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

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PROCEEDINGS.

The 14th anual session of the Vernon Freewill Baptist association was held with Mt. Harmony church Lamar Co. Ala., October 14th to 16th 1893. The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. W. B. Taylor. After recess and refreshments the association convened the former moderater in the chair, after singing, prayer was offered by the moderator, the Association then proceeded to business in the following order:

 By electing T. W. Springfield to act as clerk pro tem.
 Letters from the different churches called for and read, the names of the delegates enrolled as per statistical table.

3. Opened the door for the reception of new churches into the body. Received one from the Mt. Moriah Assiciation, Mt. Pleasant, which was cordially received the moderator extended unto the delegates the hand of welcome.

4. Porceeded to elect a moderator and clerk for the ensuing year whereupon, D. G. W. Hollis was elected moderator and T. W. Springfield clerk.

5. Called for correspondence from sister associations; whereupon a letter was presented from the Jasper Association by her messengers Revs. T. C. Elliott, S. M. Perkins and Bro. Robert Franks who reported peace and prosperity and were greeted with a warm and hearty reception, also a letter and messenger from the Mt. Mariah Association. Revs. J. D. Byars. J. E. Mathews, Bros. A. Johnson; on finance. A. J. Robertson, J. T. McManus and J. H. Dill; on Sabbath school, Rev. I. T. Neighbors, and Bros. T. M. Lollar, John R. Cole, J. H. Stacy and G. C. Crews; on deceased members Revs. D. N. McGee, J. W. Tavlor, T. W. Buttler Bro. L. F. Collins; on credentials J. W. Harrison, T. L. Hays, W. F. Cannon, W. V. Russell, J. A. Cash, Lenard Hollis, and W. B. Neighbors. 7. The committee on preaching report as follows: Rev. J. A. Brown tonight; Rev. J. D. Byars tomorrow morning at 9 a.m. Rev. T. C. Elliott at 11 a. m., and Rev. J. E. The committee on Documents report as follows: We recommend the former order of business. We recommend that the next annual session of this body be held with the Mt. Willing church. We recommend that the clerk superintend the printing of the minutes; that he have 300 copies printed; that he have them printed wherever he thinks proper; that he letain of the minute fund all over paying for the printing of the minutes for his services. 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Vernon Association. RULESQF DECQRUM

Article 1. The Assocation shall be called to order by the Moderator who presided at the last session. Former Clerk shall also officiate until the body is fully organized.

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and prayer.

3. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by ballot at each session of the Association. A majority of vote by the delegates present elects.

4. The names of delegates from the different churches shall be enrolled and called as often as necessary during session.

5. A majority of the delegates present shall rule in all cases, except in the reception of churches into our body, then it must be unanimous.

6. The Moderator shall not be entitled to vote, except in case of a tie; and then he shall give the deciding vote. He shall be entitled to speak on any question after others have spoken, provided he appoints some one to the chair while he is speaking.

7. Only one person shall speak at the same time, who shall arise and address the Moderator.

8. No brother shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject under discussion or use words of personal reflection.

9. No person shall be entitled to speak more than twice on

the same subject, without leave from the Association, nor more than 15 minutes at a time.

10. No member shall laugh or talk during the time the debates are going on.

11. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the moderator.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Vernon Freewill Baptist Association, of Ala., and being composed of delegates from the different churches forming the same, each church being entitled to three delegates.

2. This body shall be considered an advisory council, but having no authority over the affairs of the church.

3. Each church in this Association shall be considered an advisory body, and shall control its own internal afiair in matters of discipline, &c. It may, however, in extreme cases, call aid from sister churches.

4. All questions of dectrin and matters of general interest shall be settled by a two-third vote of the Association, and the decision shall be final.

5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator. Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be chosen at each session by a majority of votes.

6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by a previous annual session, and shall not adjourn finally until all the business is transacted 7. Churches wishing to become members of this Associa tion must adopt its Articles of Faith and conform to its usages. 8. We agree as churches of this Association to use our best influence to promote the interest of all moral and benevolent institutions, such as the Temperance Cause, Sabbath Shools, Missionary work &c.

9. No member of this Association shall be elligible to the office of Moderator more than two successive session, unless no other member is competent to act in that capacity.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Artscle 1. We believe there is one true and living God, who is the Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth, self-existent Creator of all things, and revealed under the personal distinction of Father, Son and Holy Ghost equal in every divine perfection, and existing in distinct but Larmonious offices in the great work of redemption. 2. We delieve the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, a d is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, Salvation for its end, and Truth for its matter; that it reveals the principals by which God will judge us, and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of this world, the centre of Christian union, the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions shall be tried. 3. We believe that man was created holy, under the law of his Maker but from voluntary transgression fell from that happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now depraved, and wholly unable of their own free will and ability to recover themselves from the fallen state in which they are by nature. 4. We believ that God has not fixed the future state of mankind by an absolute and unconditional decree, but salvation is offered in the Gospel free to all, and if sinners are lost forever it will be their own fault.

5. We belive that Christ by his death and sufferings made an atonement for the sins of all mankind in general, and every

individual in particular; however, that none but those who believe in Him can be partakers of the divine benefits.
6. We believe that true faith cannot proceed from the exercise of our natural faculties and powers, or from the force and operation of free will, since man in consequence of his natural corruption is incapable either of thinking or doing anything spiritually good.

7. We believe in the general application of the Grace of God to fallen man sufficiently to enable him morally and actually to obey the requirements of the law of liberty. Ja. 1c., 25; this is to act saving faith. John 1, 9; however, none but those who believe, or acquiesce in Christ shall be saved thereby.—Acts 17., 32; Rom. 2., 19; John 3., 19.

8. We believe in the free moral agency of man, by the grace of God, before and after conversion, that he laid under no invincible necessity. by his Creator, to act in any given way, that if he lives after the flesh, he shall die, but if he through the spirit, do mortify the deeds of the body, he shall live, and therefore man is always a proper subject of admonition and exhortion. Heb. 11, 12, 13; Rom. 12, 14; Mar: 13, 12; Eze. 18, 24; Rev. 2 and 3_{\circ} .; Eze. 33, 13 and 28; 1st Tim. 4, 1; Heb, 3, 5; 1st Cor. 1. 12 and 22; 1st Peter 1, 10.

9. We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of believers, associated by covenant in the faith of fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ governed by his laws, and exercise the gifts, and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only proper officers are bishop or pastors and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus,

10. We believe that Christian baptism is immersion in water, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that believers are the proper subjects.

11. We believe the Lord's Supper is of perpetual obligation, by which the members of the church, in the case of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self-examination.

12. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and the general judgement; that the joys of the righteous and punishment of the wicked will be eternal, upon principals of grace and justice.

13. We believe in open or mixed communion, and the churches of our body are authorized, through their pastors to invite Christians of all orthodox churches, who are in good standing in their respective churches, to commune with us at, the Lord's table.
