in this new work. The South Carolina Conference gave to Home Missions \$4,157.22 last year.

FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE MISSION, DARLINGTON, S.C.

This Mission was begun in Feb., 1971. It is located at 352 Orange St. with Rev. Newton Howle. Their membership is now 41 with S.S. averaging 62, with a yearly offering of \$4,118.35. This Mission is under the watchcare of the Temple Free Will Baptist Church. They have purchased an old Church of God building with a basement for S.S. and a building in the rear for S.S. as well. They run two Church van buses.

FAITH MISSION, DOUGLAS STREET EXTENSION, FLORENCE, S.C.

This Mission is running in the twenties at the present time. Rev. W. J. Douglas is the pastor. They are worshipping in a house at this time and the property is valued at \$10,000. We will pray for this Mission that God will use it for His glory.

**CONSTITUTIONS AND BY-LAWS
OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION
OF ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS**

PREAMBLE

WE, the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists, in order to advance the cause of the Lord Jesus Christ through fellowship and co-operation, do establish and adopt this Constitutions and By-Laws.

Since the National Association has changed the board of Superannuation to, "Pastor's Retirement and Ins." We recommend that we change the Board of Superannuation to, "Pastor's Retirement and Ins. Board," everywhere it is listed in the constitution.

ARTICLE I NAME

This body shall be known henceforth as the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of the organization to cooperate with the National Association of Free Will Baptists in its efforts to elect, combine, and direct the energies of the Free Will Baptist Denomination, for the promotion of home and foreign missions, Christian education, Sunday school, Church Training Service, Pastors's retirement and Ins. Board, and Woman's Auxiliary work and for the extension of the Kingdom of God in general.

ARTICLE III REPRESENTATION TO THE STATE ASSOCIATION

SECTION ONE: Delegates

This association shall consist of delegates duly appointed or elected by the church or organizations to represent, and ordained and licensed Free Will Baptist ministers, who are of good repute in the Original Free Will Baptist Church, and who reside in South Carolina, or hold membership in or pastor in this state, and all members of standing boards and committees.

SECTION TWO: Conference Representation

Each annual association and quarterly conference may represent in this association on the basis of two delegates for each association or quarterly conference of one thousand members or less, and one delegate for each additional thousand members or fractions thereof.

SECTION THREE: Church Representation

Any local church that is in good standing with the conference or association to which it belongs may send one delegate.

SECTION FOUR: Finances

Each member association or quarterly conference shall be requested to send a representative fee of two dollars per church. Each local church shall be requested to send a contribution of \$15.00. This money shall be used to meet

the expenses of the association and to promote its work.

ARTICLE IV OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer. They shall be elected for a two year term.

SECTION I: Duties

Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established paliametary usage, and appoint all temporary committees, unless the organization requests they be elected.

Assistant Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Assistant Moderator, to serve in the full capacity of the Moderator when he is absent or he requests the Assistant Moderator to serve in this capacity.

Clerk: It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record all transactions of the association and prepare them for printing and distribution.

Treasurer: It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all monies that come into the association. He shall be a standing member of the Finance Committee. He shall pay all bills of the association through a checking account in a bank of his convenience. He shall present a financial report to the Finance Committee at each session.

SECTION TWO: Membership and Support

All officers of this association, all members of its committees and boards, all its secretaries, missionaries, and agents plus all missionaries, teachers, and Christian workers approved or supported by this association must be fundamental in their views of the Bible and its teachings, and in harmony with the doctrines and practices of the Original Free Will Baptist Denomination. They must give evidence of genuine Christian piety, possess fervent zeal in the service of Christ and of the ability to do the work for which they are considered.

ARTICLE V COMMITTEES

The committees of this association shall be:

1. The Executive Committee, composed of its officers. This committee shall 1) act for the association on matters that demand its consideration between the regular annual sessions of the association; 2) to have oversight of arrangements for meetings of the association with authority to change, if necessary, the time and place of meeting; 3) to fill vacancies in the association that may be caused by death, resignation, etc, between the regular sessions of the association.

2. The Committee on Committees, appointed at the beginning of the session by the Moderator. They shall present before the body for vote the necessary committees for transaction of business. The recommended Committees are:

a. The Finance Committee, composed of four, whose chairman shall be the treasurer, shall be responsible for receiving and handling the monies received into the association. (The committee shall receive all recommendations for

expenditures and then recommend to the body for vote the expenditures.) The Committee shall receive and examine the treasurer's report and then present the financial report to the body.

b. The Resolutions Committee, composed of one delegate from each conference or association, shall be responsible for receiving all resolutions. After careful examination and necessary discussion, possibly with those presenting the resolution, the committee shall present the resolutions before the body.

c. The Nomination Committee, composed of one delegate from each conference or association, shall prayerfully prepare a slate of officers and present them before the body for vote.

