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World Government and World Events

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end" (Isaiah 9:6, 7).

Government! His shoulder! Peace! Increase! No end! Marvelous prophecy!

It has never yet been completely fulfilled. The Child has been born. The Son has been given. He has lived, taught, wrought, died, was buried, arose, ascended, "whom the heaven must receive until the times of the restitution of all things, which God hath spoken by the mouth of all his holy prophets since the world began."

He sitteth at the right hand of God the Father to make intercession for us who come unto God by Him. The heaven has received Him, but only until the "times of the restitution of all things."

Then will be fulfilled that part of the prophecy that says: "The government shall be upon his shoulder, and of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even forever and ever."

That the Lord Jesus Christ is coming, in person, back to this earth is a doctrine about which there can be no question among those who accept the Bible as final authority. It is in all creeds, and hymns of hope, and is universally admitted by all orthodox Christians.

Yet how few embrace it as a reality. How few are looking, longing, with burning hearts, for His coming. We are mostly lukewarm, if not indifferent, to the teaching, the exhortations, the warnings of Scripture relative to His personal return.

We may not deny it, but we do not feel it. It does not possess us. It is not a moving force within us. Yet we know of no other part of God's Word that contains a greater incentive to holy living, and evangelistic activity than that large part which is connected with the return of our Lord and His reign upon this earth.

To ignore His coming is to suffer spiritual loss. It is to deprive ourselves of the benefit of a very large part of the Scriptures. It will conceal from us that which God has revealed.

In some of its phases it may be a difficult theme. There are some things we cannot know now. There are "times and seasons" that the Father has placed in His own hands. He has not seen fit to reveal them to us. We make no claim of understanding the "secret things that belong to the Lord our God."

It is only that which is revealed that belongs "unto us and to our children forever" (Deut. 29:20). We do not always hit the exact interpretation. But we can know the fact and the general outline of His coming. That much has been revealed. It is our duty to know it.

"We have not followed cunningly devised fables," said Peter, "when we made known unto you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." As certainly as the Word of God is true, as surely as the throne of God is steadfast, as the feet of the Son of God once pressed this earth, even so certainly shall the same Jesus return again

to this very world. May the Holy Spirit warm hearts and enlighten our minds as we study some things that are connected with His coming.

"The government shall be upon His shoulder." This world is coming rapidly nearer to the time when the present order of things will be broken up and pass away. The most shallow thinker realizes that humanity has fallen upon startling and critical times.

The stream of earthly affairs has overflowed its banks, and is spreading out in every direction, in a wild disordered, ungovernable, and overwhelming volume. Human society is assuming a chaotic aspect. Old systems, and modes of thought and belief, which have stood for ages, are reeling to their final fall.

Men's hearts are failing them for fear, and for anxious expectation of the things that are coming on the earth. The disintegration of governments, that have stood for centuries, cause dismay in the minds of earth's wisest statesmen. Human resources are failing, and no one knows the way out of the perplexing situation.

The day is dark, the shadows are lengthening, and the night is coming on. There is no help in man. The arm of flesh fails. The wisdom of the wise is foolishness. The understanding of the prudent is brought to nought. Dark indeed is the outlook for the man who knows not God.

Light shines from the eternal hills of God. David said, "I will lift up mine eyes to the hills, from cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth."

If men would only look to God and to His infallible Word, they would see light in His light. His plan is clearly written there. There is a light that shineth in a dark place.

The Apostle Peter says it is the "word of prophecy," and he declares it is "sure." It can be depended upon. The best formed plans of men fail, but God's plan will never fail. All He has said will come to pass. "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my word shall not pass away."

God has seen fit to give us a picture of world government as it covers the period of Gentile Times. This picture is seen in the great image of Nebuchadnezzar's dream. We find it in the second chapter of Daniel.

