Associational Proceedings

The Eighty-Seventh Annual Session of the Union Free Will Baptist Association convened at the Central Camp Grounds on Wednesday morning, August 17, 1960, at 10:00 o'clock.

In the absence of the song director, Brother I. L. Stanley and Rev. Dewey Bernard led the audience in singing "Victory In Jesus." Rev. D. C. Byrd of Johnson City, conducted the morning devotion reading from Romans 12:1-21. Following some very inspiring thoughts, he led the morning prayer.

Rev. E. H. Brock of Loudon, Tennessee, assistant moderator, called the session to order and presented the moderator, Rev. Johnny Floyd, pastor of the First Church of Erwin.

In a brief message, the moderator made very clear just what would be expected of all speakers and laid out definite rules for parliamentary procedure during the session. He asked for consideration of others' right and made it clear that the majority would rule.

On motion, all ministers, deacons and delegates who registered at the booth were seated as the voting power of the meeting.

The moderator appointed Revs. Paul Woolsey, Winford Floyd, H. D. Bailey, Harley Brown and D. C. Bernard as a committee on committees and nominations. These were instructed to begin work immediately on the committees so that all would have ample time to prepare their reports.

Rev. Garland Teasley was asked to report the work of the general board. His report follows:

The general board met at the close of the 1959 session for organization. Garland Teasley was chosen chairman and H. H. Tutterow was chosen as secretary. Brother Hubert Strickler had been elected to fill the term made vacant by Harley Brown moving to the Clinch Valley Association.

The board met in June of this year at the call of the chairman. The program for the Eighty-Seventh Annual Association was planned and made ready for publication. A petition was also considered from the home mission board. It was voted that the petition be presented to the association for disposal.

Rev. Biddle, secretary of the camp board, reported that due to previous workable plans being adopted for this year it was not deemed needful to call a special session of the camp board.

Since the session was running ahead of time it was determined to ask for a report of the camp director, which report was to have been made after noon. The report was as follows:

REPORT OF THE CAMP DIRECTOR

To the eighty-seventh annual session of the Union Free Will Baptist Association, Greetings:

We have had a rather full schedule of camp activities during this summer, beginning on June 20 and closing on the 24. We experienced one of our most successful ministers' encampments in our history. Our attendance was better than last year and the interest was such that requests were made for a longer period for future encampments. Our camp board will give you a more detailed report when they report. Just as we were closing our ministers' encampment, the youth from over the state moved in for our first statewide youth or league convention under the direction of Brother Dale Burden of East Nashville, who had been elected by our State Convention to this post. Several from Nashville and Columbia were in attendance as well as a nice delegation from many of the churches of the Union Association. This meeting was a great success and will be reported more in detail elsewhere.

Our youth encampment was held from July 24 to July 30. A total of 96 paid campers enrolled and others attended during the day who, with the workers, brought our number to 128 who received meals daily. Even though we have two new cabins, we were taxed to capacity to provide beds at night. Within the few years that we have been in this location we have grown from about 40 campers to more than 100. This spontaneous growth makes it imperative that we expand immediately. All of our cabins are overcrowded and we are greatly in need of additional rooms and equipment for our classes. Four more new cabins should be erected before next camp time. This year we were successful in securing six very capable and interested teachers. Due to fair weather, some of the classes were conducted in the outdoor areas. This is desirable in fair weather but is impossible in case of rain. Open-sided classrooms here at the present sanctuary would not only facilitate or instruct but would provide added convenience for committee meetings during our annual meetings for conventions and the associations.

The League Conventions from the Western and the Northern Quarterly

Meetings have provided two new cabins since last year's encampment. But for these efforts we would have had to turn away several campers this past year. Other areas, if guided by the same type of leadership and the same incentives, would do the same. Our gratitude to these fine folk knows no end.

