

107 YEARS OF SERVING THE LORD

Karen Montgomery, church reporter, writes, On May 24, 1987, Flat River First Church, the oldest Free Will Baptist Church in the Mineral Area, celebrated 107 years of serving the Lord. The church located on Emerson Street was begun by three ministers in 1880. Reverends J.H. Gulley, Jerry Wood, and John Wood,

started out with a handful of determined Christians to organize a place to worship. The first building was located on West Main in Flat River, and was later to become property designated as the Pastorium for the Presbyterian Church.

One of the pastors, T.J. Mann, led the church board to trade off the property and relocating in the Norwine section of the city. The property was secured about 1918 near the school on Emerson Street. Eight people were present for the first service; and one of them, Mrs. Alberta Davis, continued her faithful worship until she passed away in March of 1986.

A great many can remember the hardships, the struggles, and the challenge of the mining camp days. "They wouldn't allow us to ring the church bell because it would awaken the night crew," said one aging member. The Depression and Two World Wars are among the historical events which have helped to shape the minds and hearts of so many who continue to worship at First Church.

Present Pastor, Ron Edgil says, "We have a wholesome appreciation for those who have preceded us in this ministry. Our desire is to continue their dreams and aspirations that a Free Will Baptist Church should become a vital part of this community and that legacy lives on."

A day of homecoming services and a fellowship dinner were enjoyed by all. The very talented Durbin Family followed in concert at 1:30 p.m.

Revival services continued on throughout the week with Dr. Joe Ange from Virginia Beach, Va., serving as evangelist. God spoke to our hearts through the tremendous preaching of Dr. Ange. Rev. Ted Wilbanks from Farmington, Mo. served as music director as he led the congregation in some "powerful singing" for the Lord. We had a good week of revival services, and we pray that from these meetings, we will continue to "grow" and "prosper" for God's glory.


The church enjoyed a four-day revival with Reverend

Dale Skiles. The Lord blessed with two rededications and an attendance of seventy in the Morning Worship.



A Letter From Charolette Tallent

Your faithful participation in my ministry over the years has been the contributing factor in the victories for our KING in the proclamation of the message of Christ to the French. I thank you with a grateful heart for your ministry of prayer and financial gifts shared.

Through this letter, I would like to share with you my future plans. Allow me to do so through an excerpt from a letter sent to Mr. R. Eugene Waddell, General Director of the Foreign Missions Department, in April.

"Returning from France June 1986, I came home feeling physically, emotionally and spiritually fatigued longing that furlough would present time for recuperation and restoration. Since being home this fatigued feeling now has been compounded to a drained, washed-out state. Deputation this furlough has been more demanding than the precedent ones of 1977-78 and 1981-82. In reality, it has presented little time for evaluation or a breather from the pressures of performing. If I were to return to France in my present state of mind, I do believe that I would not be productive. Therefore, I am requesting a leave of absence effective July 1, 1987 to June 30, 1988."

May 4-7 the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Board met for their annual meeting at which time this request was granted. I would like to underscore for you **this is only a leave** . . . time off from deputational ministry, a time of refreshment; regrouping of my thoughts so as to return to France revitalized. This is not a resignation. Therefore, I am still under missionary status with the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Board.

You may ask, "What are my plans for this next year?" and rightfully so. With a leave, I will not receive my salary from the mission board, I will, therefore, obtain employment. At least for the fall quarter, my plans are to attend Columbia Graduate School of Bible and Missions in Columbia, South Carolina taking

courses both to refresh my mind and enhance future ministry in France. Time will be given to visiting with my family with whom I and they are becoming somewhat strangers. This year will also enable me to be with my home church who through the many years has been supportive of my ministry.

If you have been giving to my account for some time or are a new supporter obtained during this year's deputational ministry, may I encourage you to continue your giving. My mission account in Nashville is still open and all gifts designated to it will be placed therein. Your continued support throughout the year would mean, I would not have to resume deputation so as to accumulate the necessary funds for returning to France.