There are four great world empires during the Times of the Gentiles, no more, no less. Read the description of the image recorded in Daniel 2. The head of gold represents Babylon. Arms and breasts of silver represent

Medo-Persia. Thighs and belly of brass is the Grecian kingdom. Legs of iron is the Roman Empire. The toes of iron and clay represent, not a separate world power, but the revived Roman Empire in the latter times. (*Now being revived.*)

As the King looked upon the image of his dream, he saw "a stone was cut out without hands, which smote the image upon his feet, that were of iron and clay, and brake them in pieces. And the stone that smote the image became a great mountain and filled the whole earth."

In the seventh chapter of Daniel we have the record of a vision that God gave to Daniel, portraying the same world empires, yet in a somewhat different way. In Nebuchadnezzar's dream there was the gigantic image of a man. In Daniel's vision, there were wild beasts.

This suggests to us man's estimate and God's estimate of human government. Man thinks of human government as great, excellent, and mighty. God likens it unto wild beasts, ravenous beasts that rend and destroy.

Now these four beasts of Daniel's vision, the lion, the bear, the leopard, and the dreadful fourth beast, each represents one of the world empires in the same order as the parts of the body of the King's image.

Daniel beheld all that Nebuchadnezzar had seen, but he saw something that the King did not see in his dream. Nebuchadnezzar saw ten toes, and Daniel saw ten horns. And in the midst of the ten horns Daniel saw an eleventh horn. This horn had eyes like the eyes of a man, and a mouth speaking great things.

Daniel saw something else that Nebuchadnezzar did not see. He said: "I saw in the night visions; and, behold, one like the Son of man came with the clouds of heaven, and came to the Ancient of days, and they brought him near before him. And there was given him dominion, and glory, and a kingdom, that all people, nations, and languages should serve him: his dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away, and his kingdom that shall not be destroyed."

Here we have the beginning, the course, and the ending of the government of the Times of the Gentiles. It will be followed by the millennial kingdom of the Lord Jesus Christ who shall rule as King of kings, and Lord of lords on the throne of David.

Five centuries before Jesus came as the Babe of Bethlehem God revealed

to Daniel the political aspects of the Times of the Gentiles from beginning to end. We are nearing the end of those Times. The Babylonian, the Medo-Persian, the Grecian, and the Roman kingdoms have passed away. All that remains is the revival of the Roman Empire with its ten confederated kings, and the Antichrist, making a total of eleven.

The course of the government of man has been along the line of deterioration. It begins with gold and ends with iron and clay. Today we are in the iron and clay period. The clay is becoming more prominent.

Humanity is restless, agitated, and roaring like the billows of the troubled sea. Even a well-founded democracy like the United States begins to tremble. Dictators are arising. The nations are being prepared for the coming of the super Dictator, the Antichrist.

The ten-kingdom empire will arise. We know not when. We set no dates. That it will come, is sure. That the Antichrist will assume control is certain.

May we be accounted worthy to escape the terrors of those days, for there shall be great tribulation such as never has been in the past, nor ever shall be in the future.

What shall be the end of these things? Is there to be an end to human government as we know it? What has God revealed about this? Again we turn to the dream of Nebuchadnezzar, and to the vision of Daniel.

When the Roman Empire is revived, and ten kings, or kingdoms are included in it, then, in the days of the Antichrist, suddenly not gradually, a stone falls. It is cut out of the mountain without hands.

This smiting stone strikes the great image that represents human government, on the feet, and the image breaks in pieces. It is important to bear in mind that the stone strikes the image, not on the head of gold, nor breast of silver, nor thighs of brass, nor legs of iron, *but on the feet*, with their toes of mixed iron and clay. "And in the days of these kings," (the days of the ten-kingdom empire) "shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom which shall never be destroyed: and the kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever" (Dan. 2:44). The falling stone represents the return of Christ when His government will replace human gov-

 BEER LICENSE**

Representatives from two Baptist churches in the northeast section of the city today appeared before County Judge Jerome Fischer to protest granting of a beer license to Sim Brown, former chief of detectives under the Bowles administration, and M. D. Glidwell.

The hearing was passed until nine a. m. Tuesday, when the protestants asked that a representative from the county attorney's office appear for them.