You will observe that since last year's meeting we have been successful in securing a water system that is buried in the ground. Ample water is now available for all areas on the compound. This was obtained at great cost of money and labor. The work of a ditching machine was very slow and expensive in this stony ground. Expansion in this field should not be so expensive. We would like very much to screen in our mess hall and kitchen, as well as the sanctuary. This too will call for a great outlay of money and labor. As of now, this is not available and if made available must come from our churches. If you desire these much needed improvements just lay the money on the line and they will be forthcoming immediately.

All of these material improvements fade into insignificance before the spiritual good that is being accomplished among our youth. Nine decisions for Christ were made and the testimonies of the campers was such that it would have inspired every heart in this presence. A finer group of children could not have been assembled from so many different areas of our denomination. One of our workers who had labored with children in four states put it like this: "This is the most co-operative and best behaved group that I have ever been associated with in my life." Another worker, Brother Ray Turnage, national director of league work, was also very loud in his praise of the excellent group. Children from at least two states and many towns and countries were brought together in a great fraternal body. New acquaintances and new friendships were established that may last into eternity. But most of all, souls were brought into the glorious light and liberty of the Son of God. No outlay of money is comparable to this accomplishment. Many other material additions have been made to the camp among which are chalk boards for teachers, a \$900 kitchen range for preparing meals, many cots and mattresses for the cabins, and other minor equipment too numerous to be mentioned here.

Two things have actuated me in my service as your camp director. One is the long distance that most of you, who might gratefully serve in this capacity, live from the camp grounds. The other is my love for service among our youth. Aside from this the work would be drudgery. Some one must do this who will sacrifice time, toil and money. Only a few weeks of the past year I have not been here from one to four times each week. I have dared to pay for gas a few times from the camp funds when I was short in my own funds.

I take this means of expressing to you my sincere thanks for the confidence that you have reposed in me and for the very distinctive honor of serving you in this trustworthy cause.

An invoice for cots and mattresses and one or two checks have not cleared. Next years' report will show these.

The meeting recessed for the morning worship.

At the morning worship hour, Rev. Bernard again led the song service. All joined in singing, "Draw Me Nearer." After a prayer by Rev. Loyd Light, the old hymn, "Send the Light," was sung.

The moderator then presented Rev. Jas. F. Miller, pastor of the Forest Grove Church of Knoxville, as the keynote speaker. After reading from John 4:31-42, and praying for guidance, he read as a text: "Say not ye, There are four months, and then cometh harvest? . . . Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest" (Vs. 35). This was a most challenging message and set the frame for the whole association.

The camp director gave specific direction for the entertainment and all repaired to the big mess hall for a bounteous repast. Great fellowship was enjoyed until tidings came that Rev. Carter's son had drowned. Then a deep sense of defeat seemed to capture the whole group. Sorrow supplanted gaiety and a great calm swept the whole meeting.

Wednesday Afternoon

Professor Jerry Presley of Sweetwater, led the old song, "Victory in Jesus." Rev. David England of Sparta was to have led the devotion, but in his absence the time was taken for silent meditation and prayer in behalf of the Carters, and also the flying ace, Mr. Powers, who was on trial at that moment in Soviet Union. Rev. M. L. Bowman led the closing prayer.

You may wonder exactly what the job of the Home Mission Board is. To quote from a motion passed in our first meeting: "We go on record as being ready to help in any home mission endeavor that is worthwhile, and that we not lend any assistance to any split or work that is not worthwhile." The job, then, of the Home Mission Board, is to establish or help establish new churches. While some advance has been made, we continue to encourage the ministry and the laity to support this worthy program.

In order to further finance this movement we offer the following resolution:

Whereas, the Home Missions Board was established by the Union Association, and

Whereas, this board, functioning now for approximately one year, has seen the necessity for funds on which to operate, and

Whereas, we firmly believe that only as we strengthen our local association can we see progress; a motion is made and carried that we petition the Union Association for 5% of all monies coming into the denominational fund, this money to be taken from the 30% now allocated to the associational fund, leaving them 25% of the denominational funds for the association fund. The new division would be 25% to association, 5% to home missions, 20% to superannuation, 15% to National Home Missions, 15% to foreign missions, 15% to Bible College, and 5% to executive department.

The report and the resolution were adopted unanimously.

