The Message of Easter

Scripture: Mark 16:1-8

It is good to be faithful in our observance of Easter, but mere observance is not enough. Easter has a message, a message we can discover for ourselves if we will but seek. What then is the Message of Easter? It can be expressed simply but clearly in four words:

A message of Light— A message of Love— A message of Life— A message of Liberty.

Reverently let us consider this four-fold message.

I-Easter Brings A Message of Light

Gethsemane, where Christ prayed His agonizing prayer and then was taken by the cruel hand of men and carried away as a prisoner, was dark; Calvary, the place where Christ was numbered with the transgressors and nailed to the cross, was dark, and to climax it all, the tomb, where kind hearts and hands had carried the body of the beloved Christ, was dark. Indeed, the disciples felt all hope had fled. They had never experienced such dark days.

But the Easter morning brought glorious light—the light of victory after apparent defeat in the Garden of Gethsemane, the light of a new hope after the despair from witnessing the crucifixion, and the light of a new beginning, after what had looked like the end when Christ's body was laid in the tomb.

II-Easter Brings A Message of Love

This is the great central message of Easter. "Love's redeeming work is done." It was Divine love that brought Jesus to Bethlehem to take upon himself the form of humanity and be made flesh to dwell among us. It was Divine love that took Jesus all the way to Calvary where He died for all mankind and made it possible for us to be reconciled to God. And it was Divine love that brought Jesus triumphant from the tomb to prove beyond all doubt that He was the matchless Son of God.

Love carried the Cross. Love accepted the wounds. Love endured the crucifixion. Love burst the bonds of the tomb. Love's sacrifice made atonement for our sins. Love suffered in our stead. Love confounded the powers of Hell. Love triumphed:

in the Manger, on the Cross, in the Tomb.

III—Easter Brings A Message of Life Jesus often spoke of this. He said:

"I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." (John 10:10). "I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth on me, though he were dead, yet shall he live." (John 11:25). Outside of Christ we are "dead in trespasses and sins" and are without hope in this life and the life hereafter.

But Easter brings a threefold message of life:

Present life here and now. Eternal life in the world to come.

Abundant life, ever fresh and ever new.

IV—Easter Brings A Message of Liberty

The stone was rolled away, the tomb stood open and Christ came forth in liberty. Sealing the tomb, and setting a watch did not bind the Christ. At His birth, the angels announced Him as Saviour, one who would bring liberty from the bondage and guilt and power of sin. The resurrection proved that to be true.

So Christ opened for us:

The door of salvation. "I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture." (John 10:9).

The door to victorious living. "Who is he that overcometh the world, but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son

of God?" (I John 5:5).

The door of heaven for evermore. "And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." (John 14:3).

Here then is Easter's glorious message of Light, Love, Life, and Liberty. This is God's message to you, God's purpose and plan for you. It was to make this possible that Jesus died and rose again.

THE WAY TO VICTORY

So they went and made the Sepulcher sure (Matt. 27:66). A Persian fable says that the earth was created a great barren plain without tree or plant. An angel was sent to scatter choicest seeds on every spot. Satan, seeing the seeds on the ground, determined to destroy them. He therefore buried all the seeds in the soil, and summoned sun and rain to make them rot away. But the seeds sprang up, clothing the earth with beauty. And a voice from heaven said, "Thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened unless it die." The burial of Christ was thought by His enemies to be the end; but, in truth, the grave was but the necessary way to His final and glorious victory.

NOT DEFEATED



FRIENDLY ATMOSPHERE TO GOD IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS ADVOCATED BY N. A. E.

Public schools ought to provide the young with an atmosphere of friendliness to God according to a statement on religious instruction in public schools released by the Executive Committee of the National Association of Evangelicals.

The statement read: "We believe firmly in the separation of church and state, but hold that by this by no means implies an espousal of secularism and of practical atheism through the exclusion from our public schools of all reference to God, who is the supreme object of all learning and wisdom, and of all reference to His laws, which must be the basis of true prosperity for men of all nations."

In the statement the committee noted that it was not speaking authoritatively, but rather submitting a judgment of a position on which the majority of its members would agree.

Several rules were listed for schools to follow: the provision of a friendly atmosphere to and acceptance of the existence of God, daily reading of the Bible without exposition and praying the Lord's prayer, and granting released time for religious instruction.

The statement also upheld the right of religious groups to establish schools of their own in addition to public schools.

