Constitution of the Tennessee Free Will Woman's Auxiliary Convention

Preamble

Believing that a bond of union and fellowship among Free Will Baptist Women of Tennessee will achieve greater success in all their efforts which are put forth in the various districts throughout the state, through a state organization, thus further combining our auxiliary work with a view to unity of purpose in promoting more effectively the cause of Christ along all lines of Christian Women's endeavors, we do organize and adopt the following constitution for our better government:

Article I—Name

This organization shall be known as the Tennessee Woman's Auxiliary Convention of Free Will Baptists.

Article II—Purpose

The primary purpose of this convention shall be to advance the cause of missions and to bring the women of each convention district within Tennessee together for the purpose of transacting business pertaining to the promotion of mission work in general.

Article III—Membership

Representation in the State Convention is by districts.

Section 1.—The officers of the Convention together with the district presidents, the ten district delegates duly accredited by the state credentials committee and one elected from each local auxiliary be entitled to vote.

Section 2.—Local auxiliaries, in sections of the state where there is no district convention, may elect and send one delegate with proper membership fee directly from the local to the state convention.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1.—The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, executive secretary, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, youth auxiliary chairman, study course chairman, stewardship-prayer chairman, and personal service chairman. These shall constitute the state executive committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum for transaction of business.

Section 2.—All officers and duly accredited delegates shall be members in good standing of a Free Will Baptist church and active members of a local woman's auxiliary.

Article V—Elections

All officers shall serve for a term of two years and shall be nominated by a nominating committee and be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

Article VI—Annual Meeting

The annual meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous annual meeting, or by the executive committee.

Article VII—Financing

Section 1.—Twenty cents (20c) per active member shall be paid yearly to the Woman's Auxiliary convention for membership and convention representation fee, plus an additional \$1.00 fee for each local Auxiliary comprising the district convention. Also a membership fee of twenty cents (20c) per Y.P.A. member shall be paid yearly to the T.W.A.C. treasurer.

Section 2.—Local Woman's Auxiliaries representing directly to this body shall send thirty (30c) cents per member for membership and convention representation fee.

Section 3.—The desired plan for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary is (1) Mission offerings following each of the three special weeks of prayer, and (2) The Co-Labor offerings received and disbursed monthly. All Auxiliary offerings for every cause should be sent promptly and regularly through the prescribed auxiliary channels; that is local to district, district to state, and state treasurer to W.N.A.C. treasurer.

Article VIII—Amendments

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment be presented in writing at the first official session of the convention and acted on during the closing session.

BY-LAWS

Article I—Duties of Officers

Section 1. President—The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all standing committees, and perform all duties usually pertaining to the office of president.

Section 2. Vice President—The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president and otherwise assist her in the oversight of the general work. As chairman of the enlistment committee, she shall help district enlistment chairmen in organizing and building up auxiliaries; should be in charge of all membership activities. During the state convention, the vice president serves as chairman of the registration committee.

Section 3. Recording Secretary—The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive committee meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national recording secretary on the form provided for such reports.

Section 4. Assistant Recording Secretary—The assistant recording secretary shall serve as chairman of the credentials committee. In the absence of the recording secretary, the assistant recording secretary shall serve in her place.

Section 5. Corresponding Secretary—The corresponding secretary shall have charge of all correspondence pertaining to the work of the convention and serve as publicity chairman, sending public notice of all meetings to the public press and report items of interest to the W.N.A.C. column in papers, and prepare attractive posters for convention display and exhibits, etc.

Section 6. Executive Secretary—To the executive secretary is entrusted the formulation and general administration of the State Convention's plan of work as adopted during each annual session. She shall have oversight of field work, visiting the various sections in the interest of the whole plan of work, as deemed advisable. As chairman of the Plan of Work-Literature Committee, her duties are as follows:

1. As chairman of the plan of work, she shall collate all plans and recommendations sent her prior to the regular annual executive committee meeting by each department chairman. She will have these plans arranged as a tentative plan of work for presentation to the executive committee. The approved plans will then become recommendations to be presented to the Body in session for adoption as the convention's plan of work for the ensuing year. It shall be her duty to keep the convention's plan of work before the women of the convention area by means of the Standard of Achievement charts, etc.

2. As Literature chairman it shall be her duty to devise ways and means (1) for arousing interest in all W.N.A.C. literature and (2) for securing every possible subscription to denominational publications.

Section 7. Treasurer—The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention, and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a report in November. She shall also send an annual report to the W.N.A.C. executive secretary-treasurer at least ten days before the annual W.N.A.C. meeting in July. The treasurer must be bonded and her accounts and all funds must be audited annually. The convention year shall terminate and all books of the treasurer be closed October 30.