Thank you for your understanding hearts, prayers and continued mission financial support. May the Lord's blessings be yours today enriching you as you endeavor to serve and grow in Him.

Paul Ketteman Called Home

Reverend Paul J. Ketteman, 62, Public Relations Director of Free Will Baptist Bible College, died in Nashville May 21 following a three-year struggle with bone cancer.

The funeral service was held in the college's Memorial Auditorium on Saturday, May 23. Words of tribute were said by Dr. Charles Thigpen, Dr. Robert Picirilli, and Dr. L.C. Johnson. Reverend Garnett Reid and Reverend Chris Real also spoke.

His death came one week after he was honored by the Bible College's Board of Trustees for 25 years of service to the college. The recognition was given as part of the college Commencement Exercises, held in the Activities Building May 14, at which some 900 people stood in tribute to his work and courage.

Mr. Ketteman, the first student to arrive when the college opened in 1942, received the Bible diploma in 1945. He earned his B.A. at Columbia Bible College in 1947.

His pastorates included Mt. Elon FWB Church, Pamplico, SC; Edgemont FWB Church, Durham, NC; and First FWB Church, Columbus, MS. He served as clerk of the National Association of Free Will Baptists for four years and for nine years was a trustee of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

President Charles A. Thigpen said, "Paul Ketteman was one of the best friends this college has ever had. He was a loyal, supporting pastor for many years, he was a very effective member of the Board of Trustees and he was an outstanding representative of the college as Director of Public Relations. He made many friends for the college."

Mr. Ketteman is survived by his wife, Helen, who teaches business at the college, and by three children: Greg Ketteman, of Nashville; Mrs. Carol Reid, of Greenville SC; and Mrs. Joy Corn, of Savannah, GA.

All who knew Paul Ketteman will feel that they have lost a dear friend.

Points for Pastors

When a pastor leaves a church several things happen and it is very important to try to understand these things and how they influence and often times impede the working of the church.

The departing pastor (we'll call him pastor number one) and the new arriving pastor (we'll call him pastor number two) often find themselves in conflict with one another. Here's how it works.

Pastor number one gathered a group around him who supported his ministry and helped him build the work. They were just a little closer than others. They made themselves an intimate part of the pastor's ministry. He relied on them for strength, support and prayers. Now he resigns and these precious people who had been people of power and influence in the church find themselves without a leader. They probably hurt a little more than others hurt at the loss of the pastor. They wander in confusion through the interim period. They feel like no one can take his place. They resent his leaving them. They resent the thought of another taking his place.

Suddenly a new minister moves into the parsonage. He just isn't like pastor number one. They plan to like him. They plan to love him and work with him. While they are trying to accept this situation the new pastor begins his ministry and a new group of people who were not in the inner circle with pastor number one now come into prominence and become the inner circle with pastor number two.

What happens? Resentment builds. Maybe church war breaks out between these two groups. The new pastor and pastor number one are innocent victims. God's church suffers, and a lot of people are hurt. What to do?

First, acknowledge that these things are not right, and put the cause of Christ above personal desires.

Second, begin loving the new pastor and resolve to work with him and become a part of his ministry.

Third, don't be guilty of attacking him, putting him down, resenting him, and fighting against him. He is now your pastor. Love him and work with him in building God's church.

God will bless you and soon the church will begin growing and prospering again. You'll be surprised that pastor number two is a great man of God also.

This Is It

Luke 24:46-48 — "And (He) said unto them, Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day . . . And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem, and ye are witnesses of these things".

These Scriptures are the words of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ to His followers before He ascended into Heaven. He was in His Glorified Body when He spoke these words. He was giving His followers His last and final instructions before He returned back to His Father. Acts 1:3 states that He was speaking of things pertaining to the kingdom of God. Acts 1:9 states — "And when He had spoken these things, while they beheld, He was taken up and a cloud received Him out of their sight." Luke 24:51 states — "and it came to pass while He blessed them, He was parted from them, and carried up into heaven. While Christ was in His Glorified Body some forty days upon the earth, He gave his followers, who made up the church, what is known as the Great Commission. This is recorded in Matt. 28:18-20, Mark 16:15-18, Acts 1:8, and here in Luke 24:46-50, which is our scriptural text.

