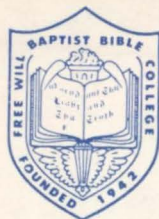

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PROCEEDINGS OF

The Twenty-fifth Annual Session of the Texas State Free Will Baptist Association convened with First Free Will Baptist Church at Denison, Texas Tuesday night before the first Sunday in November, 1939.

Opened at 7:30 p. m. with song service led by Rev. J. R. Davidson of Bryan, Texas. Prayer, Rev. Bert Rogers of Oklahoma. Rev. W. V. McPhail then introduced Rev. T. H. Newson, president of the state association, who in turn introduced Rev. Tommie Franklin, she leading the devotional. She called for sentence prayers, seeking God's guidance during the sessions of the association.

Scripture lesson, Psalms 103, followed by expressions of thanks from many in the congregation. At 8:00 o'clock, sermon by Rev. T. W. Smith of Clayton, Texas, who read from the first chapter of Paul's letter to the Phillippian Church.

Sermon theme: "Suffering for Christ"

Benediction, Rev. J. L. Bounds.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

9:00 o'clock—Song service led by Rev. J. R. Davidson. Prayer, Rev. R. C. Wiggs of North Zulch, Texas. Devotional, Rev. J. E. Dearmore. Scripture, Matthew 13:7. Prayer, Rev. J. E. Dearmore and Rev. J. L. Bounds.

9:30—Welcome address, Rev. W. V. McPhail of Denison, Texas. Response, Mrs. Chas. Moehlman, Bryan, Texas.

9:40—Credentials committee retired to prepare temporary roll of delegates in order to effect organization and while awaiting a report intervening time was spent in praise and prayer service led by Rev. M. L. Sutton of Fort Worth, Texas.

After a short recess the president called the house to order when two special songs were rendered by a quartette composed of Rev. M. L. Sutton, C. B. Wier, Rev. E. A. O'Donnell and Mrs. Sadie White.

Report received and delegates seated. At 11:00 o'clock Rev. Bert Rogers sang a solo and Rev. Tiff Covington of Buffalo Springs, Texas preached a very spiritual sermon from the 17th Chapter of St. John's Gospel. His subject was "What Jesus Prayed For".

12:00 Noon—dismissed by Rev. Bert Rogers.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

1:15—Song service, conducted by Rev. Bert Rogers. Devotional, Rev. M. L. Sutton with lesson from the 10th chapter of First Corinthians, the first 13 verses.

At 1:30 a short business session was called at which time the committee on By Laws and Constitution revision presented a draft of revised By Laws and Constitution. A motion was made to present these article, by article for ratification or amendment. Motion carried. Later a motion prevailed to table action until Thursday morning.

Missionary address was delivered by Rev. J. R. Davidson, followed by round table discussion on Missions.

2:55—Mrs. R. C. Wiggs presented a program and short business session covering the women's work. Mrs. C. H. Moehlman also read a report on their work by reading minutes of previous meetings, including reports of officers, amounts collected and disbursed during the year, which showed quite a bit of activity. A statistical report was also given by secretary, Mrs. Lucile Holligan.—Approved. (See Reports).

4:25—Solo, Rev. E. A. O'Donnell.

Dismissed by Rev. O'Donnell.

At 6:30 a song and praise service was conducted by Rev. Tiff Covington, songs being led by C. B. Weir, lasting thirty minutes. This was follow by a special song rendered by Trice Quartette, four young members of the Trice family. A quartette was also rendered by Rev. E. A. O'Donnell, Rev. M. L. Sutton, Rev. Bert Rogers and Mrs. Sallie White.

8:00 O'clock—Devotional, Rev. B. A. Grant. Song, "Jesus Is Coming Back", Trice quartette. Rev. J. R. Davidson, having been selected to deliver the evening sermon, read a scripture lesson from Matthew 5:13, subject theme being the Mission of the Church.

Song, "Are You Washed in the Blood", led by Rev. B. Rogers. Dismissed by Rev. Tiff Covington.

THURSDAY MORNING

Promptly at 9:00 o'clock services were begun with song service led by Rev. E. A. O'Donnell. Devotional, Leroy Conway of Eddy, Texas. Prayer, Rev. Purcell.

