

When the church was organized in September, 1953, there were 32 charter members and today the church has 126 active members.

In 1967, the Educational Building was constructed next to the church. This building is composed of Sunday school classrooms, a chapel, business offices and a large kitchen. Sunday school attendance averages 134.

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"And Thou Shalt Call His Name Jesus"

The angel of the Lord called upon a man stooped in his fears and doubts one night and gave him the assurance and joy of new hope not only for himself, his family, his nation, but for the whole world. Our world today stands in this place of fear and doubt even in the place of putting aside that which is the hope of the world, Christ.

In Revelation 12, the typology of Jesus' birth is recorded and the waiting hands of the devil are described by the writer, John, on the Isle of Patmus. Today the same can be said about the bride of Christ, the Church. The devil stands and waits for every opportunity to cause her defeat if possible. We must in this day realize the message which we possess and proclaim Jesus the Savior of His people.

The people of today, the rowdy minority and the silent majority both, I believe, are standing at the point of putting away their only hope of Salvation both for themselves, their families, their nation and the world, and the Church which possess Jesus. The church has one step at a time for the last 150 years been degraded, disrespected, and unexalted by those who have the ability, privilege and responsibility to hold her up.

The world today cries as they then cried, "Hosanna, 'save us now." and yet are standing and rejecting him from their lives in daily living. Jesus came to die, but also to live in the heart of every believer, until the day of full redemption and full restoration could be completed.

It is very difficult to speak about his birth, without speaking of this death on Calvary where he paid the supreme price for sin. There, because of your sins and my sins, God laid upon Him the iniquity of us all.

Jesus was born in a lowly, humbled stable in Bethlehem and we to be saved must also be born in a lowly, humbled spirit. Jesus said, "Except ye be converted and become as a little child ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven." "The Lord is nigh unto them that are of a broken heart; and saveth such as be of a contrite spirit." Jesus said, "Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth." Men must become meek and lowly before they can become strong and powerful for God

The only way for America today to be saved is for Americans to bow down in the meek contrite spirit and look to Jesus. If America continues to destroy the Church, which offers salvation to the world and peace to the troubled hearts; America will fall and the world with her. Christmas is a time of year when all in the Christian world turn to look for "Peace on Earth Good will toward all men." I pray this year that we all realize that peace will only come as Jesus is given room in our hearts to live. Peace and good will toward all men will only come when the church proclaims, "Behold the hand maid of the Lord. Be it unto me according to thy word." A SACRIFICE FOR CHRISTMAS

According to our Treatise. Free Will Baptists adopt the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice. Our churches encourage both personal and mass evangelism. We are evangelical and fundamental in our doctrinal stand. From the pulpits we admonish holy living. In other words, we have all the Biblical requirements for a vibrant Christian experience. Yet we have many among us who do not have the joy of a victorious life. Many are bitter and defeated with the attitude that both God and the Church have failed them. In the midst of the hustle and bustle of the season, even Christmas has lost its significance. Let's

look again at the event which started it all. Maybe, just maybe, we have overlooked the prime element that was evident that first Christmas. That element was self-sacrifice. In Galatians 4:4 Paul says, "When the fulness of time was come, God sent forth His Son. made of a woman, made under the law, to redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons." In other words, when the time was just right God sent His Son into the world, John tells us that this was because of the love God had for man. It was surely a thing God looked forward to - this opportunity for man's redemption - even though He was not happy that His only Son must suffer and die. But He willingly, sacrificially gave Him. Luke relates the visit of the angel to Mary. When asked to be the mother of the Messiah, she simply replied, "Be it unto me according to thy word." Joseph, who was a just man, was not willing to make Mary a public example. According to the law, she should have been stoned. But while he considered the situation, an angel brought him the message that this child was the promised Messiah, conceived of the Holy Ghost. This just man and pure maiden were willing to accept the gossip and vile remarks which certainly would make the rounds of Nazareth. The threat of slander could not daunt these two. They saw the Promised One as the Salvation of many, and they were willing to sacrifice their reputations that He might be manifested. Then there were the simple shepherds. When they heard the angels' story, they immediately began to investigate. Who would believe God's Son, the Promised One, had been born in a stable? Yet "when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child." They laid aside doubts, and even fear of ridicule, and proclaimed this child as the long-awaited Messiah. The price of sacrifice for each of these was high, but what about