We recommend the ordination of Ray Fletcher, Edward Davis and Jesse Kelley. We also ask that credentials be issued to Jim Beasley who was ordained by the Primitive Baptists, but now a member of Hill Crest Church in Blount County.

On motion, Ralph Sneed, James R. Dean and Ray Knight are dropped at their request to unite with other denominations.

Those who did not preach the required twenty sermons were passed for the year. E. M. French and E. F. Drayne are permitted to report direct and James Kelley is recognized as an ordained minister and given a new certificate.

Rev. H. D. Bailey introduced an amendment to the constitution to lower the number of sermons to be preached to twelve instead of twenty. This was tabled until tomorrow as required before passage.

Since the Ministers' Encampment has been passed on to the Ministers' Conference, a motion was sustained to retain the same committee on arrangements but they are to be placed on a rotation basis to be arranged alphabetically, the arrangement to be Central, Eastern, Northern and Western. H. D. Bailey, one year; Weldon Bowman, two years; Loyd Light, three years; E. H. Brock, four years.

Weldon Bowman, term expires 1962.

Lloyd Light, term expires 1963.

E. H. Brock, term expires 1964.

The committee on resolutions reported as follows:

Due to the fact that our president, Brother Elmer Carter, had an unfortunate accident in his family, be it resolved that this body express its Christian love by requesting the secretary to send a copy of this resolution to him and his family.

Be it resolved, that since we are ministering in a different age, may we give more attention to our ministerial code of ethics.

Be it resolved, that since our Ministers' Camp Meeting is filling a great need in our association, that it become an annual affair.

Be it resolved, that since Brother P. A. Paxton and C. L. Long were well beloved ministers in our association, we send to their widows a note of sympathy at their passing.

By motion, Rev. Elmer Carter is retained as president of this Ministers' Conference, and Rev. Dewey Bernard as vice-president.

The meeting then stood adjourned until Friday morning following the association.

THURSDAY EVENING

An adjointed session of the Ministers' Conference was called at 7:30 o'clock for the purpose of accepting Jim Beasley, formerly of the Primitive Baptist church, into fellowship of this body and present to him credentials from our conference. The meeting was held open until after the ordination when all candidates ordained were inducted into the conference.

The adjourned session stood adjourned until Friday morning.

FRIDAY MORNING

The meeting was called by Rev. Bernard.

On motion, the amendment to the constitution was removed from the table and unanimously passed.

The amendment is that Article 4 of the constitution be made to read, "twelve sermons," instead of "twenty sermons."

A motion was sustained to permit the vice-president to sign the ministers' identification cards in the absence of the president.

The business having been transacted, the conference stood adjourned to meet with the association on August 14, 1961, at the camp grounds or at the call of the president.

CONSTITUTION OF THE MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

PREAMBLE: The Ministers' Conference of the Union Free Will Baptist Association has for its purpose the unification of our ministry for greater efficiency and also to so safeguard the integrity of its members that the churches of the association may have the best possible type of pastors and evangelist that it is our ability to produce.

ARTICLE I—NAME

This shall be known as the Ministers' Conference of the Union Free Will Baptist Association of East Tennessee.

ARTICLE II—MEMBERSHIP

This conference shall be composed of the ministers of the Union Association, both ordained and licentiates, who shall be in good and regular standing at the time of admission.

In order to become a member one must first undergo a rigid examination at the hands of the ordaining council as to his calling and qualification and character.

ARTICLE III—DISCIPLINE

This conference shall have the right to discipline its members and settle

any and all questions of conduct, doctrine, usage, and general character among its members and no appeal may be made from its decisions.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

The officers of this Ministers' Conference shall be a president, a vice-president, a secretary and an ordaining council, the first two of whom must be nominated and elected from the floor of each session of the conference. The secretary to hold office during good behavior or at the pleasure of the body. The ordaining council, of whom there are five, each hold office for a term of five years, one new one to be elected each year in order of expiration of the term. These, too, are to be nominated and elected by a majority of those present and voting.