A short address was delivered by Rev. J. E. Dearmore, on memory

work of the Bible, at the close of which a motion prevailed that the treasurer be instructed to advance \$15.00 to Rev. Dearmore to enable him to publish a booklet on the subject of "Bible Memory."

At 9:40 a motion was made that the proposed By Laws and Constitution be reread and action taken. After reading and a few minor amendments had been offered, the new Constitution and By Laws were unanimously adopted.

11:00—Adjourned for preaching service. After an inspirational song and prayer service, Rev. Bert Rogers preached a fine sermon from the 7th verse of the 8th chapter of Job. Text: "Though thy beginning was small, yet thy latter end should greatly increase." Theme—increased blessings. Dismissed for lunch.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Call to order at 1:15 o'clock by president. Song led by Rev. M. L. Sutton. Devotional, Rev. E. A. O'Donnell. Lesson, third chapter of Exodus. Prayer, Rev. J. C. Turrentine.

Rev. J. K. Warkinten being absent, the address on education was postponed and the association entered in a business session.

A motion was made and seconded that the association purchase a copy of Parliamentary Rules and Order to be in custody of secretary. Motion lost. Report of committee on Sunday Schools read and unanimously adopted. (See Reports)

An invitation from Friendship Church, at Clayton, Texas was made for the meeting of the next annual session of the Association which was unanimously accepted.

The following reports of committees was then read and adopted as follows: Treasurer of Foreign Missions and Committee on Foreign Missions, Denomination; Education, Evangelism, Women's Work and Temperance.

A collection for education was taken and \$4.38 secured.

Rev. R. C. Wiggs was selected to preach the associational sermon in 1940; Rev. Tiff Covington, alternate.

On motion duly seconded the chair was authorized to appoint the Committee on Committees who named the following as Committee:

Rev. M. L. Sutton, Rev. T. W. Smith and Rev. J. C. Turrentine.

An offer by Rev. M. L. Sutton to print the annual program and the newly adopted Constitution and By Laws gratis was gladly accepted. Adjourned, dismissed by: A. Sullins.

THURSDAY EVENING

Song service led by C. B. Weir, Prayer, Rev. T. W. Smith and Tommie Franklin. At 6:45 a memorial service was conducted by Rev. J. C. Turrentine, followed by personal testimonies, closing with prayer by Rev. Turrentine. A business session was called at 7:45 when the following committees reported, viz.: Obituaries, Committee on Committees, Layman's Work and Young People's Work.

A special prayer was offered for the sick and infirm of our various congregations in Texas, led by Rev. M. L. Sutton.

Special song rendered by Trice quartette. At 8:00 o'clock Rev. J. L. Bounds read a scripture lesson from the last chapter of Revelations and preached on the subject of "The Coming of Jesus." After the sermon an offering was taken for missions and \$3.66 was collected.

Prayer of thanks offered by Rev. T. H. Newsom. Dismissed by Rev. Langford.

FRIDAY MORNING

9:00 O'clock—Song service led by Rev. B. A. Grant. Devotional, Miss Lucile Gardner, Waco, Texas. Scripture was quoted from different parts of God's Word.

At 9:30 Rev. M. L. Sutton submitted a resolution as opposing war in any form; also one as opposing Capital Punishment and a request was made the copies be sent to our U. S. Senator and Governor of State, respectively.

Election officers for ensuing year resulted as follows:

President, Rev. M. L. Sutton; Vice President, Rev. T. H. Newsom; Recording Secretary, Miss Lucile Gardner; Treasurer, Thos. A. Cloud; Publicity Director, Rev. R. C. Wiggs; Statistician, Rev. C. J. Turrentine; Parliamentarian, Rev. J. L. Bounds; Secretary-Treasurer Foreign Missions, Clyde Goen.

Clerk was instructed to have 750 copies of minutes printed.

Selection of delegates to national Association was voted to executive committee, and Treasurer authorized to pay fees of delegates.

A vote of thanks was given to the Denison church and people for hospitalities extended and the pastor of local church thanked the West Fork Association for co-operation.