3. The Public Morals Committee, composed of five with one rotating off each year, shall be responsible for evaluating the moral condition of our country and churches. Through resolutions, papers, and messages, they should warn us of the dangers of low morals and encourage us in keeping our standards Scripturally high.

4. The Credentials Committee, composed of three, shall properly register and recommend the seating of all delegates, ministers, and visitors. They shall keep a register of all delegates, ministers, and visitors, and present their report to the body and to the clerk for recording in the minutes.

5. The Publicity Committee, composed of one delegate from each conference or association. The members will be responsible for informing the newspapers and other news media of the convening and the events of this association during the session and immediately after.

ARTICLE VI BOARDS

The Pastors' retirement and Ins. Board, the Board of Education, and the Children's Home Board shall draw up their own Constitution and By-Laws and present them to the State Association for its approval.

1. The Board of Trustees shall hold title, if any, to all property or equipment owned by the association. This board shall be composed of one member from each conference or association, plus one member-at-large.

2. The Board of Education shall be responsible for examining all applications for loans from the Poston Bagette Memorial Loan Fund. The Christian Education Field Director, elected every two years, shall be under the jurisdiction of this board. This board and director should be alert to help as many worthy students as possible to attend our Christian educational institutions. The Board should encourage our churches to give financially to the Loan Fund. This Board shall be composed of one member from each conference or association, plus one member-at-large.

3. The Pastor's retirement and Ins. Board shall supervise and distribute retirement and other assistance, as approved by the board, to the ministry of this association. The Field Director, elected every two years, will be the treasurer of Pastors' retirement funds. Expenses incurred in connection with Pastor's retirement promotion and board meetings shall be paid from Pastor's retirement funds. This Board shall be composed of one member from each conference or association, plus one member-at-large.

4. General Board Member shall be one person, elected every two years to be recommended to the National Association of Free Will Baptists to represent

South Carolina on the General Board of the National Association.

5. The Children's Home Board shall supervise the ministry of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Turbeville. They shall be responsible for establishing the rules of the Home, employing the employees, and overseeing the ministry of the Home. This Board shall consist of two members from each conference or association, except South Carolina, which shall have three.

ARTICLE VII APPROPRIATIONS

1) Members of the Executive Committee shall be reimbursed their travel expenses at the rate of 10 cents per mile to and from no more than two committee meetings per year.

2) The clerk shall receive fifty dollars a year for services rendered. The Moderator and Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars per year. Before bills are incurred, he shall consult the treasurer to find out if money is available to pay said bills.

3) All board shall pay incurred expenses from their own funds.

4) The Promotional Secretary shall receive fifty dollars per year for supplies

ARTICLE VIII FIELD DIRECTORS

Promotional Secretary: The Promotional Secretary's duties are 1) to report South Carolina news to our National Association magazines; 2) to arrange missionary schedules for our state when missionaries are visiting in our churches; 3) to edit an occasional newsletter and mail to all pastors informing our people of Free Will Baptist Church news.

Pastors' retirement and Ins. Board: The Pastors' retirement and Ins. Field Director shall be under the jurisdiction of the Pastors' retirement and Ins. Board.

Christian Education: The Christian Education Field Director shall be under the jurisdiction of the Christian Education Board.

Foreign Mission Field Director: His duties are to make a report of the activities and work carried on in the State during the past year. Give a report of planned activities and promotions for the coming year.

Home Missions Field Director: His duties are the same as the Foreign Missions Director's above.

Church training Service Field Director. His duties are to give a report from the State C.T.S. convention on the activities, and accomplishments of the past year, and the plans of the coming year's activities.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Articles may be altered or amended at any regular session of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.

BY-LAWS OF THE ASSOCIATION

1. A portion of the Scripture shall be read and prayer offered at the beginning of each morning and afternoon session of the association and prayer shall be offered at the close of each session.

2. It shall be the duty of all members of the association to remain throughout the entire session unless they are excused by the Moderator.

3. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and shall wait until he is recognized before speaking further.

4. The Moderator shall not allow discussions that are unchristian in spirit and that tend to create envy and strife among the brethren. Anyone resenting the ruling of the Moderator in such matters shall be liable to censure of the body.

5. No one shall be allowed to speak more than 15 minutes or more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to have his annual message so prepared and arranged that it can be published in the minutes.

7. These by-laws may be altered at any regular session of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.

ARTICLE IX TIME

This association shall convene annually on Thursday and Friday of the week between the second and third Sundays in November, beginning at 10 A.M.
