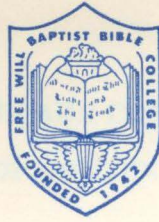

Constitution of the Tennessee Free Will Woman's Auxiliary Convention

Preamble

Believing that a bond of union and fellowship among Free Will Baptist Women of Tennessee will achieve greater success in all their efforts which are put forth in the various districts throughout the state, through a state organization, thus further combining our auxiliary work with a view to unity of purpose in promoting more effectively the cause of Christ along all lines of Christian Women's endeavors, we do organize and adopt the following constitution for our better government:

Article I—Name

This organization shall be known as the Tennessee Woman's Auxiliary Convention of Free Will Baptists.

Article II—Purpose

The primary purpose of this convention shall be to advance the cause of missions and to bring the women of each convention district within Tennessee together for the purpose of transacting business pertaining to the promotion of mission work in general.

Article III—Membership

Representation in the State Convention is by districts.

Section 1.—The officers of the Convention together with the district presidents, the ten district delegates duly accredited by the state credentials committee and one elected from each local auxiliary be entitled to vote.

Section 2.—Local auxiliaries, in sections of the state where there is no district convention, may elect and send one delegate to vote.

Section 2.—Local auxiliaries, in sections of the state where there is no district convention, may elect and send one delegate with proper membership fee directly from the local to the state convention.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1.—The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, executive secretary, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, youth auxiliary chairman, study course chairman, stewardship-prayer chairman, and personal service chairman. These shall constitute the state executive committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum for transaction of business.

Section 2.—All officers and duly accredited delegates shall be members in good standing of a Free Will Baptist church and active members of a local woman's auxiliary.

Article V—Elections

All officers shall serve for a term of two years and shall be nominated by a nominating committee and be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

Article VI—Annual Meeting

The annual meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous annual meeting, or by the executive committee.

Article VII—Financing

Section 1.—Twenty cents (20c) per active member shall be paid yearly to the Woman's Auxiliary convention for membership and convention representation fee, plus an additional \$1.00 fee for each local Auxiliary comprising the district convention. Also a membership fee of twenty cents (20c) per Y.P.A. member shall be paid yearly to the T.W.A.C. treasurer.

Section 2.—Local Woman's Auxiliaries representing directly to this body shall send thirty (30c) cents per member for membership and convention representation fee.

Section 3.—The desired plan for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary is (1) Mission offerings following each of the three special weeks of prayer, and (2) The Co-Labor offerings received and disbursed monthly. All Auxiliary offerings for every cause shall be sent promptly and regularly through the prescribed auxiliary channels; that is local to district, district to state, and state treasurer to W.N.A.C. treasurer.

Article VIII—Amendments

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment be presented in writing at the first official session of the convention and acted on during the closing session.

BY-LAWS

Article I—Duties of Officers

Section 1. President—The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all standing committees, and perform all duties usually pertaining to the office of president.

Section 2. Vice President—The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president and otherwise assist her in the oversight of the general work. As chairman of the enlistment committee, she shall help district enlistment chairmen in organizing and building up auxiliaries; should be in charge of all membership activities. During the state convention, the vice president serves as chairman of the registration committee.

Section 3. Recording Secretary—The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of all preceedings of the convention and executive committee meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national recording secretary on the form provided for such reports.

Section 4. Assistant Recording Secretary—The assistant recording secretary shall serve as chairman of the credentials committee. In the absence of the recording secretary, the assistant recording secretary shall serve in her place.

Section 5. Corresponding Secretary—The corresponding secretary shall have charge of all correspondence pertaining to the work of the convention and serve as publicity chairman, sending public notice of all meetings to the public press and report items of interest to the W.N.A.C. column in papers, and prepare attractive posters for convention display and exhibits, etc.

Section 6. Executive Secretary—To the executive secretary is entrusted the formulation and general administration of the State Convention's plan of work as adopted during each annual session. She shall have oversight of field work,

visiting the various sections in the interest of the whole plan of work, as deemed advisable. As chairman of the Plan of Work-Literature Committee, her duties are as follows:

1. As chairman of the plan of work, she shall collate all plans and recommendations sent her prior to the regular annual executive committee meeting by each department chairman. She will have these plans arranged as a tentative plan of work for presentation to the executive committee. The approved plans will then become recommendations to be presented to the Body in session for adoption as the convention's plan of work for the ensuing year. It shall be her duty to keep the convention's plan of work before the women of the convention area by means of the Standard of Achievement charts, etc.

