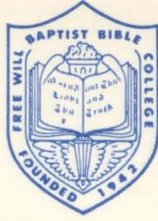

CONSTITUTION
of the
TENNESSEE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION
of the
FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH

PREAMBLE

Believing that a bond of union and fellowship among Free Will Baptist Women of Tennessee will achieve greater success in all their efforts which are put forth in the various districts throughout the state, through a state organization, thus further combining our auxiliary work with a view to unity of purpose in promoting more effectively the cause of Christ along all lines of Christian Women's endeavors; we do organize and adopt the following constitution for our better government:

ARTICLE I — NAMES

This organization shall be known as the Tennessee Woman's Auxiliary Convention of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE II — PURPOSE

The primary purpose of this convention shall be to advance the cause of missions and to bring the women of each convention district within Tennessee together for the purpose of transacting business pertaining to the promotion of mission work in general.

ARTICLE III — MEMBERSHIP

Representation in the State Convention is by districts.

Section 1. — The officers of the Convention together with the district presidents, the ten district delegates duly accredited by the state credentials committee and one elected from each local auxiliary be entitled to vote.

Section 2.—Local auxiliaries, in sections of the state where there is no district convention, may elect and send one delegate with proper membership fee directly from the local to the state convention.

ARTICLE IV — OFFICERS

Section 1.—The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice-president, executive secretary, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, youth auxiliary chairman, study course chairman, stewardship-prayer chairman, and personal service chairman. These shall constitute the state executive committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum for transaction of business.

Section 2.—All officers and duly accredited delegates shall be members in good standing of a Free Will Baptist church and active members of a local woman's auxiliary.

ARTICLE V — ELECTIONS

All officers shall serve for a term of two years and shall be nominated by a nominating committee and be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE VI — ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous annual meeting, or by the executive committee.

ARTICLE VII — FINANCING

Section 1.—Twenty cents (20¢) per active member shall be paid yearly to the Woman's Auxiliary convention for membership and convention representation fee, plus an additional \$1.00 fee for each local Auxiliary comprising the district convention.

Section 2.—Local Woman's Auxiliaries representing directly to this body shall send thirty (30¢) cents per member for membership and convention representation fee.

Section 3.—The desired plan for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are (1) Mission offerings following each of the three special weeks of prayer, and (2) The Co-Labor offerings received and disbursed monthly. All Auxiliary offerings for every cause should be sent promptly and regularly through the prescribed auxiliary channels; that is local to district, district to state, and state treasurer to W. N. A. C. treasurer.

ARTICLE VIII — AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment be presented in writing at the first official session of the convention and acted on during the closing session.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. President—The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all standing committees, and perform all duties usually pertaining to the office of president.

Section 2. Vice-President—The vice-president shall preside in the absence of the president and otherwise assist her in the oversight of the general work. As chairman of the enlistment committee, she shall help district enlistment chairmen in organizing and building up auxiliaries; should be in charge of all membership activities. During the state convention, the vice-president serves as chairman of the registration committee.

Section 3. Recording Secretary—The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive committee meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national recording secretary on a form similar to the one appearing in the Year Book.

Section 4. Assistant Recording Secretary—The assistant recording secretary shall serve as chairman of the credentials committee. In the absence of the recording secretary, the assistant recording secretary shall serve in her place.

Section 5. Corresponding Secretary—The corresponding secretary shall have charge of all correspondence pertaining to the work of the convention and serve as publicity chairman, sending public notice of all meetings to the public press and report items of interest to the W. N. A. C. column in papers, and prepare attractive posters for convention display and exhibits, etc.

Section 6. Executive Secretary—To the executive secretary is entrusted the formulation and general administration of the State Convention's plan of work as adopted during each annual session. She shall have oversight of

field work, visiting the various sections in the interest of the whole plan of work, as deemed advisable. As chairman of the Plan of Work-Literature Committee, her duties are as follows:

1. As chairman of the plan of work, she shall collate all plans and recommendations sent her prior to the regular annual executive committee meeting by each department chairman. She will have these plans arranged as a tentative plan of work for presentation to the executive committee. The approved plans will then become recommendations to be presented to the Body in session for adoption as the convention's plan of work for the ensuing year. It shall be her duty to keep the convention's plan of work before the women of the convention area by means of the Standard of Achievement charts, etc.

