PROCEEDINGS

Friday Merning October 16, 1959

The seventy-first annual session of the West Florida Liberty Free Will Baptist Association opened with congregational singing directed by Rev. D. W. Poole with Mrs. Frank Willis at the piano. Rev. Rufus Hyman led in the opening prayer.

The devotional thoughts were given by Rev. Owen, who read Matthew 5:13-16. The welcome address was made by the pastor of the host church Rev. D.W. Poole. The response was given by Rev. Wayne Hicks.

The Moderator then called for church letter to be handed in to the Clerk. All churches in the Association presented letters at first call.

The Program for this session was read, and a motion was made to receive the Program with the proper ammendments.

Rev. Freeman Edwards and Rev. H. D. Harrison read the church letter. After which a motion was made and carried to accept the letters and seat the delegates.

Visiting ministers and delegates were recognized and welcomed. Rev. C. A. Huckaby announced that Rev. and Mr. Walker, missionaries to Washington, D. C. would be in our section around the first of November.

After a short recess, the assembly was led in singing by Rev. Leon Owens, and prayer was offered by Rev. Madison Taylor. The morning message was delivered by Rev. Leo Curtis, who read from the Scripture Matthew 22:1-14. The Body was then dismissed for lunch with prayer by Rev. John Edwards.

Friday' Afternoon

The opening hymns for the afternoon were led by Rev. J. M. Rich, and prayer was offered by Rev. Henery Chestnut. The devotion was presentd by Rev. Ralph Bell. He read Matthew 17:14-21.

The Moderator then called for reports of committees. Liberty Church gave its report on auxiliaries which was adopted. Abigail gave its report as the Temperance Committee. The report was adopted.

The Committee on Stewardship was given by Chipley Church, and the report was adopted. The Committee on Nominations made a report at this time. A motion was made to adopt the report. A motion was carried to return report to the Committee for completion.

A motion was made and carried to put all district auxiliary convention minutes in the minutes of the Association so that dates will not conflict.

The Credentials Committee made a reoprt, and a motion was carried to receive this as a partial report. The Treasurer made his annual report, which was accepted by a Move and Second. The Committee on Divine Service made a rport which was adopted.

Friday Evening Mission Service

After congregational singing and prayer, a lively testimony service was led by Rev. A. B. Cook.

The report of the Mission Board was read and accepted by the attending body.

Another Hymn was sung by the congregation after which Rev. John Edwards of Dothan, Alabama brought an inspiring messge on Prov. 23:10.

The Moderator then renewed the call for church letter. Visitors who had come in for the day were welcomed.

The Finance Committee report was called for by the Moderator. A Motion was made to adopt the report. A motion was offered to amend the report to place the undersigned \$2 in the Cooperative Fund. Motion was carried. The Resolutions Committee gave a report which was adopted. The report of the Committee on Education was adopted. The Obituary report was given and adopted. Rev. Walter Eldridge was asked to lead in prayer as a memorial to those named in this report.

The Moderator appointed a Committee to make up the report to the Florida State Association from our District. Named: Rev. Hicks, Rev. Poole, and Rev. Owens.

Motion made that Bill George and Leon Owens work with the Personal Service Chairman of the District Woman's Auxiliary Convention to gather and carry goods to the Children's Home this year.

MISSION BOARD REPORT

If you will compare the financial report with last year's report you will see that we had an increase of about \$200 in missions receipts for this year. We feel that every church should be giving a minimum of 10 per cent of their fund to get out the Gospel. Some of the churches increased their giving while others gave nothing. Even though this Association has been convening for eighteen years, we are still far behind in sending out the Light at home and in foreign lands.

You will notice that cash offerings for the Missions Conference were much lower than the previous year. The Mission Board added \$100 to the offerings which made a total of \$311.47 in cash offerings. Monthly pledges made during the mission Conference to be paid within a year amounted to \$938.00. Have you kept up your pledge? This was the fourth Missions Conference sponsored by the district Auxiliary and Mission Board and many felt that it was certainly one of the best.