Section 8. Youth Auxiliary Chairman—The youth auxiliary chairman shall have general oversight of the youth auxiliary organizations within the state. She shall devise ways and means of enlisting and promoting youth auxiliary work throughout the state. She shall work these plans through the district youth chairman with whom she cooperates in annual youth camp work and daily vacation

Bible schools among the unchurched. Whenever possible, she should visit every district in the interest of the missionary education of Free Will Baptist young people, and also to enlist Free Will Baptist Colleges for Christian training. She shall have charge of the annual declamation contest as set up by the W.N.A.C.

Section 9. Study Course Chairman—The study course chairman shall promote all mission study courses of the year, securing suggested text books and information from her national chairman. She shall encourage systematic study of the conditions and needs on our mission fields. She shall secure the cooperation of the district chairman in encouraging and promoting quarterly workshops as set up by the W.N.A.C.

Section 10. Stewardship-Prayer Chairman—It is the duty of the stewardship-prayer chairman to promote the idea of being good stewards in all phases, promote family altars, and to secure the cooperation of our women in planning challenging seasonal weeks of prayer programs and collecting mission offerings following each season of prayer.

Section 11. Personal Service Chairman—The personal service chairman shall encourage the district personal service chairman in assigned and directed community missions which include all soul winning efforts.

Article II—Department Promotional Work

Departmental promotional work shall be carried on by the chairman of the various departments in the convention in cooperation with like chairman in the district conventions. For instance, it shall be the duty of the state convention's vice president to share enlistment ideas and plans with vice presidents of the district conventions, who in turn shall cooperate in enlistment endeavors with vice presidents of local auxiliaries. The same principle applies to all other departments of the convention.

The state chairmen shall originate and direct the plan of work in their respective departments in harmony with the W.N.A.C. chief aims and the state convention's adopted plan of work. These plans shall be arranged and presented to the executive secretary at least (10) days prior to the regular annual meeting of the state executive committee. Approved plans will then become recommendations to the convention.

Each department chairman shall devise ways and means of promoting her respective department of work throughout all the district conventions within the state, securing materials and helps from the national chairman of her department; shall have charge of all work pertaining to, or necessary to the promotion of her special phase of the convention's plan of work; shall be expected to attend the executive committee meetings.

For the annual report, each department chairman will secure and compile informative and inspirational facts from district chairman concerning her department's activities during the year, that will make interesting and helpful historical records to be printed in the State's minutes.

Article III—Committees

Section 1. Executive Committee composed of the general officers and the department chairman, seven of whom constitute a quorum, shall hold its regular annual meeting preceding the annual convention for the transaction of business; and shall report through its officers at each annual session of this Body what has been done toward carrying out the objects of the organization. Other meetings at such other time as the president shall designate may be held. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an oversight of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary, same to be subject to the will of the convention at its regular meetings. They shall prepare the program for the regular annual meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from

each district convention and one member at large. All are to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting. This committee shall be retained for the entire year in order to fill any vacancy occurring during the year. Each interim nomination will, of course, be upon approval of the executive committee.

Section 3. Credentials—The assistant recording secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. This committee shall study the district reports and make its report to the state body before delegates are seated. This report will be a digest of district reports, along with the eligibility report on delegates, etc.

Section 4. Finance—The treasurer shall be chairman of the finance committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The members appointed by the president audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the Body. All appropriations and expenses of the officers may be decided upon by the Finance committee, and passed upon by the convention.

Section 5. Registration—The vice president shall be chairman, and other members may be appointed by the president. This committee registers every convention officer, every delegate, auxiliary, minister, visitor and any other the convention may desire. The report shall include this and other information as desired.

Article IV—Amendments

The by-laws may be amended according to Article VIII under the Constitution.

PROCEEDINGS

A musical prelude by Mrs. Harold Teague at the organ and Mrs. Billy Melvin at the piano, opened the 18th annual session of the Tennessee Free Will Baptist Woman’s Auxiliary Convention at the First F.W.B. Church in Johnson City, Tennessee on Wednesday morning, November 13, 1963 at 9:30 a.m. The Rev. Harold Teague led the group in singing the convention hymn. Rev. Don Sexton led in prayer. Mrs. Kirby Joe Godwin, missionary to Alaska, brought a very inspiring devotion using Psa. 104:33-35 for the Scripture background for her message on the subject: “My Brother’s Keeper in the Homeland.” Mrs. J. E. Simpson, Dean of Women at the F.W.B. Bible College led in prayer.

Mrs. Ray Turnage, TWAC President, presided over the session.