Voted to allot time for a program on Ladies work to be given at annual session in 1940.

11:00 o'clock sermon was preached by Rev. R. C. Wiggs.

12:00—Adjourned to Tuesday night before the first Sunday in November, 1940.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL

We, your committee on Sunday School, beg to make the following report:

Because we have found that where there is a live working Sunday School there is a steady flow of conversions and additions to the church, and, because we find that the Sunday School work of our denomination in Texas is far behind what it could be, we submit to you the following Sunday School program for your consideration, and if you find it to be sound we urge the adoption.

1. We recommend that our Sunday Schools be re-organized according to the plan of the more modern Sunday Schools, to wit: That classes be organized according to ages: Beginners, age 3 to 5, Primaries, age 6 to 9, Juniors 10 to 12, Intermediates 13 to 15, Seniors 16 to 17, Young People 18 until married, a Young Married Class and an Elder Class. We also recommend a Cradle Roll and a Home Department.

2. We recommend that each school have a competent Superintendent and General Secretary appointed by the church; that the Superintendent be a member of the church, and that shall have authority to appoint teachers of the classes who are members of the church.

3. We recommend the use of the Six Point Record System in our schools and that a yearly school for one week be established to train teachers and class secretaries and that this school be held in some central locality of the State. That this association appoint the teachers and provide some method of compensation for their work.

4. We recommend that we urge those Sunday Schools that are using literature to use only Free Will Baptist literature.

5. We recommend that each church be urged to start a building program to provide class rooms for each class in their schools. We believe that every church in our state can provide separate rooms for their Sunday School classes, but if there are those which are not able to provide rooms we urge that they hang curtains around their classes in the auditorium.

REPORT ON LAYMEN'S WORK

We, your committee on Laymen's Work, submit the following report for your consideration:

Realizing that all workers in the advancement of this great cause, first is felt in the laymen, we urge our fellow members to make public any and all personal feeling toward their call to the Ministry—Sunday School Leaders, Teachers, etc., without delay.

We further urge the already installed officer and the Ministers to educate along this line and to immediately request any such laymen to accept any such place in the Kingdom work that he may be called upon to accept.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DENOMINATION

To the Texas State Association of Free Will Baptist:

We are glad to report our denominations are getting better organized for more efficient work than in days gone by. Some of our people are really getting a vision of our needs. Some of our Free Will Baptist are seeing the need of schools. This committee sincerely recommends that every Free Will Baptist church in the state support this move, also urge that same be a personal interest with every loyal Free Will Baptist.

We are grateful for the mission spirit of our Texas people, yet there could be much more accomplished if our people were constantly reminded of our mission needs. Since we do not have an orphanage in our state let us support the one we have in North Carolina. We thank God for this home for the unfortunate children. Where it is at all possible, we also recommend the support of our publishing houses by subscribing to the Free Will Baptist papers and publications.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

We, your Educational Committee, beg leave to submit the following report:

It is encouraging to be able to report something as having been accomplished in this field of Christian activity. We are encouraged because of the reports of the Educational activities in the local churches, and of some progress in educational projects in the District Associations.

We acknowledge, with appreciation, the work and plans of the National Association. Quite a few results have been realized through the efforts of the board. Since the board began its efforts toward the establishment of a centralized educational institution \$516.46 has been raised in the State of Texas, including a bit over one hundred dollars which was held in reserve. Twenty-five churches have taken part in the work of raising this money, with two District Associations, one Quarterly Meeting, one District Ladies' Aid and nine Ministers. We wish to commend the board and those who have cooperated in making the above financial statement possible.

RECOMMENDATIONS:—

First: In as much as it seems to be the mind of our National Association to establish a centralized educational institution, and since the Board is applying itself in this direction, we recommend that the Texas State Association go on record as approving the plan.