ARTICLE V—MEETINGS

The conference shall hold regular annual meetings at the time and place of the annual meetings of the association. Special extra sessions may be called by the president in emergencies provided due notice shall have been served upon each member at his last known address at least ten days prior to the meeting. Eleven ministers in good standing shall constitute a quorum and seven may meet and adjourn.

ARTICLE VI—DUTIES OF OFFICERS MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

It shall be the duty of the president to preside over all meetings, demand a rigid respect for the Constitution and Bylaws of the conference, to see that each member has equal rights and privileges under similar circumstances, appoint all committees needful for transaction of the meeting unless otherwise provided by law and to cast the deciding vote in case of a tie but may not vote at any other time unless the chair is filled by another. He may not speak upon any subject except by way of explanation until he has given the chair to another.

It shall be the duty of the vice-president to preside in the absence of the president and exercise the same rights and be governed by the same rules while serving.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep a concise and careful record of all proceedings, read them at the direction of the presiding officer and have the same printed in booklet form known as minutes to be distributed among the members.

It shall be the duty of the ordaining council to keep a vigilant watch over the ministers of the conference, to investigate any candidate or candidates seeking admission to the conference and make recommendations for acceptance or rejection. A rejection by the council shall be final and need not be voted upon by the conference; to issue license to those meeting the requirements of the law; to examine, recommend and publicly ordain all candidates who have met the requirements of the law and to provide proper credentials for all ministers, both licentiates and ordained.

The ordaining council is strictly forbidden to ordain any candidate who does not show reasonable signs of a divine calling or who is morally or mentally unfit. Any candidate who has been married and divorced his wife and

then married another shall in no case be granted a license or receive the sacred rites of ordination and if any who have divorced a wife shall marry another shall void his credentials and be silenced from preaching as a Free Will Baptist. It is specifically understood that this shall apply only to future cases in as much as a law cannot be made to effect a case after the offense has been committed

A license shall be valid for only one year at a time and must of necessity be renewed at the beginning of a new year before the candidate is eligible to preach.

A candidate must have been a regular member of some Free Will Baptist church for at least one year before asking for a license.

All licentiates must be required to take a one-year reading course in preparation for ordination. This course is to be outlined by the ordaining council and a rigid examination is to be taken upon the course with not less than 75 per cent grade accepted as passing. It is provided that a certificate showing that one year of satisfactory work has been done in our Bible College will be accepted. Other schools may be recognized at the discretion of the conference.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE:

That that part of the Constitution dealing with the ordination of ministers be amended to read:

1. The ordaining council of the quarterly meeting shall continue to have power to examine and license candidates for the ministry. These, after holding a license for a period of one year or more and having met all of the requirements of the conference, may be recommended to the annual conference for ordination.

2. The ordaining council of the annual meeting shall have the power to re-examine all candidates recommended by said quarterly meetings and upon approval, shall publicly ordain such candidates in the said annual meeting.

3. Ministers of other denominations desiring membership among us, must have the approval of both the quarterly meeting council and the annual conference council before being eligible for full membership in the annual meeting.

BYLAWS OF THE MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

1. A portion of Scripture shall be read and prayer offered at the beginning of each session, regular or called, and all meetings shall close with prayer or a benediction. However, if the conference shall follow immediately the work of the association, the devotion of the association may become the devotion of the conference.

2. The president or vice-president shall call the meeting to order at the time and place designated by the program committee and in case both

are absent the secretary shall take charge of the election of a president pro tem to serve until one or both come or until a regular presiding officer has been elected and installed.

3. It is required that all ministers serving churches as pastors shall affiliate with the Ministers' Conference, and a non-resident pastor being called to a pastorate shall before assuming charge of the work submit his credentials to the ordaining council for approval and receive an endorsement for the position to which he aspires.

4. All ministers shall be required to make regular annual reports in writing upon forms to be supplied to the member by the secretary. In order to be acceptable a report should show regular attendance at church, at least twelve sermons preached and liberal support to the righteous enterprises of the denomination.

