PROCEEDINGS of the SOUTH GEORGIA ASSOCIATION of FREE WILL BAPTISTS September 22-23, 1961

The 84th session of the South Georgia Association convened with the Spring Grove Free Will Baptist Church of Jesup, Georgia, Friday and Saturday, September 22-23, 1961.

Friday Morning

The session opened with the congregation singing "Trust and Obey," and "He Lives." The devotional was brought by the Rev. V. L. Pritchett, of Eastman, Georgia. He spoke concerning false teachers in

The meeting was called to order by the clerk, then the moderator brought to the congregation his message. He used our own Church Covenant and reviewed it completely.

A partial report of the Credentials Committee: (There were at this time 80 delegates present.) It was moved and seconded that this partial report be received. It was so carried.

The moderator recognized the visitors: We were glad to have with us the Rev. E. C. Morris, Rev. Fred Hersey, Rev. Ralph Lightsey and Dr. L. C. Johnson.

The association recognized the oversight of the Spring Grove Church in making out programs for the association. It is in the hands of the executive committee to make out the programs for the annual meeting of the association. (Note: See Resolutions Report, Item No. Three.)

The Program of the 1960-61'session of the South Georgia Association was approved for this session.

A temporary report of the Executive Committee concerned the program for the day and getting a temporary committee to draw up a constitution and making the corrections that are needed. They are to report at the next meeting in January.



The Nominating Committee was selected from the floor: They were as follows - Rev. Wilfred Harden, Bro. Dock Johnson, Rev. C. D. Rentz, Bro. David Mann and Bro. R. F. Connell. These were elected by acclamation.

Dr. L. C. Johnson spoke on the Bible College and "To What Kind of Education Are We Committed at Free Will Baptist College?"

The Resolutions Committee was elected as follows: Bro. Britt Briggman, Rev. J. E. Blanton, Bro. Sam Carter, Bro. Art Anthony and Rev. V. L. Pritchett.

Due to the absence of two members of the Credentials Committee, it was passed that Rev. J. M. Cobb select two people to fill in for these.

The afternoon devotion was brought by the Rev. Billy Livesay, of Blackshear, Georgia. His message was concerning the joy in serving God.

The Promotional Department work was reported by the Rev. E. C. Morris, of Tifton, Georgia. He reported that the South Georgia Association is far above the quota, but to some degree is behind last year.

Special Thanks to Brother E. C. Morris:

A motion was made for a standing vote to be seen for the untiring efforts of Bro. Morris in his 14 years of loyal service.

The report of the South Georgia Mission Board was given by the Rev. James Pelt of Glennville, Georgia. (See Reports.)

The Rev. Ralph Lightsey, of Mount Olive, North Carolina, gave a report on Mount Olive College.

Special music was brought by Rev. Bill Gardner and the Rev. James Ursery. Their song was "Face to Face."

A report of the Ministerial Association was given by the Rev. J. E. Blanton, of Jesup, Georgia. He said that several meetings of the association had not been held. At most of the meetings not all of the ministers have been in position to attend the meetings very well. The Ministerial Association sponsored a Youth Revival August 14-19, at Waycross. The evangelist was the Rev. Jack Paramore, of Greenville, N. C. Rev. Blanton proposed, as President of the Association, that due to the non-attendance of the ministers at quarterly meetings the association meetings be just once a year. (The next meeting will be on the 17th of October, 1961.)



Mrs. D. C. Dodd, of Savannah, gave a report on the National and District Women's Auxiliaries.

The Rev. T. G. Hamilton brought a message on Congregational Church Government.

A partial report of the Resolutions Committee was given. (See Reports.)

A report was given by the Obituary Committee. (See Reports.)

We then adjourned for the afternoon service.

Friday Evening

We had a very impressive missionary meeting of the South Georgia Association on this Friday evening. The Rev. Fred Hersey, our returned missionary for Japan, spoke to us concerning missions. He also shared with us some of the customs of the people of Japan. After

the service there was an offering received for missions and for the account of Bro. Hersey. The amount was \$28.00. There was also an additional amount of \$15.39 given on Saturday morning.

Saturday Morning


The congregation sang "Love Lifted Me" and "At the Cross." The Rev. Bill Gardner led these songs.

The Rev. C. D. Rentz, from Brunswick, led us in the Saturday morning devotional. His thoughts concerned spiritual bankruptcy.

