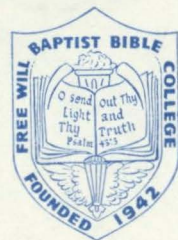

IN MEMORIAM.

Alice Bird Woolsey was born January 11th, 1825, departed this life November 17th, 1918. She was married to Rev. Wm. B. Woolsey December 22nd, 1842, and to this union eleven children were born, five of whom are now living, viz: W. H. Woolsey, Canon City, Colorado, Mrs. A. L. Fillers, Route 7, Greeneville, Tenn., J. O. Woolsey, Emporia, Kansas, Mrs. P. L. Painter, Maryville, Tenn. and T. H. Woolsey, Route 7, Greeneville, Tenn.

She professed faith in Christ at the age of seventeen and joined the Methodist church and after her marriage united with her husband into the Free Baptist church and lived a consistent member until her death,

The home has been occupied by the family since the days when Indians roamed through Greene County, and was the scene of more than one Indian massacre.

Rev. Woolsey was one of the pioneers of the Free-will Baptist movement and with a few others in November 1850 organized the Toe River Freewill Baptist Association, from this has sprung a large, strong growth of this faith throughout the mountain country of North Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee. Mrs. Woolsey stayed at home looking after the family while her husband preached the Gospel. She was a woman of great power and influence, saying to her husband

Go preach to those beautiful fields of grain,
They are ripe in the valley and on the plain;
Your labor for Jesus will not be in vain,
Go harvest the golden grain.

When life with its trials is o'er and done,
And home we are wandering, one by one;
How pleasant to see, as we leave the plain,
Those beautiful sheaves of grain.

I have read of bright mansions in heaven,
Which the Saviour has gone to prepare,
Where the saints who on earth has been faithful,
Rest forever with Christ over there.

There no sin ever enters, nor sorrow,
The inhabitants never grow old;
But not half of the joys that await them,
To mortals has ever been told.

I have made my choice forever,
I will walk with Christ my Lord;
His companionship will be pleasant,
And His blessings will be my reward.

When the last grim foe is conquered,
And the final victory won,
Then my heart will feel joys triumphant,
As the Master says "well done."

When the pearly gates swing open,
And an entrance, full and free,
Shall be granted to the victors,
Jesus, I'll go through with thee.

I've heard them sing again and again,
Of a gate that stands ajar,
Of a sunny clime and a golden plain,
And a sinless land afar.
