NEW EDUCATIONAL BUILDING DEDICATED

On December 11, Berkeley Free Will Baptist Church dedicated its new Educational Building to the Lord. The Rev. Harry Beatty, promotional secretary, delivered the dedicatory message. The choir, under the direction of Mr. Jim Mullen, sang "O Thou, Whose Hand Hath Brought Us" and the trio sang "To God Be The Glory". The pastor, Rev. Clarence Burton, gave a summary of the work, expressed appreciation to the Church for the splendid cooperation and recognized the building committee. The building provides a Junior Assembly and classrooms; Senior Assembly and classrooms; additional adult classrooms; Nursery and Sunday School office. The Beginner and Primary departments are in the lower level of the present building.

The Church has made steady progress since it was organized. Rev. Clarence Burton is the pastor.

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

RECORD YEAR FOR HOME MISSIONS
Receipts Double in Five Years

The department of Home Missions and Church Extension has had a record year in financial growth, the General Director

announced today. Mr. Willis stated that gifts for the year 1966 exceeded \$158,000.00, an increase of almost \$30,000 over last year, and double the receipts of five years ago. He pointed out that this is an increase of \$2,500 per month in gifts. This unusual increase was attributed to the work of a dedicated office staff, field staff, faithful work of the missionaries and board members. Gifts for December reached an all-time record of \$22,375.95.

The indications are that ministers, laymen, and officials throughout the denomination are responding to the need of missionary work in North America as never before.

The 1967 budget is \$171,000 and should be reached early in the year.

The following states exceeded their quotas for 1966: Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Iowa, Maine, Mississippi, Missouri, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, and Washington. Other states came near meeting their quotas and all tried hard.

The state of Oklahoma was first in giving, followed by Tennessee and North Carolina.

God has given to me so many precious friendships as a result of sessions at Youth Camp. I find no words to express the place Bro. and Sis. There have been many humorous times—from pranks by our lively youngsters to the time we slept in a cabin with an unfinished roof on a night when we were being blessed with torrents of rain. (I'm sure Gladys Turnbough hasn't forgotten that night!)

Then, of course, when I think of Youth Camp I also think of good hard work, because there is a job to be done there, and like it is elsewhere in the Vineyard of the Lord, the workers are too few. We usually leave the camp physically exhausted, but joyous in Soul and Spirit.

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MEETING THE CHALLENGE

Jan. 1967

Dear Friends,

We are getting off to a bad start in 1967 - late the first month!

We trust your holidays were filled with the blessings of God. So far the month of December has been a very busy one as well as this one. Many blessings have come our way.

We had several visitors during the month of December. Visitors are always a blessing to us and to the work. We do enjoy the fellowship which we do not have on the field!

Maybe this will not be news to you anymore, but I must share it with you. Can you imagine the surprise for us who live in a tropic area - as we got up the morning of January 9th to a 10 inch snow fall! It began about 5:00 A.M. When we got up at 6, it could barely be seen on the ground. By 11 A.M. some 8 to 10 inches had completely covered the hill sides. My what a beautiful sight! We had oranges ripe on the trees, but all covered with snow, and the children so excited because they had never seen it before. It was the first time in 45 years that it had snowed here on this fashion, and the biggest since 1894. It scared everyone except us. No one left their homes all day long. There was no water, no gas, no lights in Monterrey, and no traffic allowed to pass. Of course, the school closed and all stores and offices as well. You see we aren't prepared for winter weather - but all of us, well, as soon as it stopped snowing, bundles up the kids and outside we went. Arthur had all the students come down and we made a big fire. We were about to freeze inside. I made some snow cream for everyone -- a real treat! Then we made a big snow man followed by -- you guessed it -- a good old snow ball fight. Every- February 1967

body thought we were crazy, but we had a real time. Along about 3 P.M. we killed 8 rabbits and roasted them on the open fire. Together with all the students we we had our combines dinner and supper. Today, three days later, there is still some snow left on the ground. It was the first I had seen in 9 years and I really enjoyed it, even if we did almost freeze. This has been something unusual and very outstanding for Mexico. People were actually scared to get out in it. Needless to say, many deaths have occurred and for thousands, it meant suffering with cold. God has been so good to us. How we praise Him for His protecting hand over us.

