

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# BRIDGING THE GENERATION GAP By Gigi Barks

THERE HAS BEEN a lot of talk about the so-called "Generation Gap" of today. You hear about it on TV and read about it in magazines and in the newspaper. Is there really a Generation Gap? It is time that we as Christians and Free Will Baptists face the fact that this Generation Gap does exist and do something about it in our churches.

Now, don't get me wrong. I don't believe that there is any more of a Generation Gap now than there was twenty years ago. Adults and young people had just as much difficulty understanding each other then as they do today. Someone just thought up this new name and now all the misunderstandings between adults and young people are blamed on the Generation Gap.

Because things have changed in the world today it is necessary for the Church to change also. This does not mean that we should change the message that we preach and teach. THE PLAN OF SALVATION HAS NOT CHANGED. However, our methods of attracting young people to the church should be updated. A young person is not attracted to the Church by the same things that attract adults. Where an adult person would be content simply to come to Church, hear a gospel message and then go home, a young person would need to be involved more. We lose so many young people who would later make good leaders because they are never made aware of how interesting and exciting it can be to serve the Lord.

Two of the main differences between adults and the youth of today is (1) they have to be kept busy and (2) the enthusiasm they have for everything they do. They have not had to face the failures and disappointments that meet everyone later in life and therefore do not tend to take the negative attitude that an adult does at times. The Church would do well to remember these two things and take advantage of this enthusiasm and put their young people to work for the Lord.

There are many different ways to do this, but in our church we have found that the field of music offers the best opportunity. We have many gifted and talented young people who want to work for the Lord. We have found that by using them in this manner we also attract new young people. Our young people have had several projects this past summer, but I believe the most rewarding was their performance of the

Christian folk musical "Good News." This was an excellent opportunity for them to use their talent and also an opportunity to spread the Gospel. This program was put on first at our own church in connection with a ham supper. Proceeds, which were over \$200.00, went to the Wesley Calvery missionary account. Next the program was presented at the State Sunday School and CTS Convention at the Leadington Church. Some of you who saw this program may not have appreciated this type of program, but this is the type of program that attracts the youth. This is an example of the new method of reaching young people that I was writing about. I count it a privilege to have been able to work with our young people in this program. The blessings that I received from working in this program far outweigh all the time and work that went into it, and I am sure all the young people feel the same way.

In addition to the "Good News" program we have several young people who sing in our choir regularly. Then we also have the Crusaders Quartet and the Treble-Aires Girls Trio. All of these young people are using their talents for the Lord.

There will always be a Generation Gap and there is nothing we can do to eliminate it entirely. But we at the Berkley Church are doing our best to try to bridge this gap, and we hope that you are too. Remember, the young people of today are the Church of today as well as tomorrow.

# highlights of the state association

# FROM THE STATE CLERK

The fifty-sixth annual session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists met August 19-21 at the Free Will Baptist Church in Leadington, Missouri. Some long-time observers of the State Association reported that they never knew of a State meeting to go any more smoothly.

The convention theme, "The Church Involved," was given thorough treatment by the four speakers: Mr. Lynn Frazier, Dr. Billy Melvin, Rev. Robert Shockey, and Rev. Lawrence Thompson.

Over 100 ministers and delegates got involved in the business of the Association, according to the Registration committee. Though the number of visitors attending is unknown, they added enough to the congregation to pack the Leadington Church's auditorium out for each of the night services.


In Association business sessions, a State cooperative fund budget of \$50,000 was adopted, with 47\%% going to National Departments, and 52\%% remaining in the state. By-laws number 7, 21, and 42 were revised to be more explicit in listing the duties of the moderator, the membership of the Executive Committee, and the calling of special meetings. The changing of By-laws number 36 and 46, relative to the State Association meeting dates, was again tabled until next year, asking that the General Board thoroughly investigate the advantages and disadvantages of such a change, and report back to the 1970 State Association.

New officers and Board members elected by the body include Rev. Clarence Burton, Assistant Moderator; Rev. Vernon Maggart, Assistant Clerk; Rev. Lawrence Thompson to the Home Mission Board; Rev. Glen Murray and Rev. Finis Johnson to the Youth Camp Board; Rev. Eddie Altus and Rev. Mark Vandivort to the Sunday School-CTS Board; Rev. Alton Loveless and Rev. Harley Brown to the Superannuation Board; Rev. O. T. Allred, Rev. Vergil Maness, Rev. Ezra Butts, Rev. Glen Rehkop, Rev. Homer Moser, and Rev. Charlie Hoover to the General Board. The former moderator, Rev. Woodrow Matthews, and the former clerk, Rev. Andy Lay, were re-elected for another year.

