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Rebellion's Downward Path

by Rev. James McAllister Jonah 1:1-17

Jonah was a preacher. His job was to preach. His duty was to be ready at any time to preach, anywhere. It is not surprising that God should call a preacher to preach His message where it was needed. THE WORD OF THE LORD CAME TO JONAH ... This was the Lord speaking and men ought to always listen when our Lord speaks. ARISE ... Jonah was possibly resting. God says I have a commission for you. GO TO NINEVAH THAT GREAT CITY AND CRY AGAINST IT. Their wickedness is come up before God. Their wickedness was a bold and open affront to God. There Jonah was to cry out against sin because He was the preacher of the Lord, and his duty was to preach against sin. It is always the Christian's duty to stand against sin and to warn against sin. By doing this he saved some from Hell. So we see God's call to Jonah to go preach.

In the third verse the Bible says, "But Jonah rose up to flee unto Tarshish from the presence of the Lord." He arose, but not to go preach. He arose to flee from the presence of the Lord. Obviously he had not learned the lesson of Job. He said, "He is everywhere." Jonah went down to Joppa and caught a ship to Tarshish. Thus we see his *first* step downward. He was going directly opposite from where the Lord had sent him.

The devil's way is always diametrically opposite to God's way. It may appear the same or seem similar, but it is always opposite. Jonah paid to take a ship to Tarshish. He did not particularly want to go to Tarshish, but there was a boat going that way so he paid to ride it. When a man is running from God he is not practical in how he spends his money. He cared not. His only desire was to get out of the presence of the Lord. So he went with the mariners. He was a royal messenger of God. His rebellion makes him become a companion of sinners. He went down into the innermost part of the ship...He takes his *second* step down, trying to hide himself...He did everything possible trying to hide himself. He went to sleep...He became asleep to everything around him. So it is with the backslider, he sees not the condition of the world but sleeps on, ignorant to the eminent danger.

But notice that a storm came up . . . It threatened to wreck the ship. When the preacher is asleep, sin does always conquer. Notice what the mariners did. They cast everything unnecessary overboard. Each man cried out to his particular god. They awakened Jonah and told him to call on his God. They cast lots to see who was to blame. And the lot fell upon Jonah. They asked Him who he was and what he had done. Jonah said, "I am an Hebrew; and I fear the Lord, the God of Heaven." Isn't it amazing how when a backslider goes away from God, even though he lives as though he never fears God or His wrath, he will quickly acknowledge that he knows God, and fears Him, and knows what he should be doing. They asked him what they should do and he told them to cast him into the sea. They didn't want to do this, so they rowed harder; but the storm became more turbulent. They stopped rowing and began praying to the Lord. "We beseech you, O Lord, let us not perish for this man's life and lay not upon us another's blood." So they took up Jonah and cast him forth down into the sea and the sea ceased from her raging. Thus we see the third downward step of Jonah. This time it was not his doing. In verse 17 we see the all-seeing and all-knowing ability of the Lord: "Now the Lord had prepared a great fish to swallow up Jonah." You see the Lord knew what was going to happen and had prepared a fish to swallow him, and so we see Jonah going down again. This time he went down into the belly of the fish. Now notice the following lessons:

- 1. A disciple rebelling against God.
- 2. God pursuing him and his chances to return.
- 3. The effect of a backslider on the world and especially on the church.
- 4. What happened when he was cast out of the boat, and what happens when the backslider is cast out of the church. (But everything should be done before casting him out of the church.)
- 5. God capturing the backslider. This is very similar to the story Jesus told of the prodigal son being caught in the pig pen.

You can rebel against God in many different ways. But the Scripture says, "He that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is a sin."

Oh how I pray that you won't be guilty of rebelling against God. Get involved in doing His work today. Souls are lost, and maybe we can win a few of them to the Lord before it is too late.

The Joy of "Tithing-Plus" Stewardship

A stewardship testimony of Mrs. Minnie Pearl Thomas, a member of the Olivet Free Will Baptist Church, Marshall, Missouri, as told to the Editor.

