PROCEDINGS

The 31st annual session of the Vernon Freewill Baptist Association met with Pearce's Chapel church on Saturday before the 3rd Sunday in October, 1911.

On Deceased Members—J. H. Dill, A. E. Barnes, J.
M. Brown and G. H. Dyer.

On Sabbath Schools—Rev. J. A. Brown, W. W Barnes, A. J. Moats, D. R. Barnes and A. A. Burgin.

On Ministerial Credentials—I). W. Dill, R. C. Cooper, W. W. Mancel, L. B. Harman and Brunson Hollis.

On Queries and Resolutions—M. C. Lockhart, G. W. Chaffin and J. T. Taylor.

On motion the Committee on Devotion made the following report:

Rev. E. A. Palmer to preach at 9 o'clock Sunday morning; Rev. J. G. Boyett at 11 o'clock, and Rev. D. G. W. Hollis at night.

On motion the Association adjourned to mee Monday morning at 8 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. D. G. W. Hollis. Benediction by the Moderator.

SUNDAY SERVICES.

Sunday morning at 9 o'clock Rev. E. A. Palmer preached to a large congregation. Text: Rom. 1st chap and 19th verse. By the hour of 11 o'clock there had gathered a very large congregation, and Rev. J. G. Boyette ascended the stand and preached. Text: John 2nd chapter, 5-7 verses. At night Rev. D U. W. Hollis preached to an attentive congregation. Text: Ephs. 2nd, 8th v., and 1st John 8rd chap. 21st verse.

MONDAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. The congregation sung a song, and prayer was offered by Rev. J. W. Porter.

The Moderator then called the body to order, the Clerk called the roll, delegates answered to their names, the Moderator announced a quorum present and the Association ready for business.

On motion the reading of minutes of Saturday's session was omitted.

Called for reports of the various committees:

We, your Committee on Documents and Order of Business, beg leave to submit the following report: 1. We recommend the former order of business. 2. We recommend a divide of the Association, on the grounds of the extensive territory which it covers. 3. We, furthermore, recommend that the dividing line be drawn so as the north side be composed of the following named churches: Union Chapel, Mt. Willing Fairview, Piney Grove, Pearce's Chapel, Beaverton, Corrinth, Military Grove, Biloam and Liberty; the same to be known as the Beaverton Freewill Baptist Association when organized. 4 We recommend that the Clerk superintend the printing of the minutes of this Association and that he have \$5.00 for his services. 5. We recommend that the next session of this Association convene with Piney Grove church, 4 miles southeast of Beaverton, Ala, on Saturday before the 2nd Sunday in Respectfully submitted. Report was received and the committee discharged. Rev. D. G. W. Hollis moved that the report be re-read and adopted by sections, which was done, and by taking a vote of the Association as a whole the body voted in tavor of a divide of the Association, as recommended by the committee, the vote being 24 for and 8 against.

By motion adjourned one hour for refreshments.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. The Moderator called the Body to order; Rev. W.C. McCombs offered prayer, the Clerk called the roll and, a quorum being present, the Body proceeded with business as follows:

Called for report of Committee on Publication, Education and Literature

We, your Committee on Publication, Education and Literature, begle we to submit the following report: On Eublication we feel the great need of a better system of publishing literature for our people. On Education we feel the great need of our people being better informed on the true teachings of the Bible. We feel the need of a finance system in the bounds of our Association that our minister's widows and orphans may be better provided for.

On Temperance—We, your Committee on Temperance, beg leave to submit the following report: Whereas we find that the cause of Temperance is on the increase; now brethren, as we know that the beverage use of malt liquors is one of the greatest agencies in the hands of Satan in destroying the morals of the young and rising generation; and, whereas, the Church has had more trouble with this evil, and as we feel that the Ohurch is on gaining ground, let us still pray God to give us complete victory over the devil and his agents. And, whereas, we feel that i is our duty as members of the Church of Christ to condemn this evil, let us use our influence with our progress in our several localities to conquer from conquest to conquest, until victory shall be ours.

The business of the Association being completed, a motion was made and carried to meet with Piney Grove Church on Saturday before the second Sunday in October, 1912.

Then a song was sung and the parting hand was taken amid tears of grief and joy. Then prayer was offered by Rev J. A. Brown and the benediction was pronounced by the Moderator.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe there is one true and living God who is the supreme ruler of heaven and earth, self-existent Oreator of all things, revealed under the personal distinction of Father, Son and Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection, and existing in distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

Art. 2. We believe the Holv Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a treasure of Heavenly instructions; that it has God for its author, Truth for its matter

and Salvation for its end; that it reveals the principles upon which God will judge us, and therefore is and shall remain to the end of this world the center of Christian union. the supreme standard by which all human conduct creeds and opinions will be tried.