2. As Literature chairman it shall be her duty to devise ways and means (1) for arousing interest in all W. N. A. C. literature and (2) for securing every possible subscription to denominational publications.

Section 7. Treasurer—The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention, and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a meeting in July. The treasure must be bonded and her accounts and all the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the W. N. A. C. executive secretary-treasurer at least ten days before the annual W. N. A. C. meetinf in July. The treasurer must be bonded and her accounts and all funds must be audited annually. The convention year shall terminate and all books of the treasurer be closed September 30.

Section 8. Youth Auxiliary Chairman—The youth auxiliary chairman shall have general oversight of the youth auxiliary organizations within the state. She shall devise ways and means of enlisting and promoting youth auxiliary work throughout the state. She shall work these plans through the district youth chairman with whom she cooperates in annual youth camp work and daily vacation Bible schools among the unchurched. Whenever possible, she should visit every district in the interest of the missionary education of Free Will Baptist young people, and also to enlist Free Will Baptist Colleges for Christian training. She shall have charge of the annual declamation contest as set up by the W. N. A. C.

Section 9. Study Course Chairman—The study course chairman shall promote all mission study courses of the year, securing suggested text books and information from her national chairman. She shall encourage systematic study of the conditions and needs on our mission fields. She shall secure the cooperation of the district chairman in encouraging and promoting quarterly workshops as set up by the W. N. A. C.

Section 10. Stewardship-Prayer Chairman—It is the duty of the stewardship-prayer chairman to promote the idea of being good stewards in all phases, promote family altars, and to secure the cooperation of our women in planning challenging seasonal weeks or prayer programs and collecting mission offerings following each.

Section 11. Personal Service Chairman—The personal service chairman shall encourage the district personal service chairman in assigned and directed community missions which include all soul winning efforts.

ARTICLE II — DEPARTMENT PROMOTIONAL WORK

Departmental promotional work shall be carried on by the chairman of the various departments in the convention in cooperation with like chairman in the district conventions. For instance, it shall be the duty of the state convention's vice-president to share enlistment ideas and plans with vice-presidents of the district conventions, who in turn shall cooperate in enlistment

endeavors with vice-presidents of local auxiliaries. This same principle applies to all other departments of the convention.

The state chairman shall originate and direct the plan of work in their respective departments in harmony with the W. N. A. C. chief aims and the state convention's adopted plan of work. These plans shall be arranged and presented to the executive secretary at least ten (10) days prior to the regular annual meeting of the state executive committee. Approved plans will then become recommendations to the convention.

Each department chairman shall devise ways and means of promoting her respective department of work throughout all the district conventions within the state, securing materials and helps from the national chairman of her department; shall have charge of all work pertaining to, or necessary to the promotion of her special phase of the convention's plan of work; shall be expected to attend the executive committee meetings.

For the annual report, each department chairman will secure and compile informative and inspirational facts from district chairman concerning her department's activities during the year, that will make interesting and helpful historical records to be printed in the State's minutes.

ARTICLE III — COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee composed of the general officers and the department chairman, seven of whom constitute a quorum, shall hold its regular annual meeting preceding the annual convention for the transaction of business; and shall report through its officers at each annual session of this Body what has been done toward carrying out the objects of the organization. Other meetings at such other time as the president shall designate may be held. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an oversight of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary, same to be subject to the will of the convention at its regular meetings. They shall prepare the program for the regular annual meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each district convention and two members at large. All are to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting. This committee shall be retained for the entire year in order to fill any vacancy occurring during the year. Each interim nomination will, of course, be upon approval of the executive committee.

Section 3. Credentials—The assistant recording secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. This committee shall study the district reports and make its report to the state body before delegates are seated. This report will be a digest of district reports, along with the eligibility report on delegates, etc.