Arthur and the students left Monterrey January 3rd for El Canelito to hold a short revival. Arthur stayed 2 days and had to come home. It was so cold and with so much dirt, he felt the same as he did last summer when he took Typhoid up there. He came home to the doctor at once. This time, after five days in bed, he was up and going again. The weather was very bad and of course no heat at all. Although the group reports good services, one saved and the church helped spiritually.

Arthur, David and the quartet left Jan. 13 for Houston, Texas where they will be for two weeks. Remember them in prayer and especially Arthur's health. Also for the services, we ask special prayer that souls might be saved and the saints revived. Do remember all of us who remain here in the school. How we praise God for this school year. It has been the best year ever. Continue to pray for the native churches, that they will grow spiritually and feel the necessity to take on responsibility.

We thank each of you for your kindness shown us during the holiday season. May God bless you richly for it. Also we thank all who have sent continued support to the work. Our responsibility is great and you have been so gracious to stay with us. God bless you is our prayer.

"The Greatest of these is Charity"

I Corinthians 13:13

"And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity." (I Corinthians 13:13) (Please read all of the Chapter.)

The Thirteenth chapter of First Corinthians has been called by many the Love Chapter of the Bible. And certainly it has much to say concerning the subject of Love. The first three verses tell us that even Gifts are valueless unless they are exercised in Love. Then the next four verses (4-7) give us the Characteristics of Love. The final expression of the Thirteenth chapter tells us that the Gifts are only temporary but that Love and the other graces are eternal.

The Greek word from which the word Charity is translated is "AGAPE" which means a 'spontaneous and divine love'. A Love that is more eternal than gifts.

May we seek that kind of love which is spoken about and apply it to our lives today. May this message be an aid to this new experience. May we first seek Him who is Love, and gave, because he loved, and now tells us to love.

WHAT IS THE LOVE OF GOD? To answer this question we go to St. John and his writing for he is veritably the apostle of love. He alone of all the apostolic band seems to have been chosen to understand somewhat the depths of this divine love, in order that he might tell it to men. The Spirit of Inspiration chooses fitting instruments; and we must assume that by nature and grace, St. John was best fitted to make known the gospel of eternal love. In the third chapter, verse 16, he opens for us this eternal spring. He says, "For God so Loved the world, .." He loved the world so much. O What Love! What is the Love of God? It is God Himself. He is the fountain of love. Many glorious things are spoken of God. His eternity, "The same yesterday, today, forever..etc."; His almighty power, so that He speaks and it is done, etc.; His omniscience, His wisdom, are all brought before us, and evoke our adoration and praise. BUT this feature of His nature is pre-eminent. It is said that God is the righteous one, holy One, etc. But it is not said, He is righteousness, here in verse sixteen. It says, He is LOVE. This is the attribute that runs through and dominates all the others. How comforting is the revelation of the divine love. How it has altered men's ideas of God, and changed the face of the universe for them. Now Jesus has come and told us of the Father's care and love for the world.

WHAT GOD GAVE BECAUSE HE LOVED. St. John said, "For God So Loved the World, that HE GAVE HIS ONLY BEGOTTEN SON." God first loved the world. It would have been long before the world would have come to love Him. But "He first loved us," and our love would never have blossomed in response to His had He not loved us. What does this imply in its fulness? It implies an eternity of love. In the Son whom He loved from eternity He loved His people. Thus all through the course of the world's history, even when He seemed to be coming in wrath, God has been coming in love to men. And we live in the times when the most amazing proof of that love has been bestowed. "He gave His only begotten son," and in all the history of the Church this divine love speaks in convincing tones--in that word of salvation that is preached; in the ordinances, the observance of which tends to the soul's spiritual health; in those gifts of the Spirit given freely to them who believe; in those promises that draw us near to the throne of grace,--in all these the love of God is proclaimed to our wondering eyes searching for

truth.

It is true that God is the Father of the whole world by creation, but this in no way provides for our salvation. Through faith in Jesus Christ, God's beloved son, we come into a new relationship with God and His love. Until we have been born again we are children of disobedience and are under the wrath of the Father. The Scripture says, "Let no man deceive you with vain words; for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of Disobedience" (Ephesians 5:6).

The reason that God gave His son was "that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." He wants to give us life because He loves us. He wants to give us a new badge. The badge of Love! Some people would perhaps like to change their name. Some names carry more prestige and rights than others, but to share the "name which is above every name" (Philippians 2:9) is an immeasurable privilege. Paul says, "For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named" (Ephesians 3:14, 15). "Behold, what manner of Love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God; therefore the world knoweth us not, because it knew him not! (I John 3:1).