5. Any minister removing his membership to another denomination without first securing a letter of recommendation shall be considered in contempt and so published in the minutes of the conference.

6. All questions of faith, practice, standards of church membership and moral and spiritual conduct shall be decided and disposed of by the conference and all such decisions shall be final.

7. Visitors to the conference may be seated as advisory council and may by permission speak but in no case shall he be allowed to vote.

8. Any minister absenting himself from two consecutive meetings unless retired or excused on account of illness or other providential causes shall be investigated and if found to be careless, admonished by the ordaining council and if he refuse to accept the discipline he shall be excluded from the body.

9. Any member desiring to leave any meeting shall ask to be excused before leaving the room.

10. The moderator shall not allow any discussion which is not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

11. These bylaws may be amended in the same way as those of the association.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNION FREE WILL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: The Union Free Will Baptist Association is organized to consolidate the efforts and promote the interests of the different churches composing the various quarterly meetings of which the association is composed; to harmonize the work; unify the sentiment of the common cause of the Redeemer; and by a fraternal interchange of views among the members; to promote the cause of the denomination and stimulate a growth in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known hereafter as the Union Free Will Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization shall be to more thoroughly unify the work of the various quarterly meetings composing the association and to devise and execute measures for the extension of Christ's Kingdom among all of our churches.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

This association shall be composed of ministers, deacons, and duly elected delegates from the quarterly meetings now constituting the association, and such other quarterly meetings as may be admitted from time to time. Each Sunday School Convention, League Convention and Woman's Auxiliary Convention shall be represented by five members each from each Quarterly Meeting Convention and until such time as any of these quarterly meetings not having a quarterly meeting organization, they shall be allowed one member from each local organization.

Each quarterly meeting holding membership in the association shall furnish to the association a list of certified delegates from the various churches based upon the membership of the churches. Each church being allowed one delegate for every 20 members or fraction thereof. Any church shall have the privilege of sending an alternate to replace a delegate who cannot attend, but such a delegate must be certified by the local church to the clerk of the quarterly meeting in time for enrollment in the association.

ARTICLE IV—DISCIPLINE

The association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or usage that may properly come before it from time to time from any of the quarterly meetings composing the said association, or act upon any appeal made by any of the churches which constitute the various quarterly meetings; said appeal having been clearly and plainly stated in writing and signed by pastor and clerk, if a church, and by the moderator and secretary if from a quarterly meeting. The above must be forwarded by mail, or in person to the clerk of the association in time for presentation at the next session.

ARTICLE V—OFFICERS

The officers of this association shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, a secretary, an assistant secretary, an executive secretary and treasurer (which may be combined), each of whom shall be nominated from the floor and elected by a standing vote at each regular session except the secretary who shall hold office during good behavior or at the pleasure of the association.

An elect shall be determined by a majority of those present and voting. All officers thus elected shall hold office until their successors are duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE VI—GENERAL BOARD

SECTION 1—*Membership:*

The general board shall be composed of seven members, two shall be the moderator of the association and the secretary who are ex officio mem-

bers, one member from each of the quarterly meetings and one member at large.

SECTION 2—Duties:

The duties of the general board shall be as follows: (1) To act for the association in matters that demand its consideration between regular annual sessions of the association. (2) To have oversight of arrangements for meetings of the association, to provide programs, and with authority to change, if necessary, the time and place of meetings. (3) To fill vacancies in the association which may be caused by death, resignation, or any other cause, between regular sessions of the association. (4) To make written reports of all its work and also make such recommendations as may be deemed necessary to the next session of the association.

SECTION 3—Meetings:

It shall be the duty of the general board to meet at each regular or called session of the association and as often as the welfare of the cause may demand in extra sessions. No meeting of the general board shall be allowed to transact business unless a majority of the members are present, but a minority may meet and adjourn for discussion of any subject which may be of vital interest. All members must have 10 days' notice in writing, stating object, time and place of meeting. All transactions must be favored by a majority of those present and a written record kept and presented at the next session of the association.