The Kind of Revival We Need

You have read of the revival in the Hebrides Island beginning in 1949. It did not happen without the way being prepared by those who sought God and believed Him for a real revival. That is the kind of revival we need. We can have it if we are willing to pay the price. We have not paid the price as vet.

These reports of the revival came in 1950:

"In recent months there has been a remarkable revival going on in the Hebrides, west of Scotland. The man being used of God in this awakening is Duncan Campbell, a Presbyterian minister.

"Services are being held simultaneously throughout the churches at night, the revivalist going from one to the other preaching to the multitudes inside and out.

"The awakening is similar to the 1859 awakening in that people are literally stricken down with conviction, and cries for mercy rise from the audience while the Word of God is being preached.

"All the spiritual phenomena of former great revivals are present in the outpouring of the Spirit. Conviction of sin is terrible. No handshaking or 'coming forward' in this awakening-but sinners in despair, sometimes for weeks until they pray through to God. The routine of home and business has been in places disrupted while men and women seek God.

"During the General Election in Britain, the Secretary of the local Labor Party in a Hebrides town came under conviction. He was a Communist at heart and was engaged to address a political rally but failed to keep his appointment. He was searched for and found in prayer seeking the

"When urged to go to the political meeting, he refused and sent instead this message, 'Tell them I have business with God. And if any of them know how to pray, ask them to pray for a poor, lost sinner!' The announcement was made at the political rally with such effectiveness that the meeting broke up."

In a missionary convention held in Northern Ireland, the following report of the Hebrides, revival was given:

"The revival was the result of the prayers of seven men, and two elderly

ance that revival was coming, then they sent for an evangelist to come and conduct meetings.

"As the evangelist preached the Word souls were smitten and stricken, as in the revival of '59. Conviction of sin was so great that Duncan Campbell was kept busy all night, going from church to church dealing with souls in packed-out churches. When one church service was over, another church, packed-out was waiting for him.

"For weeks he had only 3 hours sleep a night so great was the hunger of the people. Two musicians on their way to play at a dance got somehow into one of the meetings and the Lord laid hold of them and they were saved. Duncan Campbell, hearing of this, slipped out of the meeting and went off in his car to the dance hall 23 miles away.

"Strolling into the dance hall where the people were waiting for the musicians he said, 'I have got good news for you. Your musicians have been saved. Let us sing a Psalm.' The power of God came upon the dancers and 20 were saved and now the dance hall is a mission hall. Picture shows provided busses for the people to take people to the shows but the busses were empty and the people were crowding into the churches.'

"I have seen the old pillars around which they threw their arms when they thought the day of judgment had dawned upon them. The power of that sermon is still felt in the United States today. But there is a bit of history behind it.

"For three days Jonathan Edwards had not eaten a mouthful of food; for three nights, he had not closed his eyes for sleep. Over and over again he had been saying to God, 'Give me New England! Give 'me saints, past eighty and blind: They New England! and when he arose prayed until they received the assur- from his knees and made his way

into the pulpit, they say he looked as if he had been gazing straight into the face of God. They say that before he opened his lips to speak, conviction fell upon his audience." -J. Wilbur Chapman,

STATEMENT ON RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Executive Committee of the Board of Administration of the National Association of Evangelicals does not presume to speak definitely for the constituency of NAE in all matters affecting religious life and views. However, since a question has been raised as to the position of the Association regarding religious instruction in the public schools, the Executive Committee submits the following as its judgment of a position on which the great majority of our constituent groups would agree:

We believe firmly in the separation of church and state, but hold that this by no means implies an espousal of secularism and of practical atheism through the exclusion from our public schools of all reference to God, who is the supreme object of all learning and wisdom, and of all reference to His laws, which must be the basis of true prosperity for men and for nations. This two-fold principle we believe makes imperative the following rules of procedure:

I. While our schools are not free to propound the tenets of a given sect or denomination, yet they shall by all means provide the young with an atmosphere of friendliness to and acceptance of the concept of the exist-

ence of God, man's responsibility to God and to fellowmen, and of the benefits accruing to our society through all agencies promoting godliness.

2. In keeping with this, the public schools should encourage the daily reading to the children of a portion of the Bible without exposition and the

praying of the Lord's prayer.

3. The public schools should grant upon equal terms all religious groups desiring it, and subject to the permission of the parents of the children participating, the right of gathering their children during a period of time released from the school day, for the purpose of religious instruction under the respective auspices of these religious groups.

4. The foregoing should not be so interpreted as to abridge or qualify the right of religious groups to establish and to maintain at their own cost and subject to equivalent standards of scholarship, schools in addition to the public schools for the training of their children in the branches of learning in harmony with the religious

beliefs of such groups.

