"The Lord gives and the Lord takes away, blessed be the name of the Lord!"


There is sad news from our work in India in this issue. Bro. Carlisle Hanna's right-hand man, Pastor Bolen Marendi has passed away.

It was such a joy this past March to meet pastor Bolen and see what an effective servant of the Lord he was. He was one of the first people on the mission compound I met. It was immediately obvious that he was a man of God and totally dedicated to His work. He went about his tasks quietly, but with an aire of efficiency and ability. It was a joy to watch him in service as he led the people in worship and translated for us as we preached. When I heard of his death, I looked back through the photos I took while there and found several of the blessed Good Friday service we had at the Hanna Memorial Free Will Baptist Church where Bolen was pastor. There were pictures of he and the deacons serving communion. One of him washing Bro. Carlisle's feet. Another of him as he translated the sermon from English into Hindi for the 300 people in attendance at 10:00 on a Friday morning! The church that day was full of dedicated Free Will Baptists and he was their leader.

All the folks there in Sonapur-hat are going to miss him greatly. Especially Bro. Carlisle. Please pray for the work there. Bro Carlisle has organized and trained the men there to carry on whether he is there or not. Pastor Bolen Marendi was an integral part of that plan. Please read Bro. Dear Friends,


We are back "home" in Rolla after being on the road for a month. We truly thank the Lord for giving us safety of travel the whole time —something that we do not take for granted. Thank you for your prayers.

After services at the Twin Oaks Church in Fredericktown this weekend, we will be heading to Atlanta, Georgia. We have mentioned this is previous updates, but we want to make you aware of some new names and/or terminology that will form a part of our future ministry in Spain. This past July, our Board of FWB International Missions agreed for our mission to enter into a partnership with the International Training Alliance (ITA), in order to participate in and use the Leadership Matters Course (LMC) for our leaders in Spain, in France, and possibly in other parts of the world. This next week, Susan and I, along with Robert Bryan and Dennis Teague will be going through a special course for LMC trainers in Atlanta. This is part of our preparation to join the corps of LMC trainers from around the world. On Saturday, October 15, we will meet with representatives from all the participating missions (Wycliffe, Operation Mobilization, Christian Missionary Alliance, Pioneers, etc.) at the first International Summit. We ask for your prayers for this meeting. Please ask the Lord to lead representatives to know how to best carry out this project

of training spiritual leaders all over the world, and show us exactly what part we should play as Free Will Baptists. God is leading in unique ways and opening doors for us to have new and unprecedented opportunities to serve Him and to bring more glory to His name throughout the world.

Following the week of training for trainers, a team of existing LMC trainers will host a regular LMC for more Christian leaders from around the world there in Atlanta. From our mission Matthew and Brooke Turnbough as well as Sam and June McVay will be receiving the training, which lasts two weeks. Please pray for this LMC, both for the trainers as well as the participants. God is using this training to motivate and stimulate Christian leaders to look to the Lord for the future and to be more effective as leaders where God has placed them. Our prayer is that God will continue to bless and use this course to build His Kingdom and advance the Cause of Christ around the world. If we can have a small part, we will give God the glory and be thankful to be used in this way.

Indian Pastor Home With The Lord



Pastor Bolen Marendi

Dear Ones.

Loving greetings to all of you in Jesus' precious name.

"The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord: and he delighteth in his way." Psalm 37:23.

Our Sonapurhat pastor, Bolen Marendi, was such a man. His parents were not literate. We taught them to

read and write and they memorized scripture verses. His father would not permit his little pre-school age sons to go sleep until they had memorized these verses. We brought him to Sonapurhat to begin his first grade of school when he was six years of age. When he finished high school, he continued in Sonapurhat and worked with the boys in hostel. At the same time, he began to go from village to village to witness for our Lord.

We had only four ordained pastors to work with us through the 1960s and 1970s. When we entered our North India field, it was an unevangelized area. Our coworkers, Dan and Trola Cronk, left India in 1972. Marie and I continued to work and plant churches in our area. Five of our young men had been called to preach and we were preparing them for ordination. They were: Bolen Marendi, Kolen Marendi, Saifal Das, Jagat Das and Ronen Guha. Four of these had been in our hostels from first grade and had studied the Bible every day. They had been taught the Bible on our compound and four had been away for Bible training. After much prayer and preparation we ordained these five on 28 March 1982. Rather than pastoring one church, they were responsible for an area. Our Lord has blessed and we have 186 churches now.

Pastor Bolen continued to be responsible for the hostel, in which we now have fifty boys. He became pastor of our church in Sonapurhat. He pastored not only this church but was responsible for 26 others at the time of his

death. We have evangelists and church planters working in these areas with our pastors.

