### Points for Pastors by James McAllister

You are the new pastor. The church has had a very successful ministry under the direction of the former pastor. He left, he said, because God was finished with him in this place, and wanted him elsewhere. Now you are in the driver's seat, and to your surprise, people aren't as willing to accept you as their leader, as you are willing to become their leader.

Now what do you do? You didn't ask for the job. You prayed about it. The church said they prayed. You were elected, assured of the support of the people, moved to the parsonage, and now you discover you are the bad guy. It seems as though everybody is blaming you for the old pastor's resignation. Everybody knows that it isn't true, but someone has to be blamed and it seems that you are the chosen one.

No one attacks you, they are nice, but you suspect that soon people will go beyond their nice coolness and

become cruel, vindictive, and antagonistic. With this suspicion you start erecting barriers, putting up resistance, watching your step, and in general, becoming a defensive pastor. You begin to notice how you are always on the watch. You must not make any mistakes. But everyone knows that when you are being careful not to make mistakes, that will often be the very thing you do.

Here is your position: You are the duly elected pastor of this church. You prayed, the church prayed, and you felt secure in your decision. You still believe you are where God wants you. Then why won't the congregation accept you?

This is dilemma many pastors must endure, and suffer through. What can he do? What must he do? Is it possible to experience these things and still have a happy and successful ministry under these circumstances.

Since I have raise the question, and presented the problem, I will in the next several articles, offer some suggestions as to how best to handle these and other problems.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists meets at Municipal Auditorium July 17-21 in Kansas City, Missouri, for its 52nd annual session. Executive Secretary Melvin Worthington says he expects more than 6,000 delegates and visitors from 40 states for the five-day meeting.

For the sixth time in 44 years, the national convention will be hosted by the 17,000 members and 160 churches of the Missouri State Association. The convention last met in Kansas City in 1978.


Five ministers will speak on the 1988 theme, "Back to Basics." They include Pastor Wallace Malone (Decatur, Ill.), Pastor Larry Hughes (Walnut Ridge, Ark.), Pastor Bob Thompson (Poteau, Okla.), Pastor Glen Rehkop (Arnold, Mo.), and Foreign Missions Director of Church Ministries Fred Warner (Nashville, Tenn.).

Meeting simultaneously with the National Association are the National Youth Conference with an expected 2,000 registrants and the 53rd annual Woman's National Auxiliary Convention with more than 1,200 women anticipated.

Greg McAllister, pastor of New Life FWB Church, O'Fallon, Missouri, will keynote the 1988 National Youth Conference service Monday evening, July 18, when more than 2,000 teens are expected to gather in Bartle Hall. This year's theme, "Proclaim Liberty!" is taken from Isaiah 61:1. Youth competitive activities conclude on Wednesday of the four-day conference.

The two-day Woman's National Auxiliary Convention meets July 18-19 in Municipal Auditorium. Home Missionary James Munsey, director of Mexican Missions, will deliver the 11:00 a.m. message Tuesday. Mrs. Laura J. Thigpen, speech professor at Free Will Baptist Bible College, will address the WNAC Fellowship Dinner at 5:00 p.m.

The members are very active in helping the church and community.


## REPORT FROM THE FIRST FWB CHURCH OF WAYNESVILLE





# Minute Meditation

"And God said unto Noah, the end of all flesh is come before me; for the earth is filled with violence through them; and, behold, I will destroy them with the earth." Genesis 6:13

In the first book of the Bible, God explains His feelings about sin. He had created man in His own image, and because of the works of the flesh man had fallen to a very low state. His mind was not upon the things of God, but upon evil continually. The sight of wickedness and violence grieved the heart of God to the point that He was sorry that He had ever created man.

But, there was a man named Noah who was in the right relationship with God. While people around him were going their own ways ignoring God's commands, Noah determined in his heart to live right. Noah had not placed his confidence in the flesh, but walked with God. He was a just man and perfect in his generations. And Noah found grace in the eyes of the Lord. Even from the beginning, grace in the sense of kindness carried with it the idea of free generosity. Free generosity! How descriptive of God's attitude and actions toward us!

Even though this verse was spoken to Noah, the preacher of righteousness, I wonder if it ought not be relayed to our generation as well; for the verse states that the cup of God's wrath was finally full. He had given opportunity and all needed provisions for man to live a life acceptable to Him. The reason his wrath was full was because the flesh or sinful man as in verse 3, has so influenced the earth that violence prevailed. Today the works of the flesh found in Galatians 5 have influenced every area of our society that violence prevails on every hand.

The last portion of the verse says God will finally destroy sinful flesh. I'm thankful that we may know something of the same grace that Noah knew and that Jesus Christ, our ark, has gone to prepare a place where flesh and blood cannot enter. A place of peace not violence.

I hope this generation will see that God has not closed his eyes to wickedness, but will one day say, "the end of all flesh is come before me." Will you throw off the works of the flesh or be thrown off yourself at Judgement. If you plan to go to Heaven, you must prepare now, because flesh will not enter there.