- Art. 3. We believe that man was created holy, under the law of his Maker, but from voluntary transgression fell from that holy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now depraved and wholly unable of their own free will and ability to recover from the fallen state which they are in by nature.
- Art 4. We believe that God has not fixed the future state of mankind by an absolute and unconditional decree but salvation is offered in the Gospel tree to all, and if sinners are lost forever it will be their own fault.
- Art. 5. We believe that Christ, by his death and sufferings, made an atonement for the sins of mankind in general, and every individual in particular, however, that none but those who believe in Him can partake of the divine benefits.
- Art. 6. We believe that true faith cannot proceed from the exercise of our natural faculties and powers, or from the force and operation of free will, since man, in consequence of his natural corruption, is meapable of thinking or doing anything spiritually good
- Art 7. We believe in the general application of the grace of God to fallen man sufficiently to enable him, morally and actually, to obey the requirements of the law of liberty, Jas. 1:5, this is the act of saving faith. John 1:9 however, none but those who believe or acquiese, in Christ will be saved thereby.—Acts 17:32, Rom. 2:19, John 3:9.
- Art 8. We believe in the moral agency of man, by the groce of God, before and after conversion, that he is laid under no invincible necessity, by his Creator to act in any given way; that if he lives after the flesh he shall die, but if he through the spirit do mortify the deeds of the body

he shall live, and therefore man is always a proper subject of admonition and exhortation. Heb. 11:12, 13; Rom. 13:14; Mark 13; 12; Eze. 18:24; Nev. 2 and 8 chaps; Nze. 33:13 and 28; I Tim. 4:1; Heb. 3:5; Cor. 1:12 and 24; I Peter 1:10.

- Art. 9. We believe that the visible church of Christ is a congregation of believers, associated by covenant in the faith of fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by His law and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only proper officers or bishops, are pastors, and deacons, whose qualifications and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.
- Art. 10 We believe that Christian baptism is immersion in water, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that believers are the proper subjects:
- Art. 11. We believe the Lord's Supper is of perpetual obligation, by which the members of the Church, in the form of bread and wine, are to commenorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self examination.
- Art. 12. We believe in open and free communion, and the churches of our body are authorized through the pastors to invite all Unristians of orthodox churches who are in good standing in their respective churches, to commune with us at the Lord's table.
- Art. 13. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and the general judgment; that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal, upon the principles of grace and justice.

HULES OF DECORUM.

Article 1. The Associa ion shall be called to order by the Moderator who presided at the last session. Former Clerk shall also officiate until the body is fully organized.

- Art. 2. The Association shall be opened and closed with singing and prayer.
 - Art. 3. The Moderator and Clerk shall be, chosen by

ballot at each session of the Association. A majority of the votes of the delegates present elects.

- Art. 4. The names of delegates from the different churches shall be enrolled and called as often as necessary during the session
- Art. 5. A majority of delegates shall rule in all cases, except in the reception of churches, and then it shall be unanimous.
- Art. 6. The Moderator shall not be entitled to vote except in case of a tie, and then he shall give the deciding vote. He shall be entitled to speak on any question after others have spoken, provided he appoint some one to the chair while he is speaking.
- Art. 7. Only one person shall speak at the same time and he shall rise to his feet and address the Voder tor. and after recognition by the Modator, proceed.
- Art. 8. No brother shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject under discussion, or use words of personal reflection.
- Art. 9. No person shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, nor more than fifteen minutes at a time.
- Art. 10 No member shall laugh or talk during the time the debates are going on.
- Art. 11. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.

CONSTITUTION.

- Vernon Freewill Baptist Association of Alabama, and being comp sed o ministers and delegates from the different churches forming the same, each church being entitled to three delegates.
 - Art 2. This body shall be considered an advisory council, but having no authority over the affairs of the churches, unless they depart from the articles of faith of the association. In case any church depart from the articles

of faith and supports doctrines of heresy, or allows any minister of her body to teach doctrine not in keeping with our articles of faith, the same shall be dealt with by the association as it may see proper according to the teachings of the Bible.

- Att. 3. Each church of this association shall be considered an advisory body and shall control its own internal affairs in matters of discipline, etc., though the association shall rule n matters doctrine and general interest, though the church may in extreme cases call in aid from sister churches.
- interest shall be settled by a two-third vote of the association, and the decision shall be final:
- Art. 5. The officers of the association be a Moderotor, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at each session by a majority vote.
- Art (1 The association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by previous annual session, and shall not adjourn finally, until all the business is transacted.
- Art. 7. Churches wishing to become members of this association must adopt our Articles of Faith and conform to its asages.
- Art. 8. We agree as churches of this association to use our best influence to promote the interests of all moral and benevolent institutions, such as the Temperance cause, Sabbath Schools a Missionary work, etc.
- Art 9. No member of this association shall be eligible to the office of Moderator more than two successive sessions unless no other member be competent to act in that capacity.