In other business, the office of State Statistician was abolished, and a new GEM editor was elected: Rev. Alton Loveless, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church, Joplin, Missouri, will assume the position with the publication of the October issue.

The 1970 session of the Association will be held August 18-20 at the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church of Bridgeton, Missouri.

# INDIAN CREEK MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

The September meeting of the Indian Creek Minister's Conference met at the Jones Chapel Church near Stella, Missouri, where Rev. Billy Joe Gentry is pastor. There were eight ministers present who discussed the possibility of establishing churches in Sarcoxie and Oak Grove.

A QUESTION JESUS was asked has also been asked of the Christian worker. After explaining the plan of salvation to a group of natives a missionary was asked, "By what authority do you teach that everyone is a sinner and Jesus Christ is Saviour?" In this agnostic, twentieth century many Christian workers are asked the same question.

What is the preacher's authority for teaching that man is a sinner, Jesus Christ is Saviour, Heaven is the eternal abode of the believer and Hell the eternal abode of the unbeliever? The authority is the Word of God! Therefore, it is necessary that there be no doubt as to the inspiration of Scripture. The Bible states in II Timothy 3:16, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." If there is any doubt about the Scriptures being God's Word, there can be no authority in teaching for to be "thoroughly furnished unto all good works," one must be thoroughly convinced as to the truth of God's Word.

The Bible is not authoritative on account of human decrees about it. Church councils in past centuries did not create the authority of the Bible. Church councils did make certain declarations about the canon of the Scriptures, but the books of the Bible do not derive their authority from these decisions. The councils simply recognized the books which bore in themselves the marks of their authoritativeness. The writers of both the Old and New Testaments claimed to speak for God. They declared that they were moved by the Holy Spirit. Jesus gave His own endorsement of the Old Testament revelation. He also promised the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit to His disciples.

According to the Scriptures, God has spoken in three ways.

He has spoken to us in the works of creation. "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament sheweth his handywork. Day unto day uttereth speech, and night unto night sheweth knowledge. There is no speech nor language, where their voice is not heard. Their line is gone out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world. In them hath he set a tabernacle for the sun" (Psalm 19:1-4). As someone has said, "The sun is his splendour, the moon with her silvery, rays, the planets in their order, the milky way with its mystery, the sea with its roar, the earth with its countless treasures, all speak to us, and declare God's eternal power and Godhead."

He has spoken to us by His Son. "God, who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in time past unto the fathers

by the prophets, Hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son, whom he hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also he made the worlds" (Hebrews 1:1-2). "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God" (Jchn 1:1-2). "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). Then John 1:18 states, "No man hath seen God at any time; the only begotten Son, which is in the bosom of the Father, he hath declared him."

F. E. Marsh said this about Jesus, "In His words He told out the mind of God; in His works the power of God; in His compassion, the love of God; in His dealings, the grace of God; in His spotless character, the holiness of God; in His death, the righteous love of God and in His resurrection, the energy of God."

He has spoken to us in His Written Word. "For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (II Peter 1:21). "All scripture is given by inspiration of God . . ." (II Timothy 3:16). We are told that no less than 3,800 times the Old Testament writers use the terms "thus saith the Lord," "the Lord said," etc. The New Testament uses expressions such as "declaring unto you the whole council of God," "in words which the Spirit teacheth," "the commandments of the Lord," etc. The writing of the Bible is unique. Here are words written by kings,

# By What Authority?

by princes, by poets, by fishermen and by statesmen. It was written by men in exile, in the desert, in shepherds' tents and in prison. Quite a combination, and yet there is not one valid contradiction. Also, the one central message is man is a sinner, he needs a Saviour and Jesus Christ, the only begotten of the Father, is the Saviour of all who believe.

"What a wonderful Book it is," said one Christian to another. "Yes," was the reply, "but you see it is a living Book." Its grace shows the overflow of Divine love to meet all needs.

Its harmony shows its Divine arrangement. The Old Testament is revealed in the New Testament and the New Testament in hidden in the Old.

Then, its order speaks of a Divine plan. Look at the epistle to the Philippians and note the progressive unfolding of the Christian life. The purpose of life—"For me to live is Christ" (1:21). The pattern of life—"Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus" (2:5). The power of life—"I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me" (4:13). The provision for life—"But my God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (4:19). Then, lest someone should fail to read the entire epistle the prize of life is mentioned in 3:14, "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."
