Associational Proceedings

The Eighty-Sixth Annual Session of the Union Free Will Baptist Association met in regular session on the morning of August 12, 1959, at ten o'clock. Rev. Dewey Barnard led the audience in singing the old familiar strains of "Draw Me Nearer" and "I Must Tell Jesus," and Rev. Horton Davis, pastor of the First Church of Knoxville, lead the morning devotional, reading 1 Peter 4:11-19. Rev. Lloyd Light, pastor of the Eastern Star Church, led the prayer.

Rev. Winford Floyd, pastor of the First Church of Elizabethton, then called into executive session the eighty-sixth annual session of the association.

Rev. Floyd then turned the service over to Rev. T. M. Pate, moderator, of Knoxville, Tennessee, who read an inspiring and instructive message in brief. He said in part: "Your moderator greets you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

The challenging theme of this Eighty-Sixth Annual Session of Free Will Baptists calls us backward upon the history of our denominational progress.

The Union Association was organized in 1872. Later, the first annual meeting was held with the old Liberty Church in Washington County. Visualizing our theme of the present session, "Stretch Forth the Curtains, Lengthen the Cords and Strengthen the Stakes," a long but steady period of progress was begun. This task was not an easy one. In 1904 there were within the association, 1,273 members. In 1924, twenty years later, there were only 1,300 members. By 1946, the number had increased to 4,367 members, then in 1958 there were within the association, 8,339 members. May God enable us to double this number within the next few years.

May the unerring hand of God direct and lead each of us in every activity of this entire session. May each item of business, each moment of worship, and each hour of fellowship serve as a channel through which God may freely bless each of us throughout this association.

Rev. Harley Brown read the report of the general board for the year. This report was unanimously adopted and will appear in these minutes.

The General Board met after the association. Present were: Revs. Tutterow, Dunbar and Brown. Absent were: Revs. Pate, Howington and Cutshaw. Rev. George D. Dunbar was chosen chairman and Harley Brown, secretary. We then adjourned to the call of the chair.

C. Moved and passed to divert 5% of the home and foreign mission and Bible College allocations—to the local associational treasurer now.

D. Moved and passed to make a special drive for an emergency camp fund. This is to encourage every member of the churches in the Union Association to contribute the amount of one dollar per member.

E. Moved and passed that 10,000 envelopes be printed to receive said fund.

F. Moved and passed to extend our appreciation to the Home for Children for the use of the home and facilities for this meeting. Adjourned.

Bowman, pastor of the Greeneville Church, for Brother Kelley's recovery and also for spiritual guidance in the present service here at the sanctuary.

The morning speaker, Rev. W. F. Phillips, pastor of Keensburg Church, was presented. After some very pointed and timely remarks, he read from Isaiah 54:2, and also from John 13:33-35. He delivered a very spirit-filled message which was well received and appreciated by all. The closing hymn was "Higher Ground," and the benediction was prayed by Rev. Frank Thompson of Central Church in Johnson City.

At noon, everyone enjoyed a bounteous and luscious repast and fellowship at the mess hall.

Mrs. Paul Woolsey of the Western Quarterly Meeting read a very fine report of the work of the woman's auxiliary and accompanied the same with some very appropriate remarks concerning the work that needed to be done. Next was a report of the Sunday School Convention work which was read by Miss Jewell Dunbar of Erwin, Tennessee. She, too, added some challenging statements to the work of the Sunday schools among our churches.

At this time Rev. Joe Fort from the Free Will Baptist Press at Ayden, North Carolina, was given time to present the national Sunday school work in a very comprehensive way.

A motion was sustained to adjourn for the work of the Ministers' Conventions.

WEDNESDAY EVENING

The evening worship service was called to order promptly at 7:30. Special features of the service were some spirited numbers in song: "Are You Washed in the Blood," "Sunlight," and "Standing on the Promises." Rev. Teasley prayed the evening prayer. The moderator, Rev. T. M. Pate, introduced Rev. Homer Willis of the National Home Mission Board and Ray Turnage of the National League Board.

After singing "I Feel Like Traveling On," by the audience, the moderator presented Rev. E. H. Brock, pastor of Valley View Church in Loudon County. He read from James 4:13-15 and 1 Thessalonians 5:1. He stressed the theme of the association and particularly lengthening and strengthening our prayer life. This was a very unusual message and was greatly appreciated by everyone present.

A season of prayer was called around the altar and great blessing was experienced.

THURSDAY MORNING

The morning session was called to order promptly at 9:00. After singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," Rev. R. E. Cutshaw of Greenville, read from Matthew 26 and Luke 24:49. After brief remarks he led the devotional prayer.

The minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

Rev. Johnnie Floyd reported for the Committee on Education. This report was adopted for publication.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

It can readily be observed that when the preachers of our churches are more enlightened, our people also are more informed. May it never be the testimony of any that we are glad for ignorance, but that we heartily thank God for the privilege of an educated mind and heart to do His work better. The Holy Spirit calls also to preparation.