After this wonderful devotion, the Rev. Mance Cason led us in prayer. We were very glad to have Rev. Cason visiting with us at this meeting.

The Finance Committee reported at this time. (See Reports.) A correction in this report was made. The committee in adding up the offering to the Free Will Baptist Bible College added some checks wrong. The motion was made to take an offering for the amount needed, which was \$17.50. The offering was \$32.89, which was \$15.39 over. Another motion was made to give this overage to the account of Rev. Fred Hersey. It was so carried.

Where do we meet in January for the next quarterly meeting of the association? It will be on the Saturday before the fourth Sunday in



January, 1962. An invitation was given from the Harmony Church, Lake Butler, Florida. This invitation to go there for this meeting was accepted.

The Georgia State Association has been changed from Macon Church to Mount Olive Church at Reynolds, Georgia. It will be on the 14th, 15th and 16th of November, 1961. The delegates of the state are as follows: Mrs. Joan Gardner, Mrs. D. C. Dodd, Mrs. Harris Nix and Mrs. J. M. Cobb. Motion was made that these four named be our delegates for the State Association and the Moderator of the South Georgia Association have the right to appoint those who might be there from the South Georgia Association as other delegates.

Next, the final report of the Resolutions Committee was given. (See Reports.)

The final report of the Credentials Committee was also given. (See Reports.)

Following this came the Ordaining Council report. (See Reports.)

A motion was made to rescind the action in Item One of the Resolutions Committee report. (See Reports.) This motion was defeated by a vote of 32-25. (See Reports for this item.)

The last committee reporting was the Nominating Committee. See its report under Reports.

THE REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

OF THE

SOUTH GEORGIA ASSOCIATION

ITEM ONE:

Program:

On August 14th, 1961, the Executive Committee of the South Georgia Association met for the purpose of planning the program for the Association which meets September 22-23 at the Spring Grove Church near Jesup.

Members present were as follows: Moderator, Damon C. Dodd, T. W. Long, T. G. Hamilton, W. M. Gardner, A. H. Quinn, Ollie Carter (sitting in for Henry R. Eason,) and J. M. Cobb. We also had visiting with us the Rev. Jack Paramore.


The program theme for the Association, "Committed to the Changeless Christ in a Changing World, " was adopted, not to copy the National Association, but so that we might share with this Association its eternal meaning, as it was so manifested in the National Association in July. We felt that a program with such a theme as this certainly could not be presented properly unless the Christian Education of our people was reviewed. Dr. L. C. Johnson or someone from the Bible College will speak on the subject, "To What Kind of an Education Program Are We Committed At Free Will Baptist Bible College?" This will be on Friday morning. Then on Friday evening there will be a special missions program presented. The speaker will be our returned missionary from Japan, the Rev. Fred Hersey. Then to close out on Saturday morning, the Rev. James E. Ursery will bring an evangelistic message.

ITEM TWO:

Now inasmuch as the Union meetings have expressed by vote a desire to disband their organizations in favor of quarterly meetings of the Association, we recommend that the South Georgia Association comply with such action. We submit the following items as a matter of temporary constitutional provisions relating to the new set-up in our Association:

MEMBERSHIP

This South Georgia Association shall be composed of such regularly organized and well-disciplined Freewill Baptist



Churches as may conveniently embody themselves in this fellowship.

MEETINGS

This South Georgia Association shall hold its annual meeting on Friday and Saturday after the second Sunday in October each year. Quarterly meetings of the Association shall be held on the fourth Saturday in each of the following months: January, April and July.

REPRESENTATION

Representation shall be by delegates duly authorized by the local Churches comprising the South Georgia Association and shall be determined on the basis of one (1) delegate for each twenty (20) members or fraction thereof. Standing Delegates: All ordained Ministers in good standing with the South Georgia Association shall be standing delegates. Freewill Baptist Missionaries who hold membership in a Church in the South Georgia Association shall also be standing delegates.

FEES

Member Churches in South Georgia Association are requested to observe the following suggestions relative to fees to be sent with quarterly reports:

We recommend that a constitutional revision committee be elected and instructed to present its report in January at the next meeting of the Association.





ORDAINING COUNCIL REPORT

A request was read from Spring Grove Church relative to reinstating credentials of Bro. Mills which were revoked in 1954. Bro. Mills was questioned concerning Seventh Day Adventist doctrines, his own experience spiritually, his call to preach, his attitudes and beliefs concerning support of missions, Bible College and our denominational enterprises.