SECTION 4—Proxy:

No member shall delegate authority to another member of said board to cast his vote for him for anything, but any member may send a proxy, who shall be a Free Will Baptist, and said proxy shall have the same authority as a regular member. Said proxy must have written authority from the member for whom he acts.

ARTICLE VII—BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

This association shall be allowed to appoint or elect such temporary or standing boards and committees as it may deem necessary for the conduct of its regular business, provided that these are in strict co-operation and harmony with the State and National Associations.

ARTICLE VIII—MEETINGS

The association shall hold regular meetings at a time and place to be fixed by the last regular session and made known before adjournment. Special meetings may be called by the general board when extreme necessity demands, provided that the clerk of each quarterly meeting has been properly notified at least 20 days before the date set for the meeting. Twenty-five delegates from at least three of the quarterly meetings shall constitute a quorum for such business.

ARTICLE IX—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

It shall be the duty of the moderator to preside over all meetings, see to it that Constitution and Bylaws are obeyed and respected, that all discussions are carried on in a Christian spirit and he shall exercise all of the rights and

privileges of any other member, except the right to vote. The right to vote shall only be allowed in case of a tie. He shall not speak at any time except by way of explanation while presiding.

It shall be the duty of the assistant moderator to assist the moderator in any way that he may in the discharge of his duty. This duty shall not be construed to deprive him of his right to vote except when in the chair, in which case he shall be governed by the same rule, affecting the moderator.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep a correct record of all meetings and to publish the same in pamphlet form as minutes and distribute them to the various quarterly meetings of the association. Expenses of such printing and distribution to be defrayed by the treasury of the association.

It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and disburse all such monies as may come into the association and to do this at the discretion of the association.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the change is recommended in writing at least one day before the vote is taken.

BYLAWS OF THE UNION FREE WILL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

1. A portion of the Scripture shall be read and prayer offered at the beginning of each morning and afternoon session of the association, and a prayer shall be offered as a benediction at the close of each session.

2. The moderator or the assistant moderator shall call the association to order at the hour designated by the program committee. When neither the moderator, nor the assistant moderator is present, the general board shall name a moderator pro tem, who shall call the association to order and proceed until the vacancy is legally filled as provided by law.

3. All delegates from the different quarterly meetings who present proper evidence of their rights to seats shall be entered by the secretary at the direction of the moderator. These with the ministers and deacons shall constitute the voting membership of the association. All qualified voters shall be seated in a group to themselves for convenience in counting.

4. It shall be required of each quarterly meeting so representing in this body to present a full report of the year's work in all of the churches of that body. Any refusal of the quarterly meeting to report is just cause for investigation and may be dealt with at the discretion of the association.

5. Whenever any quarterly meeting becomes a part of the association it may not withdraw without the consent of the association by a two-thirds majority vote.

6. In case of any question as to parliamentary procedure, Robert's Rules of Order shall be final authority on the subject.

7. Any person not a member of the association, by permission of the moderator, may be allowed to speak on any subject. Any visitor may be

invited to a seat as advisory council and by permission be allowed to speak, but in no case shall he be allowed to vote.

8. It shall be the duty of all regularly enrolled delegates to be present at the time of meeting and anyone wishing to retire shall obtain leave from the moderator.

9. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one person for any position on a committee or board, provided the person nominated is elected or appointed, until each member present has had an opportunity to make a nomination.

10. The moderator shall not allow any discussion that is not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

11. Anyone refusing to cease speaking when asked by the moderator shall forfeit his membership in the meeting and be barred from participation until acceptable apologies have been submitted and accepted by a majority vote of the meeting.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the friendly appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator. No speaker shall be interrupted while speaking except to be cautioned to adhere to the subject or the time limit by the moderator or anyone may call for a point of order when the discussion is out of order, where upon the moderator shall rule as to rules of order.

13. No speaker shall be allowed to speak more than two minutes or twice on the same subject without permission of the chair except when the time limit has been set for a longer period by the program committee.

14. This body shall have the right to correspond by letter or in person with other religious bodies.

15. These Bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, provided the amendment has been submitted in writing and read publicly at least one day before passage.