Be this as it may then let our young people consider the two colleges owned and operated by Free Will Baptists. Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee, for preparation in the ministry, missions, and general Christian service; and Mount Olive Junior College in Mount Olive, North Carolina.

Further be it resolved that the possibilities of an extension school from the Bible College to be held here at the camp be explored. Credit can be earned by these studies and would be a great asset to both our young and older ministers.

We recommend that all pastors and ministers promote, teach, and preach missions through the different auxiliaries of the churches, such as the woman's auxiliaries, the young people's auxiliaries, all leagues, Sunday schools and preaching services.

Second, we recommend that all pastors and all ministers as much as possible get behind and support the Shepherd's Mission Station (located in Africa) which includes home for the missionary, dispensary, school and church.

CAMP DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Greetings to the Eighty-Sixth Annual Session of the Union Free Will Baptist Association:

For the fourth successive year it has been my honored privilege to be your camp director at this scene of activities. It has been a pleasure to operate under the wise and efficient direction of our most congenial and effective camp board.

In order to further strengthen our efforts, early in the year we asked for a joint meeting of both the camp board and the general board. The meeting was held at the Home for Children and was a very compatible meeting. Most of the members of each board were present. It was very apparent to all of us from the first that a considerable sum of money would be needed to expand the present facilities and to complete the work already begun. To accomplish this double purpose, it was agreed to ask our annual association for a stipulated sum to be set aside from the associational treasury for maintenance and upkeep of the property. Then, Brother J. C. Howington presented to the meeting a plan calling for the printing and circulation of small envelopes asking each member of the various churches composing the association to contribute the sum of \$1.00. This was to be known as an emergency fund to complete and to expand the encampment.

Those churches having interested pastors were spontaneous in their response. Considerable money was soon made available and we had hoped that enough would be received to complete the entire project. Our hopes were that at least one half of our entire membership would respond to this appeal. This was a dream that never came true.

One of the first things to receive attention was the painting of all buildings already erected by our association. This proved to be slow and expensive due to the rough material used in these structures. Then, there had been a demand for additional parking space. This, too, has been accomplished, as you can see. This cost was much greater than expected because of the rugged terrain and the stony nature of the ground to be cleared.

Another objective that had to be met was added facilities for our kitchen. A new range had to be secured and some costly cooking utensils had to be added in our kitchen. We are still using a borrowed range for the kitchen. This must be replaced at once.

Thanks to some of our friends who have made great sacrifice, five cabins have been erected for the housing of campers. Brother Burgess purchased the Hunley Home near our mess hall and lent us the use of it for our late encampment. But, this did not solve all of our problems. Beds and mattresses had to be secured for all these buildings. To meet this need, Brother H. D. Bailey was successful in securing from State College forty bunk beds of the army type without cost. Several other beds had to be purchased. To further relieve our problem, about 75 new mattresses had to be secured. These with other facilities lent us by Brother Burgess, from the Home for Children, saved us from a very embarrassing situation.

Our first activity of this summer was the Ministers' Camp Meeting held from June 29 to July 3. We were greatly disappointed at the smallness of our enrollment, but we feel that our accomplishments were invaluable. Everyone in attendance was delighted with the results and asked that we have

a much longer period of training and inspiration next year. Those who did not attend missed one of the great blessings of his entire life.

Our Youth Encampment was held from July 19 to July 25. Eighty regular campers were enrolled and enough additional day time campers attended to bring the number to be cared for each day to 101 campers. This was by far the most successful encampment that we have ever held at any time. Prospects point to an even larger enrollment next year.

The highlights of the camp were the fine instructions in Evangelism, League, World-Wide Missions and a Teen-Age Bible Course. The afternoons were given over to hand craft and recreation. In the hand craft class, campers were permitted to make souvenirs which they could carry home with them when they returned. This proved much more attractive than we had even hoped for.

Evangelistic services were held each evening at the sanctuary. These were conducted on the highest possible spiritual plains and resulted in 31 decisions for Christ. This within itself more than compensated for all the combined efforts put forth in the entire encampment.

Children from 19 churches and from two states attended. This shows the ever increasing interest in this enterprise and is one of our greatest challenges. Increased and added facilities are needed and our staff of workers must be doubled by next year.

We have conducted an intensive investigation into the activities of other camps being conducted within several miles of our camp and find that in most cases only one subject is being taught during the entire week and the remainder of time is given to reception. Our camp is not without recreation and pastime, but some of the most intensive class work possible is made available to every child, and each child is being taught on his individual level, thanks to a most efficient corp of teachers. B. M. Pierce has succeeded in getting the Greene County Board of Education to co-operate with us in installing a larger water line from the big spring to a point beyond our encampment. We are to share in its benefits. Our water line must be buried and that will be very expensive among these stones. We solicit the assistance of those particularly who did not contribute to the emergency fund, please do so at once and we shall complete this important job before cold weather hampers our work.