Brown and Glidwell applied for a beer license under the name of "Big Jack's Bar" at 1029 N. Utica Ave. This is in the vicinity of the North Trenton Baptist church and the Free Will Baptist church. Nearly 50 church members were present to voice their opposition.

This is one of the few cases where protests have been voiced before a beer license was issued.

Judge Fischer refused an application for a beer license to reopen the M. and M. bar at 205 W. Archer St., which he closed last week by revoking the beer license of Tom Miller. A former barkeeper, named Dooley, who testified on behalf of Miller at the hearing last week, asked Judge Fischer to issue him a beer license for the place, but Judge Fischer had already announced that he would not permit the reopening of that particular bar.

August 11, 1936

Heeding the protests of some 75 residents of the North Utica avenue area, County Judge Jerome Fischer today denied a beer license application made by Sim Brown, former chief

of detectives, and M. D. Glidwell.

The two men applied for a license for "Big Jack's Bar" at 1029 North Utica Ave.

The courtroom was packed with men, women and children from that vicinity, who protested against the license.

Rev. Melvin Bingham, pastor of the Free Will Baptist church at 833 N. Utica Ave., and Rev. J. E. Outlaw, pastor of the North Trenton Baptist church, led the protests. Frank Hickman, attorney, represented the protestants who, in a majority, were members of the two churches.

Reverend Outlaw said that his church was three and a half blocks away from the proposed beer parlor, while the other church was a block and a half. He pointed out that there is an unusually large number of children in that area.

"These people who are here this morning represent the biggest business in the world—that of raising families," said Reverend Outlaw.

Walter Griffin, 907 N. Utica Ave., postal clerk, father of five children, told the court that "we're trying to make a decent neighborhood and want to protect our children."

Mrs. C. C. Wilson, 1024 N. Utica Ave., just across the street from the protested tavern, explained that the children play baseball on vacant lots which surround the tavern site and that she and other mothers oppose the idea of a beer parlor being so near the children's recreation spot.

Brown protested to the court that "The case has been misrepresented." He said that there is no residence within 350 feet of the property on the south and none on the north for 500 feet and that the entire block is vacant east of the property, and with vacant lots directly west.

Brown cross-examined Sam Jones, who lives across the street from the property owned by Brown.

"Didn't you have some hard feeling toward me when I sued your mother for \$468?" asked Brown. Jones said he did not.

"Didn't you appreciate it when I marked that judgment paid?" continued Brown. "Yes, I did," said Jones.

"Yes, this is the way you appreciate it," said Brown.

Brown insisted that he could "keep the place clean" if permitted to open.

Hickman suggested that "we have too many beer parlors in resident areas now."

There is no appeal from the county judge's ruling denying the application.

A SERMON

POTTAGE TO EAT

By Eld. Wm. Reeves

I want to write briefly on the subject that is on my heart this morning. I am thinking of food, spiritual food, which is so much needed. I am thinking of the abundant supply there is in the store house of God.

I wish to call your attention to 2 Kings 4:38-41, where Elisha, a servant of God, a messenger to his people, a prophet of God, looked upon the sons of the prophets in Gilgal, and saw that they were hungry..

Now Elisha was a servant who loved his people, and had a desire to help them, as God had showed him. God also loved His people, just as He has proved to us that He loves us today, by His Son which He gave, by His Spirit of peace and love that comes into our lives.

Elisha said to his servants (v. 38), "Go into the fields and gather herbs for pottage, that they may eat." Elisha was a prophet crying to a rebellious people to repent of their sins. This messenger had servants or helpers, which in our day would be a body of workers or believers, a church; we have plenty of Israelites in the world today, but only a few crying prophets. Oh, may God help us to become messengers with tears for the lost.

We see the pastor as he looks upon the Israelites or sons of the prophets. We have multitudes of prophets and sons today, as there was in that day, that are not servants of God. Elisha had compassion on them, loved them, as a true minister loves the souls of all men.

