

THE PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S CORNER

During September I went into four different districts doing promotional work. Twin Oak and Mine La Motte Churches in Madison Co., which are regular supporters of the cooperative program. New Rock Springs and New Hope in the Mission Association, and Niangua fifth Sunday meeting held at Buffalo, each of their seven churches represented by person, and gave me the honor of bringing the introductory sermon. Also, they were very attentive to the promotional program. I attended the closing service of the Laclede Co. fifth Sunday meeting, held with Sunnyview Church, which was the communion service. They also gave time for the cooperative program, and I brought the message for this service. The churches in this section are congenial toward the program. I have discovered that some of our churches send their money direct to the National Cooperative Department. In this procedure our six state departments do not share in the money. 55% of MISSOURI Cooperative money is forwarded to the National cooperative department, and there divided into the

seven departments sharing in the cooperative receipts. The 45% remaining in the state is allocated according to the percentage set by Missouri state association, to six state departments. The cooperative receipts for Sept. were below normal. SERMON OF THE MONTH

Preached at the Missouri State Association "Anto The Attermost"

I would like to commend the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists for its support of our foreign missionary program. You exceeded your quota last year and your missionary vision and burden is indicated by your increased support of our missionary work during this current year. Not only have you given to us your dollars but you have also given to us your sons and daughters. Your state has the distinction of giving to our foreign mission department our first medical doctor, Dr. Laverne Miley of Kirksville, Missouri. Of course, some years ago one of your daughters, Marie Hanna, went with her husband to serve in North India. This lovely host church has also given to us one of its own daughters, Glenda Fulcher, who is serving with her husband in Uruguay. The Lord is answering your prayers and is thrusting forth laborers from your very midst.

I commend the program committee for the theme selected for this convention. The other speakers have thrilled and challenged our hearts with their messages "Go Tell In Jerusalem" and "Go Tell in Judea and Samaria." Now it is my privilege to speak the message of my heart, "Go Tell To The Uttermost."

Psalm 2:8 "Ask of me, and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." Acts 1:8 "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you; and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Hebrews 7:25 "Wherefore he is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them." In these three passages of scripture we have possessing the uttermost by witnessing to the


To Isaiah, God said go. To Jonah, God said go to Nineveh. To the son, the father said go work today. As the women came in the early morning to the sepulcher, the angel said, I know that you seek Jesus which was crucified, He is not here: for He is risen, as He said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly. As the women went to tell the disciples Jesus met them and said go tell my brethren. When Jesus met the disciples in Galilee, He said "Go ye therefore and teach all nations." When the apostles were arrested and thrown into prison the angel brought them out and said go, stand and speak all the words of this life. When Phillip was engaged in a successful revival in Samaria, the Lord directed him to Gaza and the Spirit said **go** near and join thyself to this chariot. To Saul of Tarsus stricken down on the Damascus road, the Lord said "Arise and **go** into the city." To the prejudiced mind of Peter a vision was given and men came to invite him to the house of Cornelius, the Spirit said to him "**Go** with them." **Go, Go, Go!** The command has not been changed.



The Worth of a Family Altar

A man once had a dream about a visit from a citizen of Mars. The man from Mars wanted to find out about what he called our secret weapon, the family altar. He asked, "What is a family altar?"

A family altar isn't something one can go out and buy. One has to make a family altar. Two tools that are needed for a family altar are **God's** Word and prayer. Many families use singing or devotional booklets in their worship. An essential part of the family altar is people. Using these tools a person must make his own family altar.

A family altar helps to unify the family. By having a family altar, a time is created in which all of the family have their minds focused on one main idea. Having one main goal, that of worshipping the Lord together, tends to draw the family closer to each other.

When the family gathers for their family altar, it provides a way to help solve one another's problems. Also, the problems they have as a family can be prayed about and often solved.

When a member of the family is unsaved, the Christian members of the family would enjoy seeing that person saved. The worship of the family, during the family altar, is a good witness to the unsaved members of the family. The family altar could be the means of making the whole family a Christian family.

Probably the most important thing a family altar does for the family is the training it gives to the child. The Bible says, "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22: 6) A child spends most of his time in the home, especially his early life. For this reason the training a child gets through the family altar is very important. It may mean the difference between the child living a good life or a bad life.

A family altar can often be a blessing to visitors if it is shared with them. Children many times have friends over to spend the night. A next door neighbor once attended family worship at the home of her girl friend. She made

the remark that she wished her father and mother would have a family altar. The girl and her mother later became Christians because of this experience. Sharing the family altar is a good way to witness for Christ.