WHAT WE DO BECAUSE OF LOVE. We are able to come back to the Chapter from which the text was taken because this chapter deals more with what we are and what we do because of Love.

There are many ingredients of divine love found in this chapter. I have drawn from some of these verses some of the ingredients we must put to work in our lives as evidence of His Love within us:

1. Patience-(love passive): no hurry; suffers long; beats, believes hopes, and endures all things (v. 4, 7).
2. Kindness-(love in action): never acts rashly or insolently; not inconsistent, puffed up, or proud (v. 4).
3. Generosity-(love in competition): not envious or jealous (v. 4).
4. Humility-(love in hiding): no parade; no airs; works then retires (v. 4).
5. Courtesy-(love in society): does not behave unseemly; always polite; at home with all classes; never rude or discourteous (v. 5).
6. Unselfishness-(love in essence): never selfish, sour, or bitter; seeks only good of others; does not retaliate or seek revenge (v. 5).
7. Good Temper-(love in disposition): never irritated; never resentful (v. 5).
8. Righteousness-(love in conduct): hates sin; never glad when others go wrong; always gladdened by goodness to others; always slow to expose; always eager to believe best; always hopeful, always enduring (v. 6-7).
9. Sincerity-(love in profession): never boastful and conceited; not a hypocrite; always honest; leaves no impression but what is strictly true; never self-assertive; does not blaze out in passionate anger, nor brood over wrongs; always just, joyful, and truthful; knows how to be silent; full of trust; always present.

I think it is a privilege of sharing in God's Love and it demands of us to Love as He loved us.

Love demands love in response. No adopted son would be happy in a home where there was no love shown toward him, and his unhappiness would be greatly aggravated if there were natural-born sons in that family, also, who received all of the love and affection of the parents. God loves equally each of his sons and shows no partiality. Adoption is a gracious act of love that finds

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a real response in the heart of the adopted son. In the family of God, the adopted son is not only loved by the Father but also by his brethren. No one was more conscious of this love that was the Apostle of love, who said, "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth in death." (1 John 3:14) The apostle spoke with authority because he had himself heard Christ say, "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." (St. John 13:34-35)

There is no limit to what a man will do for one he loves; in fact, love knows no bounds. Jesus said, "If a man love me, he will keep my words; and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him." (John 14:23)

Man's primary motive in life is to provide things abundantly for themselves and their families. Men toil hard and ceaselessly for the things that pass away with their using—food, clothing, and shelter. But the man who puts his trust in Jesus Christ finds that God's watchful eye is always over him in tender care so that he need never be concerned about his physical needs which God through His gracious providence will freely give. Such provident care never ceases to utterly amaze the world. Speaking about this very subject, our Lord told His disciples to "Consider the lilies how they grow; they toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you, that Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. If then God so clothe the grass, which is today in the field, and tomorrow is cast into the oven; how much more will he clothe you, O ye of little faith? And seek not ye what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink, neither be ye of doubtful mind. For all these things do the nations of the world seek after; and your Father knoweth that ye have need of these things. But rather seek ye the kingdom of God; and all these things shall be added unto you. Fear not, little flock; for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell that ye have, and give alms; provide yourselves bags which wax not old, a treasure in the heavens that faileth not, where no thief approacheth, neither moth corrupteth". (Luke 12:27-33)

Let us not forget that God is Love and that because he loved we were given a Saviour who tells us to love one another. Let us not forget that "Charity never faileth". We have Faith from the hearing of the Word, and we have hope because of the WORD that became flesh, and we have proof of God's love because of His Sons Atonement. Now let us show the World, God's love in us. "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity."


JOPLIN CHURCH HAS ADDITIONS

FWB BIBLE COLLEGE RECEIVES LARGE GIFT

The largest single gift in the history of Free-Will Baptist Bible College was received December 22 from Mr. and Mrs. Clyde F. Goen, of Bryan, Texas, who gave \$10,000 to the Development Program. Mr. and Mrs. Goen have carried a special burden and manifested an unusual interest in the school through the years. This gift swelled the December total to more than \$20,000 for a new record of giving in any month for expansion purposes.