2. As Literature chairman it shall be her duty to devise ways and means (1) for arousing interest in all W.N.A.C. literature and (2) for securing every possible subscription to denominational publications.

Section 7. Treasurer—The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention, and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a report in November. She shall also send an annual report to the W.N.A.C. executive secretary-treasurer at least ten days before the annual W.N.A.C. meeting in July. The treasurer must be bonded and her accounts and all funds must be audited annually. The convention year shall terminate and all books of the treasurer be closed October 30.

Section 8. Youth Auxiliary Chairman—The youth auxiliary chairman shall have general oversight of the youth auxiliary organizations within the state. She shall devise ways and means of enlisting and promoting youth auxiliary work throughout the state. She shall work these plans through the district youth chairman with whom she cooperates in annual youth camp work and daily vacation Bible schools among the unchurched. Whenever possible, she should visit every district in the interest of the missionary education of Free Will Baptist young people, and also to enlist Free Will Baptist Colleges for Christian training. She shall have charge of the annual declamation contest as set up by the W.N.A.C.

Section 9. Study Course Chairman—The study course chairman shall promote all mission study courses of the year, securing suggested text books and information from her national chairman. She shall encourage systematic study of the conditions and needs on our mission fields. She shall secure the cooperation of the district chairman in encouraging and promoting quarterly workshops as set up by the W.N.A.C.

Section 10. Stewardship-Prayer Chairman—It is the duty of the stewardship-prayer chairman to promote the idea of being good stewards in all phases, promote family altars, and to secure the cooperation of our women in planning challenging seasonal weeks of prayer programs and collecting mission offerings following each season of prayer.

Section 11. Personal Service Chairman—The personal service chairman shall encourage the district personal service chairman in assigned and directed community missions which include all soul winning efforts.

Article II—Department Promotional Work

Departmental promotional work shall be carried on by the chairman of the various departments in the convention in cooperation with like chairman in the district conventions. For instance, it shall be the duty of the state convention's vice president to share enlistment ideas and plans with vice presidents of the district conventions, who in turn shall cooperate in enlistment endeavors with vice presidents of local auxiliaries. The same principle applies to all other departments of the convention.

The state chairmen shall originate and direct the plan of work in their respective departments in harmony with the W.N.A.C. chief aims and the state convention's adopted plan of work. These plans shall be arranged and presented

to the executive secretary at least (10) days prior to the regular annual meeting of the state executive committee. Approved plans will then become recommendations to the convention.

Each department chairman shall devise ways and means of promoting her respective department of work throughout all the district conventions within the state, securing materials and helps from the national chairman of her department; shall have charge of all work pertaining to, or necessary to the promotion of her special phase of the convention's plan of work; shall be expected to attend the executive committee meetings.

For the annual report, each department chairman will secure and compile informative and inspirational facts from district chairman concerning her department's activities during the year, that will make interesting and helpful historical records to be printed in the State's minutes.

Article III—Committees

Section 1. Executive Committee composed of the general officers and the department chairman, seven of whom constitute a quorum, shall hold its regular annual meeting preceding the annual convention for the transaction of business; and shall report through its officers at each annual session of this Body what has been done toward carrying out the objects of the organization. Other meetings at such other time as the president shall designate may be held. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an oversight of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary, same to be subject to the will of the convention at its regular meetings. They shall prepare the program for the regular annual meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each district convention and one member at large. All are to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting. This committee shall be retained for the entire year in order to fill any vacancy occurring during the year. Each interim nomination will, of course, be upon approval of the executive committee.

Section 3. Credentials—The assistant recording secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. This committee shall study the district reports and make its report to the state body before delegates are seated. This report will be a digest of district reports, along with the eligibility report on delegates, etc.