He (the pastor) says to the servants or church, "Branch out into the fields and gather food, that all may eat." The question then is asked, "How can a church branch out into the fields and gather food?" How true it is that a church cannot gather herbs of the world and have spiritual food! But we can gather herbs for food by obeying the word that is taught of God—See Luke 13:24; 2 Tim. 2:16; 1 Tim. 4:12; 1 Thess. 5:17; St. John 15:12, and many other Scriptures. God expects the simple things to confound the wise. The world

today is hungry for love, food for the soul, that is so near, yet untouched.

We see the servants as they go out to work, we also see that the Devil goes too. While these are working, the best they can, we see others (as Bro. Davis said in the last Gem), the careless Christians, are in the field too. We see so many things today that are enticing, that we sometimes want to see and understand more about. The servant found a wild gourd vine that looked good, a "no harm" gourd can scarcely be told from the good herb by looking at it.

The servants return with the herbs, the church has been gathering food, pottage is made ready to feed the hungry (revival starts). I want to refer to the report in last month's Gem of the church at Tulsa, Okla., where Bro. Bingham is pastor; they surely have been out gathering food for the hungry, souls have been fed, the church has power.

Going back to our story. As the pottage was being passed out, just as the Gospel is being preached to the filling of hungry souls, the wild gourd begins to take effect, and they begin to cry, "There is poison in the pot!" The thing that looked so good is now bringing death; people are perishing, being deceived by idolaters. I asked a young man why he didn't give his life to God; and he answered, "Tell me what to believe. I go to this one and he tells me his way is right and all others are wrong. I go to others and they say the same thing, and they all differ." Brethren, I have been made to believe that this carelessness has barred the progress of the church. Theories, ideas and customs have caused people to lose confidence in the church.

But Elisha knew the cure. He didn't go through a great big maneuver or great miraculous motions or words to prove the power of God was with him, but he did the simple thing. He said to his servant, "Bring me some meal." He could have cried out to God and God could have healed them. The servant brought the meal to Elisha and he put it into the pot, then said, "Dish out and eat." So they ate of it, and it was good.

Now brethren, if Elisha had performed some great emotional action, as the sounding of a trumpet, Israel would have been stirred and Elisha would have been honored.

Now, when everything looks bad, dark and dangerous, the simplest thing will do the work—let us all pray.

Now, may I ask you this question,

How can we get the church to pray? Remember us in prayer.

A SERMON

Theme: "Spiritual Power."

"But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth" Acts 1:8.

What is meant by spiritual power? Not personal magnetism, eloquence, learning, not human attainment., but a divine gift, the possession of the Spirit of power. The Greek word for power means dynamic.

The evidence of the need of spiritual power—When we begin to look around us today, we can see the need of spiritual power. First, the sad condition of the churches. Where there is spiritual power in the church, there must first be harmony with God, unity among members, victory over sin, testimony for Christ, influence for Christ going out from the church every day. Can we say our church doesn't need this spiritual power?

How we get spiritual power—We must earnestly desire it, put away sin, uncover the golden wedge, take the hide off of some of the old moss back church members who have been in the church until they think nobody else has any right there, who wont get in and enjoy salvation, nor let any one else in. Enthroned Christ again in the church, let Him be the center of your attraction, instead of other things which have crept in and taken His place.

Obey the Spirit—"Quench not the Spirit." The same God who said, "Thou shalt not steal," said also, "Quench not the Spirit."

The result of having spiritual power—We shall have victory over sin. If you have some trouble in your church, which I am made to believe you have, all I have ever been in have trouble, start you a revival and fast and pray until you get spiritual power and you will begin to get results right away. Trouble just wont stay where there is spiritual power. Then your church will have boldness in testimony. You wont have to say, "Who will be next to testify?" for everybody will want to testify.

Your church will also become influential for Christ, and people can see the Christ in the church and want to come in and be with you

The Cry of Latin America, "We Would See Jesus."