We have had an Annual Conference for more than fifty years. When we started, we had less than fifty people for the conference. The past several years, we have had more than five thousand. All of us work very hard to prepare for this and take care of sleeping and feeding all these people so they can rejoice in our Lord, be ministered to through His Word and have fellowship with one another. Many only meet during the conference each year. Pastor Bolen was the one who took most responsibility for this. He, very quietly, went about doing much more than anyone else with no thought of praise from anyone. When Brenda Kay and I told them goodbye at the airport on 3 July 2005, we expected to meet all of them again as soon as I was able to return to India.

One of the men who works in our hostel sent me Bolen's schedule for the week 3 to 10 September. It is amazing the work he did. Our Don spoke to him by telephone the evening of 9 September. He was not feeling well. They called a local doctor who has very little medical training and was Bolen's classmate in school. He told them to take him to our nearest town. They were told there he had had a heart attack and should be taken to a larger hospital. They took him to Siliguri but it was too late. He died at 6 AM on 10 September of a massive heart attack. We were following this by telephone here in Charleston.

None of us could believe our Lord would call Pastor Bolen away from the work when he was being used so wonderfully well by our Lord. Even now, it does not seem possible that he is not at work in Sonapurhat. Please pray for the many who now have no shepherd.

Please pray for Pastor Bolen's wife, Asha, and their four daughters, Shanna, Sallie, Sulee and Sylvia. As you thank our Lord, with us, for Pastor Bolen's life and ministry, please ask our Lord to raise up others to

take up this ministry. Bolen was a precious son to us and a wonderful elder brother to our Brenda Kay, Don and Mark. Thank you for being a part of this ministry and a part of the life of this wonderful servant of our Lord.







Angel Eyes The Audrey Maggart Story

"From Sorrow to Celebration." This was the headline on the front page of our hometown newspaper in early June, 2005. The article was about a little girl who was celebrating her third birthday. What made this birthday a little more special than usual? My little girl was healthy and loving

life to the fullest.

My wife, Kerri, and I met at Free Will Baptist Bible College and dated for four years and two days. On October 5, 1997 we were married. That same year we moved to my hometown of St. Joseph, Missouri. I took a job at St. Joseph Christian School and-Kerri found a job working at a bank. In 2000, our first child, Zachary, was born, and we loved being parents for the first time.

A couple of years later, Audrey was on the way, and she was to be born on June 15. She came a couple of weeks early, but June 15 would turn out to be a date that would stay in our minds forever. Kerri and I are from great Christian homes and we have never

had any major problems to deal with. This would soon change and God was already working.

In early June of 2004, I was preparing to go to the school to finish up some end-of-the year projects. Kerri was getting ready for work and preparing to take Zach and Audrey to my parent's house. Kerri had recently gone back to work at the bank after leaving a job she really loved at a local dentist's office. Insurance was one reason for her going back to the bank, but about a month earlier we sensed that this was where she needed to be. I noticed as I was

getting ready to leave that Audrey's right eye was acting "lazy." I asked Kerri about it, and she told me she thought she had noticed it the day before. After arriving at school, I called to make an appointment at a local eye clinic for the end of June. Kerri called her mom in St. Louis to tell her about Audrey's eye. Kerri's mom happened to be at an eye doctor with her mother-in-law. This doctor said he thought it might be a good idea to get Audrey in sooner. Kerri's new coworkers' sister scheduled appointments at the eye clinic, and we were able to get Audrey in sooner on June 15. Later, the local doctor shared with me that this probably saved her life.

On June 15, Kerri and I found out that our little girl had a detached retina that was most likely

caused by a cancerous tumor on the back of her eve. The term he used was "retinoblastoma" (found in only one in twenty thousand kids between the ages of two five). Shock filled our bodies, and we clung to our little girl. We could hardly talk without crying, and the three-mile trip from the eye doctor's office to our house was nothing but crying except for our little angel in the backseat who was just singing away.

On June 16, we got into a specialist in Kansas City who, after doing an ultrasound on her right eye, confirmed a tumor had caused the detachment, and we were in a serious situation. Dr. Burr in St. Joseph and Dr. Cooper in Kansas City both told us to take this

one step at a time. I never dreamed I would be asking about mortality rates concerning my two-year-old daughter.

The rates were good as long as the cancer was contained in the eye. My parents were with us, and we were all hit hard with the news. At this point we were told that we needed to be in St. Louis or Miami the following day. Kerri's family is from St. Louis so this was an easy choice. On our way home from Kansas City, Dr. Cooper called and told us that we would have a CT scan done the following morning, meet with Dr. Harbour in the afternoon, and her eye



would come out on Friday morning. It was at this point we knew this was very serious due to the fact that Dr. Harbour hadn't even looked at Audrey yet, and the best-case scenario was that her eye was coming out.