Section 4. Finance—The treasurer shall be chairman of the finance committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The members appointed by the president audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the Body. All appropriations and expenses of the officers may be decided upon by the Finance committee, and passed upon by the convention.

Section 5. Registration—The vice president shall be chairman, and other members may be appointed by the president. This committee registers every convention officer, every delegate, auxiliary, minister, visitor and any other the convention may desire. The report shall include this and other information as desired.

Article IV—Amendments

The by-laws may be amended according to Article VIII under the Constitution.

19th Annual Session

Convention Theme — "Choose Ye"

Convention Hymn — "I Choose Jesus"

Scripture Text — Joshua 24:15

Wednesday Morning, November 11, 1964

At the Donelson F.W.B. Church, the nineteenth annual session of the Tennessee F.W.B. Woman's Auxiliary Convention opened at 9:30 A.M. with a musical prelude by Mrs. Billy Melvin at the piano and Mrs. Hubert Sloan at the organ. The Rev. Norman Richards led the group in singing the convention hymn. The Rev. Henry Melvin prayed the invocation. The president, Mrs. Ray Turnage, led in the unison reading of Joshua 24:15, the scripture text chosen for the day. Mrs. Hubert Sloan, a member of the Donelson Church, extended to the convention and visitors a very cordial welcome. Mrs. I. L. Stanley, Knoxville responded.

Special music was rendered by the "Preachers Trio" composed of the Rev. John Gibbs, Rev. Norman Richards, and Rev. Andy Lay. To the joy and inspiration of all present they sang the "Ninety and Nine" and "So Send I You".

Miss Laura Belle Barnard, Instructor at F.W.B. Bible College, brought the devotional "Choosing Where to Serve" based on Joshua 24:15-16.

The President, Mrs. Ray Turnage, opened the business of the session by calling for the report of the Credentials Committee which, by sustained motion, was adopted. (See Report)

The district delegates, district presidents, and the local auxiliary delegates who had registered, were recognized by the president as the duly authorized voting power of the convention. (Delegates listed on page 3.)

Recognition and welcome was extended to all attending the convention from the various sections of the state. One national officer, Mrs. Rufus Coffey, president, was present. Four of the nine state officers were present; namely, Mrs. Ray Turnage, Mrs. Paul Woolsey, Mrs. J. E. Frazier, and Mrs. J. B. Smith. Two district auxiliaries and nine local auxiliaries were represented. Twenty ministers, along with nine deacons and forty-two visitors, were registered.

The program as planned by the TWAC executive committee was adopted as the schedule for the session with permission granted the president for whatever alterations that may be needed.

The Youth Hour under the direction of Mrs. Billy Melvin, proxy for Mrs. Harold Teague, TWAC youth director, was begun with the congregational singing of "Are Ye Able" led by the Rev. Norman Richards. The theme of the hour was

very creditably presented by the four contestants; namely, Miss Judy Felts and Mr. Glen Standridge representing Y.P.A.'s and Suzanne Pressley and Kenny Simmons representing the G.T.A.'s.

The first place winners were Suzanne Pressley, G.T.A. from the Union District Woman's Auxiliary and Glen Standridge, Y.P.A. from the Union District also. Both winners receive an expense paid trip to the WNAC in Raleigh, N. C. on July 12, 1965 where they will represent Tennessee in the Nationwide Youth Declamation Contest.

The Rev. Ken Riggs led into the worship hour by singing very effectively the lovely hymn "Submission". This was followed by the keynote message brought by the Rev. Mark Vandivort, field secretary for the National Home Missions Board, from the subject, "Choosing How to Serve" based on Proverbs 3:27. A missionary offering of \$48.34 was received to be divided equally among the most needy home missionary couple and the most needy foreign mission couple. The Body was adjourned to reconvene at 1:15 P.M. for committee meetings. Prayer was led by the Rev. Rolla Smith, host pastor.

Wednesday Afternoon, November 11, 1964

After the congregation sang "I Need Thee Every Hour", the assembly repeated in unison the Convention Scripture text, Joshua 24:15 led by the president. The Rev. Jerry Pressley led in prayer.

