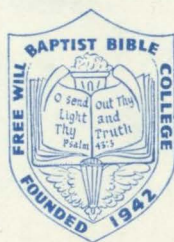

MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

—o—
THURSDAY MORNING, AUGUST 15TH

At 10:30 A. M., Rev. W. S. Barton introduced Rev. J. S. Burgess who, after a brief history of the denomination and its workings, preached to a very appreciative audience from Genesis 4:6, "There were giants in those days."

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Met at 1:30 o'clock P. M. Devotion was conducted by Rev. H. W. Morelock. The president called the conference to order and the following ministers were enrolled: P. A. Paxton, J. S. Burgess, Lloyd Light, J. J. Brooks, A. F. Hensley, S. D. Hammer, J. Q. Adams, Jesse Laws, J. N. Carroll, J. E. Ellenburg, J. L. Cagle, J. P. McGill, W. H. Johnson, W. S. Barton, H. W. Morelock, C. R. Morelock, Geo. D. Dunbar.

The work of the organization was turned over to the clerk. Rev. J. N. Carroll was re-elected president by acclamation.

The order of business of last year was adopted as follows:

The following committee, appointed to investigate the application of Rev. W. W. Lee for re-instatement in the Ministers' Conference, reported favorably: J. S. Burgess, W. S. Barton and W. H. Johnson. The report was adopted and Rev. Lee was re-instated to membership in the Conference.

Brother D. L. Temple, of the M. E. church, Lexington, N. C., was invited to a seat as advisory council.

The following ministers were present and reported: J. Q. Adams, W. S. Barton, J. S. Burgess, J. J. Brooks, Geo. D. Dunbar, S. D. Hammer, W. J. Holdway, J. E. Ellenburg, A. F. Hensley, Lloyd Light, C. R. Morelock, P. A. Paxton, Jesse Laws.

The Conference then adjourned for the work of the Association.

FRIDAY MORNING, AUGUST 16TH

The Conference was called to order by the president and devotion was conducted by Rev. S. D. Hammer.

Brothers R. F. West, Hubert Morelock and J. P. McGill were elected to membership in the Conference.

The ministers reporting at this morning session were: J. L. Cagle, J. N. Carroll, J. P. McGill and Hubert McGill.

Revs. J. Q. Adams, W. S. Barton, and W. W. Lee were appointed as a committee on resolutions.

On motion the chairman of the Ordaining Council in each of the Quarterly Meetings was elected as a member of the Yearly Meeting Q. M. Rev. J. S. Burgess of the Eastern Q. M. was elected chairman and J. L. Cagle of the Western Q. M. and W. W. H. Morelock of the Northern Q. M. as associate members.

On motion no work of the Ordaining Councils of the various Q. M.'s is to be recognized until passed upon by the Yearly Meeting's Ordaining Council and all ordination is to be done by them at the sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

The Conference, by unanimous vote, adopted the revised treatise of 1848, and selected J. N. Carroll, Geo. D. Dunbar and J. E. Ellenburg as a committee to re-write a constitution and by-laws for the Conference and write them in the Ministers' Roll Book for future reference of the body.

Adjourned until afternoon.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, AUGUST 16TH

The President called for a brief session following the Ladies' Aid Convention.

The ministers reporting were E. C. Burkey, J. E. Moffitt and W. H. Morelock.

On motion a letter of recommendation was granted to J. J. Brooks.

Those excused from further attendance were Jesse Laws, J. J. Brooks, A. F. Hensley, J. E. Moffitt and H. W. Morelock.

Adjourned to meet Saturday at 8:00 o'clock A. M.

SATURDAY MORNING, AUGUST 17TH

The Conference met at 8:00 o'clock A. M. Devotion by I. N. Wilson.

Brothers J. R. Taylor, Mennis Bible, W. J. Sawyer and J. L. Ollis were placed in the hands of the Ordaining Council for investigation.

Brother E. W. Knight was dropped from the roll for contempt of the body in uniting with another body without the consent or knowledge of this body.

By request of W. S. Barton the conference voted to send a letter of condolence to Brother W. M. Stroup and family. An offering of \$14.00 was also sent.

On motion the Clerk was voted \$10.00 for his services.

All ministers leaving before the Conference adjourned and not being excused must pay the \$2.00 fine before their reports are received next year.

The Conference then adjourned to meet at the call of the President or with the next session of the Association.

The Association adjourned to meet for preaching at 7:00 o'clock.

At the preaching hour Rev. Cagle made a very earnest appeal for brotherly love and kindness toward all, which was received by a very appreciative audience.

