October is Pastor Appreciation Month.


It's a time we have set aside to say "Thanks." I recently read a quote from an article by Ken Sande which said that 1,500 pastors leave their assignments every month in the United States because of conflict, burnout, or moral failure. In a comment on the article, another author said "There are many reasons why a pastor's ministry might be long or short. But the congregation that doesn't say, Thank you, in practical ways will almost guarantee limited success."

Words do have meaning. Two of the most powerful are "Thank You." They can reach in and flip on the light switch in a darkened soul. They are two words that are easy to say and have more impact than thousands of others.

There is ample reason to say thanks to your pastor. His dedication to you and your family go beyond what you might imagine. He hurts when you hurt. He rejoices when you rejoice. His desire is for you to be in God's favor and be used of the Lord in His service. He prays for your protection and prosperity. He approaches God on your behalf on a regular basis. His chief desire for you and your family is for you to be as close to the Lord possible That's why he preaches and teaches at your church. That's why he spends time with you, when he can catch you at home.

So how can you let your pastor know you appreciate the things he

does for you and your family. Well, you have seen the lists. Things from the large to the small are all welcome, but often the most effective is a heartfelt "Thank You." But if you need recommendations, visit www. my-pastor.com or www.parsonage. org. Both websites offer several good suggestions for practical ways to show your pastor how much you appreciate him.



But before you rush off to buy a gift, let's look at what Paul told the Thessalonians, He said, And we beseech you, brethren, to know them which labour among you, and are over you in the Lord, and admonish you; And to esteem them very highly in love for their work's sake. And be at peace among yourselves. I Thess 5:12-13

We often expect the pastor to know what is going on in our lives, remember our grandkids names, that your brother lives in Topeka, and a thousand other things about us so that he can minister to us effectively. If he should forget our birthday or some other pertinent fact of our lives, we often are offended. But Paul says that we are to take it upon ourselves to get to know the pastor. When he says that we are to "know them that labor among you," this is just what he means.

It is as we get to know the pastor that we begin to see ways that we can show our appreciation. If we know him, we will know his inordinate love for Starbucks and give him a gift card so he can pursue his mocha obsession! If we know him we will know he is a Cardinals or Royals fan and get him something appropriate. If we know him we know his favorite authors and get him a gift certificate at Lebanon Bible and Bookstore for that new release he has been wanting to read.

This passage also says to esteem him highly. God has called him to his position, we are just fortunate to be providing the place for him to carry out that service to the Lord. When a church is looking for a pastor, we speak in terms of praying for God to send us the man he knows is best for us and our church. When the Lord answers our request and the new pastor arrives we need to esteem him highly. Not because he does everything just the way we want it done, but because he is God's man doing God's work in God's church.

Are You Serious?

This is an odd title for a report on a mission trip, I know, but I don't think that I can fit all the details into this one article. I could tell you about how we experienced the grandeur of God's Creation in the Rocky Mountains. I could tell you about the excellent job done by our church, our youth, and our chaperones. I could tell you about how the group from Ofallon First Free Will Baptist church got kicked off the go-cart track for causing too many wrecks. I could tell you how our whitewater rafting trip became a conflict management illustration. I could even tell you of how we pranked Bro. Chad Kivette, the pastor of Westgate FWB in Grand Junction, CO, so that we could leave our mark. However, most of it you had to be there to see with your own eyes. Still, I would like to share with you what I gained from this experience. And if you can't guess, it directly relates with a question which continued to haunt me throughout the planning and

The first time this question popped into my head happened after we had decided to take the mission trip to Grand Junction, CO. At that point, I sat down with a map and charted the distance and the time it would take to get there. I found that Grand Junction is 1,100 miles and 16 – 18 hours from O'Fallon. I had to ask "Are you serious?" A bunch of teenagers stuck in a van for 1,100 miles and two days of travel? Even for a youth pastor that can be detrimental to one's

the actual trip.

physical, mental, and spiritual well being. It turned out to be a great experience.

The second time this question entered my mind was when the leadership team decided that the youth would do the backyard bible studies by themselves. Are you serious? Teenagers who hardly wake up before noon will be responsible to study and teach young children? Without any whining or complaining, the youth took the task on and wowed all adults present.



There were several other times this question was in the front of my mind, but I won't bore you with all the specifics. Let me share with you the last time I dealt with this question. As we were traveling home after a job well done, the question still haunted me. Are you serious? Are you as serious about reaching your community as you were about Grand Junction? Are you ready to do the same for your community? Are you ready to exert the same effort and time to make a difference in O'Fallon, Missouri? You see, mission trips have a way of bringing you to reality that other trips can't quite accomplish. I have found that mission trips help us see that we are real people serving the real God in a real world. And until we understand and feel that reality, we won't truly be serious. Allow me to explain.

