Bob Shockey To Direct Pass The Torch Drive

Bob Shockey, the college's campus pastor and Christian Service Director, has been asked to direct the \$3-million Pass The Torch campaign for the college, according to President Charles A. Thigpen. The board of trustees tapped Rev. Shockey for the job at its semi-annual meeting in December.

The board considered his wide acquaintance with Free Will Baptists and his enthusiastic representation of the college when they named him to the post.

In other actions, the board added Jonathan Thigpen to teach full time in the area of Christian Education. Rev. Thigpen has been a part-time teacher for two years while he worked with Randall House Publications as editorial supervisor. He will also assume Rev. Shockey's position as Christian Service Director for the remainder of this school vear.

The trustees also employed Rev. James Earl Raper, a member of the board from Greeneville, TN, to do part-time promotion for the college. Rev. Raper, former director of the Tennessee Free Will Baptist Home for Children, is president of the Alumni Association. He will continue to serve as a trustee since his duties are part time.

Bob Shockey, the new director of the Pass The Torch campaign, (see related article) challenged the college family to 100% involvement—Everyone can do something. Every student who brought back money was given a six-color FWBBC iron-on patch. Those who brought back \$500 or more were given special awards. Enthusiasm ran high on

campus, especially on tally day, Jan. 7, as everyone watched the soaring total demolish the \$45,000-goal. Mr. Shockey said, "I think people responded because of the great love they have for the

memory of Paul Ketteman. It is tremendous that they have honored him in this way." Mr. Ketteman's favorite drive each year was the Christmas Project. He began it in 1976, when it raised \$5,500, and watched it eventually bring in over

\$470,000 during the 11 years he conducted it. The project has been permanently named The Paul Ketteman Memorial Christmas Fund Drive. Mr. Shockey added, "I appreciate every pastor, parent and friend of our students and teachers, who helped with a gift or a checkbook. I am also grateful for the many people who

sent a special gift in Paul's memory."

College Enrolls 349 For 1987-88 School Year

The college's 1987-88 enrollment was 349, of which 329 were undergraduate students from 25 states and two foreign countries, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar.

Of these, about one third are preparing either to preach or to serve on the mission field. There were 80 ministerial students and 29 missions students in the undergraduate student body.

By states, the most came from Tennessee (74). Other leading states were North Carolina (36), Michigan (20), Missouri (20), Alabama (18), Arkansas (18), Illinois (17), South Carolina (17), Kentucky (16), and Georgia (15).

One unique feature this year was the nearly even split between men and women—168 men, 161 women.

By classes, there were 57 seniors, 67 juniors, 80 sophomores, 102 freshmen, and 23 special students in the student body. Single students outnumbered married ones, 228 to 101.

Every student is a trust, and the college is honored to have these outstanding young people to comprise its 1987-88 student body. New students enroll for spring semester.

Crowds filled the college auditorium and overflowed into the adjoining lounge for Bible Conference, Mar. 8-12.

No one seemed disappointed in the messages preached by Dr. John Whitcomb, Rev. Larry Powell, Rev. Billy Hanna and Dr. Stanley Outlaw.

Dr. Whitcomb's messages reinforced confidence in God's Word as he demonstrated in six messages that the Bible is consistent with science and totally accurate. He also caused us to marvel at God's power and wisdom demonstrated in creation.

Rev. Powell demonstrated a firm grasp of the Bible and preached it powerfully. In his message on The Fiery Furnace from Daniel, he said, "If you aren't in a furnace and you have never been in a furnace, get ready. If you are a child of God, you have one coming!" Rev. Hanna's messages on the theme of loyalty were timely and highly praised. He spoke on loyalty to the Cause, the Church, the Creed and the Cross.

Dr. Outlaw's approach to the Churches of Asia in Revelation was unique. In three messages he grouped the seven churches according to those whose problem was doctrinal (Pergamus, Thyatira), those whose problem was a lack of spiritual fervor (Ephesus, Sardis, Laodicea), and those whom Christ commended (Smyrna, Philadelphia).

The music was special, as always, featuring the choir, Rejoice! ensemble, and many soloists, both vocal and instrumental. Even the congregational singing was especially good.

FWBBC Undergoes **10-Year Re-evaluation**

Free Will Baptist Bible College has been accredited for 30 years by the American Association of Bible Colleges (AABC). Every 10 years, it must be re-evaluated by AABC in order to continue its accreditation. That reevaluation has just been completed, and the administration feels that you will want to know the outcome.

This re-evaluation is done in two stages: the college does an intensive study of itself and a team of educators is assigned by AABC to examine the college.

FWBBC's self-study took 18 months to complete and involved every full-time teacher and administrator, as well as many on the staff. The final report was about 200 pages long. Surveys were sent to former students to evaluate how they feel about their training at the Bible College. Separate committees studied the college's objectives, faculty, campus, enrollment, finances, etc. for this report.

