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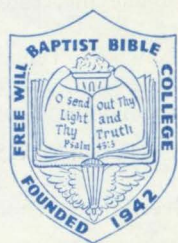

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MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

The Sixty-fifth Annual Session of the Ministers' Conference of the Union Free Will Baptist Association met with the Christian's Bend church in Hawkins County, Tennessee, at 1:30 o'clock P. M., August 12, 1937. The meeting was called to order by the retiring President, Rev. P. H. Woolsey of Greeneville. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Edward C. Burkey, also of Greeneville.

FRIDAY MORNING

Assembled at 9:30 o'clock. Devotion was conducted by Father Barton, citing the First Psalm, followed by a very earnest prayer for the brotherhood.

Revs. S. F. Way, W. H. Morelock and W. F. Phillips arrived and were enrolled.

Reports read and adopted were: W. H. Morelock, H. W. Morelock, S. F. Way, Minnis Bible, J. C. Howington, W. F. Phillips.

On motion the Conference stood adjourned until 1:30 P. M.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The call was delayed until 2:00 o'clock on account of late luncheon.

Revs. C. Y. Elkin and Jesse Laws arrived and were enrolled.

On motion Rev. W. H. Morelock was elected as vice-president.

The following ministerial reports were read and adopted: Jesse Laws, Hubert Morelock, A. F. Hensley, C. Y. Elkin, Marlin Vaughn, C. E. Lowe, D. C. Patrick, M. L. Bowman, Otis Barham.

After a partial report from the Ordaining Council was accepted, Rev. James Dean was reelected to full membership in the Ministers' Conference.

The Conference then stood adjourned until 8:30 Saturday, A. M.

SATURDAY MORNING

Met promptly at 8:30. Rev. E. M. French conducted a short devotion.

Rev. Herman Christian arrived and was enrolled.

The reports of Revs. Arnold Lonas and Herman Christian were read and adopted.

A complete report from the Ordaining Council was read and adopted as follows:

We have renewed the license of Brother Arnold Lonas; have granted license to Brother Dewey Kirk, also to Brother Wilson of Greeneville, with the understanding that his license may be recalled at any time at the discretion of the Council.

We recommend that Brother James Dean of the Primitive Baptist church be received into full connection with us, he having agreed to take our course of study.

We ask that the Ordaining Council be allowed to remain in session until the first session of the Eastern Quarterly Meeting for the purpose of examining any applicants for sister associations.

Since Brothers Dave Inscore, W. P. McLain, and Sherman McLain, have left their respective churches and have not asked for a renewal of their license, they are formally dropped from our list and cannot function as Free Will Baptist ministers.

We ask for permission to renew the license of any licentiates who, for providential reasons, may have been hindered from coming to this meeting.

Rev. Huie W. Morelock was re-elected as a member of the Ordaining Council, his term to end in August, 1940.

The Ordaining Council was instructed to investigate the absence of the following ministers. J. N. Carroll, J. D. Bright and Hugh Jones.

Brother J. Q. Adams was only asked to fill out the blank in time for publication.

There being no further business to be considered, the conference adjourned to meet with the association at the New Liberty church in Carter county on Thursday before the Third Sunday in August, 1938, or at the call of the President.

The report of the Supervisor was read and adopted as follows:

I submit this report to the Sixty-Fifth Annual Session of the Union Association with a degree of reluctance. We have passed another milestone in our Christian endeavor.

I have tried to work this year where most needed. While I have not visited all of the churches, I have tried to keep in touch with them through the pastors and thus assist in any way that I could.

I feel that the year just closing has been a good one. We have not accomplished all that we had hoped, but the Lord has blessed. A number of successful revivals have been held with a nice increase in membership resulting for the churches.

Through the efforts of Brothers Howington, Elkins, and others, we have received into our Association four churches with an approximate membership of 315. This has added great strength and some promising territory to our work.

As we face the future it looks like it is time to work. I see great possibilities for us, both East and West. Loudon and Carter counties present to us a challenge. They are looking to us for help. This is an opportunity for us to further unify the work in Tennessee. This we see to be our greatest need at present. With the Free Will Baptists in Tennessee merged into a State Convention our opportunities would be greatly expanded.

During the past year we have dedicated two churches—Greeneville and Greggs Chapel at Newport. Then, a number of the churches have made needed repairs and improvements. The members in general seem to take a greater pride in their church buildings.

Our Young Peoples' work has been allowed to lag. This should not be so, for I see in the youth our future as a church. No new Leagues have been organized during the year, yet the eight Leagues now working, are doing a good work. This work must not be neglected any longer. A Secretary of Young Peoples' work must be elected at this sitting. It has been a pleasure to be associated with the youth of our churches and see the eagerness to work that is manifested everywhere.