NEW CHURCH ORGANIZED AT EUREKA SPRINGS

A new church was organized at Eureka Springs, Ark., on the night of March 21. This marked the climax of four revivals held in this rural community within the last two years. The first revival was conducted by Rev. Lester Hilton of Springfield, Mo., and Rev. Cecil Garrison of Springdale. The second was conducted by Rev. Hilton and Mrs. Etha Hull of Eureka Springs. The third revival conducted by Rev. J. McCully of Neosho, and the last meeting just closing by Rev. Hilton and Mrs. Hull, who has been conducting regular services there since the first revival.

Twenty-five people, most of them adults, became charter members. The charter will be held open for thrity days.

The council organizing this group were Rev. Cecil Garrison, Rev. Horace Knox, Rev. Kenneth Autry, all of Arkansas, and Rev. Lester Hilton and Rev. O. T. Allred, both of Missouri. MISSIONARY EMPHASIS IN TEXAS

Many of these police and soldiers are my friends. Yesterday one sat in front of the Post Office with his chin resting on the barrel of his old U. S. Springfield. I said, "Son, you are a brave man, you are doing something I would never do." "What," he said, "put my head over that gun. It might go off and I would have no head." We are giving them Testaments and they are reading them on the streets.

We are greatly in need of your prayers. It is a very unusual thing to get permission to hold a big public gathering like this at this time but thank God, we have the fullest confidence of the people in power. The ministry of your missionaries goes on.

Bro. Joe Ange endeared himself by his willingness to go back into the hard places into the cliffs over terriffic roads to visit our chapels in the Havana province.

This great missionary pastor is a man our whole denomination is proud of. His messages will live forever in the hearts of those who heard him. Durward, who is like a son, has a masterly style in his preaching, clear, positive, spiritual. We are proud of these men. SOME ACCEPT—SOME REJECT

"Praise the Lord for the Santals. Every few weeks some people around Junglabita are asking for baptism. The new converts at Borokoda which Carlisle baptized last year have witnessed to their own village and some seven or ten more are asking for baptism.

We are having church every Sunday morning in Kishanganj-only Trula, myself, our Hindu caretaker, Christian cook, a Christian nurse from the hospital and her husband when he is there and any of our village Christians who happen to be in town. It's fairly discouraging. But God is leading people in, however. There is a Mohammadan boy who comes often, and says he believes on Christ and wants to be a Christian. Who knows? He may be the first Mohammadan convert here. Pray that he may be sincere for he often brings his friends who are a high type people. The other day he brought a friend and just to show you a little of the way our conversation goes I repeat a bit of my witness. He knew the Koran and had studied the Bible and many other things. My witness ran such. (Missionary-me.,

Abdul—the Mohammedan).

Miss. "What does Koran say about Christ?"

Abdul. "His name is Isra-el-ruahallah (Christ in whom the Spirit of God dwells). He is the hookum (law of God). He is a prophet, a friend of God's."

Miss. "Yes, in Jesus is the Spirit of God for He is actually God. What are Christ's works?"

Abdul. "In the Koran it tells that when Christ was to be born the Spirit speaks to Mary. After he is born people ask for the Christ and Mary says that the babe will speak for himself. They ask him and the new baby speaks. Later he turns clay pigeons to live ones, etc. etc."

live ones, etc etc."

Miss. "Jesus Christ was a miracle worker. He did works of God because he was God. However, when we wish to learn of Mohammad we turn to the Koran and if we wish to learn of Christ we must turn to the Bible for it has the full story, etc."

Abdul. "Jesus was only a prophet, we must not say that he was 'son of God.' God will not have sexual relations with women. He cannot beget a son. We reverence Christ as a holy man."

Miss. "Jesus cannot lie. He himself says, 'I am the truth.' He calls himself God. He says that he is the only way to the father. (here I presented Christ as Saviour). What does Mohammad say about you and your sin? What will happen to your past sin and its consequences? What is your hope for the future. What is God?"

Abdul. "Oh, oh, oh... What is God? That's very difficult. He is..." (Then he gave me some of the ninety-nine names of God in the Koran, etc.

Miss. "You have named God but you have only said what he is not and given his titles. You can never know what God is apart from Christ because Christ is the revelation, the manifestation of God. God is what Jesus is. Jesus is the clothed-upon-with-flesh-Word of God. Jesus can't lie..."

Abdul. (Enters long discussion).