The ordaining council recommends that Bro. W. L. Mills be put on probation for one year, that he be granted the freedom to preach for one year and given such time to prove himself doctrinally sound, and then to meet again with ordaining council before approving the restoration of his credentials.

Bro. Raymond Altman appeared before the ordaining council upon recommendation of Philadelphia Church to be examined for license to preach the Gospel. The ordaining council recommends that license be granted to Bro. Altman.

Bro. McKennley Brown appeared before the ordaining council upon recommendation of Stony Hill Church to be examined for license to preach the Gospel. The council recommends that license be granted Bro. Brown.

Bro. Carl Baker having given evidence of at least two years of college training in preparation for the ministry and having satisfactorily served as a licensed minister in pastorates at Metter for two years, the ordaining council recommends his ordination.

The ordaining of Bro. Baker took place after lunch on Saturday, September 23, 1961. May God bless him real good.




MISSION BOARD REPORT

Articles of Faith

1. The Bible. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice.

2. God. There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the universe; and in the Scriptures as Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. Christ. Christ is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified, and is our ever present Saviour and Lord.

4. The Holy Spirit. The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God.

5. The Government of God. God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of men requires.

6. The Sinfulness of Man. Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His prosperity, therefore, inherit a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability sin, and become guilty before God.

7. The Work of Christ. The Son of God by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. The Terms of Salvation. The conditions of salvation are: (1) Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty renunciation of it. (2) Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. (3) Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. Election. God determined from the beginning to save all who would comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect.

10. Freedom of the Will. The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit, or to resist them and perish.

11. Salvation Free. God desires the salvation of all, the gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely.

12. Perseverance. All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have promise of eternal salvation.

13. Gospel Ordinances. Baptism, or the immersion of believers in



water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the gospel; feet washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be ministered to all true believers.

14. Tithing. God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed it in the gospel (Matthew 23:23), and the apostle, Paul, said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God has prospered him" (1 Corinthians 16:2).

15. The Christian Sabbath. The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employments and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works and activities and for personal communion with God.

16. Resurrection, Judgment and Final Retribution. The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation; then the wicked will "go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Church Covenant

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."


We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the Scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions and social worship; and by self-denial, faith, and good works endeavor to "grow in the grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship and the observance of the ordinances of the gospel; nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and so far as we are able to promote the success of the church and of the gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His will done on earth as it is in heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and



denominational enterprises, the support of missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Church Decorum

1. The local church is an independent body, so far as relates to its own government, the transaction of its business, the choice of its officers, the calling of a pastor and the discipline of its members.

2. When it becomes necessary, a pastor may be chosen at any time, at either a regular or called conference.

3. The pastor shall be moderator of the church. In the absence of the pastor, the chairman of the deacon board or someone appointed by the church shall act as moderator.

4. There shall be two or more deacons in the church. They hold office at the pleasure of the church during the maintenance of Christian character, faithful service and sound doctrine. They assist at baptism and the Lord's Supper, have care of the poor and conduct religious meetings in the absence of the pastor.

5. Conference shall be opened and conducted as follows: (1) Prayer. (2) Invitation to visiting brethren to seats. (3) Call for acknowledgements. (4) Call for old or deferred business. (5) Call for new business. (6) Call for miscellancous business.

6. Visiting brethren from sister churches shall speak and make motions or seconds, but are not allowed to vote.

7. Any person, upon proper application to a local church, may be received upon a profession of faith, by letter or by baptism by immersion.

8. Members shall be received into the church by the unanimous consent of the members present.

9. If members are to be tried for misconduct, written notices of the charges and specifications of the same should be furnished to those accused at least one week before the trial. If the charges are not confessed, the trial proceeds in regular order by the presentation of testimony, without personal disputation or remarks from those not church members.

10. Questions of fellowship, expulsion and all other items of business of the church shall be settled by a vote of the majority present, and this action shall be final provided public announcement of the intended action is made at the last regular meeting; and the quarterly meetings has no power to reverse it, but may, if deemed necessary, withdraw the hand of fellowship from a church as a whole when its action is inconsistent with sound doctrine of Christian policy.

11. Expelled members, upon request, shall be restored to full fellowship if their conduct, since expulsion, has convinced that church that they have sincerely repented of their former evils.



12. A vote shall not be taken upon questions without a move and a second. All important questions shall be decided by standing vote.