FRIDAY MORNING AUGUST 16TH

After the adjournment of the Ministers' Conference the Moderator called the Association into session and Prof. B. V. Watson sang, with

the help of the entire audience, a new setting of the old song "I'm Going Home." Everyone was moved by the wonderful melody.

Rev. J. E. Moffitt, of Kingsport, arrived and was enrolled.

Joe Cate and J. W. Baker, of Powder Springs, were seated as delegates from the W. Q. M. Ira Kesterson and wife, Carrie Pierce and Etta Armstrong, of the E. Q. M. were seated.

The Association then recessed for the preaching hour.

Promptly at 10:30 o'clock A. M. the preaching service began. Some splendid numbers were rendered by the Bethany choir under the leadership of their young pastor, Rev. Huey Morelock, after which Rev. W. S. Barton introduced Rev. J. N. Carroll, of Bybee, Tennessee, who held a record breaking audience spellbound with his great message on "Victory," using as his text I Cor. 15:57. This was a treat to old-fashioned, camp-meeting style preaching and resulted in great rejoicing.

Friday afternoon was given the District Convention of the Ladies' Aid Society.

Notwithstanding the fact that a revival was being held in the adjoining community, many could not find seats at the evening worship. The home choir rendered some very fine numbers after which Rev. Barton, the former pastor, introduced Rev. Geo. D. Dunbar, who preached to a very appreciative audience from II Kings 7:9, "This Is a Day of Good Tidings."

been brought up outside the Sabbath Schools.

We urge that the pastors of the various churches use their influence to maintain an evergreen Sabbath School.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT

We have noted with much interest the small increase in pastors' salaries. This is gratifying, but we yet have not reached the goal.

We recommend a greater and more rigid enforcement of the 25 cent rule in all the churches, and ask those financially able to give vastly more.

We also ask that a more careful study of the law of tithing be made by our churches and that each pastor preach on tithing at least once in the year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR

To the Union Free Will Baptist Association, Greetings:

As your Supervisor, I have visited and held services with twenty of our churches, and find the work in very good condition. I could not reach all of the churches, but did all that I could to assist them in any way I could.

I held revivals in three of the churches with good results. Under the direction of the pastors twenty-two revivals have been held resulting in eleven hundred conversions and renewals. Out of this number we have received into the churches only one hundred seventy-nine new members bringing the total membership in the Association up to 1376.

During the year I have organized five Ladies' Aid Societies and some F. W. B. L's. These are doing nicely at present. A good report will be shown this year by them.

We are glad to find that the churches are improving in pastors'

salaries and also in improvement of church property; but there is room for much improvement yet in this respect. Some new churches have been built and some are in the course of improvement or under construction. The total value of the churches now approximate \$50,000.00. Let's not stop here but press toward the top.

Seeing the need of an increase in membership, of better churches and church equipment, and better paid pastors, therefore, I recommend:

First—That our people try to get all young converts into our church immediately after their conversion.

Second—That the churches take a deeper interest in the financial affairs of the churches.

Third—That a higher standard of co-operation and a deeper feeling of unity be sought throughout the Association.

In closing, let me say that the work has been pleasant, but not without its hardships. I have enjoyed it very much. The churches have treated me kindly and fairly good offerings have been made to the work.

My expenses for the year have been \$55.00 and the Mission Board has paid me \$55.00.

CHURCH EXTENSION

The Church Extension Board found from the reports of the Quarterly Meetings that we have a splendid outlook at Friendship, north of Greeneville, where there is a large quantity of lumber on the sticks to build a church. This work is under the direction of Rev. E. C. Burkey. He also has an option on a church south of Greeneville, where he has been conducting services for some time.

The Church Extension Board of the Northern Q. M. reports a new church in course of construction at Grassy Creek. This is a very worthy proposition and all Sunday Schools are asked to donate their Fifth Sunday offerings to the work there. The Board also finds a good opportunity at Bradshaws Chapel. No work has been done there for some time, but Rev. C. R. Morelock is taking charge and we expect a great work to be done this year.

Midway has built and dedicated a magnificent building under the administration of Rev. Dunbar.

The outlook for the future is very bright and we solicit the co-operation of everyone to the end that we may continue to have a very healthy growth in the future.

The following Church Extension Board has been elected to serve for one year: I. A. Kesterson, I. N. Wilson, M. F. Dunbar, chairman.

On motion, no work of the Q. M. will be accepted by the association except upon the recommendation of the above named board.
