S. superintendents, fathers, mothers, grandfathers, grandmothers, church members, are playing cards, some dancing, going to shows, going everywhere the old devil wants them to go, but the true child of God does not go to these places, because the footsteps of Jesus do not lead to evil. Feet Washing an Ordinance By Elder Walter E. George

"Peter saith unto Him, Thou shalt never wash my feet" (John 13:8).

To the Gem Family:

Here I come again. I will first say that I am still on the Lord's side: He is not on my side, but I am on His side.

I am some stronger than I was, but my condition is no better. I am requesting the Lord's people to pray a special prayer for me, that I might get well and go into the fields for God. Read Jas. 5:16 If I had gone to the evangelistic fields I, no doubt, would have been strong.

Now back to the text. Next month is our month to take the Lord's Supper and to wash the saints' feet: I want to write a few lines about it. Brethren of the Free Will Baptist, did you know we are losing ground? This may not sound good, but it is the truth and one reason is that so many members of the Free Will Baptist churches have said the same thing that Peter said, or about the same; and some whole churches wont wash feet, I mean Free Will Baptist churches. Now Jesus said to Peter, "If I wash thee not, thou hast so part with me" (John 13:8. I am sure that lots of folks who claim to be Christians will have no part with the Lord, because they wont wash feet.

You may watch the revival meetings and see the number who claim to be converted and see how they drop off in number as the daily walk comes and God's word is preached. For example: A meeting is held and 25 converted. About 15 of them will join the church and about 12 will be baptized, about 10 will take the Lord's Supper, and about 5 will wash the saints' feet. Now in general that is about the way it runs, and I say. that the thing is wrong somewhere, for God does a perfect work. So the wrong is sin, I will

say, "for he that knoweth to do good and doeth it not, to him it is sin" (James 4:17). And I know that part or most of the sin is in the preachers, and the rest is in the people. Did you know that we have lots of preachers in number, but when it comes to qualify, we haven't near so many that God is pleased with? Read 1 Tim. 3:1-8

Now Jesus said, "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world" (Matt. 28:20). That means feet washing too, and if we fail to teach them that and to observe to do that, we need not ask Jesus to be with us. Alway, for He has not promised to be with us unless we teach and practice all things. "If ye know these things: happy are ye if ye do them" (John 13:17).

You know that feet washing is a test of fellowship. This may be new to you. If it is, pray and study God's word before you condemn me. Note that Jesus is our example in everything and He tested the fellowship of Peter in the washing of his feet. Any one that will take the stand against feet washing, and will not do it, he or she has no part with Jesus. Here is another thing; if two members fall out with each other, you know if the pastor with the deacons, would take the wash pan and a towel to them and make them wash one another's feet or get out of the church, we would not have so much trouble, and that would be a Bible ground to discipline, without having to run all over the country trying to get it fixed up, and never get it done from the heart. Feet washing is to teach humility, but some will say, "I can have that without washing feet." Jesus said He had given an example, we should do as He has done. So if you can show your humility to the brethren and to the world without washing the saints' feet, you are not following Jesus, for Jesus said, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men" (Matt. 4:19). You know I find that so many folks want to have their own way about things and would stand up and argue with Christ, if He were here on earth. Some will say, when you hem them up, that they believe in feet washing, but they will not do it. "Faith without

works is dead" (James 2:18). You may believe in feet washing, but unless you do it, your faith is dead, no good. I am not calling any names, but I know a preacher who was preaching at a Free Will Baptist church and it came to the day for the Lord's Supper and feet washing. They did not believe in it, and would not do it. but the preacher preached it and finally got one man and one woman, with the preacher and his wife, making four to wash feet. They washed feet, but the preach-. er didn't get to go back any more; and that preacher did what the Lord said for him to do. The trouble was, that some other preachers had let the church backslide from feet washing because they didn't want to observe it. I have said, and still say, I would not conduct a service and stop when I got to feet washing; and if the churches don't want it preached, they had better not call me, for it is God's word, and that is what we have to go by, and not what people see, hear, or think. Let us do today the things that we would like to be doing when Jesus comes. Feet washing is a Gospel ordinance. Paul said in 1 Cor. 11:1-2, "Be ye followers of me even as I also am of Christ. Now I praise you, brethren, that ye remember me in all things and keep the ordinances as I delivered them to you." "And if any hunger, let him eat at home; that ye come not together unto condemnation. And the rest will I set in order when I come" (1 Cor. 11:34) Here is another thing and I will Feet washing is not to wash the dirt off, nor to cleanse them like some think. I have been in feet washing when I was ashamed of the dirty feet, and I am sure that Christ was too. Children of God ought to clean up on the outside as well as on the inside, and we would not be scorned at by the world so much. Some will argue that because they wore sandals and their feet were dirty, and on long trips they would wash feet. There is no Bible for that. In Old Bible times they washed their own feet and the first record in the Bible is where two angels came down to Sodom and Lot got water for them to wash their feet, I would not by any means say that the angel's feet were dirty,