Jesus? "Who, although being essentially one with God and in the form of God did not think this equality with God was a thing to be eagerly grasped or retained. But stripped Himself of all privileges and rightful dignity so as to assume the guise of a servant (slave), in that He became like men and was born a human being. And after He had appeared in human form He abased and humbled Himself and carried His obedience to the extreme of death, even the death of the cross!" (Phil. 2:6-8 Amplified N.T.) His was the supreme sacrifice! What about us? Are we trying to endure the shame and price of sacrifice? Too often we are like the inn keeper in Bethlehem:

Could I know

That they were so important? Just the two, No servants, just a workman sort of man, Leading a donkey, and his wife thereon Drooping and pale, -I saw them not myself, My servants must have driven them away; But had I seen them, -how was I to know? Were inns to welcome stragglers, up and down In all our towns from Beersheba to Dan, Till He should come? And how were men to know?

Had I known,

I would have turned the whole inn upside down, His honor, Marcus Lucius, and the rest, And sent them all to stables. So you have seen him, stranger, and perhaps Again may see him? Pray thee say for me I did not know; and if he comes again, As he will surely come, with retinue, And banners, and an army -tell him my Lord That all my inn is his to make amends.

And many slept and did not see


The faint far gleam when dark unfurled—



ONLY 35% OF CHURCHES SUPPORTING BIBLE COLLEGE

In a recent analysis of the churches financially supporting Free Will Baptist Bible College, the Reverend Paul Ketteman, director of public relations, noted that during the 1968-1969 fiscal year 442 churches, about 35 percent of those affiliated with the National Association, gave anything to the school.

Church gifts to the school's general and building funds ranged from one dollar to ten thousand dollars. He also noted that 74 Free Will Baptist Churches gave amounts exceeding \$500. Of that number, the gifts of 31 churches exceeded \$1,000. The gifts of individuals within churches made directly to the Bible College or gifts made through cooperative programs were not included.

In the first four months of the 1969-1970 fiscal year, 12 states have increased their giving to the school over last year. They are: Alabama, Colorado, Hawaii, Illinois, Michigan, Mississippi, MISSOURI, New Hampshire, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Virginia.

Missouri has given 35% of their quota as of October 31. Our giving from June to October totaled \$4,253.01 which was an increase of \$378.37 over the same period of last year.

Mr. Ketteman reports that monthly giving to the school, while good, is averaging \$1,500 less than what is needed to meet the 1969-1970 gift quota of \$175,000. He points out however, that giving in the later half of the year usually picks up. He is hopeful of raising the entire gift budget by May 31, 1970.

MERL'S CHAPEL CHURCH

The Merl's Chapel Church celebrated their 40th Anniversary Sunday, November 9th, with special services throughout the day. Four of the 10 former pastors were present and two charter members of the church. The Anniversary climaxed a week of revival with the Rev. Billy Joe Gentry as the Evangelist. Rev. Lloyd Jeffreys is the pastor of this church.

STATE HOME MISSION BOARD ASSUMES INDEPENDANCE MISSION

The State Home Mission Board has assumed full sponsorship of the Independance Mission. The mission has called the Rev. Earl Langley of Ashland City, Tennessee to pastor and has sought the full assistance of the Mission Board's support in aiding their work. The Board reports their need of additional support to promote their work at an increase of \$300-\$400 per month of present giving. The Board chairman noted that it takes \$265.00 per week at present to pay Missionary salaries alone in the supported mission projects.

MYRTLE CHURCH

The Myrtle Church reports the loss of one of their oldest members in the passing of Mr. Javan E. Cantrell, October 10th. He was 88.

ST. JOSEPH CHURCH

The St. Joseph mission sets new Sunday School record with 74 in attendance. The mission averaged 51 for October.

O'FALLON CHURCH

The O'Fallon Church reports a one conversion and three rededications during October with three new members received during the same period.

Pastor Dale Underwood is leading this fine church in an upward growth both spiritually and numerically.