Minnie Thomas has been a tither for more than 20 years, but only in the last four years has she experienced the joy of "tithing-plus" stewardship. "Tithing-plus" stewardship is the concept that a Christian has given nothing to the Lord until he gives above his tithe, because the tithe is the Lord's and the conscientious Christian is obligated by a sense of loving obedience to pay his tithes. What he gives to the Lord's work above his tithes he gives not out of any sense of duty or obligation but simply because he wants to.

Minnie Thomas wanted to increase her giving to the Lord's work so badly that, at an age when most people are thinking of retiring, she began to pray for a second job to provide the additional money she wanted to be able to support her church and denominational mission program. But that is getting ahead of our story. Let us go back and see what brought her to this point of Christian dedication.

Minnie was saved the first time she ever heard the gospel preached although she was already grown and married at the time. The first five years of her Christian life, she failed to grow significantly in the faith because of lack of fellowship and participation in her church. "Those were difficult years as a Christian," she said, "having the Holy Spirit indwelling my heart trying to lead me and chastising me but without much ambition on my part to be a good Christian."

She at last grew weary of this half-hearted effort on her part to live for the Lord and rededicated her life to Him. At this time she agreed to teach a Sunday school class, become more regular in church attendance, and for the first time in her life started tithing. But by her own admission, she tithed legalistically, just out of a sense of duty.

In 1968 Minnie and her husband, Bob, moved to Marshall, Missouri, and soon joined the Olivet Free Will Baptist Church. Under the faithful example and instruction of Pastor Cliff Bowman, Minnie's Christian life began to bloom. She began to serve the Lord more than ever before in her life, and about this time her motives began to change as well. She found she was getting more joy from her Christian life because she was serving the Lord and because she loved Him and wanted to do more for Him. She had now begun "tithing-plus" giving. And, strangly enough, she found herself wanting to do more and more for the Lord. Her husband had been disabled in 1962. So she worked, out of necessity, to add to his small pension. But, her holding down a full-time job did not quench her desire to be able to do more for the Lord's work. She actually applied for a second job with the intention of giving all her income from it to the Lord.

She did not get the second job but instead took a cake decorating class and soon found herself getting orders for cakes. What started out to be a hobby grew into a missionary enterprise. From the profits of the cake decorating, crocheting, and making bead jewelry, Minnie Thomas now sends at least \$5.00 per month to *each* Missouri State Home Mission project in Independence, Columbia, Jefferson City, and Cape Girardeau; to foreign mission accounts of Bobby Poole, Jerry Pinkerton, Mable Willey, Howard Filkins, Jim McLain, and Lonnie Sparks; to National Home missionary Larry Powell and the Home Mission Loan Fund.

All of this is, of course, above her regular tithes which go into her local church. It is also above other outside giving for special church projects, revivals, Woman's Auxiliary, etc. She pledged \$100 recently, for example, to the State College Fund.

When I asked Mrs. Thomas for an interview about her stewardship, she replied, "I don't know why you would want to interview me. I do so little for the Lord." After hearing her story, I thought, "So little for the Lord?" Yes, maybe in the same way as the widow's two mites whose offering caught Jesus' eye; but, compared to the American way of getting all you can and spending all you get, offerings totaling \$150 to \$200 per month from a \$100-a-week nurse is not a little.

"Sometimes, the first of the month, I don't see how we can pay all the bills," Minnie told me, "but it always works out victoriously. It doesn't figure out in black and white, but it always works out."

"When I think about what Jesus did for me," she went on, "I do so little in return. And besides, I figure I am the gainer not the loser when I give my money and time to the Lord. I believe I have grown spiritually in proportion to the way my giving percentage has grown."

When I asked Mrs. Thomas how she would respond if someone told her they could not afford to tithe, she replied, "People are dissatisfied and complaining because they don't mind the Lord. They need the joy of giving. They are broke all the time because they don't give the Lord His part. To really give something to the Lord besides what belongs to Him is where the joy is. I wouldn't trade my life for the life of people who aren't living for the Lord, regardless of what they've got." The thoughts for this article came while I was listening to an audience participation program on the local radio station. One lady called and began to tell of the beauties of a nearby state park which she had visited and she told of the beautiful trees, flowers, wild birds, etc. Immediately after her call, another lady called and said that she too had visited

the same park, but her impressions were quite different. She complained of the rough, dirty, and dusty roads. She had spent so much of her time fussing about dusty roads that she had failed to see the beauty of nature around her. One of the ladies had been looking up while the other had been looking down. As I thought of the difference in the conversations of the two ladies, I began to compare them with different Christians that I had come in contact with since I had begun serving the Lord.