But I could not believe that if any one was as sorry for his sins as I was, and wanted to be a Christian, that the Lord would not forgive if I would ask Him.

And along came Satan. Seeing that I was getting the light on what to do, he said to me: "If you go to the altar, what will your friends say? Wouldn't they laugh and say that you couldn't live the Christian life? You had better wait and get somewhere where you are not known; you couldn't stop your drinking and other pleasures, besides you are too young to give up your fun; wait until you get older." and a number of other excuses came into my mind. "And it was the sabbath day when Jesus made the clay and opened his eyes" (verse 14). "Therefore said some of the Pharisees, This man is not of God, because he keepeth not the sabbath day. Others said, How can a man that is a sinner do such miracles? And there was a division among them" (v. 16). Notice that they were speaking of miracles. "Then again called they the man that was blind and said unto him, Give God the praise: we know that this man is a sinner" (verse 24). "He answered and said, Whether he be a sinner or no, I know not: one thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see" (verse 25).

The reason I am giving these Scriptures is to prove that they were trying to prove that Jesus was a sinner, because He had opened the blind man's eyes on the sabbath. Now any one that has read the Bible knows that the Pharisees were always finding fault with Jesus. "Now we know that God heareth not sinners" (verse 31). The Pharisees were speaking again and were the ones that accused Jesus of being a sinner. The blind man himself said in verse 25, "Whether he be a sinner or no, I know not." If they didn't know whether Jesus was a sinner or not, how could they know whether God would hear and answer a sinner's prayer? Now I don't believe that God would answer a sinner's prayer if he was praying for anything except his own soul. Praying for his own soul and praying for a miracle are different. Now we have read what the blind man and the Pharisees said about sinners praying, we will read what Jesus said in Matt. 7:7-11-"Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you; for every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened. Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask for bread, will he give him a stone? Or if he ask a fish, will he give him a serpent? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask Him?"

"For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the Scripture saith, Whosoever believeth in him shall not be ashamed. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek; for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon him" (Rom. 10:10-12).

Dear sinners, don't misunderstand; if you are sorry for the way you are living and are convicted of your sins, know that you are lost and are willing to give up your sinful ways, believe with all your heart that the Lord wil do what He says He will do, and hear that knock at your heart's door, then the Lord is ready to save you.

"Behold, I stand at the door and knock, if any man hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to him and will sup with him, and he with me" (Rev. 3:20)

"While it is said, Today; if ye hear his voice, harden not your hearts, as in the provieation" (Hebrews 3:15).

Dear sinners, how many times have you heard that knock or feeling, telling you that you ought to give your life to Christ? Putting off salvation, how shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation?

You may think you are having too good a time to give up some of your friends, or some other lust, but where are they leading you "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Let me tell you as a follower of both roads, There has been more real joy in my life since I gave my life to Christ than there was in all my There is real joy in past life. living for the Lord, "Whom having not seen, ye love; in whom, though now ye see him not, yet believing, ye rejoice with joy un-. speakable and full of glory" (1 Peter 1:8).

It is not God's will that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance. So we have our choice; Christ invites us all into His fold, and promises us everlasting life; and if we go to the other place, we are going where we are not invited, and to everlasting punishment.

Dear souls, I realize that I can not write as others can. This being my first attempt, I ask you to bear with me. I hope these words may lodge in some soul's heart and cause them to turn to God.