A tribute was presented to the memory of Mrs. Fannie Polston, a faithful Woman's Auxiliary leader and worker until April 24, 1964 when the Lord called her home. The poem "A Sweet Release" was read by Mrs. J. E. Frazier as Mrs. Billy Melvin played softly on the organ. Mrs. Polston's favorite hymn "The Church's One Foundation". Following the singing of her favorite stanza (No. 3), of this hymn, a period of silent prayer was observed as all stood in reverence of this noble faithful Auxiliary and denominational worker in so many areas, but all done for the Glory of God whom she loved and served many, many years so well.

"Choosing What to Use" was ably presented by the CDWA president, Mrs. Robert Picirilli, as she displayed and discussed the very splendid Auxiliary helps now available for both leaders and members.

Committee reports were begun with presentation of a \$5.00 check as the Honor Award to the CDWA, for the best participation record in the TWAC Plan of Work for 1963-64. Mrs. Picirilli, president, accepted the check for the Cumberland District Auxiliary which had achieved 11 of the possible 12 points to be achieved. UDWA achieved 8 points; Randal Memorial achieved 6 points. All were urged to enter wholeheartedly into this Achievement Plan contest, and all be first place winners in 1965.

Reports were received from the temporary committees and by sustained motion accepted. (See Reports Section.)

Reports from TWAC Officers were received and adopted. (See Report Section.)

A motion sustained to retain Mrs. I. L. Stanley, Mrs. Byron Ross, and Mrs. Norlin Jones for the 1964-65 Committee on Nominations.

A motion was sustained for final adjournment. Mrs. Harley Brown prayed the benediction.

Preface

Too often we are satisfied with membership contests without realizing the importance of getting the new members actively engaged in the tasks of missions and down to work for God right where we are. Also the inactive member who needs to be enlisted into meaningful activity in the Lord's service, is too often overlooked. An **enlisted** member is one who not only attends the meeting and pays her membership fees, but also takes an **active** part in **promoting** and **accomplishing** the projects adopted for the year's plan of work.

This responsibility belongs to the Vice-Presidents of every auxiliary group. Let's enlist in 1965! Everyone win one to active participation in Mission Work in 1965!

1964 District reports revealed 126 new members this year, bringing membership in W.A. groups up to 837 and in Youth Auxiliaries up to 608. The attendance at monthly meetings averaged 16. It was reported that 127 members endeavored to win new members but 837 could have. 88 members were reported to have worked to re-enlist absentees. Many, many more of us should have. The total TWAC enrollment is 1445. This is 837 W.A. members and 608 youth auxiliary members.

These figures, it is hoped, will challenge everyone of us to enlist more diligently this new convention year, for how can we teach unless we first reach them!

Recording Secretary's Report

(Statistics Chairman)

The fastest growing organizations in America are those that keep good accurate records. Guess work is poor work! Get the facts for convincing and effective work.

Reports clearly indicate where the work was effectively carried on. Failure to make a report is in itself an indication that the work has not been undertaken with any enthusiasm. Also reports or statistics point up the progress that has been made and reveal the weaknesses which need attention. Reporting is the responsibility of every member and of every officer with the recording secretary serving as the compiling clerk.

A Digest of the reports received from 3 districts and 1 local Woman's Auxiliary revealed 115 local auxiliary groups with 1445 members. 98 of these groups conducted study classes with an average attendance of 17. The only increases revealed over 1963 was in the number of souls won and in the offerings made during the 3 Seasons of Prayer. 333 members gave an offering to missions, all of us could. 428 witnessed, but many, many hundred more should have. God heard the faithful and spared us all.

Woman's Auxiliary members' sharing their possessions resulted in an offering of \$4,164.03 sent through TWAC treasury. \$4,387.77 was reported sent through other FWB Channels. The grand total offering, therefore, was \$9,551.80.

The Woman's Auxiliary works with the local church to help stimulate, through her 7 areas of proposed study, a growing missionary vision. It is with gratitude that we say the Woman's Auxiliary record down through the years since 1935 reveals a measure of success in increased Missionary vision among FWB.