In cooperation with the district auxiliary we have invited the Calverys who will be home from Japan soon and Mrs. Eunice Edwards to be our speakers for the next Mission Conference. The dates are January 19-26. Mark those dates on your calendar.

Following is a report of the activities of your Board of Missions as far as your secretary-treasurer, Pro tem was able to ascertain from records given to him by the regular secretary-treasurer upon his departure from the area. The Board of Missions sponsored teams consisting of members of the Board and Officers of the Liberty Association to personally visit the various associations of the state and promote the cause of Missions in each of those associations. The Board of Missions sponsored and paid expenses of Miss Linda Pippin to the National Free Will Baptist League Conference in Fort Smith Arkansas. The Board of Missions was Co-sponsor with the Liberty District Woman's Auxiliary in the annual missions Conference and auxiliary training course in the Liberty Association.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. Name. This Association shall be known as the WEST FLORIDA LIBERTY FREE WILL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE II. Composition. This Association shall be composed of such regularly organized and well-disciplined Free Will Baptist Churches conveniently located, as may embody themselves under this constitution.

ARTICLE III. Representation. The Conference of this Association shall consist of delegates from the several Churches of which it is composed, each Church being entitled to two (2) delegates for the first twenty-five (25) members or fraction thereof, and one (1) delegate for each subsequent twenty-five (25) members or fraction thereof.

Section 2. All ordained ministers and deacons who are in good standing with the Association shall be standing delegates.

ARTICLE IV. Officers, Boards and Committees. The officers of this Association shall be a Clerk-Treasurer, Moderator, and Vice-Moderator, who shall be chosen at every session of the Association, with assistants as may be deemed necessary.

Section 2. The Standing Committees of this Association shall be: Executive, Finance, Obituary, Temperance, Stewardhip, Auxiliaries, Resolutions, and Nominations. Other committees shall be appointed as the need may arise. The Executive Committee shall be composed of seven members of which the Moderator of the Association who shall be Chairman of the Committee, and Clerk shall be standing members. The other five members shall be elected for two year terms as follows: two one year and three the next year.

Section 3. The Board of Missions consisting of three (3) members shall be elected as follows: one member shall be elected each year.

ARTICLE V. Membership. Any well-organized and well-regulated Free Will Baptist Church which conforms to the practices, and adopts the doctrines of the Free Will Baptist denominations, as published in the treatise of their faith, and in the Minutes of the National Association, and is in favor of all the benevolent enterprises of the denomination, may at any time, on application, by vote of this body, become a member thereof.

Section 2. Churches from other Associations wishing to become members of this Association must present a letter of recommendation from the Association of which they were previously a member.

ARTICLE VI. Meetings. The sessions of this Association shall be held on Friday and Saturday before the third Sunday in October at which time it shall be the duty of the churches of which this Association is composed to represent themselves by letter and delegates, and report their standing, prospects, and statistics. At this time the Association shall act upon such questions and topics as may be referred to it by its respective Quarterly Meeting or Churches, and transact such other business not repugnant to this Constitution, nor to the practices of the denomination, as in its judgement may promote the cause of Christ and the interest of the Churches within the limits of this Association.

Section 2. This Association shall sponsor a Quarterly Meeting to be held on Saturday before the first-third Sunday in each Quarter whose representation shall be the same as that of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. Finances. The general expense of the Association shall be provided by each Church according to its ability. The Moderator

and Clerk shall receive twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) each per year, and the remainder of the money shall be used for Minutes, postage and any other expense that may occur.

Section 2. Each Church shall send at least 10% of its income to the Treasurer of the Quarterly Meetings and the Association for the Different phases of the denominational work.

ARTICLE VIII. Discipline. This Association shall have power to discipline the Churches of which it is composed, and to exclude them for disorderly walk, if the labor proves unsuccessful, but in no case to reverse their decisions, nor to interfere with any of their internal regulations.

ARTICLE IX. By-Laws. This Association shall have power to adopt any regulation or by-laws, not inconsistent with this Constitution, which may be deemed essential to the further regulations of its sessions.