On February 24-26, a team of five Chrisadjugators from other Bible colleges

visited the campus for an on-site inspection. They had already scrutinized the college's own self-study, so they were well prepared to dig out the details and put together a comprehensive picture of FWBBC.

Although the final decision on the reevaluation will not be made until the Accrediting Commission meets in October, the evaluation committee indicated their findings to the administration before leaving the campus. President Charles Thigpen says, "The team members made a number of very positive statements about the college, students, faculty and staff."

One area they particularly praised was campus morale. An evaluator told Dr. Thigpen that he would like to "bundle up" the school spirit he found at FWBBC and take it back to his school!

One of the Bible College's objectives has always been excellence in all areas. Its accreditation by AABC and the periodic reevaluation are part of the ongoing effort to keep the standards high.

Christmas Project Exceeds \$178,500

This year's Christmas Project, honoring the late Rev. Paul J. Ketteman, totaled a record \$178,568.86 in gifts and commitments, according to Rev. Bob Shockey, Student Support Director.

Actual cash gifts as of mid-March were over \$141,000. The goal for the total drive was \$100.000.

Students and FWBBC employees raised \$91,134.29, doubling the \$45,000-goal they had set. Seventy five-49 students and 26 teachers/staff workers-raised \$500 or more in the drive.

Gifts to the college since December have been extremely good, according to Tom Sass, Treasurer. In spite of this, the college could finish the year with an \$85,000-deficit, unless giving is especially high between now and May 31, the end of the fiscal year.

Students Adopt Project To Repaint Gymnasium

The student voted in January to underwrite the cost of repainting the gymnasium, and completed the project in late March, just in time for spring Welcome Days, according to Dean Jones, Student Body President.

They raised and spent nearly \$1,000 on the project, he said.

The repainting included the inside of the gym and the lobby. It also included painting the college torch logo on two walls in the gym and adding "FWBBC Flames" over the bleachers. The actual work was done by two students who, with several commercial painters, submitted bids for the job. Their work was termed "excellent" when they finished.

Jones says, "The redesigning of the gym added a special new dimension to the campus and was a great motivation to our new intercollegiate basketball team, the Flames."

Recently Added Courses Enhance Pastoral Training

Several course additions/changes are making the college's pastoral training program even more effective.

New for this semester is a course in Pulpit Speech, taught by Joseph Jones, chairman of the English-Speech Department. Some 20 ministerial students signed up for the new course, designed to build their communication skills. Mr. Jones says, "Several in the class have told me that they are getting a lot out of it."

Other recent additions to the program are courses in Pastoral Counseling and Church Growth/Development.

The course in Pastoral Administration has been increased by 50 percent—from four to six hours—to equip pastors to deal with the more complex structure of today's churches.



About 30 from the college-teachers, students and friends-went to Georgia for services Mar. 26-27. They had several decisions and raised over \$6,500 for the college, with many churches' offerings yet to be reported, according to Ronald Creech, who organized the trip.

College Ends Year "In The Black"

A sharp increase in the number of donors and gifts enabled the college to close the 1987-88 school year in the black, defying early predictions that the year-end deficit could be as high as \$170,000, according to Tom Sass, Treasurer.

Gifts during the last six months of the 1987-88 fiscal year were 25% higher than for the same period in 1986-87. The number of donors also increased by more than 530

Mr. Sass says, "Gifts during the last half of the fiscal year have, indeed, been miraculous." The surge began in December, with a record response to the Paul Ketteman Memorial Christmas Drive. This campaign eventually reached \$178,500. December gifts set a new school record. January and the other early months of 1988 were also very good. "In fact," Sass continues, "the college has not experienced a low month through May, which ended at over \$78,400. The overall volume of gifts from our people has been on an upswing."

The college has done its part to operate in the black by keeping spending within bounds.

First, only the bare essentials have been purchased, especially during the final months of the school year. Spending, especially in May, was significantly lower than usual.



Second, work loads have been increased for the faculty and staff to keep from adding more people to the payroll.

Third, major purchases have been postponed. For instance, three of the vehicles the college uses daily have over 100,000 miles and need to be replaced. New furniture and equipment

are needed in several areas on campus, but will not be purchased until income is sufficient.

Deepest thanks to every church, pastor and individual whose prayers and support made it possible for the college to close the year in the blackby less than \$1,000!

Basketball Program Continues On Trial Basis

Many friends have inquired about the future of intercollegiate basketball at FWBBC. The questions may reflect uncertainty about the effect of the decision of the National Association this past summer, prohibiting the team from wearing regulation uniforms.

Perhaps a brief review is in order. During the past school year (1987-88) the college tried out a season of intercollegiate basketball, competing—both at home and away—against several other small, Bible-based colleges similar to ours, located in our part of the country. Because that year was regarded as a test, with no commitment to a continuing program, the team did not purchase regulation uniforms, using jerseys and sweat pants.

After observing the trial games and judging the program good, the FWBBC faculty voted last spring to recommend to the college board that a continuing program be approved, one that would include the use of regulation uniforms. At its annual meeting in May, the board voted to adopt this recommendation. Consequently, a season of games for the current year (1988-89) was scheduled with these schools.