This year's TWAC study class records revealed all 7 areas of study were represented with 98 of the 115 groups conducting classes that had an average of 17 present. Evangelism class still led in the number held. My personal Report:

Report of Stewardship-Prayer Chairman

What is the great need of missionaries? Is it increased funds to carry their work forward, new equipment for efficiency, faster means of communication and transportation, political favor, open doors, more laborers, or revival?

From impressions gained through missionaries' letters and visits to our churches, it is believed that the greatest need, one which will affect all these other things and more, is prayer support. To have earnest Christians standing with them in believing prayer is the burning desire of missionaries who long to see God work in power in their field.

Along with daily prayer fellowship periods, the Woman's Auxiliary provided 3 special seasons of prayer to help those who stay at home to recognize the truth spoken by David, "... as his part is that goeth to battle, shall his part be that tarrieth by the stuff ..." What is the part in the battle of those who stay at

home? The greatest of all missionaries Paul says, "Ye also helping together by prayer . . ."

Why don't you find out all you can about a missionary or project for some mission field, and ask the Lord to involve you personally by prayer? Many in the Woman's Auxiliary did this in 1963-64, but all of us could. 88 auxiliaries reported the 3 special prayer seasons observed; 111 women were reported to have observed the daily prayer fellowship period when many hundreds more of us could. We are grateful for the faithful stewardship of those members that resulted in 33 new tithers. 372 members are tithers but all 837 should have tithed. There are 258 family altars reported.

Woman's Auxiliary Chief Aims in Review

The purpose and place of the organization called Woman's Auxiliary by Free Will Baptists, are expressed in and carried out through its chief aims. These aims are as they should be — means to an end — the end being the proclamation of the gospel around the world.

These aims and the projects adopted at the annual session, and listed in the Plan of Work, make up the activities expected of every auxiliary member during the convention year, and about which each officer is requested to report annually her achievements. Through these aims, the ten auxiliary officers seek to do the following things:

1. To develop the spiritual life of all members through individual Bible Study and prayer.
2. To bring all women of the church into experiences of missionary endeavors through enlistment activities.
3. To develop appreciation and genuine concern for all lost peoples everywhere through reading missionary books and church publications, and study classes, and special seasons of prayer for missions.
4. To lead members into experiences of Christian witnessing in their own communities.
5. To magnify **Christian** sharing of possessions.
6. To cultivate missionary convictions in the hearts of F.W.B.
7. To give through workshops and committee meetings, the auxiliary an informal leadership.
8. To build and maintain a business-like operation of the auxiliary through goods system of records and reporting achievements.
9. To build a true pattern of the Lord's work in the minds of people by communicating the activities of the auxiliary through publicity.

It is impossible to build and maintain a good missionary education organization in the church without an effective **Plan of Work** and a good system of Records and capable enthusiastic **Officers** to operate both of them. The measure of any leader is not what she herself can do, but what she can inspire others to do. So, in the words of our 1964-65 theme "Choose ye this day whom you will serve" and also **how** you will serve and **where** you will serve the Lord. Then, if the Lord tarries, to be faithful in reporting at Newport, Tennessee on November 12, 1965, the results of our daily choices as we serve the Lord in and through the Woman's Auxiliary.

 - A. Enlist all women (young and old) of your church as members of Auxiliary.
 - B. Help members grow spiritually by enlisting them into full participation of Auxiliary Activities as planned.
3. Study:
 - A. Through special programs and study classes in missions, stewardship, prayer, methods and evangelism, keep missionary endeavors before the Auxiliary.
 - B. Cultivate Missionary Conviction through Reading Circles and Prayer Seasons.
4. Personal Service (Christian Witnessing)
 - A. Winning the Lost to Christ
 - B. Helping the needy, sick, and sorrowing
 - C. Ministering to the Spiritual needs of the Community
 - D. Teaching:
 1. Christian observance of the Lord's Day
 2. Total abstinence
 3. High standards of conduct, speech, and dress
5. Gifts (offerings unto the Lord)
 - A. Systematic giving is encouraged by monthly offerings to the Co-Laborer Fund Plan.
 - B. Self-denial offerings taken during the 3 Seasons of Prayer for state, national home missions and foreign missions.
 - C. To Convention projects as adopted annually.