What does salvation mean to you? This is a question that all professing Christians answer. Not

audibly, always, but by the lives that they live after accepting Christ's gift to mankind.

First, let us examine the first attitude-a fire escape from Hell. Many people use Christ's sacrifice as just this and of course it is a good reason to do so. Over and over in the Bible we are warned of the conquences of not accepting Christ as Savior. We are told of the awfulness of Hell: how it was originally planned for the devil and his angels; but, because of the sinfulness and rebellion of man, its boundaries have had to be enlarged. The Bible tells us that Hell is a bottomless pit, burning with fire and brimstone; that it is dark; that there is no escape after we get there; and, perhaps worst of all, while we are there we will still be able to feel pain and remember. Remember that the reason we are there is because we refused to heed the warnings that had been given us while we were on earth. We will have no one else to blame; we will have to carry the load of guilt. pain, and shame ourselves. There will be no one else to help carry it, and Satan will mock and laugh at us for being so foolish as to have listened to his claims. So as we contemplate on the horrors of Hell we find good reason to use our salvation as a fire escape from Hell.

Now let us look at the other outlook-a stairway to Heaven. This type of people also have escaped the horrors of Hell, but they have an entirely different view of their salvation experience. They are spending their time going somewhere rather than just escaping from someplace. Their attitudes for the most part are quite different. Their service is done from a heart of love and gratitude. They work gladly for Jesus, because they keep the end of the road in view at all times. For the most part this is the type of Christian that you will find in churches that are the hardest workers, and they are also the happiest workers. They are the ones who do the job that needs to be done without grumbling and complaining. Each day becomes a new opportunity to do something for their beloved Savior and each day brings them one step closer to Jesus and their eternal home. They are not working to earn their salvation: they already have that. They are working because they love Jesus, and they are unselfish and want to share with others the joy and peace that they found when they accepted Jesus.


So, in conclusion, we find two types of Christians. They have all accepted Christ as Savior, but their outlook on life and eternity is different. One feels perhaps that he has done all that is necessary. He has done what the Bible said. He has accepted Christ as his Savior and feels that his part is done, while the other Christian feels that salvation is the first step on his way to glory. He is always looking up, he never feels that he has done enough to show Jesus how much he loves Him. One cheats himself of the blessings that he could receive by serving Jesus completely while the other is enjoying all that Jesus has for him in this life and living with the joy of knowing that this is just the beginning of what Jesus has in store for him.

MONETT CHURCH GROWING

Pastor Jim McAllister reports that the Monett FWB Church continues to grow and souls continue to be saved through the church's aggressive ministry in this southwest Missouri town. The 1973 Sunday school average was 208 and the morning worship service attendance average for the year was 231. Monett has three buses and a children's church.

RECORDS BROKEN AT VICTORY

December 16 was a record breaking day at the Victory FWB Church in Avondale, Missouri. There were 273 present for Sunday school and 309 present for the morning worship service. Fourteen people were saved and 10 rededicated their lives to the Lord. The Singing Ledbetters of Wichita, Kansas, were guests at the Victory Church for the day.

"It is an exciting time here at Victory," writes corresponding secretary, Karen Hensley. "Even though bad weather has hindered us in our building program, we hope to be in our new church by early summer."

The 1973 statistics for Victory reveal the growth the church has experienced: Sunday school attendance average for the year 178; morning worship average 204; bus riders averaged 86 per week; a total of 41 persons united with the church; and 258 persons made decisions in the services, 130 of them first-time decisions. The church's offerings for the year totaled \$44,950.60, which is a weekly average of \$864.43.

THEME FOR 1974 STATE CONVENTION CHOSEN

The Executive Committee of the General Board of the State Association met last month in Lebanon and began making plans for the 1974 State Convention. "I Must Work... While It Is Day" was chosen as the theme for the August 20-22 associational meeting to be held with the First FWB Church of Flat River.