A criminal, who had been in and out of prison for escape, forgery, burglary, and auto larceny, and who has had only eleven months of freedom in fifteen years, studied the men in prison to try to find why children go wrong. Not one of these men he studied had been raised in a home where there was a family altar. The children of today will be the men and women of tomorrow. In order to have a world that is fit to live in these children need to be reared so that they will make good men and women, not criminals.

A good way to curb juvenile delinquency would be to have more family altars. Children imitate their parents. If the parents try to teach the children about Christ and live Christian lives, the children will be apt to be the same way, instead of being delinquents. "He who guides the youth guides the future."

All young married couples should start their homes by having a family altar. If this were done there would be a lower divorce rate. A young married couple whose marriage was on the brink of divorce, went to their pastor with the hope that he would be

able to help them save their marriage. The pastor asked if they had a family altar. When he learned that they did not, he suggested that they go home and start one. The couple followed their pastor's advice and their marriage was saved.

No mother and father in their right minds would think of starving their children physically. Just as important to the children as food for their physical growth is the food for their spiritual growth. A child needs a well balanced diet with three meals daily in order to have proper physical growth. A child also needs a well balanced diet of spiritual food. If a child has a diet consisting of nothing but sweets he will not grow properly. Neither will a child with nothing but church and Sunday School for a spiritual diet grow properly. A family altar is needed in order to have the right kind of a spiritual diet.

Family altars make stronger churches. Statistics show that only 35% of the church going people have family worship at home. It should be a goal in every church to start more family altars.

The Bible says in Deuteronomy 6:6-7, "And those words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou liest down, and when thou risest up." In order to fulfill this commandment a family altar is a must.

A family altar is very important because it unifies the family, helps solve problems, is a witness to unsaved members of the family, provides good training for the children, can be a blessing to visitors, makes better men and women of tomorrow, helps save marriages, provides spiritual food, and makes stronger churches. Those who want to help guide the future right, with the aid of a family altar, should begin to do so immediately.

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

Officers Credit Missionaries For Crime Reduction Among Indians

Daggett, Calif. (CNS)-Law enforcement officers in this area say they credit the efforts of Protestant home missionaries for a 90 per cent reduction in crime among the Indian population. A judge in the nearby town of Yermo has stated that the crime rate among the Indians has been reduced sharply since two Assemblies of God workers have been working among them.


The two home mission workers, Rev. and Mrs. Raymond F. Myers, came to the area six years ago to take over a Navajo Indian mission which had less than 50 converts. In that time they have had over 420 converts and have had to build a new church to accomodate their growing congregation.

Many of the converts are railroad workers who are in the area only for short periods of time. Others are civilian workers on nearby military bases and come originally from reservations in Arizona and New Mexico. The Indians often return to the reservations and win their families and friends to their faith. One returned to the Tuba City, Ariz., reservation and became a tribal police officer who carries his Bible in the patrol wagon.

The Assemblies of God have more than 160 missionaries working among American Indians. (8-23-62)

A GROWING WORLD-

In the days of Jesus the population was 300 million but now it is twice that in China alone. By 1800 the population had increased to one billion souls and by 1900 the population had increased to two billion. These are not simply dry statistics but each one of these is a soul destined for eternity. In the past sixty years our world has added 850 million to its population and it is predicted that by the year 2000 there will be six billion souls on the earth. It is predicted that 1/6 of these, one billion, will be living in India which is already overwhelmed with the task of feeding and educating its millions.

The Kingdom of God must expand to meet the need of this growing world. The glory of the Lord must cover the earth as waters cover the sea. Free Will Baptists must have even a greater outreach in the preaching of the gospel. We have expanded this past year by opening two new fields in Panama and Uruguay. The growing country of Brazil remains a constant challenge to our missionary force. Sao Paulo is the fastest growing city in Latin America. Brazil is just 10 per cent smaller than all of our 50 states and touches every country in South America except two. Our missionary work in Brazil is a strategic area for the preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ in South America. Our missionary staff has doubled in the past five years but what are 42 adult missionaries for a denomination the size of ours? Our giving has also increased but what is \$1.08 per member per year to compare with the income of our Free Will Baptists?

A GROANING WORLD_

This is a groaning world politically. There is the rising tide of nationalism and Jesus spoke of these things prevailing during the end time. "Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles, until times of the Gentiles be fulfilled" (Luke 21:24). After more than 2000 years of being dispersed, Israel has now become a recognized nation among the nations. Jesus spoke a parable, "Behold the fig tree; when they now shoot forth you see and know of your own selves that summer is now nigh at hand." (Luke 21:29,30) The fig tree, Israel, has budded and in the past ten years at least 26 African nations have gained their independence. National creates its problems for the missionary. He cannot ally himself closely with political rulers yet neither can he completely separate himself.

Communism since 1917 has gained 1/3 of the world's population and 1/4 of the land area. Satan has found this system the most effective in hindering the missionary advance. Communism tries to identify Christianity with the West, the imperialist. They picture Europe and democracy as growing old and feeble.

