## From the Editor

## State Meeting 2007

The Clarion Hotel in Springfield was the location for the 2007 annual State Associational meeting of the Missouri Free Will Baptists. Almost 500 folks registered for the three day event beginning on Monday with the

Missouri Women Active for Christ. They heard their

officers tell of the success of their efforts this year and plans for the coming year. They were led in worship by Jodi Simpson and heard from Paul Parks. Debbie Webster and Rev. Frank Webster. The annual retreat is coming up Septem-



ber 14-15 at the Clarion Hotel and will feature Marjorie Workman and Sandy Atwood. Their project for the retreat is to help with the library at the Seminary of the Cross in Renyosa, Mexico.

Monday also saw the meeting of the Executive Committee and the General Board of the state. In business recommended by the General Board and passed by the body was an increase in subscription price for the Gem Magazine from \$4.00/\$4.50 to \$6.00/\$6.50. The increase will not take effect until the next billing cycle.



Monday evening was the opening service of the general session of the conference. The service was led by moderator Jim Williams with Greg Smith enthusing us with great congregational

singing. Our hearts thrilled to head the Jones Brothers Quartet provide the special music, setting the stage for Rev. Glenn Rehkop, pastor of Grace Church in Arnold. He began to develop the conference theme of "By Faith..." with a masterful exposition of the character Enoch and his walk of faith.

Tuesday morning was under the direction of the Christian Education Board. They chose H. B. London as

their seminar speaker, much to the delight of the congregation. Dr. London spoke directly to the heart of pastors and encouraged his listeners with his humor and practical passion.

Tuesday afternoon was the opening business session with reports being given from all our boards and committees, as well as reports from our national agencies. All our state groups had a very successful year in 2006 and were enthused to report great plans for the coming year. The Executive office reported a total of \$747,800.37 in Coop receipts for the year and \$341,000,16 in Show-



Me income with a total of \$1,403,413.50 for all giving categories. Missouri continues to lead the nation in Coop giving.

A major change in the schedule of next years state meeting was announced as well. The Youth Competition will begin on Sunday evening and continue on



Monday. The MOWAC will have their meeting on Tuesday along with our Executive Committee and General Board and our business session will take place on Wednesday.

The Bookstore reported record sales for the year.It was noted that \$24,000.00 from the bookstore profits were given back to the Missouri Cooperative Plan.

The Missouri Mission Board gave a good report on all our mission works and plans for our new Show-Me plan are moving forward under the direction of Rev. Frank Webster. We currently have works in Jackson (soon to be self-supporting), Columbia (possibly self supporting by the end of 2007), Troy (they have just purchased 5 acres of land), Raymore (their new building is just about finished), and our Spanish work in Monett (they are averaging 30 in attendance.)

The Youth Camp reported delays on the construction of the new dormitory at the camp, but preparations are well under way for this year's camping season. They also directed us to their new website (www.campniangua.com) for registration forms, brochures and photos

Being only 3, the shortest one in the crowd and not knowing me at all, he was a bit shy about his planned request but dad helped him out. "Dagen would like to give his money for missions. Then, because of their situation, they move on to other areas knowing and sharing that truth.

That dollar, which is deposited and added with the others, is also allowing for someone to travel our state and share with all of our Free Will Baptist brethren the mission needs of our National projects in which our Missouri Free Will Baptist's are working. It also allows him to explain how the Show-Me Plan helps fund our International Missionaries from our Show-Me state.

So, "Thank you," Dagan. And may I say, "Thank you" to all of you who give your dollar(s) to Missouri Missions; may God bless them into a harvest of precious souls for His Glory.

# Toujou Meeting Place Secured



# Pharmacist's Questions

Out of the blue, this morning our pharmacist María said, "Susana, may I ask you a question? I know it is a bit forward of me to ask such a question, but we have been "tuteando" (using the informal verb forms to address one another) for a while now, and so I'll take a risk and ask you this ques-

tion. You always seem happy. What do you do here in Spain?" With that question, María opened the door for me to tell her specifically why we are in Spain, which I did without hesitation. To my surprise, María began to tell me that she believes in God, that her background is in the Roman Catholic Church, but that she has not been satisfied for a long time. María shared, "There are things in the Roman Catholic Church that do not make sense to me, such as confessing your sins to a man." When she and her husband were on their honeymoon, they attended a "Protestant mass", and she thought it was great!

She asked about our children, with sincere interest, and I told her that our son and his wife do the same work as we do here in Spain, and that our daughter and her husband are a nurse and doctor in New York, and that they also serve the Lord where they are. She thought that was great, and admitted that she didn't really know too many people whose family all believe in God, and even more, who attempt to live their lives



for Him. At that moment Jeff entered the pharmacy with our grandson, and María immediately went to talk to Andrés. Before we left, María said, "I would really like to know more about your beliefs! Let's talk again."

The Apostle Paul spoke of making the most of every opportunity, which is a truth in Scripture that the Lord seems to have made a guiding principle for me in Spain:

Devote yourselves to prayer,

Devote yourselves to prayer being watchful and thankful.

And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should. Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone. (Col. 4:2-6)

Opportunities such as this one tend to arise in casual, day to day relationships that we develop over time. Building relationships take time and some effort, but the opportunities they create are worth it all.

Please pray for María, as well as for the other "Marías" with whom we relate here in Spain on a regular basis. None of us ever knows when a casual opportunity such as this may present itself.