I would like to consider our scriptural text with this title in mind, THIS IS IT. Many times when we use these words, This is it, we mean—it's final, it's all we have, there is nothing more to offer, Take it or leave it, for this is it. But when Christ spoke these words, of our text, He was giving them the message that the world needed in order to be saved. I want to consider the words of our title THIS IS IT, with four great truths in mind, concerning the great Salvation that Christ has given to us.

1. This is It—The Plan of Salvation
2. This is It—The Span for Salvation

3. This is It—The Man telling of Salvation
4. This is It—The time for Salvation.

I. This is It—The Plan of Salvation.

Salvation is a gift that God has given to mankind. Titus 2:11 — "For the grace of God that bringeth Salvation hath appeared to all men." This was the purpose of Christ coming to the earth. Luke 19:10 — "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." But there is a plan in our text, concerning our salvation. Verse forty-seven gives us the Plan. The Plan is Repentance. "And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached." There is no salvation apart from repentance. Outside of repentance there is no way of securing salvation (pardon) for our sins. No sacrifices, nor religious ceremonies can we give or do to secure salvation. The Plan of Salvation is through Repentance—This is It, there is no other way. Christ in His glorified Body, when giving His final instruction, reminded His followers to preach repentance for the remission of sins. He made it clear, that this is it, and there is no other way. The plan is Final.

II. This is It—The Span For Salvation.

What is the span of salvation? Verse 47 teaches that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. The span is the entire world. Mark 16:15 — "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every Creature." No one is excluded. God loves all. He gave His Son for the world. No race, no age, no creed, can say, that the plan of salvation is not for them. The Span for Salvation is for all. This is it. Whosoever can have Salvation.

III. This is It—The man to proclaim it.

Not just the preacher, not just the deacon, nor the Sunday School teacher, but everyone that is born of God. Every Christian is a gospel witness for Christ. Everyone will not preach a gospel message from the pulpit. Everyone will not do visitation in person. But, everyone can live a life that the world can see Christ in one's daily walk. The life we live may be the means of carrying the gospel to someone. Christ said — "Ye are witness of these things." The only gospel some will ever hear or see, is the gospel they see in our lives. If we are saved, then we are the man—this is it, there is no other man.

IV. This is It—The Time for Salvation.

The time of Salvation is now. The time to witness is now. The time to preach repentance is now. Now is the Time. Now is the time for the church to preach and teach the plan of salvation to the world. 2 Cor. 6:2 states — "For he saith, I have heard thee in a time accepted, and in the day of salvation have I succoured thee, behold now is the accepted time, behold, now is the day of Salvation." The world today is in need of salvation. I believe we can say, This is it—This is the time, that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations.

I pray, I hope, that the church of today will resolve to take the words of our text, and preach the gospel of Christ to this lost and dying world while we still have the time and opportunity. 



Krista is survived by her parents, Mr. & Mrs. Frank Eaton (Frank and Katie), one sister, Eron and one brother, Frankie, Jr.





She also visits the sick, makes needed phone calls, and sends cards or letters of warmth and kindness to many in need. Prayer is a stronghold in her life. She is most always enthusiastic about whatever she is called upon to do. She is excited about her church, and generates more enthusiasm in me and in the other ladies of the church. It is hard to be discouraged when around her. What she has seems to be catching. She takes such a load off the pastor's family with all the little tasks she **tackles**. By the way, she even **volunteers**, and gladly.

Wouldn't it be nice to have more Sister "Phebe's" in our churches. We could have. You might be a potential candidate yourself. It isn't necessary for all of us to have a charismatic personality, or some "up-front" ability. Just begin looking for some of the little things you can do, that when mixed with faith and prayer and gladness of heart, bless the work of Christ.

Looking out my parsonage window, I see a mighty potential for thriving, growing churches, as God makes use of both the more "seemly" and "unseemly" gifts among us. Romans 16:1-2.

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