This is a groaning world socially. The church has not faced its social problems as squarely as it ought. We do not preach a social gospel but we preach a gospel which changes and influences a society in which we live. Free Will Baptists must reach each strata of society with the preaching of the Word. In my pastorate I felt that the woman in silk should feel as welcome as the woman in print and the man in kakis should find spiritual satisfaction in our services as well as the man in the tailored suit. Every soul has spiritual needs which must be met by the church to make that person a better citizen for the society in which he lives.

Our missionaries must be able to cope with the social problems which they find in a heathen and pagan society. The church has brought literacy and education with one million learning to read each week. With this ministry the church must provide literature to satisfy the hungry minds of the people to whom they minister.

I remember my visit to our mission field in Cuba some years ago. I remember seeing the painted walls of some of the thatched roofed houses and I asked the missionary about these improvements. I was told that as the people visited the mission station and saw the painted buildings of our property that they returned to their homes with the desire to make their buildings look better. The people of other lands are seeing magazines, listening to radios and some even seeing television. They see the better living conditions of people in other countries and they are asking why? Why can't we have these things now? The African, Indian and Mexican has a desire for these things the same as we have. Old crust of tradition are being broken -a new Asia, a new Africa and a new India is appearing. The white man is no longer a "god."

In many places the American missionary is no longer welcome. Such opposition, however, does not justify our disobedience to the command of our Christ.

I shall never forget the last interview our board of foreign missions had with Dr. Miley. The interview had been concluded and a time of prayer fellowship had been enjoyed. Dr. Miley said, "There is one thing I would like to have clearly understood between me and the board and the other missionary personnel. Though I am a medical doctor, my chief objective in going to my mission field is the winning of souls to Jesus Christ."

Church Leader Calls For Curbs On Teen-Age Drinking In New York

Merchantville, N. J. (CNS)-A New Jersey church leader has charged that the current New York state laws which allow 18-year-olds to buy liquor contribute substantially to teen-age delinquency in states that border on New York. To correct the situation, Rev. Samuel A. Jeanes, general secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance of New Jersey, called on New York's Governor Nelson Rockefeller to support measures which would raise the minimum age for drinking in that state to 21. Forty-eight other states have set 21 as the minimum age for buying liquor.

Jeanes accused the New York governor of delaying action on the measure until December 15, a few weeks after the gubernatorial election date. The minister also said that the measure which is now under study in New York is reportedly being handled by a legislative committee which is "loaded with persons close to and friendly to the liquor industry." One committee member, he said, represents the liquor industry as a public relations man and another is a lawyer who has a distiller as a client.

In citing the menace of the legalized drinking by teen-agers, the minister said that 21 deaths and many injuries attributed to teen-age drinking

in New York have occurred on New Jersey highways. Roadblock checks by police in New Jersey have discovered that as many as 93 per cent of youths returning from New York admitted drinking there. Connecticut and Pennsylvania have had similar experiences, the minister said.

In urging the New York governor to take action now, Jeanes recalled that Rockefeller had been able to make up his mind quickly on hundreds of subjects at home and abroad. He called for the state leader to use the potentially high moral influence of his office now in behalf of the youth of America. (8-23-62)

sionary's home before anyone awakened in the village to discover what she had done. She ran through the night, stopping only long enough to catch her breath. Early the next morning she found refuge among Christian believers.

Some weeks ago you may have seen on television worshippers crawling on hands and knees to worship at a sacred shrine. After crawling for miles some of these worshippers came to the shrine with hands and knees bleeding. These souls are groaning spiritually desiring that their burden of sin be lifted.

Evangelical Welfare Agency Finds Homes For Over 100 Children In Past Year

Chicago, Ill. (CNS)—During the past year the Evangelical Child Welfare Agency of Chicago placed 48 children for adoption and found foster homes for 75 additional children. This agency, which is an affiliate of the National Association of Evangelicals, has been in operation for ten years and in that time has placed a total of 450 for adoption and arranged for foster care of 950 children referred to it by the courts.

"Through this agency we are able to provide a distinct service to our evangelical constituency," said the Rev. Herbert Lockyer, executive director of the agency. "By means of our facilities we are able to place foster children from the courts and others through adoption in Christian homes with a wholesome environment. Also our provision of services for unwed mothers makes it possible for them to receive sympathetic help in a critical time of their lives."

NAE Sponsor Preaching Contest As Part Of Its Bible Emphasis

Wheaton, Ill. (CNS)—As a concluding effort in its year-long program to "Return the Bible to the Heart of the Nation" the National Association of Evangelicals is sponsoring an expository preaching contest. The competition is open to any minister, missionary or chaplain who may enter an expository sermon which he has preached to a congregation between July 1, 1962 and January 27, 1963.