In going forth adventuring for Christ in a new field, we stake all on the thesis that Christ is the only adequate remedy for a sick world. The task confronting the true ambassador of Christ is to truly represent Him in a land where He is sadly misrepresented. I have had occasions to observe many times on the upper slopes of the Andes this misrepresentation, observations, that to tell here, there might be many in this enlightened land that would doubt, they are almost unbelievable, they are so dark. I have seen and listened the night through to the weird wail of the Indian flute, hour after hour the monotonous jiggling music. Day in and day out, night in and night out, the celebration continues till the gutters are lined with drunken Indians. The liquor they are filled with having been sold for the glory of God and the honor of the saints. They have a Christ of a sort in the temple, but to be appreciated, the "Christ" must be seen. An image of carved wood, usually life size, almost naked, bloody, bruised, repulsive, hanging on a cross, this is the only Christ most of them know. These poor ignorant people prefer the pleasant and comely Mary and the well dressed saints. The Virgin Mary is given a beautiful face, dressed in rich robes and decorated with costly jewels; she is the center of attraction, the object of worship; but Christ is another matter, a bruised and broken spectacle to move one to grief and crushing despair, so ghastly, hideous, repulsive are the characters of the Savior of a sick world. I have seen perspiring men staggering down the street under the ton weight of a platform bearing a gilded virgin, a load heavy enough to overload a truck, these folk were doing "Church work."

I rode into a village in the Marañon valley in company with three other missionaries just as darkness had fallen, and on hearing the most terrific screaming and yelling, we reined our mounts under the shadow of a high wall and looked upon a blood curdling scene, an unorganized mob of natives dressed in grotesque masks with burning torches in their hands in the midst of a religious celebration, all in the name of Christianity.

I would not desire to be unduly harsh and critical of a religious mo-

tive, but I have observed in this country a dear old Catholic woman with shoulders stooped with hard work and hands knotted with hardship kneeling at early morning mass when millions of so called Protestant Christians were too lazy to get up for the preaching service at eleven o'clock—shame, shame, shame! We say they are in error, if so, are we guiltless? But the Catholics of the United States would be appalled at the scenes of ignorance and superstition and idolatry in the land of a DEAD CHRIST.

There are those over there who are awakening. I have a dear friend in Ecuador, David Clark, a missionary. He told me last year of one dear man whom he had been enabled to lead to Christ, an official, one of the class that has rejected the sham I have described. This man, a devout and humble Christian, was promoted to a governmental position, did he compromise, as some of our own people do? No, he purchased a hundred Bibles and wrote a beautiful tribute to the Book that meant so much to him and presented one to every employee under him. Shortly after his promotion he was approached by an editor who offered him a substantial bribe. Immediately, with indignation, the editor was escorted to the door over his protests and threats. The Catholic who really finds Christ excels us in devotion; he, as a usual thing, is by far more reverent than our own people.

Bishop Miller of the Methodist Episcopal church relates the following illustration of a wonderful class that needs to be reached in South America, and are not being reached so rapidly:

"An intellectual leader of South America was telling his experience in the course of a lecture before a group of men. He was related to no church and frankly knew very little about Protestant churches of any sort. He was the author of a book on the social applications of Christianity, a work based on first principles and personal observations, rather than on research or the comparative findings of other scholars. How he himself had come to personal relations with the Christ of whom he spoke.

"Of institutional Christianity he

had had more than enough in the superstitions and intellectual blight that he had known from childhood. Masses, incense, images, prescribed beliefs, prohibited thinking. Thinking for one's self had brought him no satisfaction of mind nor heart. But steadily he began to push out his way against the barriers of intolerance and reaction, and to find an inner assurance that it was safe to disregard the inflexible prescriptions and reach out after God in his own way. Slowly he began to find a way that led to clearer light.