Words of welcome were brought by Mrs. Jasper Calloway, President of the local Woman’s Auxiliary. Response was made by Mrs. Henry Melvin, Nashville, Tennessee.

Special music was rendered by Miss Martha Hughes.

The report of the Credentials Committee was read by the Chairman, Mrs. Paul Woolsey, and by sustained motion adopted as read. (See reports on page 17).

Mrs. Turnage, President, recognized and seated the district delegates, the

district presidents, and the local auxiliary delegates who had registered as the duly authorized voting power of the convention. (A complete list of all delegates on page 4).

Recognition was extended to all attending the convention from the various sections of the state.

Missionaries recognized were Mrs. Ken Eagleton, Brazil; Rev. and Mrs. Kirby Joe Godwin, Alaska; Rev. and Mrs. Don Sexton, Chattanooga mission work.

WNAC officers recognized were Mrs. Cleo Pursell, Executive Secretary-Treasurer; Mrs. Robert Hill, Study Course Chairman. All nine state officers were recognized. Three districts and ten local auxiliaries were recognized. Thirty ministers along with twenty-four deacons and thirty-five visiting men and women were recognized.

The program as planned by the TWAC executive committee was adopted as the working plan for the session with permission granted the president for any needed alterations.

The Youth Hour under the direction of the TWAC Youth Chairman, Mrs. Harold Teague, was begun with the congregational singing of "Christ for the Whole Wide World" under the direction of the Rev. Harold Teague. The theme of this hour, "Missions", was very ably presented by the four contestants; namely, Misses Martha Hughes and Judy Felts representing the YPA group and Debbie Melvin and Karen Brown, representing the GTA group.

Debbie Melvin, representing CDWA Go-Tell auxiliaries spoke from the subject, "Other Sheep Have I". Karen Brown, representing UDWA Go-Tells used for her subject "Untold Millions Have Never Been Told". The CDWA Young Peoples representative, Judy Felts, was the author as well as the deliverer of her speech on the subject, "Here Am I, Send Me". Martha Hughes, UDWA Young Peoples auxiliary representative spoke on the subject, "The King's Command".

The first place GTA winner was Debbie Melvin. The first place YPA winner was Judy Felts. These young ladies will represent Tennessee youth at the WNAC Declamation finals to be held in Kansas City next July.

Letters of congratulations and a check from the district convention they represented was presented to each first place winner in appreciation of their faithfulness to a task so well done for Christ and His cause. Next July in Kansas City they receive the TWAC check for \$20.00 toward their expenses to the WNAC.

The Rev. Harold Teague led into the worship hour by leading the congregation in singing "Rescue the Perishing". Prayer was led by the Rev. Winston Sweeney.

Mrs. Ken Eagleton, missionary to Brazil, brought the morning message. She read I Cor. 13:1-10 and using "My Brother's Keeper in Other Lands", she stressed that love is the greatest thing in the world.

An offering for the missionary speakers at this session was received in the amount of \$46.89.

After the announcements, Rev. Gordon Hart pronounced the benediction.

Vice-President's Report:

(Enlistment for Missions Chairman)

There are two reasons for making efforts to enlist women in the Woman's Auxiliary work — what the organization can mean to women and what women can mean to missions.

The aims of the enlistment department includes a program of visitation, organization of new auxiliaries, regular attendance at general meetings, participation in TWAC Plan of Activities, and constant attention to absentees from the meetings. These aims keep before auxiliary members the need for enlisting women in a program of mission study, prayer, stewardship, and community mission activities, or personal service.

It is the responsibility of the Vice Presidents who compose the enlistment committee to keep before the group all the enlistment plans of the convention.

1963 district reports revealed 135 new members this year, bringing the convention enrollment of W.A.'s to 809. The average attendance at the monthly meetings was 18. It was reported that 326 members made contacts to win new members and 201 worked to bring back the absentees. Records revealed a loss of 104

members this year. The total TWAC enrollment is 1531. This is 809 adult members and 722 youth auxiliary members.

In the light of these facts, may we prayerfully search our hearts and decide if we have truly been laborers with whom the Lord is pleased. If not, may this record challenge you to do more for Him through enlistment of Free Will Baptist in Missions during the coming year.

Recording Secretary's Report:

(Statistics Chairman)

Reporting is an important part of organizational life. It brings into focus what an organization is doing and what it is not doing. It makes possible the combined records which show progress or lack of progress and builds organizational history.

The recording secretary's report involves 7 points. According to the reports sent in by the 3 District and 2 Local recording secretaries, there was an increase in all points except point 6.

Since the itemized statistical report will appear in the printed record, just now I will review or digest the compiled reports.