MISSIONARY PRAYER PARTNERS

Prayer Partners in your Auxiliary can meet two needs: more power and more fellowship with one another. Here are some suggestions for monthly meetings:

- 1) Make name tags appropriate for the month. Include a prayer request on each of these. Make 2 of each color or object. Let the ladies match the colors or objects for their monthly prayer partner.
- 2) Write a Bible verse on one side of your paper and your prayer request on the other, then cut them into 2 parts like a puzzle. Have each take one piece as they come in and match puzzle parts for their monthly partners.
- 3) For Feburary you might cut out red hearts and write the missionary couples on them (one name on each

heart). You could match the husband and wife couple for partners that month and pray for the couple you and your partner have.

Let the prayer partners spend time together at your meeting in prayer to share requests. Encourage them to write each other's requests down and pray about them during the month and to spend extra time together if possible.

A missionary to China relates this incident:

My Chinese was very sketchy, but I was learning. I knew there was no hope of being able to speak or teach in meetings. However, I found comfort in the thought I could at least be friendly and learn the ways of the Chinese people. But how wrong I was!

One day I was alone in the little room I shared with a nurse. I decided to do my nails. I heard footsteps and a wavering voice at the door. It was an old

Can you identify with this missionary? Do you see beyond yourself and your family to glimpse the heart-needs of others?

Christ often spoke of loving and caring about others; but more frequently He demonstrated it. He was not too aloof to talk with the Samaritan woman; too proud to associate with publicans and sinners; too impatient to listen to His disciples; or too busy to bless the little children. You see, He cared!

Are we like a caterpillar that binds itself snugly in silken threads of a cocoon anticipating that soon it will become a beautiful butterfly? That caterpillar spins its home with everything it needs inside. It isn't aware that there are other caterpillars struggling to prepare their cocoons. It does not notice that some are battling under tremendous burdens, or impossible circumstances. That caterpillar has its cocoon all snug and "comfy". That's all that matters.

Are we so absorbed in ourself that we do not look beyond our little circle of friends to the ones who need help? These ones do not need a lecture, or advice, or even a brow-beating. They need Jesus.

Try listening, not judging. Try sharing their burden, understanding their circumstances. In other words — really care! How they will rejoice when they find the One whom you have found!


What about those who need Jesus? Are you too busy spinning your cocoon — making your own life? Do you really care about them?



AN EDITORIAL

Man, The Moon, and Last Christmas

Last year on Christmas eve one quarter million miles out into space in orbit around the moon, astronauts Borman, Lovell and Anders took turns reading the majestic passage on creation from the first ten verses of Genesis. Since the historic flight thousands of letters have poured into NASA commending the astronauts for acknowledging the God of the universe.

Apollo 8 Commander Borman told reporters in a Washington, D.C. press conference, "I can't understand taking a trip like this without recognizing its religious significance." He indicated to several hundred newsmen present that the trip to the moon has bolstered his religious beliefs.

Although not immediately challenged by legal action, the reading of the Genesis account by America's three moon-orbiting astronauts caught the attention of the Supreme Court. As well as that of self-proclaimed atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair who has challenged the astronauts for injecting religion into the moon flight and the Moscow radio who tried to dismiss the reading of the Scriptures as a joke.

It is encouraging to me to note that the vast majority of Americans, and others in the free world, have applauded the readings by letters to NASA or their Congressman. The public's overwhelmingly favorable reaction and the letters which still flow into NASA can help neutralize these forces which seem bent upon removing the Bible and prayer from every phase of public life.

I wish to strongly urge every reader of this publication to take a stand by writing the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Manned Spacecraft Center, Houston, Texas 77058 and go on record favoring the Bible reading and opposing efforts to censure it.

Since last Christmas our space program has placed man on the moon and at this writing we have men in orbit there with the instruction to set down on it again. With each moon flight there has been either Scriptures read or acknowledgement of a Supreme Being. Our space achievements, impressive as they are, should first point to the greatness of God, not the greatness of man. For on this ball three billion people live and die, love and war, rejoice and sorrow. Viewing this sight, the moon, the stars, the heavens, they too must have wondered, "What is man, that thou art mindful of him? And the son of man, that thou visitest him?" (Ps. 8:3,4)

May we keep this Christmas season a rejoicing one by letting our leaders know we wish to remain free from the oppressions of Satan's devices by taking our Christian and Civic stand.