"With all this there was a haunting sense of something ahead not yet attained, that drew him steadily onward. Rest for the mind he sought in a new philosophy of life of God and man and the universe. Faith began to be, not an iron band about the imprisoned mind, but a glorious adventure, a seeking after God. Here at last was life and hope with something not far away that would yet answer his questions and give rest to his heart. So matters went on till there came a day before Easter, and during the night that followed, he found himself one of a throng in a Greek church, witnessing the stately ceremonies that precede the resurrection day. Chants, processions, prayers, shadows, and pageantry wore away the hours, none of it meaning very much to the visitor. About three o'clock in the morning, the lights burst forth, the black curtains and robes fell away, and in one great chant of triumph, choir and multitude broke forth in the shout of victory, "Christ is risen, Christ is risen!" It was dramatic in the extreme, but it was not the light nor the color nor the drama that suddenly struck thru the soul of this earnest seeker. It was something deeper and more sublime, a sudden sense that Christ had risen in himself, that Christ is living, actual, Divine Presence was with and in him; the resurrection had taken place in his own heart and then and there this man knew for himself that he had come to accept as a reasoned dogma, "Christ is risen in me."

This man had, in his gropings, seen Christ Jesus, and there are many thousands like him, who are saying to us as we go, "Sirs, we would see Jesus," as did those early seekers in quest of the Christ.

Sanctification

There are many "contrasts" recorded in the Bible, for example: God and the Devil; Life and Death; Righteousness and Sin; Christ and Antichrist. But the great doctrine of Sanctification is within itself, a double; that is, it is an act accomplished by man himself—"Sanctify yourselves therefore, and be ye holy; for I am the Lord your God" (Lev. 20:7; Lev. 11:44; 1 Sam. 16:5), and it is an act accomplished by God—"May the very God of peace sanctify you wholly" (1 Thess. 5:23).

In studying a complete concordance in connection with a Greek and Hebrew Lexicon, we find that in every text in the Old Testament embracing the verb "sanctify" in its varied tenses and its noun forms, "sanctification, sanctuary, sanction, etc." are translated from the Hebrew word *quadash* (Kaw dash') which is a primitive root, "to be clean." Causatively, to make clean, to pronounce clean, or to observe as clean, ceremonially and morally: also to consecrate, dedicate, hallow, be holy and keep holy, purify, and sanctify.

Some of the Hebrew derivatives are *quodesh* (Ko'desh) which means a sacred place or thing, holy, saint, sanctuary. *quadash* (Kaw dashe') means a sacred person, devotee. In the New Testament, every text related to the doctrine of sanctification is translated from the Greek word *Agios* (Hag' ee os) which means sacred. Physically it means pure, morally it means blameless or religious, ceremonially it means consecrated, also most holy, and saint. The Greek derivative, *Agiazō* (hag ee ad'zo) means to make holy; ceremonially, to purify or consecrate; mentally, to venerate, be holy, sanctify.

Agiasmos (hag ee as mos')—the state of purification, holiness, sanctification.

Agion (hag'ee on)—a sacred thing, holiest of all.

The English definition for sanctify is to make sacred or holy, set apart to sacred use, purify and exalt as by God's grace, free from sin or evil, make the means of holiness. Huge volumes may be written upon this subject and yet one word may be employed to tell the whole story. That word is *Holiness*—and the Bible states that without holiness no man shall see the Lord (Heb. 12:14).

In studying the meanings of the

words pertaining to sanctification in three different languages, it may be well to note that neither of the conditions of the definitions of sanctification can be attained until there is a cleansing from sin.

"Draw nigh to God and he will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands ye sinners; and purify your hearts ye double minded" (James 4:8).

By the strict analysis we have concerning the word, it may be well said that the great doctrine of sanctification begins with the regeneration of the soul in the new birth, but to say that sanctification is at its fullness at regeneration is to contend in error, for the truth of the matter is that, when regeneration has been accomplished, sanctification has merely begun. Jesus said, "Come unto me and I will give you rest." This is a gift of life in the conversion of the soul. Then He said, "Take my yoke upon you . . . and you shall find rest unto your souls" (Matt. 11:28, 29). This soul-rest is found in a consecration for service by putting the yoke on. It is not obtained in conversion. Sanctification involves the deeper experiences in grace and a close walk with God. When we are regenerated, born again, the obstacles of a Christian life are not removed from our pathway; we receive forgiveness of sins, but the problems of overcoming the daily hindrances of a Christian life are met only in the deeper experience in grace, called sanctification. Sanctification is not a second work of grace, for it is a continuation of the first. It is not a definite work of grace only in the sphere of its definiteness in overcoming a specific obstacle, while every day of a man's life he needs this wisdom to choose between good and evil (1 Cor. 1:30), and the great significance of sanctification is involved in the Hebrew word *quadash*—"be holy and keep holy."