1. Enlistment for missions showed an increase of 15%.

2. Educating youth in missions showed an increase of 13%. Records show 722 F.W.B. youth engaged in mission activities which seek to cultivate missionary conviction in their hearts.

3. Mission Study classes showed a 47% increase with classes in Evangelism leading.

4. Stewardship-Prayer increased 27% over 1962. The number of family altars and weeks of prayer increased encouragingly while the missionary offerings made during the 3 seasons of prayer almost tripled last year's record.

5. Christian witnessing revealed an increase of 18%. Witnessing to the lost resulted in 43 souls saved and many spiritual needs in the local communities ministered to during 1963.

6. Publicity among FWB is still not on the increase. This is the one point on our Standard of Achievement that we had to show a 44% decrease. Just as it pays business men dividends to advertise, it also pays Christians dividends in souls to publicize the meetings and activities of the Woman's Auxiliary.

7. Sharing possessions by 82% of Woman's Auxiliary members resulted in an increase of 16-2/3% in tithes and offerings over 1962.

Woman's Auxiliary Chief Aims in Review

The purpose and place of the organization called Woman's Auxiliary by Free Will Baptists, are expressed in and carried out through its chief aims. Whenever these aims are understood every phase of activity is charged with meaning. The organizational structure and the promotional program then fall into proper perspective. They are as they should be—means to an end—the end being the proclamation of the gospel around the world.

These aims and the projects adopted at the annual session, and listed in the Plan of Work, constitute the Woman's Auxiliary activities expected of every auxiliary member during the convention year and about which each officer is requested to report achievement annually to her superior officer. Through these aims the nine auxiliary officers seek to do the following:

1. To Develop the Spiritual Life of All Members through:
 - A. Encouraging daily Bible study
 - B. The Use of W.N.A.C. Prayer Calendar
 - C. Efforts toward Establishing Family Altars
2. To Bring Other Women and Youth into the Experience of Missionary Endeavors through:

- A. Efforts to Enlist Every Member into full participation of Woman's Auxiliary Activities
- B. A Continuing Program of visitation which enlists the women and youth of the church as Members.
- C. Constant Attention to Absentees
3. To Develop Appreciation for All Peoples and a Genuine Concern for Those Lost without Christ through:
 - A. Emphasis on Continuous Reading of Mission Books and Church Periodicals.
 - B. Study classes on Missions, Prayer, Stewardship, Evangelism and Woman's Auxiliary Methods.
4. To Lead Members into Experiences of Christian Witnessing through:
 - A. Promoting individual efforts in soul-winning
 - B. Directed Monthly plans for witnessing that will meet spiritual needs in the local community
 - C. Distribution of Christian Literature such as tract, gospels, etc.
5. To Magnify Christian Sharing of Possessions through:
 - A. Enlisting each Member to tithe
 - B. Continuous month-by-month giving through the Co-Laborer Offering Plan.
 - C. Self-denial gifts during the 3 seasons of prayer for state and national home missions and for foreign missions
 - D. Gifts to F.W.B. College.
6. To Cultivate Missionary Convictions in the Hearts of F.W.B. Youth through:
 - A. Securing Cooperation of parents in Youth Auxiliary work.
 - B. Maintaining a Graded Program of Missionary education for F.W.B. Youth Auxiliaries
 - C. Adequate fostering of Youth organizations
7. To Give to the Auxiliary an Informed Leadership through:
 - A. Study classes in Auxiliary methods
 - B. Workshops and Clinics for Officers and committee members.
 - C. Well-planned Committee Meetings held regularly.
 - D. Representation at district, state, and National Auxiliary Meetings.
8. To Build and Maintain a Business-like Operation of the Woman's Auxiliary through:
 - A. Good system of records to teach faithfulness, respect, and individual responsibility.
 - B. Recording Achievements
 - C. Reporting systematically in order to provide needed information, and to aid the auxiliary in doing a better job of Missionary education in the Church.
9. To Build a True Pattern of the Lord's Work by Communicating the W.A. Purpose and Activities to Others through:
 - A. Using the Media of local newspapers to motivate attendance and participation.
 - B. Writing cards and letters to create and sustain interest and to insure growth.

It is impossible to build and maintain a good Missionary education Auxiliary in the church without an effective **Plan of Work** and a good **System of Records**, and **Capable enthusiastic officers** to operate both. It is believed T.W.A. now has these. May we All endeavor earnestly and diligently to prove it by our good works done in 1963-64 to "Declare His Glory", and if the Lord tarries, the faithful reporting of them by each officer at Donelson, Tennessee, November 11, 1964.