Christian people, please pray for me, that I may hold out faithful and ever be found doing the will of my precious Savior.

THE LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF CHRIST

By Mrs. May H. Clutter, Wichita, Ks.

"And for this cause He is the mediator of a new covenant, that a death having taken place for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first covenant, they that were called may receive the promise of the eternal inheritance. For where a testament is, there must of necessity be the death of him that made it. For a testament is of force where there hath been a death: for it doth never avail while he that made it liveth" (Hebrews 9:15-17).

How wonderful is the love of the Heavenly Father in the pains He has taken to teach man his relation to God, his fellowmen, and the world. He took infinite pains in creating man, and in redeeming him; and He has taken infinite pains in instructing him. He has given him a revelation which is like a fountain at which he may quench his thirst; a table at which he may feast and live, and sit in blessed fellowship; a marriage relation in which he is united to Christ to bring forth fruit unto God; a lake of redemption in which he may wash and be clean; a citizenship in a kingdom of peace and joy and righteousness in which he must acknowledge the King and submit to His laws. This revelation is also represented as covenants, as testaments or wills as is shown in the text quoted from Hebrews.

Testament or Will

The will has always been recognized among all peoples as an instrument to provide a means by which a person could transmit to his heirs the title of the property which he has accumulated during

a lifetime. All free people have this right, and we cannot deny the Heavenly Father the right to do the same. Wills are made because of the generous impulses of the will-makers, and it cannot be different with God.

There are certain qualifications which the will-maker must have. He must be of proper age; of sound mind; must have witnesses to his will; and must have something to give. Also, according to law and custom he may make any number of wills during his lifetime, but only the last one made is in force after his death. He may make his last will many years before his death, willing to his son a farm, to his daughter a house in town and an equal amount of money to each. He may will some of his wealth to missions and benevolences. But as long as he is alive he may do as he pleases with his possessions, giving gifts to his children and others.

Should the father fear the children might dispose of their property and squander the money he might place conditions in the will which would prevent them doing so. They would then abide by those conditions or lose their estate. There would be no redress for them.

God's First Will

In wills the names of those who are to inherit are named. In Ex., 19:3 we have a clear illustration of who are named in God's firstwill. Israel is addressed, and none other, as the inheritors. Deut. 5: 1-3 makes this fact still clearer. It was a covenant made with those who were present at Sinai on that day, and was to be in force until abrogated by another and better. The promise was there, but Israel could not receive its fulfillment, for the reason that when the Maker of the will had died, it was found that the first had been abrogated by a later one.

God's Second Will

In His great love for mankind God sent His Son into the world to reveal His will which should set aside the old one. The will was made, Christ died on the cross and after His resurrection and ascention to the Father, His will was opened and probated.

But before Jesus died He had the right to do as He wished with what He had to give. To the

A SERMON

Text, Gal. 5:5, 6-"For we through

the Spirit wait for the lope of rightcourness by faith . . Faith which worketh by love."

palsied man He said, "Son, be of good cheer, thy sins are forgiven thee." To the sinful woman He said, "Thy faith hath saved thee, go in peace." To the thief on the cross, "Today thou shalt be with me in Paradise.":

We cannot take these incidents as precedents for a claim to more than the will allows us as heirs. They were special gifts given by One who had the right to give them, and only to those who were named as recipients. After the death of the will-maker the heirs must conform to the conditions of the will or lose their share of the The will of Christ was probated on the day of Pentecost and the heirs were named, together with the conditions of heirship. The witnesses were produced and the will was stamped and sealed by the presence of the Holy Spirit in the rushing, mighty wind, and tongues of flame. By the Holy Spirit the witnesses became the executers of the will, "And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance." The inheritors are announced to be, not Israel alone, but all nations; all who through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and obedience to His will are adopted into the family of God. On the Day of Pentecost lost sinners, hearing the message of the will were brought to a belief that Jesus is the Son of God, and were told to repent and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of their sins and they should receive the gift of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2: 38).