As heretofore, a complete financial statement cannot be made until after this session is over, due to an over carrying of food from other meetings. With your kind permission I shall compile a complete and concise financial statement to be published in our next minutes.

There is much more that needs to be said but time and space will not permit this at this time. Please allow me to thank everyone of you who have helped to make possible the wonderful work already accomplished in this camp. And, let me tell you what a joy it has been to labor, even tirelessly, for these wonderful accomplishments in our work. Aside from your co-operation and sympathy it would have been nothing short of drudgery.

May the good Lord bless everyone of you real good is my prayer in His name.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERS' CAMP

The committee on arrangements for the Ministers' Camp Meeting met at the camp ground immediately after the adjournment of the Ministers' Conference on August 15, 1958. The members present were Geo. D. Dunbar, chairman, Rev. E. H. Brock, Rev. H. D. Bailey, Rev. Lloyd Light and Rev. Weldon Bowman.

Tentative plans were made for the encampment to be held during the summer of 1959. It was agreed that the mornings were to be given to class work and the afternoons to meditation and rest.

A meeting was scheduled to be held on April 25, 1959, at the camp

site. Due to a misunderstanding, this meeting was not well attended and a second meeting was scheduled to meet at the Home for Children on May 9, 1959. All the committee were present for this meeting except Brother H. D. Bailey. Last minute preparations for the coming encampment were fully discussed at this meeting. It was agreed that arrangements for the program were to be entrusted to Rev. Dunbar, however, each member was granted the privilege of supplying a speaker from his quarterly meeting.

The camp meeting convened on June 29, and continued through July 3. These were days filled with spiritual refreshment and Christian fellowship. Some of the highlights of the camp were:

1. The fine instructions by the various teachers secured for this occasion.
2. The manifest presence of the Holy Spirit among the campers.
3. The excellent type of preaching by the participating ministers. Those who brought the messages were Rev. Dewey Bernard, Rev. J. C. Biddle, Rev. David England, Rev. W. H. Teague, Rev. Stanley Parkey, Rev. L. M. Bowman, Rev. Weldon Bowman, Rev. E. M. French and Rev. H. H. Tutte-row.
4. The hour of prayer, conducted each afternoon had the visible approval of the divine presence.
5. Classes were held each morning in Evangelism, Free Will Baptist Doctrine and Pastoral Work. These subjects were taught by Rev. T. M. Pate, Rev. Paul Woolsey and Rev. Garland Teasley, respectively.

As usual the noon hour was a time of festivities and fellowship among the entire brotherhood.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session was called to order promptly at 1:30. Rev. Guy Foster, of the First Church of Johnson City, led the devotional by reading 2 Timothy 2:1-5. He led the prayer.

Visiting ministers to be recognized were Rev. Raymond Riggs of the Foreign Mission Board and Lester McKinnon of Bristol, Tennessee. Rev. Riggs brought special greetings to the association.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LITERATURE

Resolve: That we encourage our churches, Sunday schools and other auxiliaries to purchase as much of their supplies from Ayden, North Carolina, Free Will Baptist Press as soon as possible after January 1, 1960.

That in the meantime those who have been purchasing from the Press continue to do so and that those who have been purchasing from National Headquarters continue to do so for this coming quarter (last quarter of 1959) only and there after that they patronize the Press at Ayden who from that time has a contract with the National Sunday School Board.

We urge our people, adults, young people and children, to purchase for their churches and various auxiliaries, their homes and for themselves as individuals, pamphlets, magazines, books and all types of literature that will aid in the development of a well rounded and useful Christian life.

We recommend that our people use only those Biblical translations that are true to the fundamental truths of God's Holy Word. We find that the majority of our people prefer the King James for use in public worship.

REPORT OF SUPERANNUATION BOARD

We, your Superannuation Board, wish to report as follows:

We have 2 ministers on the superannuation roll at present, namely P. A. Packston and C. L. Long.

Realizing the confusion that has prevailed, over the years, concerning the eligibility of ministers for superannuation, we recommend that a definite set of rules be adopted to govern the Superannuation Board in its decisions and actions, in retiring ministers.

We further recommend that these rules, when adopted, be printed, each year, in the minutes of the association, with any changes and/or amendments to these rules.

We recommend the following resolution to the Resolution Committee:

Be it resolved that the following shall constitute the rules by which the Superannuation Board shall be governed in retirement of ministers:

1. The applicant must be a member of the Union Association and of the Ministerial Conference, in good standing.
2. He must have pastored a church or churches in this association for at least five (5) years.
3. The minister must be totally disabled to pastor a church or otherwise earn a livelihood, and this disability must be certified to by a licensed physician. It is further provided that this certificate must be renewed each year, unless the minister has reached his sixty-fifth (65) birthday.
4. No minister may be added to the superannuation roll until he has presented a written application signed by him and by the moderator of the quarterly meeting to which he belongs. This application must be accompanied by four copies of the doctor's certificate—one for each member of the Superannuation Board.
5. Retirement shall date from the first day of the month succeeding the date of application and doctor's certificate.