One side of the subject is that man must sanctify himself and make himself holy. "Sanctify yourselves and be ye holy." "Sanctify the Lord God in your hearts" (1 Peter 3:15).

Man is not qualified to do these things when he comes to God as a sinner to receive forgiveness of sin in regeneration, and he cannot sanctify the Lord God in his heart until regeneration is realized. When regen-

eration is realized, a Christian race is to be run and that race cannot be successfully run until we "lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us" (Heb. 12:1). These things are obstacles to a Christian life, and they must be laid aside, and it is man's part to lay them aside.

When a man has sanctified the Lord God in his heart, and has sanctified himself to God's service, then God sanctifies the man, and not merely God but each member of the Divine Trinity sanctifies man.

1. Sanctified by the Word of God and prayer (1 Tim. 4:5). To be thus sanctified means a lot. The Bible teaches the great doctrine of giving of our substance to the work of God (Rom. 12:13; 3 John 5:8; Gal. 6:10; 1 Cor. 16:13). Our Baptist people meet and sing of what wondrous things would come to pass if we all would do these things, then we go to our home church and have ice cream socials to "make money for God." Such inconsistent practices are undermining the truth of God and are far from being sanctified by God.

2. Sanctification by the blood of Christ. "Wherefore Jesus also, that he might sanctify the people with his own blood, suffered without the gate" (Heb. 13:12). "For if the blood of bulls and goats, and the ashes of an heifer sprinkling the unclean, sanctifieth to the purifying of the flesh; how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?" (Heb. 9:13, 14). In the blood of Christ is involved the cleansing element of the Atonement—it cleanses and keeps clean.

3. Being sanctified by the Holy Ghost (Rom. 15:16), the one who guides into all truth and testifies of Christ (John 16:13, 14).

Man must completely and unreservedly sanctify (yield) himself to God, then God sanctifies man to His service with an entire sanctification, involving the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Now what is there that is more complete and entire than this? Yet some theological Pop-guns continue to tell us that man must sin a little every day. But why was there a way of escape made for every temptation? No, my friend, atonement is not in vain! If you are sinning every day, you have not sanctified yourself, neither has God sanctified you. We recommend to you, therefore, sanctification—a close walk with God.

God's People Are A Peculiar People

the Lord your God."

"And I heard a great voice out of heaven, saying, Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God" (Rev. 21:3).

Verse 7—"He that overcometh shall inherit all things: and I will be his God, and he shall be my son.

Verse 8—"But the fearful, and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolaters, and all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone: which is the second death."

Oh God, help us to overcome evil with good, that we may inherit all things!

"For thou art an holy people unto the Lord thy God: the Lord thy God hath chosen thee to be a separate people unto himself, above every people that are upon the face of the earth. The Lord did not set his love upon you, nor choose you, because ye were more in number than any people: for ye were the fewest of all people: but because the Lord loved you, and because he would keep the oath which he had sworn unto your fathers, hath the Lord brought you out with a mighty hand, and redeemed you out of the house of bondage" (Deut. 7:6-8)

"And the Lord hath chosen thee to be a peculiar people unto himself" (Deut. 14:2).

"No doubt but ye are the people, and wisdom shall die with you" (Job 12:2).

"Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Savior Jesus Christ; who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works. These things speak, and exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no man despise thee" (Titus 2:13-15).

"But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth praises of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9).

"For he is our God; and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand. Today if you will hear his voice, harden not your heart" (Psa. 95:7).