ARTICLE X. Amendments. This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of the Association at any regular session, notice of such intended alteration having been given in writing, and recorded at the next previous session.

ASSOCIATION DECORUM

- 1. This Association shall be called to order by the Moderator elected at the last session if present. If absent, by the Vice-Moderator, or someone elected by the body.
- 2. The Moderator shall see that order is preserved and submit all actions to the body. He shall have the same right of speech as any other member, but appoint some other brother as chairman while speaking. He shall not have the right to vote unless it be in the case of a tie, then he may cast the deciding vote.
- 3. The Vice-Moderator shall assume the duties, rights and privileges of the Moderator in his absence.
- 4. The delegates shall be enrolled by the clerk as they are seated in the body. The roll shall be called each morning, and all not answering to their names marked absent.
- 5. No delegate or minister shall be allowed to absent himself from the body during any session without permission from the Moderator.
- 6. All business shall be brought before the body by move and second and shall be disposed of according to ROBERTS' RULES OF ORDER. No person shall be allowed to speak more than three times on the same subject, and not more than ten minutes each time without a move and second from the body.
- 7. Only one person shall be allowed to speak at a time and he must rise to his feet and address the Moderator. No person shall be disturbed while speaking so long as he keeps to the point in debate, except by the Moderator, and then only to call him to order. The speaker must not use abusive language or personal reflections upon anyone.
- 8. Each minister shall make a report of how many churches he is serving, if any, and what each church has paid him for his services.
- 9. No minister shall be considered in good standing that officiates in the rites of matrimony where either party has been divorced except it be for fornication.
- 10. No minister or deacon shall be considered in good standing with this body that has more than one living wife, drinks intoxicating beverages or fails to pay or make proper satisfaction of his just and honest debts.

- 11. All ministers serving churches shall preach at least one sermon a year on doctrine and rules of holy living.
- 12. Any minister belonging to this body who has an appointment or is serving churches who fails to meet the appointed hours, shall be due acknowledgements to the congregation or church.
- 13. No minister shall preach in our churchs that cannot bring a clear record from his home church.
- 14. Any minister who will voluntarily step aside shall immediately turn his credenitals over to the Executive Committee of the Association.
- 15. No church shall be recognized in this body who does not commune and wash feet at least twice a year and who does not have conference quarterly. The pastor's salary, number of conferences and the number of communion and feet washing services shall be contained in the associational letter.
- 16. No church shall be considered in this body that holds fellowship with a minister or deacon that does not conform to Article 10 of this Decorum.

CHURCH DECORUM

- 1. The church may choose a pastor annually at the last conference in associational year; or if they prefer, it may choose a pastor for an indefinite length of time to continue from year to year, as long as they may deem it proper to keep up the connection.
- 2. When it becomes necessary, a pastor may be chosen at any given time, but if the choice be made at a special conference, the time for the conference must be appointed by the church in conference at least thirty (30) days in advance.
- 3. When a pastor wishes to resign a church he shall give the church a sixty (60) day notice; or when the church wishes to call a pastor it shall give the present pastor a sixty (60) day notice.
- 4. The pastor shall be Moderator of the church, but when the Moderator is absent or does not sit, a suitable brother shall be appointed in his place.
- 5. There shall be two or more deacons in the church whose duty it shall be to superintend the collection and distribution of all contributions, and to assist the pastor in administration of the Lord's Supper and washing the Saints' Feet.
- 6. The deaons shall take notice of such members as refuse or neglect to partake of the Lord's Supper and endeavor to ascertain the cause that the same may be laid before the church in conference if necessary
- 7. Some suitable member shall be appointed clerk and it shall be his duty to do all the recording and writing pertaining to the business of the church and to preserve a file of the Minutes of the Association.
- 8. When a clerk is appointed all of the books, Minutes, etc., belonging to the clerk shall be delivered to him by his predecessor.
- 9. Some suitable member shall be elected treasurer whose duty shall be to distribute all funds as directed by the church.
- 10. It shall be the rule of the church to attend to the administration of the Lord's Supper and washing of the Saints' Feet as often as the church sees fit. Members not in good standing should not commune, but the administration should not be deferred on account of any orderly matter of dealing.
 - 11. Conferences shall be opened and conducted as follows (1) Prayer

unless divine service has just been concluded, and generally then, (2) Invite visiting brethren to seats, (3) Open the door for reception of members, (4) Call for absentees, (5) Call for acknowledgement, (6) for reference of deferred business, (7) for matters of dealing which are in order to come before the church, and (8) for miscellaneous business.