Miss. (I return to my questions about him and his sin and its consequences) "Tell me in a simple way how you can find salvation." And so he begins another long discussion. This is just a general idea of the difficulty of witness to a Moslam, a rough running translation of his meaning but you can get the idea.

Then in contrast to this there was an opening to witness to the Hindu clerk in charge at the bank. I began a witness but he soon carried the conversation by force and very few words was I able to get in. His idea was that

we Christians think that we are better than others and that only we are going to heaven and that we have a monoply on worship. He wanted me to know that all the holy men are dear to God, Abraham, Mohammad, Jesus, Krishna, Budda, etc. That all religions have the same high ethics and tell people to be moral. That God is one and has different names among different people. That all religions worship God. That idols are only to keep the mind on God, are symbols of His presence and are not to be worshipped in themselves. All religions are different avenues to God. Men are all men in the world and have one blood. God is one, approached in different ways. He was a harsh arguing man and I soon left the discussion. I admitted that all the major religions have an element of worship, ethical standards and moral injunctions. That the great religious leaders were not all bad as were not all Hindus, etc. I pointed out that there are, however, religions which have no worship as we think of it, no God in any sense. I pointed out that Jesus says that he is the only true incarnation of God. We Christians have to be as narrow as Christ was. Ours is a revealed religion and Christ says He is the only way. It is true that we have a common humanity which must be separated from religion, etc. So on and on.

Next week we have our annual conference at Sonapur. We are praying for a real outpouring of the Spirit. A missionary who can speak Bengaliis one guest speaker. A Santal man is coming for the Santals. Also Thomas Joky from Nilgiris, who helps Miss Barnard with her books, is here. He is being a real blessing to our boys and people. He is a keen witness. In Calcutta after the E. F. I. conference we were in a taxi going to the train. We talked to the cab driver who spoke excellent English. We found that he was two years along in college. When we paid our fare, Thomas said, "Look friend, you own this taxi, right?" He said, "Yes." Thomas said, "Well, you are driving it and you will take better care of it than a man hired to drive it, won't you?" He said, "Yes." Thomas says, "Well, your body is your taxi and Jesus will take it to heaven." He says, "But I am a Sikh." Thomas said, "Oh, but Jesus will drive it to the right place. He made it and he is its rightful owned. Any other driver will never get it into heaven,"

We are not here to correct the world, but to live the love-filled, Christ-filled life before it.

A great concourse of friends and relatives of the late Reverend George W. Scott gathered to pay their last tribute to him at the Free Will Baptist Church in Mountain Grove Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The Rev. Othel T. Dixon, pastor of the church, chose as his text John 15:13 "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." Rev. Dixon gave a very beautiful portrayal of Rev. Scott's life amid a beautiful floral offering. The church choir sang favorite old time hymns accompanied by Mrs. Letha Franklin at the organ.

Concluding services followed in the Hillcrest Cemetery in charge of the Barber Funeral Home. Pallbearers included W. W. Paul, Herschel Halliburton, Marshall Smith, Elmer Ellington, Lloyd Brown, Earl McDaris, Tom

Sanders, and Will Elliott.

George W. Scott was born December 18, 1890 near Huggins, Texas County, Missouri, and passed away March 7, 1957, in the Springfield Baptist Hospital, his age being 66 years. 2 months, 19 days. He was the son of Foster F. and Nancy Howe Scott.

He was reared and educated in this community and ordained into the Gospel ministry in 1918 by the Free Will

Baptist Church.

Since boyhood Rev. Scott had a true vision of what his mission in life was to be, and from his youth to his last days he put forth great effort preparing for this task. He never ceased to pray, to study, to read, and to converse with Christian people to gain knowledge he needed to carry on.

He spent forty years of earnest effort in the pastorate of churches in Missouri and Oklahoma. The Free Will Baptist Church of Mountain Grove was built under his leadership and in this and other churches in Mountain Grove he worked seventeen years in building a strong organization—a tribute to God's great purpose. His many friends in Mountain Grove and the hundreds who leaned upon his guidance and counsel through the years are a true testimony of his work for God in this community.

In Oklahoma City he carried out a similar building program and a successful ministry.

In every pastorate he left great numbers of conversions, a better organized activity program, and a more God-like congregation for his having been a part of that church.

One friend has said this of Rev. Scott: "George Scott was a great man.

His joy came from forging ahead in his acheivements. He loved his work and he carried on with a firmness of purpose—never tiring, never faltering. His sincerity was shown in many ways. He regarded a few moments at the bedside of a sick friend just as important as his appearance before his largest congregation."