So we find that the dear Lord ex-

pects us to be a peculiar people. I have studied about this word peculiar, and got the dictionary and found that it means "particular." So I could see at once that we as church members are not particular where we go, what we say, and what we do; but the Lord said, "My people are a peculiar (particular) people." If we are traveling the highway, we are particular to notice the signs and stay on the right side of the road, then when in a city, notice the flash light, stop-go, and we know to obey, or we will be in danger. So God has given us the ten commandments, sufficient for every need: "Remember the sabbath day to keep it holy," and ball games are kept up by a majority of church members; but Jesus said, "My sheep know my voice, and a stranger they will not follow." Because they are a particular people, they know His voice, they know He is God, and the only one who is able to save, and keep us saved.

Oh, dear people, let us be particular about the Book, the Holy Bible. If a lot of people would be peculiar about their reading, instead of reading those old magazines and novels, and read the Word of God, which tells you how to dress, "In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel" (1 Tim. 2:9).

"The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man, neither shall a man put on a woman's garment: for all that do so are abomination unto the Lord thy God" (Deut. 22:5). You see we need to be particular people, to please our Father in heaven. Look what Paul told Timothy about widows; he was particular.

And He is particular to tell us why: "Because strait is the gate and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life: and few there be that find it."

Book, the Holy Bible, which tells us everything needful to get to that mansion He is preparing for a peculiar people; it tells us how to build: Be very particular about the foundation, it must be on the Solid Rock, Christ Jesus, the only sure foundation. Some folks say you can't live a holy life, but He said, "Without holiness, no man shall see the Lord." No, you can't be holy as long as you buy tickets at this wide gate that leads to destruction, and "many there be which go in thereat."

Oh, church members, who having put your name on the church book, but left your heart in the world! I heard a truthful woman say that her daughter-in-law paid six dollars for a seat at a certain ball game. Poor thing, she perhaps has never heard about this strait gate and narrow way, which leads unto life, and few there be that find it.

Oh preacher, tell the world about this narrow way, and that Jesus has paid their fare, and how beautiful Heaven must be. God's Word teaches us that we must be a separate people; "Come out from among them." You'll sure have to swing out clear, not even touch the unclean thing; and God has said, "I will receive you."

I think just now of a song which my mother used to sing:

*"Broad is the road that leads to death,
And thousands walk together there;
But wisdom shows a narrow path,
With here and there a traveler."*

Dear Gem readers, pardon me for talking so long; and pray for us, that we may never leave this narrow path; because this old time religion, this peculiar people, the good Lord speaks about, will go sweeping through the gates into the city where we'll never grow old.

SCHOOL NEWS

of THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education of the National Association was in session on August 18, 1936, at Cofers Chapel church, Nashville, Tenn. The following members were present, namely: J. L. Welch; T. B. Mellette, J. W. Alford, and W. L. Moretz proxy for Melvin Bingham. Due to a heat stroke, which affected Rev. Bingham, he delegated to the chairman and the secretary of the Board the authority to appoint his proxy.

A hearing was given Mr. Edgar Grier secretary of the Weaverville, N. C. Chamber of Commerce, concerning the proposition of the Free Will Baptist becoming the owners of the Weaver College property located at Weaverville, N. C. Too, Rev. W. L. Moretz who represents a heart felt interest in the behalf of the Free Will Baptist denomination was heard concerning the property.

The Board thereupon resolved to appoint another day upon which all parties concerned and all parties interested of our denomination, and those connected with the Weaver College property may attend and make further investigation of said property.

The following was passed by the Board: Resolved, That this Board of Education of the National Association arrange a conference with the trustees of Brevard College, Brevard, N. C. for the purpose of investigating plans as submitted by the Brevard College Trustees concerning the Weaver College property at Weaverville, N. C., and we ask and make petition that the School Board of Trustees of the National Association of Free Will Baptist meet with us, the date to be announced.

Be it further Resolved, That we invite the Executive Committee of the National Association to meet and advise with the Board in the planning and changing the location of a college for the Free Will Baptist National Association.