- 12. It shall be the duty of every church member, male or female, to attend each coference meeting, if they can, for on that day the pastor is expected to instruct the church in a certain manner by giving plain and pointed lessons on doctrine, discipline, and rules of holy living.
- 13. Any male member who shall fail to attend three successive conferences and any member who may be generally remiss in attending meetings of the church shall be cited to appear in conference and answer for his conduct; but the church may exempt members from this if necessary.
- 14. When the Moderator calls for absentees the clerk shall inform the church what male members have been absent from three successive conferences, and the Moderator shall appoint some brethren to cite each of them to the next conference.
- 15. A vote shall not be taken upon a question without a move and second and on all important questions the vote shall be taken by rising to the feet.
- 16. Visiting brethren called in as help from sister churches shall be allowed to speak and make motions or seconds, but not allowed to vote.
- 17. No main motion shall be made while a move and second is before the conference.
- 18. It shall be considered disorderly for any member to absent himself from conference when an important question is to be decided; but a member, upon request, may be exempted by the church from voting on either side in peculiar cases.
- 19. No member shall leave the house during conferences without a sufficient cause, nor engage in conversation or whispering without being subject to be called to order by the Moderator.
- 20. All discussions in conference must be conducted with calmness and good feeling. Those who speak must rise to their feet, and keep to the point in debate.
- 21. No one shall speak more than three times on the same subject without permission from the Moderator, nor shall the remarks of any-one be unreasonably long.
- 22. When the Moderator speaks he must nominate some brother as Moderator to act in his stead.
- 23. No one shall be interrupted while speaking unless it be necessary to call him to order.
- 24. No member shall be expelled unless he has been cited verbally or in writing to attend his trial provided his residence be known to the church.
- 25. Expelled members may be restored to fellowship on their petition if their walk since expulsion has convinced the church that they have sincerely repented for their former evil.
- 26. When a witness, not a member of the church, is introduced he shall not be examined until the question has been put to the church: "Will you hear the testimony of the witness?"
- 27. The evidence in every case of dealing and acknowledgement shall be recorded in the church.
 - 28. Members dismissed from the church by letter who become dis-

orderly or continue to hold their letter without good reason shall be cited to the conference to answer for their conduct.

29. Any ordinary member of the Baptist Church who does not hold this church in fellowship may be received into the church without a letter when it is made apparent that his Christian character is irreproachable and that he has applied for a letter and could not obtain it because he desires to join this of some sister church. All other persons must join by letter, baptism, statement, or restoration.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. THE BIBLE. The Scripture of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD. There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Righteous Governor of the universe; and in the Scriptures as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all inteligent creatures are supremely to love, adore, and obey.
- 3. CHRIST, Christ is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The Mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified, and is our ever present Saviour and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT. The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD. God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of men requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN. Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity therefore, inherit a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability sin, and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST. The Son of God by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death and restoration effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. THE TERMS OF SALVATION. The conditions of salvation are:
 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty reunciation of it.
 2 Faith or the unreserved commital of one's self to Christ as Savior and Lord with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION. God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF THE WILL. The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE. God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all and whosover will may come and take of the water of life freely.
- 12. PERSERVATION. All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have promise of eternal salvation.

- 13. GOSPEL ORDINANCES. Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be ministered to all ture believers.
- 14. TITHING. God commanded tithes and offerings in the old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." (1 Cor. 16:2).
- 15. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH. The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employment and amusements, for rest, worship, holy work and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 16. RESURRECTION, JUDGEMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION. The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the ressurrection of damnation; then the wicked will "go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."