Rev. Scott's passing is mourned by his devoted wife, Oma Ratterree Scott, whom he married on September 21, 1910, also six daughters and two sons: Mrs Ina Edwards, Mountain Grove Mo.; Mrs. Bessie Vandivort, Cabool, Mo.; Rev. Adam Scott, Saratoga, North Carolina; Mrs. Mary Haliburton, Bristoe, Okla.; Mrs. Daisy Lindsey, Cabool, Mo.; Mrs. Agnes Smith, Flat River, Mo.; Rev. Benjamin Scott, Fredricktown, Mo.; and Mrs. Leah Mae Postlewaite, Cashmere, Washington; 22 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren.

There are also two brothers and three sisters surviving: John Scott, Sapulpa, Okla.; Louis Scott, San Bernardino, Calif.; Mrs. Della Hutsell, Mountain Grove, Mo.; Mrs. Pearl Chancy, Shidler, Okla.; and Mrs. Myrtle Harrison, San Bernardino,

California.

His sister, Mrs. Martha Lemons, of Springfield Mo., died while attending Rev. Scott's funeral service. Two small children also preceded him in passing.

A Great Assurance

Rev. Ollie Latch Romans 8:28

The road of life takes some strange and incomprehensible turns. It is utterly impossible to peer around the bends, to pierce the curtain of distance, and discover what things are going to happen to you along this road. The only expectation one can bear toward life is the unexpected. You may as well plan to meet the unplanned, count as probable the improbable. One goes from health to sickness suddenly. One goes from wealth to poverty with unbelievable rapidity. From sunshine to storm is but a moment, from life to death a fleeting second. It is but natural that in the midst of swift, unexpected events one cries out, "Why? Why?" For the mystery of life there is often no explanation, no logical answer. How often we stand in the midst of gloom and wish for the light.

Under such circumstances, the text of this message pierces the darkness like a shaft of light. "For we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." I have tried to rationalize that text when all was well with me, and have found it hard to accept. But there have been times when I grasped at it like a drowning man grasps at a straw. In moments of great, soul shaking trials, one does not seek to rationalize; he seeks assurance. And that is what this text brings to us. It is a great calming, saving assurance. It has attached to it two important qualifications, and he or she who would derive assurance from it must ask himself or herself, "Do I meet these qualifications?" Those two qualifications I wish to discuss with you today.

I-Them That Love God.

All things work together for good to them that love God, we are told. There is here no question raised about his love for us. The burden is upon us. Do we love him? In moments of confusion and disorder, even that question is not always easy to answer.

But there are some things which will help us find the answer.

First, examine yourself as to the basic acts by which one becomes and stays a Christian. Have I faith in, do I believe in Jesus Christ? Have I acted upon that faith by repenting of my sins and confessing him to the world? These are the basic, required steps one takes who loves the Lord.

No matter how crushed we may feel and how low in spirit we become, we always have those basic experiences to which we can return, if they have been taken.

Second, do we love the fellowship of God's people? Do we love the brethren? If we love our brothers and sisters in Christ, then we have the Bible assurance that we have passed from death unto life, that we love God. When the heart is full of jealousy, envy and ill will, beware. The assurance of this text is not for you.

And third, are we loyal to his kingdom? The greatest charge in Biblical language, exceeding that even of the great commission, is found in those burning, challenging words, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God." The same ideal is repeated in his great illustration, "He that puts his hand to the plow and looks back...." The willingness with which we lay aside the desires of our own lives for the sake of the kingdom of God is a very true measure of our love for him.

Over and above all this, of course, is our devotion to him who hung upon the cross for our sins. It is his love which constrains our own love. And if these basic things exist in us, no matter how dark the night, the glowing assurance of the text may be ours. Look, then, my dear friend, to these things. Do you love the Lord?

II-Called According To Purpose

I am not unaware how close this text leads us to the brink of Calvinism. But we must remember that there were features, even in extreme Calvinism, which are not to be overlooked in our zeal for the freedom of the human will. One cannot affirm the omniscience of God and then deny. in the same breath, his foreknowledge of events in our lives. God knew, from the beginning, the trials through which we pass. One may question as to why he does not lead us around them from now until doomsday and still be no nearer an answer. But he cannot deny that foreknowledge.