Following the decision made at the National Asso-

ciation, we contacted all the colleges on our schedule of games. All of them, with good attitudes, have agreed to play the games scheduled even though our team will not be wearing regulation uniforms, and several of them indicated some reluctance about scheduling games in the future. In view of this, we have decided to go ahead with the current schedule (on page two). As the season progresses we will continue to evaluate the program, including the pros and cons of competing without regulation uniforms, to see whether it will be helpful and practical to continue to participate in intercollegiate basketball.

All of this will be done in a spirit of cooperation with the decision of the National Association. FWBBC recognizes its answerability to the National Association as its sponsor and governing body. The college has no hesitation about maintaining its commitment to serve the denomination in the ways the denomination requires.

Flames coach Byron Deel began tryouts for the team during the week of October 3. Most of last year's team is expected back and is looking forward to another year of competition.

College's Accreditation Extended For 10 Years

FWBBC, after a long, exhausting selfstudy, and a thorough inspection by the American Association of Bible Colleges (AABC), has received a 10year extention on its accreditation, according to President Thigpen. All colleges belonging to AABC must be re-examined every 10 years.

The re-examination covers every facet of the college—its objectives, programs of study, faculty qualifications, campus facilities, financial support, library, etc. The process takes a year to 18 months to complete.

In October, Dr. Thigpen, Dr. Picirilli, and Dr. Hampton met with the AABC Accrediting Commission in St. Louis. The commission conveyed its approval of FWBBC and extended the college's accreditation.

Students Adopt Project For Missions Institutes

FWBBC students have adopted a \$10,000-project to buy books for Free Will Baptist institutes on five mission fields, according to Gene Richards, president of Foreign Missions Fellowship on campus. "The libraries in our sister schools on the mission fields are often smaller than that of the average pastor," he said. "We feel a responsibility to help them."

If the goal is reached, each library will receive \$2,000 with which to buy new books.

Last year's project, to raise \$7,500 to help build a church in St. Nazaire, France, was completed successfully. Missionary Tom McCullough thanked the students in chapel and presented them with a picture of the new church signed by its members. He said, "Since we finished our new building, we have had 55 new visitors—more than in the previous 10 years." He added that three new families are attending regularly.



On General Education Tests

s the general education program at a Bible college sound? Everybody knows that Bible colleges do a good job teaching Bible and theology, and giving training for Christian ministries. But how about general education—courses like English, social studies, the arts, literature and such?

Administrators at FWBBC (with two other Bible colleges) decided to check this out by using nationally standardized tests. The tests used were those administered by the American College Testing program (ACT) called COMP (for College Outcomes Measurement Project). When given to seniors, they provide an evaluation of the general education courses taken by students at a particular institution.

And thus 26 of our bachelor's degree candidates spent several hours last year in a battery of these tests. All of us held our breath while we awaited, for several weeks, the results.

But when the report was in, we breathed easy. In fact, we rejoiced! In summary: the average scores of our seniors were approximately the same as the average scores of 40,625 seniors at 123 colleges/universities across the United States.

The tests yield scores in six categories. On three of these, FWBBC seniors scored at or above the national average, and on the other three only slightly below. And the list of 123 schools in the comparison group is impressive, including mostly state universities and private liberal arts universities and colleges.

Needless to say, we are very pleased that a small Bible college like ours compares favorably with the prestigious universities in our land.

In fact, the results were even better than that! The ACT people can also measure the *progress* made by students during their college years. They do this by using the basic ACT scores of the students before they started college. Consequently, we were especially pleased when people at ACT reported to us that *our seniors had made greater progress in these areas of general education than students in all but five of 112 four-year institutions in a study they have made.*

And that isn't all. The report also compared us to a selected group of five Christian liberal arts colleges. Our seniors' average was higher than theirs in every one of the six categories of general education, by five or more percentile points.

By the way, these results were not only true for the seniors at FWBBC, but also for those at the other two Bible colleges in the project. Who says "Bible college" education is inferior? We have the evidence to prove it isn't!

Students Buy Hymnals For FWBBC Auditorium

The student body, led by President Eddie Moody, recently gave the college 250 copies of the new Free Will Baptist hymnal, *Rejoice*.

Students, college employees and friends raised \$2,200 for the project. Moody said, "Because of the hard work and sacrifice of our students and faculty this year, many students, both present and future, will be able to share in the blessings of our new hymnal."

The formal presentation was made in chapel November 18. FWBBC President Charles Thigpen thanked Mr. Moody and those whose sacrifice made the gift possible. "I am very pleased that the students chose to make this gift," he said. "We will enjoy using these books for many years to come."

Rodney Whaley, chairman of the FWBBC Music Department and a member of the committee that compiled the new hymnal, described the work that went into its production. He then led the college family in singing a number of the hymns from the new hymnal.

President Charles Thigpen called the conference "truly outstanding."