Jesus had all the necessary qual- -From the DEFENDER

ifications of a will-maker. He was of sound mind, proper age, had twelve trained witnesses, and had rich gifts to give. The personal gifts He wills to all who will accept the conditions are remission of sins, the gift of the Holy Spirit, and adoption into the family of God. "To as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the children of God, even to them that believe on His name: who are born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God" (John 1:12, 13).

The unbeliever is told that he must believe on the Lord Jesus Christ in order to be saved (Acts 16:31). The believer is told to repent and be baptized (Acts 2:38. Thus the sinner is led through the conditions of the will until he can lay claim to the promises it has made, the remission of sins, and the possession of the Holy Spirit. But the will goes even farther than that, and promises eternal life. This is the real estate of the Father, and is the strongest incentive to purity of heart and activity of life. These blessings. strength and guidance and comfort, and all the blessings that flow through trusting hearts are in this will for believers.

And what of it all? Paul tells us in the eighth chapter of Romans, "The Spirit himself beareth witness' with our spirit that we are children of God: and if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint heirs with Christ, if so be that we suffer with Him that we may be also glorified with Him." Being children we are heirs. The old will of God to the Jews is no longer binding, for through Christ all who will accept Him as Savior are adopted into the Family of God. Not upon flesh and blood does our salvation depend, but upon faith and obedience through which we are born into His family Any one, Jew or Gentile, may become a child of God through Christ. In this new relationship to God the life is changed, and the things we once loved we now hate, for we can look upon the things of this world through the eyes of God. With Him in the heart a new world opens to our gaze; new affections; new sympathies; new hopes that human hearts never had until He came.

My mind wanders back to almost sixty years ago when my father moved from the State of Illinois to Wright Co., Missouri. He bought a little home about three-quarters of a mile from the Coldwater school house, which was boxed out of oak lumber, and the house was used also for a church house. Some of the neighbors told my father that there would be preaching there and would be glad for him to come When the day came, he said, "Get ready, we will go to church today, hurry up, let us be on time." So father led the way over the little path that started from our back door, over a rail fence, and up the hill we went, single file, all wondering what it would be like. And the more we went, the more we wanted to go; for, "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." Father, when it was dark, carried the lantern and went in front, the rest following him. He and his family are all gone to the glory land, only the writer is left here for a short time, but this path is fresh in my mind this morning.

Now, after several years had passed by, and I had got moved and had a little family of my own, my husband bought us a little home on Elk creek, at a distance of six miles, and at this time there was no school in this district, but in a short time they built a new school house, with the understanding that it should be used for church too. This school house was about three-quarters of a mile from our house and the brush about as thick as they could grow. So when we heard that the house was completed and school was to begin on a certain day, Jim came through the yard with his ax on his shoulder one day and said, "I am going to cut and blaze out a path up the hill for the children

to hinder the Church of God from carrying out its mission as set forth by Christ's "Go ye therefore and teach all nations?" Ah, my brethren! when we fell at the foot of the cross and through that faith in Christ which worketh by love we were relieved of our burden of sins, did we not take upon ourselves the loyal duty of following the royal Banner of Christ? His Word we did profess to be Therefore, through the truth. the faith which worketh by love. we arose as one resurrected from the dead, to walk in newness of life. We hear Him saying, "By their fruits ye shall know them." Can we say we have faith in Him when, by our works, we deny Him? Can we declare that we know of His saving grace and at the same time be abominable and disobedient, and unto every good work discreet? The prophet Ezekiel says, "Come, I pray you and hear what is the word that cometh forth from the Lord, for such cometh unto thee as the people cometh, and they sit before thee as my people: and they hear thy words, but they will not do them; for with their mouth they shew much love, but their heart goeth after much covetousness."

We need more of that faith which worketh by love. We learn from Paul that the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned. Again we read that "pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless, and widows in their afflictions, and to keep himself unspotted from the world" (Jas. 1:27). "But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead?" (Jas. 2:20). We have learned from nature that if a little twig of a tree fails to perform its function in its relation to the body of the tree it soon withers away and is cast off. According to the Scriptures, this will happen unto each and every Christian who fails to be obedient unto the commandments of Christ our Lord. Therefore having gifts differing according to the grace that is given unto us, should we not be faithful in the use therof?