The second qualification of the text suggests then that God has a pattern, a mold, into which he would pour our lives. "Called according to his purpose." Trials may be the process by which he brings us to fit the mold. The text suggests talents and abilities which God wishes to bring out in us. Trials may be the means by which we are forced to show up the steel and fire within our own souls. But certainly God has a plan for our lives and certainly he has endowed us with abilities and talents which fit us to fill the pattern.

Thus, the text does not drive us toward extreme Calvinism so much as it drives us to that all important project of discovering the plan, the purpose, the talents and the abilities which God has placed within us. It is so important to know our calling, so imperative that we find our places. Not all are equipped alike. One person may have the calling of the ministry; another may have the calling of the missionary; another may have the calling to sing; another to teach. Multiple are the gifts, talents, abilities which lie within the congregation. The discovery of your own usefulness as a servant of God is a major step to soundness in the time of great trial.

When one is sure that he or she loves God; when one is sure that he or she has a contribution to make to God's great kingdom, then such a one may call this text to his or her heart in the time of trial, and say, "I do not know why this has happened to me, but I know that I love God and I know I can do this in his kingdom. Therefore, all things are going to work together for good for me."

Conclusion

Will I get what I want? Ah! There now is the crucial question for many of us. The answer must honestly be faced. No, the text does not say that we shall get what we want. Jesus did not get the thing he asked for in the Garden of Gethsemane. Paul did not get what he asked for when he prayed for the removal of his thorn in the flesh. This is the pivot upon which every life turns. Are we in love enough with God to take what he arranges? Are we dedicated enough in our talents to surrender what we want for that which God thinks is best?

So the assurance of this text is issued to those who love God, to those who are conscious of their calling, to those who will submit their own personal desires to the wisdom and direction of God. If we are willing to do this, we may reach out a dying hand for the rocklike assurance of this text, "All things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are the called according to his purpose." Can you claim such an assurance?

To reach this state is not just one step, but a step which must be made again and again in the course of life. There is no stopping place.

Many Americans say, "I think this or that," whereas, the actual facts are that he doesn't think at all, but heard what he says he thinks on the radio.

AMERICA NEEDS AN AROUSED AND MILITANT CHURCH

As a people we have no real consciousness of the insidious undermining of our national character. We have drifted along letting others do our thinking and praying for us. We take our vacations and close our churches when it gets hot. We forget the world is on fire and cinders are flying. We leave the whole responsibility of the present sordid hour to somebody, somewhere else, to do something, sometime.

America is not going to escape what is coming! A crisis is developing! And we are not ready for it! America is capitulating before the forces of wickedness that caused the debacle in France. We will begin to be in earnest to fight the fires of hell when our national structure is half burned down or our godliess enemies are dropping bombs on our cities, blowing us to atoms.

America and Americans need a renewed moral concern and a renewed, awakened, empowered church to rise and bless the nation and the world. Christ said, "My house shall be called a house of prayer." Is yours? World-wide man's need! World-

World-wide man's need! World-wide God's love! World-wide this call! Pray without ceasing for world-wide revival in the Body of Christ and for world-evangelization.

Back of the praying saint is the almighty power of the Risen Lord. Pray! Get others to pray with you for the Spirit's immediate, world-wide outpouring. The renewal of the Church has always been by prayer. Evangelization of the world must be by prayer. God's praying minorities, through the Holy Spirit, are undefeatable.

Billy Graham's Diary: "In village after village great crowds had gathered to put up a roadblock to stop us, and the police would not let us through until I had gotten up and waved to the crowd. One man stuck a whole bunch of bananas in my hands. People gave us lemons and oranges... Some would wave palm branches at us. Word had traveled down the highway that we were coming.

"In one section we passed a number of Communist parades. They were parading with their flags waving and shouting their slogans and songs. We got out for several of them so pictures could be taken. We marched along for about three or four hundred yards with one group. I would wave at them. and smile, and they would smile back, because of course, most of them, even though they were in red shirts, waving the hammer and sickle, did not know what it was all about. We stopped in front of one group in one little village of Communists that had gathered with their flags waving, and they were all giving their shouts and slogans. with their fists clenched in the popular Communist fashion; so we got out, and I told Bishop Jacob, who was accompanying us, to interpret for us. So we quieted the crowd down, and I started preaching to them. I told them what Christ meant to me, that He was the only answer to the world's problems, that I had not come to India to talk politics but had come to talk Christ. And as I began to tell about the change that Christ could give in their lives, they began to drop their clenched fists, until only one man standing in the middle was holding his fists up-but he could not look me in the eye any longer. He looked down; the Holy Spirit was convicting him. I am convinced that the average Communist of India doesn't know what it's all about."