Second: In view of the fact that in a mass meeting of representatives of Texas at the last session of the National Association, it was agreed that Texas would endeavor to raise 25 cents per capita, we wish to recommend that we strive to raise the equivalent of 25 cents per member, 12 1-2 cents to be raised by January 1, 1940 and the other 12 1-2 to be raised by July 1, 1940.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

We, your Committee on Temperance beg to submit the following:

Whereas, the cause of Temperance has, during the past political administration suffered temporary defeat because of repeal of our most effectual constitution amendment, therefore be it resolved, that this Association here and now go on record as being uncompromisingly opposed to any further repeal of the laws which shall guarantee to us immunity from the sale or manufacture of intoxicating beverage in any way, and that we, as a body of christian believers will use every means within our power, both in our public worship and our private life and at the public voting places to defeat that element who are using every scheme they can conceive to bring upon us the free use and sale of all kinds intoxicating beverages, the general use and sale of which can only bring public and private ruin.

REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE

Of the Free Will Baptist Church of the State of Texas for the Year
Ending September 30, 1930.

We, your committee, beg leave to submit the following:

According to the record of the state secretary-treasurer of Foreign Missions we have donated the amount of \$186.04 to our National Program. We acknowledge that this amount is far too small for the State of Texas, but when we take into account the fact that this amount has been donated by only four churches, (including their auxiliaries), four ministers, one Quarterly Meeting and one Ladies' District Convention; and the fact that all of these are found to be in the bounds of only one of our District Associations, namely: the Central Texas, we realize that there have been some who have favorably supported our Foreign Mission Program. The trouble is, that far too few of our people seem to have

given any serious consideration to this great cause. However, we wish to commend those who have made the above financial report possible, and pray that the remainder of our people will follow these noble examples.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

In as much as our Lord and Master commanded us to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," and in as much as some of this responsibility has been taken by our National Association; and in as much as the National Board of Foreign Missions has asked for an amount from the State of Texas this year which aggregates more than twice as much as we are able to report now, we recommend as follows:

That the brethren of the Central Texas Association continue the present degree of their support to this cause at least, and that the new committee on Foreign Missions, together with the State Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions, apportion the remainder of the amount asked for by the National Board among the other District Associations of the State.

That, in case there are those of our people who are contributing to the Foreign Mission Program by sending money direct to the National Secretary, they be asked to change their plan of procedure by sending all funds directly to the State Secretary-Treasurer, who in turn will forward to the National Secretary-Treasurer.

REPORT ON WOMEN'S WORK

We, your committee on Women's Work, wish to give the following report:

After attending the state meeting last year we saw that this phase of work needed strengthening. New officers were elected and committees were appointed, ready for service. It seemed hard to get the women to meet in a separate meeting from the men, so we asked the program committee to give us some time on the main program in which to carry on our business and they did, for which we appreciate.

To have a number ONE State Convention, we realize that is important to have our district conventions, which make up the state. We have been trying to get in touch with women in the different church associations and get them (or help them) to organize into district. We can represent from the local society and where you do not have a district convention, we urge you to do so, but it is best to represent from the district. So far we have only one district convention, which was organized some over a year ago. It is in the Central Texas District. They have held three meetings. The first was encouraging. There was a good number present and good reports with six societies representing. They sent money to education, missions and benevolence. The second was much better, with two new societies added and more work done in all departments. The third was more encouraging. Showing better reports and better interest. These are some of the things accomplished: more given to education, missions (both home and foreign), orphanage and superannuation to say nothing of the benevolent work.

This will help you to see what can be done in a district. Then when the whole state is properly organized and all send in their reports from the district can't you just imagine what a great work we will be able to accomplish. That is what we are working toward. With the co-operation of everyone we can see it in the near future. We must have your interest and co-operation. 1 Cor. 3:9: "For we are Labourers together with God."

We, your committee, recommend that all pastors give their full support to this work. That they co-operate with the state president and their local women in getting the work properly organized.

In the last session of the State Sunday School and League Convention, very few Leagues were represented. We have no way of knowing the exact number of Leagues and members therefore a report of this cannot be made.

We would like to see every Free Will Baptist Church in Texas have a League and for every League to function according to the uniform system.

Many churches insist on rejecting the League made especially for our denomination and borrowing some organization from another denomination. We feel that this should not be and hope it will discontinue to be true.

We hope that the League work will begin to prosper and that the young people will ever receive encouragement from the church, its pastor and members.