"Who then is that faithful and wise servant, whom his lord shall make ruler over his household, to give them their portion of meat in due season? Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing. Of a truth I say unto you, that he will make him ruler over all that he hath." It is our duty as stewards to help support our Lordship or Gospel. Our Lord demands that we give as we are able according as the blessing of the Lord our God has given unto us. Paul said, "If there be first a willing mind our gifts will be accepted according to that a man hath, and not according to that he hath not." What lord is more righteous than our Lord? When then, should we make settlements with Him? Read 1 Cor. 16:1, 2; 1 Peter 4:8-11.

Brethren, it being an established fact that we are to support the church in the spread of the gospel and the care of the poor and the needy; should we not help the organized church in the function of its duties? The Free Will Baptist church is a part of this great body of Christ. We have a mission organization within this church, whose duty it is to carry on all home mission work. This mission organization was allowed by our associtions, because it was set up by the apostles, as brought out in a previous article published in the Gem last May, and it has been a vital part of the Church of God since those days. The doors stand ajar for the spread of the Gospel; shall we go ahead with the work of the church? The success of the mission will depend upon our loyalty to the command of Christ our Lord.

Let each church pray for more light upon this phase of the work of God's kingdom, and may each preacher and deacon put their shoulder to the wheel and help to enlighten the Christians as to the duties they should perform in the kingdom of our God. Help us to encourage our people to make their offerings according to the scriptural plan. "Prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, and see if I will not open to you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen. Branch, Arkansas.

MINISTRATION OF ANGELS

PREACHING "AT" PEOPLE From The Church Herald

We preachers are addicted to some bad habits. Some of us have the very bad habit of preaching AT people when we should be preaching TO them. I suppose any preacher knows the difference in the meaning of the two little prepositions, to and at, so I shall not explain.

Preaching AT people is cowardly. No preacher has any right to get up behind the sacred desk, and make personal insinuations, and then call himself brave. He is about as brave as a boy who once hid behind a stone wall and threw green persimons at me as I passed by. I did not have a fair chance at the boy. That stone wall stood right in my way. The boy could not call himself brave so long as the stone wall protected him. The pulpit is not the place to pour out condemnation on an individual. Pulpit utterances are supposed to be applicable to the people as a group, and not to an individual. Brave preacher who has a personal feeling against a member and hasn't therewith backbone enough to go to him face to face like a man and tell him his fault, but throws about himself the cloak of ministerial authority and berates him from the pulpit! The fellow thus abused is helpless. He cannot defend himself. He cannot explain matters, for no self-respecting man would openly resent the message from God's desk.

I heard a country school teacher once bemean a young man. The young man was guilty of some misdemeanor, and the teacher took advantage of this fact to tell him what he thought of him and

his family. He told the young man that he was mean and low-bred and ignorant, and never would amount to anything. The young man took it, for to resist it was against the authority of the school. The teacher said he (the teacher) was brave. I thought he was cowardly. I think the same thing about a preacher who gets up and gives an individual a public brow-beating when everybody knows what he means. Let him go to the offender privately as the Bible enjoins.

Preaching at people, like praying at people, is hypocritical. I have heard people pray at each I think God hears such prayers, but He never answers them. He records them, but not to the credit of him who prays them. To get on one's knees and say in the palm of one's hand, about a brother, that which one is afraid to say to the brother's face. is pure hypocrisy. Likewise to climb into the pulpit and pretend to say to the face of the crowd what is meant to be said to the face of the individual is hypocrisy.

Preaching at people never benefits him who preaches or him who is preached at. A member of the congregation may have done a wrong, but the old saying that "two wrongs do not make a right" is true in this case. There is an element in human nature that resents being thrust at in public and thus made to come before the conspicuous gaze of the crowd. Personal faults are never eliminated in this way.

Preaching at people is discourtcous. It is beneath the dignity of the sacred office of a pastor. No preacher can put into practice the Golden Rule and preach at people. No preacher would enjoy a private admonition administered publicly, so let him do unto his brother as he would be-done by.

Preaching at people is sure to bring trouble. I never yet have known the preacher who was addicted to this very bad habit and persisted in it who did not have trouble. He soon loses the respect of the people and they turn away from him. His usefulness is hindered and his troubles augmented.
