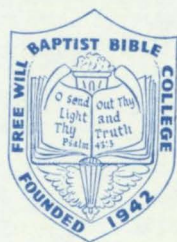

Brethren, once more we have come to the close of a conference year. As we review the year that has just past we see that God has in a wonderful way blessed us. We have had a nice gain in membership; our pastors have been better paid and more souls have been saved than for many years. All of this is very gratifying in the face of the great odds.

I have visited all of the Quarterly Meetings during the year and find them doing excellent work with a continual increase in attendance and interest.

The net gain for the year in members has been 292, and the increase in pastors' salaries has been \$1,476.67. We have every reason to be proud of this gain.

Let us make our goal next year 1000 new members and another increase in pastors' salaries.

Resolution on finances was read and adopted as follows:

Realizing that the present system of financing our work has never been entirely satisfactory to the people as a whole, therefore, be it,

Resolved, that the resolution requiring each church to pay twenty-five cents per capita for the Supervisor, be repealed, and instead thereof let the following be adopted.

That a budget to be equivalent to one dollar per month per church be established, but the amount to be prorated among the churches according to the ability of the churches to pay.

Be it further Resolved, that a Finance Committee be created to make the assessment and each church be asked to pay monthly thru the Association Treasurer the amount so assessed.

Be it further Resolved, that each pastor shall be responsible for the raising of the assessment so assessed.

Be it further Resolved, that the ten cents per capita assessment for Minutes and Missions be amended to read, "Active Members," but that the churches report all members on roll to the Annual Meetings.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We see the growing need of better trained teachers of Christian character and who are members of our own churches or in sympathy with our work.

We insist, therefore, that every Sunday School obtain teachers of this kind, and that the pastors of the various churches outline a course of study for these teachers. . If this is not convenient, that he appoint someone who is competent and of orthodox faith to do so. We recommend that the teachers meet with the pastor or the one so appointed once a week for the study of the lesson for the week.

We oppose the use of sinners as teachers and earnestly request that only those possessing piety and Christian character be allowed to direct the youth of our churches.

We also recommend the use of our own literature.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

We, your committee on Education, have observed with satisfaction the increased awakening of our people on the question of education. Much progress has been made in recent years, for which we are grateful, but much remains to be accomplished if we are to take our place among the denominations of the land in spreading the gospel to a lost world.

We observe with sadness that there yet remains among our people those who would discourage education, but we believe their influence is waning.

We also believe that a new day is dawning in which we shall be able to measure arms with the strongest denominations and be proud of the name of Free Will Baptist.

We feel that no greater incentive can be offered to encourage people to join in with us than to a ministry that is not only filled with the spirit but is able to delve in God's word and prepare and deliver messages that will be enlightening.

We feel as did the Scottish divine to whom a young man applied for admission to the ministry that, "Three things are needful for ministers, viz: Learning, piety and common sense. If you lack the first, go to school or read good books. If you lack the second, pray to God "Who giveth to all men freely; it shall be given unto you." But if you lack the last, neither God nor man can help you."

We concur with the committee of last year and recommend the following schools. "The Moody Bible Institute" of Chicago; "The Free Will Baptist School" at Aden, N. C., and "The School of The Bible" at Pawnee City, Nebraska.