There are times when we need to

experience what Rick Lawrence in his book Jesus Centered Youth Ministry calls "controlled crises". These are the times that we realize that we are real people. In other words, we are not sufficient. We are not capable on our own. We find that we need one who transcends our knowledge, our strength, our understanding, and our goodness. We find that God's Word is our instruction manual. We find the Holy Spirit to be our voice. We find our strength "in the power of His might." (Ephesians 6:10) We find the truth in "not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit says the Lord." (Zechariah 4:6) We need God, because we are only human.

Then, as we fall back into the arms of the Almighty, we begin to truly understand that we serve THE real triune God. He never fails to fulfill His promises, and we know that as we see those promises fulfilled in our lives. He gives us the strength and courage to do things that we normally might not do. He gives us the patience to deal with 20 screaming, crazy kids. He is the Creator of the mountains and the barren wasteland that is Kansas. He is with us wherever we go, from the interstate to almost drowning in the Colorado River. He is a God who must punish sin. He is the one who died for our sins. He sympathizes with the brokenhearted and comforts the one in great need. Most of all, He is not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance. (2 Peter 3:9) He died not only for me, but also for every person I see or talk to today denly, as we look through the ey of the Gospel, we see that we live in a real world.

Gas prices are outrageous. Our country is in real trouble mor-

ally. Our choices in this election are rather poor. War is all around us. According to the media, we will destroy ourselves with pollution if we do not change our lifestyle. If we are not careful, our desire is to withdraw from this dark world of evil and lies. We must see that we live in a real world full of people just like you and I who have real hurts, real needs, and real insecurities. Some families now have to choose between driving to work and feeding their family. Many are trying to find a way to fill the emptiness that drives them every day, even if that means drugs, alcohol, cults, or immorality. As difficult as this war is, there are wives and sons and daughters struggling everyday to make ends meet and living with the reality that their husband/father may not be coming home. It is a real world with real, hurting, lost people.

Until we truly understand and feel the gravity of this reality, we may never get serious. Are you ready to admit your need for the Savior? Are you ready to see through His eyes? Are you ready to confront the problems that real people have with the Truth of the Gospel? I'm ready, and I'm serious. So.....Are YOU serious?

Samantha Bevis Travels to Bulgaria




Michael Gungor Band


FWBBC Finalizes Purchase of New Campus Site

NASHVILLE, TN – Free Will Baptist Bible College officials closed on a \$2.96 million contract August 15 to purchase 66 acres for a new campus site in Middle Tennessee's Sumner County, according to President Matt Pinson. The action came nine months after the college initiated an agreement to secure the land, pending Gallatin city approvals and due diligence studies. The property is a 26minute drive from the current campus on West End Avenue and is within the Greater Nashville area.

Pinson said, "This is an important and essential step toward our dream of relocating the college. We were delighted to complete the transaction to purchase this prime property. The site meets all the criteria the college set at the beginning of its land search - close to a limited access freeway (Vietnam Veterans Boulevard), near educational and medical resources and job opportunities for students, and adjacent to a rapid economic growth area with shops, malls, restaurants, and affordable housing."

The Gallatin property is more than seven times the size of the current FWBBC campus, which means the college will not have to cap enrollment or curtail new academic programs. There is room to construct adequate buildings for instructional needs and to house students. The larger campus site permits building outdoor sports facilities for students, and provides adequate parking for students, staff, and guests.

Dr. Pinson confirmed that the college has two immediate relocation goals—(1) fund the land purchase and (2) continue marketing the current campus to potential buyers.

FWBBC gives special thanks to the faithfulness of God's people in the 1990s who believed in the vision of a new campus for a new generation and bought land in Joelton. That asset more than tripled in value by the time it was sold in 2006. The invested proceeds grew to be worth nearly one-third of the \$2.9 million purchase price when the Gallatin contract closed. Subsequently, \$865,000 is dedicated toward the purchase of the Gallatin property.

"We are in the process of contacting a number of FWBBC donors and friends, inviting them to partner with us in funding the new property purchase," Pinson said. "This will give us momentum as we move forward with relocation plans."

Colonel Mark Johnson, FWB-BC's relocation consultant who spearheaded the property search, said, "This is a great day for FWB-BC. We looked at over 100 potential

sites before settling on this beautiful land in Sumner County. Gallatin city officials, as well as business and educational leaders, welcomed us to the community while we worked with Mr. Dan Downs, the property owner, to satisfy contractual agreements. We've assembled an excellent relocation team that guided us through this long purchase process, and we're now ready to take the next step."

Although a start-up date to begin construction cannot be determined until arrangements for the sale of the existing campus have been finalized, the college has secured Hastings Associates, LLC, a Nashville firm, to design the new campus.

The FWBBC Board of Trustees committed to relocate the 66-year-old college in June 2006 following a six-month feasibility study.