The One Thousand Church Campaign, the second phase in the Development Program, was officially launched the first of the year. As the first phase appealed to individuals, the Church Campaign will appeal to local churches and is designated to challenge at least one thousand congregations to raise a minimum of \$1,000 within twelve months. Special recognition is planned for churches that have contributed at least \$1,000.

More than \$120,000 has been given to the Development Program through December 31, with an additional \$120,000 in commitments on file. Free Will Baptist everywhere are asked to pray for the needs of the College in 1967 which promises to be a year of unusual advance.

The group was then broken into prayer cells to be presided over by junior and senior students, and dismissed to rooms about the campus. For an hour prayer was offered and testimonies shared. At 9:50 the students and faculty re-assembled in the auditorium for a challenging message by special guest speaker for the week, Rev. Billy Morris, pastor of Immanuel FWB Church, Durham, N.C.

Through the years it has been the school's practice to call such days of prayer from time to time lest too much study muddle the mind and weary the heart. These days have resulted in the discovery of God's will for many students, a fact that can be testified to by numbers of former students now in the pastorate and on the mission field.

FWBBC INSTALLS IBM EQUIPMENT

Several large pieces of IBM office equipment have been installed recently at the Bible College. This equipment, which has been obtained on a lease basis, will facilitate the handling of more than 3,000 bookkeeping entries per month in the College business office. It will also increase

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efficiency in recording the financial accounts of more than 400 students at the Bible College.

In addition to being used in the business office, all registrar's records are being transferred to punch cards for use with the equipment. These IBM machines will make alumni records instantly available, report student's grades, and speed up registration procedures.

The equipment installed so far include a sorter, collator, key punch, and 402 accounting machine. The regular staff members have taken IBM training to operate this equipment.



Has a missionary began a term with more rest than we? After 36 days on the boat we yearned for a full active schedule again and now, after being on our station less than a month, we find ourselves in that schedule with hardly time to even think about correspondence.

We are not concerned primarily with the medical work at this time. Dr. Griffin arrived in June and is proving herself entirely competent; thus we can devote our time to something we often wished we had time for last term--the study of the tribal language. Sandra Payne is taking a month's rest from the clinic and I'm helping there each morning, so I can devote afternoons to study with a bit more enthusiasm. If you remember, this isn't exactly my my choice of work, and it is work. French and I are not on too familiar terms. But we have come to translate God's Work into their own understanding, and this is rarely effective through an interpreter.

Pray that we will learn this language well and quickly since we will become involved again in the medical work when the Gages arrive on the field. Pray that we will have ears to hear and lips to speak. We're unaccustomed to pronouncing these difficult sounds, like kp and gb. And the only difference between a husband and a

sickness is aspirating the h. LaVerne is hoping I'll learn well!

A word about our children--we spent the week end with Larry before coming up to our station. We had received news on the boat that the second day of school he broke his leg, and it was quite a shock to see he had lost about 15 lbs. Our last letter said he had lost 2 more, but he added, "I'm beginning to like it here."

Lynette is doing well in her correspondence course but lacks physical activity. Her chief relaxation is her accordian. We continue to be amazed at the marvelous way He provides for us. We haven't bought a car since arriving on the field, but hope to get something before long as we are planning to equip our old Volkswagen into a mobile dispensary.

May God richly bless you in your work for Him.

The Church has not been selfish with its income. A total of \$2,853.32 was given to outside causes. This is plus 20% given outside the local Church. This is the way outside giving was expended: \$1212.38 to Coop. fund; \$577.55 to foreign missions; \$240. went to national home missions; \$156.68 to state home missions; \$120. to quarterly meeting home missions; with \$242.46 going to Greenville, Tennessee orphanage; with \$240. going to Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee; \$49.25 to National Association of Free Will Baptist headquarters building; and \$15. to area Free Will Baptist Youth Camp. Percentage wise, this is an excellent report, too.

The average Sunday School attendance for the past year was 170 per Sunday. Again, this is a tremendous increase because of the many moving away for employment in other areas.

To God be the glory for progress in 1966. This has been a blessed year of victory. This year should see us move forward. God expects continued progress in this battle against the demonic forces of the world.

It hasn't been easy by any means, for the devil is at work at all times and places. Faithfulness has been rewarded with victory, in part, at least.

The older faithful members of the Church are to be greatly commended for a good job done. The newer members and friends are to be praised for so faithfully taking up where the others left off.