I make the following recommendations, viz:

First. That we retain a full time Supervisor if possible.

Second. That we elect at this session a Secretary of Young Peoples' Work to work with the various pastors and the Supervisor.

Third. That we take immediate steps to open within our territory an asylum for orphan children, this to serve also for a nucleus for the establishment of some work educationally.

I pray God's blessings upon my successor, whomever he may be, and wish for each of you who have supported me in these years, the richest of blessings.

The report of the committee on Temperance was discussed very forcefully by Brother Howington and Father Barton in an appeal for a unanimous support, after which the report was adopted by a standing vote of almost all in the room.

TEMPERANCE REPORT

Due to the fact that we, as Christians, have such a great responsibility to meet in the oncoming election of September 23rd, we urge every member of our denomination to use his vote and influence to defeat the return of the saloons to our state.

We further suggest that each minister of this conference urge the members of his audiences to vote upon this important question. And, that they take great care to see that those who will vote against the accursed stuff, have some means of getting to the polls.

In our opinion, the return of the saloon will do more to destroy the lives and the souls of our boys and girls than any other single agency in existence.

This is a time when a mere report will not suffice. We need action—united action. If we cannot poll a large vote in this part of the state we

shall be defeated. The whiskey interests and large cities will be there on time. Let us be aroused to the importance of this cause!

The report of the Eastern Quarterly Meeting was read and adopted.

The election of the Supervisor was taken from the table. Upon motion Rev. C. E. Lowe of Greeneville, was elected by a unanimous vote.

Rev. Lowe made a short but impressive talk.

The Supervisor was voted to receive only free-will offerings from the churches where he visits. These to be taken by the pastor, or in the absence of the pastor, by the Supervisor himself.

The budget for the ensuing year was cut from thirty cents to ten cents per member. Reports were not to be received until the full amount of ten cents for each member reported is paid in full.

Suggested plans for an Orphanage from the Eastern Quarterly Meeting were presented and adopted unanimously by the Association.

On motion a full set of officials was elected to administer the work of the Orphanage, viz:

First. A Board of Trustees, consisting of Geo. D. Dunbar, Chairman; C. L. Long, G. F. Cannon, B. M. Pierce, Sam Harrel.

Second. A Board of Directors, consisting of J. S. Burgess, Frank Stroupe, E. D. Kendrick.

Third. A financial setup, consisting of J. C. Howington, field manager; H. W. Morelock, F. C. Atkins, C. Y. Elkin and E. C. Burkey, co-workers; and H. D. Bailey, treasurer.

The Board of Trustees is to hold office until their successors are elected and installed. It is their duty to obtain and hold property.

The Board of Directors are to be elected each year by the Association. It will be their duty to administer the affairs of the home, such as employing helpers, directing the purchase of goods and materials and all other duties directly affecting the work of the Home.

A Field Manager is to be elected each year by the Association, whose duties it will be in connection with the co-workers to organize the different churches and communities into working units for the financing and support of the Home.

All funds are to be held by and expended through the treasurer.

The Pulpit Supply Committee reported that Brother C. Y. Elkin would preach at the evening worship.

The meeting then stood adjourned until Saturday morning.

Rev. Elkin was very effective in the evening service on the subject of Prayer. Rev. Dean sang an original solo to introduce the service.

Met in final business session after the adjournment of the Ministers' Conference.

Rev. Herman Christian was enrolled.

A partial report from the Northern Quarterly Meeting was adopted, with the understanding that the report was to be completed if possible.

Upon request from Rev. Howington, the New Liberty church in Carter county was elected as the place of meeting in 1938.

Rev. Paul Woolsey was elected as Secretary of Young Peoples' Work, with Gettis Cannon of the Western, Herman Christian of the Northern, and Floyd Phillips and E. C. Burkey of the Eastern Quarterly Meetings as co-workers. The Association recommends and urges that all churches co-operate financially and otherwise in this worthy work.

On motion, a committee was elected to try to work out plans with the cooperation of the other associations of the state for a State Convention.

The business session then adjourned to meet with the New Liberty church on Stony Creek, eleven miles east of Elizabethton, on Thursday before the Third Sunday in August, 1938, at 10:00 o'clock, A. M.

Special features of the Morning Worship were a solo by little Miss Florence Way, daughter of Rev. S. F. Way, entitled, "I Am Only a Preacher's Daughter," and then the message from Rev. Jesse Laws from Matt. 26:39, "He Went a Little Farther." A soul stirring message that lifted the whole audience and was a fitting climax to a very pleasant session.