The four messages chosen by the committee to carry out the theme were: (1) "Signs of the End Time"; (2) "Coming to Grips With the Urgency of This Hour"; (3) "The Unfinished Task"; and (4) "The Laborer's Reward." Speakers will be announced later.

FWBBC LIBRARY WING PROJECT CATCHES ON IN STATE

Rev. Bob King who works with the Director of

Development at Free Will Baptist Bible College told the State Executive Committee on their meeting last month that the Library Wing Project which our State Association adopted last August is catching on in all parts of the state.

King said more than \$6,000 had come in in cash and more than \$50,000 in firm commitments had been made toward the \$125,000 goal.

Two special events planned for the coming months are designed to boost the total cash and commitments nearer the projected goal. The Drama Tour scheduled for March 23-29 should not only better acquaint Missouri Free Will Baptists with the school and students and rally financial support for the project, but should also prove a tremendous spiritual blessing to those attending the production. Churches hosting the Drama Tour include West Plains, Springfield's South Fremont, Mountain Grove First, Monett First, Berkeley First, and Farmingtin First. Other Participating churches had not been confirmed at press time.

The second rallying event scheduled by the college promoters for this spring include 25 Walk-A-Thons for the Bible College in the state before June 8. Pastors and youth directors of our Missouri churches are encouraged to plan a Walk-A-Thon for your youth. Suggestions for conducting a Walk-A-Thon may be obtained by writing the College's Office of Development, 3606 West End Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee 37205.

Every Church in the state is urged to do something toward the Library Wing Project. Have you made your plans yet?

FROM THE MCLAINS IN JAPAN

"We appreciate the way Missouri has stood behind us and given to our account and prayed for us. I wish we could report that we have a new work started. But it seemed we ran into problems everywhere we turned. We looked for a place to live in an area where we could start a work, but were unsuccessful, so we finally settled for a place to winter. We have started back to language school in a refresher course and to take some advanced language we never had before. It is good to get the wheels in our brains revolving again and we do feel that we can give this winter to concentrating on language study and perhaps by spring when many companies make transfer of personnel, we will be able to find a place in an area where we can begin a work. Pray for us that we will be led to the right place.

"We enjoyed the holidays, spending some of our holiday time sledding and skiing down a good hill nearby. Over New Year's almost all the businesses are closed from the 31st to January 4. We had to lay in a supply of bread, milk, and I got extra cans of kerosene so we wouldn't run out. Our kerosene man said it was a good idea anyway because next month there might be a pinch. We can't see that the Japanese are trying to cut down very much, but perhaps we are just too critical. Japan imports

99.7% of its oil so they quickly joined the Arabs as their friends. Economically the Japanese are scared. The dollar has gone up in value, but not as fast as the prices. Prices have gone up a lot since we've been here, and we are promised more advances after the first of the year. Everyone blames the oil shortage for the high prices, but so far there has been no shortage. But the Lord has a purpose for this. Materialism is the real god of Japan and we might have a better opportunity in our work if people realize there is no security in the things of this world. Their living has become quite easy, but there are no doubt many problems ahead for all of us. We are trusting the Lord for His perfect will to be done. Do pray for us that we might be true to Him and will be used to glorify His Name."

FROM THE PINKERTONS IN SWITZERLAND

Exerpts from a letter from the Pinkertons to the GEM Family follows:

"Tim is doing just great. The Lord has been so good to us. It has been a wonder just to see how rapidly progress has been made. He will need one more operation, but it will not be done until later in '74. The truck driver's insurance has agreed to pay our way back here. We didn't want it done in Africa unless there wasn't another way. They say even a small scratch gets infected so easily there.

"If no other problems arise, Tim and Carol will be leaving January 9 from Geneva and arriving in Abidjan the same day. If you happen to hear a loud joyous sound about that time, it might be us. Jerry's boat is to leave the 20th of January but France is known for its strikes. Also it is a freighter and will not leave until full of cargo. The boat he was to take in August was delayed twice. Please pray with us that he will be able to get to Africa as quickly as possible.