"We hope that many pastors across the nation will participate in the contest," Dr. Robert A. Cook, NAE president, said in announcing the event. "This emphasis on the expository method of biblical preaching will give thousands of congregations across the country a chance to become personally involved with the Bible as it is preached from many pulpits."

In defining "expository preaching," the NAE president stated that all sermons entered should be based on a "definite passage of Scripture with the goal of explaining and applying the content in that passage to some problem of contemporary life." Each individual entrant may select his own passage and subject.

The first prize winner in the contest will receive a new edition of the 36-volume set of **The Speaker's Bible** through the courtesy of Baker Book House, Grand Rapids, Mich., plus a \$25.00 cash award. The next nine winners will each get a cash award of \$25 and all ten of the top sermons will be published in a book by Baker Book House. The winners will be announced at the NAE convention April 22-26, 1963, in Buffalo, N. Y.

A panel of five judges representing some of the nation's top authorities on expository preaching will select the best sermons. On the panel will be Dr. Merrill C. Tenney, dean of the graduate school at Wheaton College, Wheaton, Ill.; Dr. Andrew W. Blackwood, Sr., professor emeritus of homiletics at Princeton Theological Seminary and noted author, Philadelphia, Pa.; Mr. Herman Baker of Baker Book House, Grand Rapids, Mich.; Dr. Neil Winegarden, president of Buffalo Bible Institute, Buffalo, N. Y., and Dr. James D. Robertson, prefessor of preaching at Asbury Seminary, Wilmore, Ky.

Each contestant will be allowed to

American Youth Worker Calls Helsinki Festival 'Massive, Calculated Propaganda Spectacular'

Helsinki, Finland (CNS)—An American youth worker here for the recently Communist-sponsored world youth festival termed the event a "massive, calculated propaganda spectacular."

Dave Breese, director of Chicagoland Youth for Christ who covered the festival as a correspondent for Church News Service, described it as a "masterpiece of planning and logistics which was geared to produce a series of psychological shock waves" on the 14,000 young people who were brought here from all parts of the world for the event.

"Bright colors, dramatic staging, massed crowd enthusiasm and controlled discussion groups were all used to convey the impression of an irresistible Red tide sweeping the whole world," Breese said. He said he felt that the Reds' primary purpose of the \$25 million political show was to make an impression on the thousands of delegates from the uncommitted nations rather than on the world at large.

All of the delegations from over a hundred countries were under strict control of hard-core Communist leaders, Breese observed. Delegates were given little opportunity to mingle with Finns or other national groups apart from closely supervised activities, he said.

Attendance at the scores of simultaneous meetings was controlled by the leaders of national groups issuing tickets to sessions which they thought would be best for certain delegates. Finnish Communist "goon squads" were used to keep order and to prevent delegates out of satellite countries from defecting to the West. Despite this close guard, however, it was reported that 14 East German youths did defect.

Reaction of the festival delegates to the distribution of Scripture portions given out by the American-based Pocket Testament League was varied, Breese reported. Some received them gladly while others—like a young Bulgarian—tore them up and stamped them in the ground. One young Finnish girl who was helping with the Scripture distribution was manhandled by a "goon squad." The PTL team reported that advance arrangements which they had made were disregarded by city authorities in deference to Communist pressures.

"Because the basic Communist philosophy is based on a lie the Reds are terror-stricken at any form of alternative truth," Breese said. "The Reds are not only opposed to Christianity, but are against anything which does not specifically agree with them. They even destroyed some literature from other countries for the simple reason that it did not carry their line."

"The advantage of truth," he said, "is that it can compete freely in the marketplace of ideas and asks no special consideration."

The appearance of the famed German churchman who is one of the presidents of the World Council of Churches, Dr. Martin Niemoller, at the festival was particularly disconcerting, Breese said. Niemoller hailed the youth festival as an excellent place to work for world peace and told one group that he would work with anyone for world peace because it was in the "spirit of the living Christ to do so."

Reaction of the Finns themselves to the Red-sponsored affair was remarkably cool, according to Breese. All who could left the city on vacation, but thousands of young people gathered to demonstrate against the Reds. Breese was twice caught in tear gas which the police used to break up the crowds. New Import Regulations In Congo

Leopoldville, Congo (MNS)—New regulations have gone into effect in the Congo requiring that import licenses be obtained for each item entering the country, no matter how small. Here is how it affects missionaries. If a missionary family (or anyone else) gets a package containing a dress, a shirt and a toy, for instance, they must pay fees and secure a separate license for each item. This is apart from the duty which may be levied. Persons desiring to send packages to the Congo should contact the missionary for instructions.