Section 4. Finance—The treasure shall be chairman of the finance committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The members appointed by the president audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the Body. All appropriations and expenses of the officers may be decided upon by the Finance committee, and passed upon by the convention.

Section 5. Registration—The vice-president shall be chairman, and other members may be appointed by the president. This committee registers every convention officer, every delegate, auxiliary, minister, visitor and any other the convention may desire. The report shall include this and other information as desired.

ARTICLE IV — AMENDMENTS

The by-laws may be amended according to Article VIII under the Constitution.

PROCEEDINGS

of the

Fourteenth Annual Session of the Tennessee Free Will Baptist Woman's Auxiliary Convention

Theme: SHARING THE LIVING CHRIST

Scripture: Acts 3:6b

The Free Will Baptist Woman's Auxiliary Convention of the Tennessee State Association, was called to order at 9:30 a.m. October 21, 1959 at the Bible College Memorial Auditorium, Nashville, Tennessee, by Mrs. J. B. Smith, the vice-president. Invocation was offered by Mrs. Fannie Polston. The congregation was led in singing the opening hymn, "Jesus Saves" by the Rev. Robert Hill with Mrs. Dale Burden as accompanist. Mrs. L. D. Miley led in the opening devotions using Acts 4:20 as the basis of her remarks on the subject "Sharing Christ Through Our Auxiliary."

The delegates, officers, and visitors were welcomed to the Bible College by the president Dr. L. C. Johnson and to the Cumberland District by Mrs. Robert Hill, C.D.W.A. president. Mrs. Garland Teasley of the Union District responded.

Mrs. J. B. Smith, vice-president, presented the explanation of the president's necessary absence, and read the appointment of committees as follows: Credentials: Mrs. Sue Boyd, Mrs. Georgia Hill, Mrs. Fannie Polston. Digest: Mrs. J. H. Graham, Mrs. J. B. Stack, Mrs. Garland Teasley. Finance: Mrs. J. E. Frazier, Mrs. Roy Thomas, Mrs. Paul Woolsey. Registration: Mrs. Esterlene Barnett, Mrs. W. E. Marshall, Mrs. J. E. Simpson. Resolutions: Mrs. L. D. Miley, Mrs. Walter Maxey, Mrs. Horace Teague.

Due to the absence of several state officers, the following were chosen to serve as substitutes: Mrs. J. E. Frazier for the recording secretary; Mrs. Sue Boyd for the assistant secretary; Mrs. Esterlene Barnett for the vice-president since Mrs. J. B. Smith was acting as president in the absence of Mrs. Paul Inbody who had been called suddenly to Oklahoma because of a serious emergency in her family.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried that Article VII of the Constitution be amended. The proposed amendment was read and in accordance with Article VIII was laid on the table to be acted on during the closing session.

Mrs. J. B. Smith presented the State Youth Auxiliary chairman, Mrs. Charles Sublette, who had charge of the Youth Hour. "Sharing the Living Christ Through Missions" was the theme of the Youth Program. There were three contestants in the annual Y. A. Declamation Contest; namely, Miss Reba Brinton, Y.P.A. representative and Miss Sue Patten, G.T.A. representative from the Cumberland District and Miss Helen Fillers, Y.P.A. representative from the Union District. Miss Reba Brinton's speech, "God's Challenge to Us," won first place in the Y.P.A. group, and Miss Sue Patten, having no opponent, of course, was first place winner in the G.T.A. group. The award for both young ladies is a check of \$20.00 toward their trip to the W.N.A.C. annual meeting to be held in Fresno, California, July, 1960, where they will compete with Y.A. contestants from all the states representing there at that time. Tennessee is proud to have such splendid representatives.

The annual essay winner was Miss Adair Boyd, of the C.D.Y.A.

Following some special numbers in song rendered by the Girls' Trio of the F.W.B. Bible College, the Rev. Dale Burden, pastor of East Nashville F.W.B. Church brought the keynote message of the convention. He closed the message with prayer.

The convention then adjourned for lunch and the necessary committee meetings.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session was opened by the congregation singing the hymn "Jesus Calls Us." Mrs. Laverne Miley led the opening prayer.