"Carol will be staying in Bouake with a couple of boys she hasn't seen in a long time [referring to the Pinkerton's sons Howard and Junior who are already in Ivory Coast]. She will stay with the Filkins at the Ivory Coast Academy, so send all letters there please. The address is B. P. 1171, Bouake, Ivory Coast, West Africa."

We especially are thrilled that the husband of one of our faithful women recently gave his heart to the Lord and attends every service with her and their seven children. He was one who drank and at times became very angry, forbidding his wife to attend the services. Praise the Lord for the change we have seen in his life! Please continue to pray for many more like him. We are looking to the Lord for great things here in this community as the precious Word penetrates into sinful hearts.

"Thanks to all of you who helped us pray concerning the request we made in our last newsletter regarding a house nearer to our work. The Lord wonderously opened up a very nice house right across the highway from our church. We had looked at this house so many times and thought how convenient and helpful it would be to live there, but it was never available. Then one day we were advised that we could rent it the first of December if we were interested. So we are now all moved in and are looking forward to greater things from the Lord as we live here in the community with our people. Considering the high rent here in Panama, we feel very fortunate to have all this for \$250 a month. It is almost impossible to find a house with at least 3 bedrooms under \$300. Praise the Lord with us for this provision, and pray with us for a great harvest of souls.

"Once again we thank you for your financial support to our account. May the Lord richly reward you for your concern in spreading the Gospel here in Panama. We continue to depend on you to help bear the financial load of this work.

Missouri State Home Missions Need You!

Numerous times since I have been serving on the Missouri State Home Missions Board, the telephone has rung, or a letter has come or someone has stopped me and I have heard welcome words: "What can I do for our state Home Missions Program?" or "How can I become more involved" or "Are there some special needs that we can share?"

Please let me share with all who are concerned with the great commission, which includes home missions, a few of the ways in which you can help our home missions program. First and foremost among our list of needs is sincere, earnest, and dedicated prayer warriors. By this I mean folk who will enter the throne room daily and make intercession for our missions program as a whole. I will list a few in a list of many things to pray about. 1. Pray that our God will baptize our missionaries with power: power to witness the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, to overcome discouragement, to take a stand in righteousness, and then when having done all to take that stand then for power to stand, and to endure persecution, ridicule, and intimidations. 2. Then pray the Lord to give them wisdom: Wisdom to know how to deal with the many problems of organizing a new work, to deal with personal problems which arise daily, and to discipline themselves. 3. Pray for each member of the Home Missions Board; pray God will raise up a people to share the burden of getting a FWB church in every city in this great state of Missouri.

This can be done by following their reports at meetings and through our state paper *The Gem*, but better yet, by a personal visit to their field of service or a letter will certainly encourage them and it will inform you.

Then of course there is always the need for finance. It takes money and lots of it to carry out the great commission of "go ye." I won't spend any time explaining the high cost of living for we all are personally acquainted with this, but I do want to say that it costs just as much for a missionary to buy a loaf of bread, a pound of meat, or a gallon of gas as it does for a banker, a farmer, a teacher, or as it does for you.

Besides the salary and living expenses there are many other needs once a missionary family reaches the field, such as an acceptable place to hold worship services. And, by the way, the days of starting a church in an old dilapidated store building on a back street, or in the Moose Hall, or the basement of someone's home is a thing of the past. That has worked in some instances in the past but people are so used to all the conviences of this modern generation that a modern facility is a must and rightly so. Then there are needs for church furniture, song books, literature, etc., and all this calls for \$ \$ \$ and more \$\$.

There are new doors of opportunity opening every day. We hear the cry on every side, "Please help us get a FWB church started in our city." We the Home Missions Board are limited in what we can do. We can go only as far as you will help us go. I want to thank every individual, every church, and every auxiliary of the church for what you have done in the past. I speak for the Board and missionaries, past and present. God bless you, and I thank you in advance for what you plan to do in the future. But now I plead, if you have not been involved in the past and are not involved at the present, will you as an individual, a church, or an auxiliary consider becoming involved now, and continue to be involved; and, if you are involved at the present, consider becoming more involved in the future. We need you. Missions is a must.

We need you to pray consistently, earnestly, and to give systematically and sacrifically. "For we are labourers together with God" (1 Corinthians 3:9).



MEETING OUR CO-LABORERS ...