Our Christian Education Board shared their many successes for the year, including the ongoing Palmer Leadership Institute and the continued awarding of scholarships. They are also responsible for providing the speaker for the minister's retreat.



Our Senior Adult Ministries Board shared of their very

successful retreat in 2006 featuring Rev. Fred Warner and Dr. Alton Loveless.

The Youth Ministries Board reported on the 2006 Youth Competitive Activities at West Plains with 156 entries. Their success this year also included the annual Youth Retreat at Windemere. Over 480 students from 40 churches in Missouri and Arkansas heard Rev. Alan Pointer from Russellville, AR develop the theme "First Things First". Music was by Bebo Norman, Aaron Schust and Brandon Heath. We were fortunate to be the last stop on their 2006 "Dreaming True Tour."

Rev. Randy Raines directed the Tuesday evening service and Ray Bradley, worship leader at First in Mtn. Grove lead the congregation in worship. Mtn. Grove's "Faithful Trio" and "Rejoice" from Free Will Bap-



tist Bible College in Nashville provided an inspiring



musical introduction to Rev. Dale Cochran's treatment of Abraham from Hebrews 11. He reminded us that trials are a necessary part of growing in faith.

Our Wednesday morning busi-

ness session was opening with flavorful spiritual food

presented by our assistant clerk, Kenny Panduku, continuing with the theme of "Faith."

Most of the business having been conducted on Tuesday, the morning session was taken up by discussing a proposed amendment to our Constitution and By-Laws. Recommended by the General Board from a report created by the Executive Committee, the body discussed the merits of proposed by law #66.

It states: We believe that Paul's statements in I Timothy 3:2,12 and Titus 1:6, namely "the husband of one wife..." be looked upon as making ineligible as pastors or deacons, anyone who has been divorced and remarried or who marries a divorced woman, regardless of the cause of the divorce or the guilt or innocence of either partner.

We believe that said persons, whose marital status disqualifies them to be pastors or deacons, not be discouraged in their Christian lives or Christian service, but that they be encouraged to live faithfully for Christ and serve Him in the ministry of the local church; and that such be reminded that pastors and deacons are the only church officers for whom the "husband of one wife" prohibition is given. While certainly it is the ideal for all believers, it is biblically insisted upon as a requirement for deacons and pastors.

While not insisting that this bylaw be made retroactive, we do establish this standard be upheld for all new candidates for pastors and deacons.

After a thoughtful and reasoned time of discussion, the body voted to approve the recommended by-law.

Our morning worship on Wednesday featured Parkview pastor Rev. Eddie Vincent leading us in congregational singing and the Hillsdale Trio (minus



one) providing great special music. They set the stage for Dr. Timothy Eaton, president of Hillsdale College to continue our theme with his development of the life of Joseph.

After an afternoon break, we reconvened for the evening service to discover a full house both inside and out. The youth met on the parking lot in a tent for their service that featured the praise band from Calvary Chapel Church in Buffalo and a tremendous sermon by Rev. Jeff Myers, Youth Pastor of First Church in Lebanon.

## MOWAC Retreat Announced....

Mid-September, the 14th and 15th, is the date for the 2007 Missouri WAC Retreat. The meeting place will be the Clarion Hotel in Springfield.. The speakers are two of our choice Free Will Baptist women, Majorie Workman and Sandy Atwood, from Nashville, Tennessee. Sandy and her husband Richard, who were church planters in Delaware for over 20 years, joined the Home Mission Department in 2000 to help train and supervise new church planters. Marjorie has been active in leading Women Active for Christ for many years. She serves as Executive Secretary-Treasurer for Women Nationally Active for Christ.

Arrangements for the retreat this year will require two steps and should result in very satisfactory accommodations.

The first step is to complete the Registration Form found in the GEM. The \$40.00 per person registration fee includes the cost of the Friday evening meal and all retreat activities. The second step is to contact the Clarion at 1-417-883-6550 to make room arrangements. At that time, you should inform the hotel that you are with the Missouri Women Active for Christ in order to get the special room rate. The room rate will be \$80.54, which includes taxes and Saturday's breakfast. The maximum number of people per room is four. The following is a breakdown of the cost of rooms based on the number of people to occupy the room:

From the sidewalk one could smell printers ink and see a small offset printing machine spitting out Sunday School lessons written and printed by Free Will Baptist. If you shook hands with Roger Reeds during those days you might have notices some ink smudges and paper cuts on his skin.

June. That month seemed to be the meeting time for several FWB state associations, Numerous times, I car-pooled with Roger as we visited one of those meetings. As we drove along in his small Rambler compact he commonly spoke lovingly of his wife, Myrtle, and their children. I won't forget some of the valuable life-lessons that he shared with this younger Christian brother.

Dr. Roger Reeds had a zest for learning and he felt God's call on his life to teach. His sermons were fully packed with solid Biblical content and clear life application. One of the "highlights", that I remember, was him speaking to the Missouri State Association of FWB on the subject of "sanctification".

Thank you Bro. Roger for your life of unselfish service to your family, friends, and your church.

NASHVILLE, TN—Three golf tournaments in three states in a 10-day period raised more than \$50,000 for Free Will Baptist Bible College, according to David Williford, vice president for institutional advancement. The golf tournaments were played in Missouri, North Carolina, and Tennessee.

"This was a first for us," Williford said about the sponsored tournament play. "But thanks to the good turnout and the positive results, we're planning more tournaments during the 2007-2008 fiscal year. If you missed this round of play, you can join us later this fall or next spring."




### From the Editor:
