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

From the Editor


Pastor appreciation........... why do we need a day or a month? Is it because we do not appreciate our pastors on a regular basis and need to make up for our shortfall? I am sure



that most of our Free Will Baptist churches are very appreciative of their pastor, his abilities and the job that God has called him to do. This article is not for those who do appreciate their pastor, but for those few who do not!

Schedule....I once heard of a deacon who was very critical of how his pastor spent his time. His

comments centered around the tired, old accusation that the pastor only has to work one day a week. So, the pastor invited the deacon to spend the week with him. As God would have it, it began as a typical week. Sunday evening, after preaching twice, teaching Sunday School and conducting the Nursing Home service, the pastor arrived home to a ringing phone. One of the attenders had been taken to the hospital, could he come immediately.



pastor later and had gone home. The pastor called the deacon's home to make sure he was okay and his wife said, "Oh pastor, he's fine, He just came home to take a nap and said he would see you tomorrow!"

Soon, this deacon became one of the pastor's strongest supporters and actually began to volunteer to make some of the calls with and for thepastor!

Your pastor is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week and will to drop what he is doing to answer the call of the membership. He does it, not because it is a job, but because it is a calling.

Scrutiny.....Most folks are used to some sort of performance evaluation on their jobs. It is necessary to determine whether an employee is productive. This usually happens annually. How would you like it if your job performance review happened weekly?! That is often the case with the pastor. After spending hours in the study on his knees and in the word, the pastor preaches what God has laid on his heart and soul, knowing that someone

will complain later over lunch that it was not one of the pastor's best efforts.

The late Fred Rogers, for years host of "Mr. Roger's Neighborhood" tells of attending a different church every Sunday while he was in seminary to hear a variety of preaching. One Sunday as he was leaving the service he turned to a friend and was about to remark that it had been the "most poorly crafted sermon he had ever

heard." He stopped short as he found her in tears. She said, "that was just what I needed to hear!" Rogers said he realized then that the "space between someone doing the best they can and someone in need is holy ground." He said, "the Holy Spirit had transformed that sermon for her and as it turned out, for me too."

Remember, if your attitude toward your pastor is bad to begin with, you will never get anything good out of his sermon. The Holy Spirit will not be able to get around your bad attitude to bless your soul.

Salary....."Lord, you keep 'um humble and we'll keep 'um poor!" That old phrase from the Ozarks is too close to the truth for many pastors. While it is true that most of our churches these days are more sensitive to the needs of the pastoral family,




service of music, testimony and preaching. A group of

there is still an attitude that often manifests itself poorly. If someone is critical in the two areas mentioned previously, it will show itself here. Paying the pastor is a sore spot if you are not satisfied with him.

All too often pastors are forced to take secondary work to make ends meet. If your though here is "well so do I," let me remind you of what the Bible says about paying your pastor. (Oh, you didn't know it said anything?") Paul is pretty clear when he tells Timothy in 1 Tim 5:17-18 " Let the elders that rule well be counted worthy of double honour, especially they who labour in the word and doctrine. For the scripture saith, Thou shalt not muzzle the ox that treadeth out the corn. And, The labourer is worthy of his reward." Try as you might to make that mean anything other than that the pastor should be adequately cared for does violence to the scripture. I will not go so far as to say that the pastor should make twice as much as his congregation (although the scripture does seem to indicate that) but I will say that it is a shame when a pastor has to worry about finance when he is burdened with the cares of the ministry.

Another area of change is housing for the pastoral family. For many years, a parsonage was seen as a good deal for the church and the pastor. The pastor was not burdened with the care and expense of maintaining a home and the church could pay the pastor less. That arrangement is growing rare these days and rightly so. Many pastors have lived in a parsonage all their ministerial lives and when they retire have no place to live and no equity in anything that would allow them to make the down payment on a home for their family. We should say, "Lord you keep 'um strong and true and we will pay 'um all you help us to!"

Stress.....we have worked recently on trying to get a group health insurance plan for our Missouri pastors and their families. We have not had much success. One agent wished me luck and then told me that Pastors are one of the most uninsurable group in America. As I asked why, I knew what his answer would be. "They are too sick," he said. "They have entirely too much stress related illness" I am sure your pastor has heard the same thing from his doctor as he visits him for ulcers or high blood pressure or other stress related illness. I once saw my doctor for a stomach problem and he said, "Just a tool of the trade!"

Why are pastors under so much stress? Why is

pastoral burnout often the topic at pastoral conferences? Probably because it is so real. Too many good men are falling by the wayside because of poor health or are laboring under the daily strain of illness that they will not give in to or have told no one about. Often their families are suffering as well. What causes this? The stress of ministry. The care they have for their flocks. And after caring for their people and all their concerns they must go home and care for their own. The burden often becomes more than they can bear.

So by now you are probably asking what is the point of all this rant. Just this.....your pastor is the man God has sent to your church to minister. You may not have voted for him but that does not matter.

He is God's man in God's church! Do all you can to support him.

Pray for him and his family. His strength comes from God so implore the Lord for daily, even hourly provision, protection and guidance for him.

Volunteer to help him. Find out what your spiritual gift is (yes, you do have one if you are saved) and make yourself valuable to your pastor and your church and to the Lord because of your service.

Bless him with thoughtfulness. A note under his study door when you feel led of the Spirit can be just the word he needs in a difficult hour. I have a file full of notes and cards that I have received through the years. I can still feel that warm glow of support and love as I reread them today. I can remember how they encouraged and strengthened me. They were "words fitly spoken."

Defend him. When someone comes to you with gossip, don't hear them. This is scriptural. Paul told Timothy "against an elder receive not an accusation." Tell them to go to the pastor and talk to him. And you do the same when you have a concern or grievance. I guarantee your pastor will have a open door.

Am I trying to say that pastors are perfect? No. Just the opposite. They are people just like everyone else. Which makes their job all the more difficulty because many folks expect the pastor to be perfect. They are just men called of God to the highest calling that exists in the world today.

Thank God for your pastor and ask God what you can do for His man and your shepherd.



Pre-Teen Camp 2005







Salina, Oklahoma. Howard was a veteran of World War II serving with the United States Army. In 1946, , he started Greenbrier Free Will Baptist Church, where served as pastor for about 12 years. Howard was a bivocational minister, also having a dairy farm at the same time. He then moved to Checotah, Oklahoma and was the pastor at the Checotah Free Will Baptist Church for 8 years and was also a contractor and builder. Howard was not only a minister but also a missionary and spent a great deal of time on the Ivory Coast of West Africa building hospital, student dormitories and homes. His last visit to West Africa was in 1972. He had served as one of the Board of Directors for Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Moore, Oklahoma for several years. Howard was a master gardener and an awesome carpenter. You would always be able to find Howard when he was working, all you would have to do was listen for someone whistling hymns, it was always said that Howard had taught mocking birds to whistle "Amazing Grace". Whenever anyone would ask Howard how he was doing he would always say "good as new" and he meant that. If you were visiting with Howard he had a way of making you feel like you were the most important person in his life. His wife, children and grandchildren were very important to him and he will be deeply missed by many.

Howard is survived by his wife Willie of the home, son W.H. Gage and wife Wanda of Pryor, daughter Ruth Bivens and husband Bud of Monett, Missouri, daughter Sue Wilcox and husband Allen of Pryor, 7 grandchildren 11 great grandchildren, 2 sisters, 2 brothers and a step-sister and their spouses.

Alabama Pastor Barry Raper Joins FWBBC Faculty

NASHVILLE, TN — Reverend Barry G. Raper, pastor of Red Bay Free Will Baptist Church in Red Bay, Alabama, has been named program coordinator for the Christian education and youth ministry programs at Free Will Baptist Bible College, according to Academic Dean Milton Fields. The 30-year-old minister is an FWBBC graduate, completing a Bachelor of Science degree in pastoral ministry in 1999.

Raper earned a Master of Divinity degree with an emphasis in Christian education from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary (Louisville, KY) in 2002. He then returned to Alabama where he served as associate pastor at Red Bay FWB Church until Pastor Tom Scott retired. The congregation called Barry as pastor in 2003, and he led the church through an \$800,000 building program to construct an 8,000-square-foot sanctuary.

Reverend Raper will teach as an adjunct faculty member at FWBBC during the fall 2005 semester as he completes his duties at Red Bay FWB Church. He will join the FWBBC faculty in a full-time capacity in January 2006. He also plans to begin work on a doctorate.

President J. Matthew Pinson said, "I am delighted that Barry Raper has decided to join our FWBBC team. He is unique in our denomination, combining excellent academic credentials in Christian education, hands-on experience in youth and pastoral ministry, and a passion for preparing cutting-edge youth, family and Christian education ministers for real-world, 21st century ministry in our churches."

While a student at FWBBC, Raper was named "Best All-Around Student" and elected student body chaplain. An All-State high school basketball player in Alabama, he played two years on the basketball team at FWBBC and was named captain of the Flames. He served as an FWBBC recruiter during the summer of 1999.

Barry put his graduate education to work while earning a master's degree. He volunteered as youth pastor at Abundant Grace FWB Church (mission work) in Louisville, KY (2000-2001). He served as