That evening we headed to St. Louis, and all the way all we did was talk about our family and listen to worship songs. Problems of the previous day were no longer in our minds, just being together and having each other was top priority. People were praying, and God was already giving us strength. The following day we met with Dr. Harbour and we found out that the cancer had not spread according to the CT scan. It was great to hear some good news, and we had already prepared ourselves for the fact that the eye was going to be coming out the following day. We also learned that she would get a prosthetic eye, a permanent implant attached to her eye muscles so that it would move with her other eye. Dr. Harbour shared that Audrey had most likely had never seen out of the eye, which made us feel better.

The following day a caravan of family members prepared to head for the hospital. As Kerri was walking out of the house to get in the car, our son, Zachary, grabbed her arm and said, "Are they taking Audrey's eye out today?" Kerri wiped tears from her eyes as she got in the car, and even though we had heard good news the day before, the reality of her eye coming out was hitting us. At the hospital we had to sign a sheet giving permission for the doctors to remove Audrey's eye. Kerri and I signed the sheet as our beautiful little girl's angelic blue eyes looked up at us. After a prayer with family, we sent our little girl off with the medical staff. Dr. Harbour had told us that the procedure would take a couple of hours, and if the cancer had spread, the procedure would need to stop immediately. We waited, hoping not to see or hear from the doctor for the next two hours. About an hour into surgery I felt a peace that could only be from God, and Psalm 46: 10 came to my mind: "Be still and know I am God." People all over were praying and we were feeling it. few moments later, the phone in the waiting room rang, and I answered. "The cancer has not spread to the other eye," the nurse told me. An hour later, Dr. Harbour shared that the cancer did not look like it had spread, and he was able to fit an adult-size implant where her eye had previously been. We would soon be with our little girl. I remember her waking up and not even being concerned about the significant patch covering the right side of her face. At one point, she looked up at my mom and asked, "Why did they do this to me?" The answer to this question came in the form of tears dropping from my mom's eyes into Audrey's blonde hair.

Soon after we arrived home, Freeman Chapel Free Will Baptist Church celebrated Audrey Maggart Day where I was able to share our story. An offering of over \$5,000 was given to help with Audrey's medical expenses. As my dad and pastor, Vernon Maggart, presented Kerri and me with the check, I hugged him and looked down to see Audrey hugging his leg as tight as she could.

Later that week, Kerri and I were praying with Audrey as we put her to bed. As we got up to walk out of the room, Audrey said something that we will never forget: "Thank you, everybody, for praying for me; Jesus loves me all the time." After the pathology report came back, it looked as if Audrey was going to need chemotherapy, as a few cells had crept onto her optic nerve, which leads to the brain. We were ready to proceed with this until severl doctors and pathologists from St. Louis and St. Jude's Children's hospital in Memphis recommended we not do chemotherapy.

Audrey received her new prosthetic eye six weeks later, and it was a great day. She had been wearing a patch on her eye all summer, and we all were tired of seeing that.

As a celebration, we headed to Branson, Missouri for the kids to ride the rides and for a time just to relax. On the way down we stopped at a Long John Silvers restaurant, and Audrey received a pirates patch with her kid's meal! We all just laughed. This past year Audrey has had two tests done under anesthesia, which came back clear. Kerri, Zach, and I were tested to see if the form of retinoblastoma Audrey had was hereditary. At this point, it appears that it is not, and that is good for a lot of reasons.



Free Will Baptist Bible College Enrollment Sets 21-Year Record

NASHVILLE, TN — Free Will Baptist Bible College enrolled 377 students from 22 states and five foreign countries for the 2005 fall semester, the highest number of enrollees at the college since 1984, according to Dr. Milton Fields, academic dean. As of September 9, the college enrolled 249 dormitory students and 128 commuter students. Officials set the full-time student equivalency at 341. By classes, they number 67 seniors, 87 juniors, 99 sophomores, 101 freshmen and 23 special students. The college's enrollment has grown 35 percent since the fall of 2001. There are 181 women and 196 men in the student body.

Dr. Fields said, "By the time all registrations close next spring and we get a final count, we anticipate registering at least 410 students, perhaps as many as 425 for the 2005-2006 academic year."

This years enrollment includes 20 from Missouri and 9 from other countries (Bahamas, Canada, Korea, Mongolia, Russia)

President J. Matthew Pinson said, "We've had a wonderful beginning to a promising new academic year. I am excited about our students this year. This marks the largest enrollment in 21 years. We are also delighted with the response to our Online/Lifetime Learning program as well as our Adult Studies Program."