13. No motion shall be made while a move and a second is before the conference.

14. No member shall leave the house during conference without a sufficient cause, nor engage in conversation or whispering without being subject to be called to order by the moderator.

15. All discussions in conference must be conducted with calmness and good feeling. Any person who desires to speak must rise to his feet and be recognized by the moderator. His discussion must be relative to the issue.

16. No one shall speak more than three times on the same question without permission from the moderator, nor shall the remarks of anyone be unreasonably long.

17. When the moderator desires to speak, he must appoint some brother to act in his stead.

18. No person, having the floor, shall be interrupted while speaking unless he is out of order.

19. It shall be the duty of each church member to attend the administration of the Lord's Supper and washing of the saints' feet at least once a year.

20. All members, participating in the communion service, should be in fellowship with the church. All Christians should be invited to partake of the Lord's Supper with us (1 Corinthians 11:28).

21. Public fasting, humiliation and prayer shall be observed on proper occasions.

22. No licentiate shall be ordained until he has been licensed for one year and called by one or more churches. However, in the event that a minister has been licensed for one year and is attending a Bible college or seminary and requests ordination through the proper procedure, then it is left to the discretion of the ordaining council to examine and ordain the candidate for ordination.

23. Licensed ministers must renew their licenses annually.


24. This decorum may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the membership present or any two successive regular conferences.

Associational Decorum

1. At the meeting of each session of the association the officers of the preceding session shall preside until their successors shall be known.

2. At each session prior to business, the names of the ministers and delegates shall be called.

3. At the beginning of each session the minutes of the preceding session shall be read for correction and approval.



4. Any person wishing to speak shall rise and address the moderator. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration and avoid personalities.

5. No person shall speak more than twice on any subject without permission from the body.

6. No motion shall be withdrawn after its discussion.

7. When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, or postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall be preferred in order in which they are stated.

8. Nominations for officers and committee members shall be made from the floor or by a nomination committee.

9. After motion has been decided, any member having voted in the affirmative may move for a reconsideration.

10. No member shall absent himself during the session without permission from the presiding officer, and none shall take final leave of absence without permission from the body.

11. This association has the right to decide what matters shall be admitted to its consideration.

12. This decorum may be amended at any session of the association by a majority vote.

13. No church shall liberate any minister who comes from any other denomination until he has been examined by the ordaining council and has received credentials bearing the approval of the council.

Constitution

Article 1. This yearly meeting or association shall be called the South Georgia Association, and shall be composed of such regularly organized and well disciplined Free Will Baptist quarterly meetings, conveniently located, as may embody themselves under this constitution.

Article 2. The conference of this yearly meeting or association shall consist of delegates from the several quarterly meetings of which it is composed, every quarterly meeting being entitled to one delegate, every quarterly meeting containing five hundred members to two delgates, and one addition delegate for every five hundred members. Churches sending delegates to this association shall be allowed one delegate for each twenty members or fraction thereof.

Article 3. The officers of this yearly meeting or association shall be a standing clerk, treasurer and moderator who shall be chosen at every session of the yearly meeting or association, with assistants as may be found necessary.

Article 4. Any well organized and well regulated Free Will Baptist quarterly meeting, composed of such churches as conform to the practices, and



adopt the doctrines of the Free Will Baptist denomination, as published in the treatise of their faith, and in the minutes of the National Association, and are in favor of all the benevolent enterprises of the denomination, may at any time, on application by vote of this body, become a member thereof.

Article 5. This yearly meeting or association shall have the power to discipline the quarterly meetings of which it is composed, and to exclude them for disorderly walk, if labor proves unsuccessful, but in no case to reverse their decisions nor to interfere with any of their internal regulations.

Article 6: The sessions of this yearly meeting or association shall be held annually at which time it shall be the duty of the quarterly meetings and churches of which this yearly meeting or association is composed, to represent themselves by letter and delegates, and report this standing, prospects and statistics; at which time the association shall act upon such questions and topics as may be referred to it by its respective quarterly meetings, and transact such other business not repugnant to this constitution, nor to the practices of the denomination, as in its judgment may promote the cause of Christ and the interests of the churches and quarterly meetings within the limits of this yearly meeting or association.

Article 7. This yearly meeting or association shall have the power to adopt any regulations or bylaws, not inconsistent with this constitution, which may be deemed essential to the further regulations of its sessions.

Article 8. This constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of the yearly meeting or association at any regular session.