The Credentials Committee's report was made by Mrs. Sue Boyd and by motion adopted as read. (See Reports.)

Mrs. Smith then recognized and seated all district convention delegates, local auxiliary delegates and district convention presidents who had registered with the committee.

Highlights of the 1959 W.N.A.C. were given by Mrs. J. E. Simpson.

The treasurer's report was made and adopted as read by Mrs. J. E. Frazier.

The following reports were made and by motion accepted: Finance Committee, Registration, Digest, Resolutions, and Nomination Committee. (See Reports.)

By motion the report of the committee on nominations was received and voted on item by item. In every instance the committee's nominee was elected. (See report of committee for names.)

Due to the fact that the committee had not suggested a nominee for the personal service chairman, a motion sustained that this chairman be nominated from the floor. Mrs. Elizabeth Moore of Kingsport, was nominated and elected by acclamation.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried to have 1000 copies of the 1959 minutes printed. A motion was made, seconded, and carried to elect a committee on nominations for the ensuing year. Mrs. E. J. WOMAN'S AUXILIARY PLAN OF WORK

W.N.A.C. Watchword for 1960: "Calvary's Call."

W.N.A.C. Theme: "They (the Women) Remembered His Words" — Luke 24:8.

W.N.A.C. Hymn: "Jesus Saves"

T.W.A.C. Watchword: "Sharing the Living Christ."

T.W.A.C. Theme: ". . . Such as I have give I thee: in the name of Jesus Christ . . ." — Acts 3:6.

T.W.A.C. Hymn: "Soul Winner for Jesus."

1. Prayer and Bible Study:

- a. Emphasize the need of more family altars in our homes.
- b. Three special seasons of prayer are observed.
 - (1) Pre-Easter with offering for foreign missions.
 - (2) Pre-Thanksgiving with offering for National Home Missions.
 - (3) Pre-Christmas with offering for State Home Missions.

2. Enlistment:

- a. Make use of special efforts to enlist new members,
- b. Helping the Christian to grow spiritually by enlisting her in the activities of the auxiliary as outlined in the Plan of Work.

3. Study:

- a. Missions is kept before the group at all times through special programs and the following study courses: prayer, missions, stewardship, manual of W.N.A.C. Methods, Evangelism.
- b. That at least one *standard* study course be held during the year before an auxiliary may be classed as "A-1."

4. Personal Service (Missions in one's own community).

- a. Winning the lost for Christ.
- b. Ministering to other *spiritual* needs of community.
- c. Helping the needy, sick, and sorrowing.
- d. Teaching:
 - (1) Christian observance of the Lord's Day.
 - (2) Total abstinence.
 - (3) High standards of conduct, speech and dress.
 - (4) Law observance.

5. Missionary Education of F.W.B. Youth:

Designed to capture and to use each and every young person in the church for Christ. Stresses definite full-time Christian service and emphasizes stewardship.

Three groups:

- a. Young People's Auxiliary (ages 14-18).
- b. Go Tell Auxiliary (girls, ages 9-13).
- c. Boys' Auxiliary (boys, ages 9-13).
- d. Declamation and Essay contests are urged for these youth auxiliaries.

6. Tithes and Offerings:

- a. Systematic giving is encouraged by regular offering to the Co-Laborer Fund.
- b. Special self-denial offerings are taken during the seasons of prayer.
- c. Convention projects as adopted at each annual session.

The 1960 Convention Projects are as follows:

- a. Co-Laborer Offering (every month) to State treasurer.
- b. October — Student Memorial Loan Fund.
- c. November — National Home Missions (Pre-Thanksgiving Season of Prayer with offering for National Home Mission Work).
- d. December — State Home Missions (Orphanage, Youth Camp, State, or District Home Mission).
- e. January — Bible College (Library, Expansion, etc.).
- f. March — Any project desired.
- g. April — Foreign Missions (Pre-Easter Season of Prayer and Offering for Foreign Missions).
- h. May — W.N.A.C. Mexico Buildings Fund Projects (this project may be any month through June).

(Gifts to these Projects constitute Point III on the Standard of Achievement.)
